Notes for James CAMPBELL:

JAMES CAMPBELL is a mystery to us, and we've yet to even prove that his name is James; but in speculation thus far, we think he may be the emigrant or the son of an emigrant who was forced to leave Scotland during the awful time of the "clearances", which occurred circa 1740s through the late 1800s. Also unconfirmed, but speculated is that he may have married Elizabeth McCoy, also of Scotland, in Mercer County, Kentucky in 1794. They moved to Wilson County, Tennessee sometime around 1804. Hugh is the only confirmed son born in Kentucky in 1795-6. James may have lived until 1842. James [Cambell] Sr and James [Campbell] are on page 78 of Wilson Cty, TN Federal Census 1840?. Not sure of ages yet. Our James Sr appears to have died before 1850 census. See other Federal Census, not yet transcribed here.

WILL OF ANDREW PICKETT

I, Andrew Pickett, do make and publish this my last will and testament, hereby revoking and making void all other wills by me at any time made. First I direct that my funeral expences and all my Debts be paid as soon after Death as possible out of any money that I may die possessed of or may first come into the hands of my Executor. Secondly I give and bequeath to my wife Elizabeth Pickett all the money & cash notes that I may have on hand at my death. Also all the house hold and kitchen furnature consisting of all sizes. Together with all my wheat, corn & bacon on hand also all my hogs and sheep. My gray horse and Buggy and the Choice Milch Cow and heifer. Thirdly I have given and hereby bequeath to my son-in-law John Allen & Eveline Allen a tract of land in the state of Illinois, Their portionable part of my real Estate. Fourthly, I give to my son Joshua W. Pickett a certain tract of land in the state of Tennessee, DeKalb County on which he now lives, Beginning on a Beech the dividing line between O.B. & Elizabeth Wright his wife and Joshua W. Pickett, Running a north direction to Hetton's Creek on up said creek with its meanders a honey locust, A. Bones Corner on the original Deed to Andrew Pickett from William Vantrease of said land will show the buts & bounds and that is his portionable part of my Real Estate.

Fifthly I have given and hereby bequeath to my son Jonathan F. Pickett a certain tract of land lying in DeKalb County Beginning sugartree running west this and will show the buts and Bounds and that is purportionable part of my Real Estate. Sixthly I have given and hereby bequeath unto O.B. Wright and Elizabeth his wife one other tract of land also lying in DeKalb County Beginning on a sugar tree running East, this and will show the Buts and Bounds. Seventhly I give and bequeath unto my son James E. Pickett a tract of land lying in DeKalb County Beginning on a Sugar tree, Frances Turner's Corner on the North Bank of a Branch Running Thence East to a Back, Thomas W. West's Corner then North of a site a crop Fence Between my two fields designated as the Big Field & Lower Field thence a strate line so as to take in all the peace of ground called the new ground To Jonathan Pickett's Corner a sugar tree his perportionable Part of my Real Estate. Eighthly I order that my horse Jim, wagon & carpenters tools and farming tools and all the cattle except what my wife gets Be sold on a twelve months credit and when the money is collected pay it over to my wife for her special Benefit.

The balance of my Real Estate together with the mansion house to my wife Elizabeth Pickett during her natural life & at her death to be sold on a twelve months credit and the money to be divided in the following manner to witt- Give my Grand Daughter Mary Malissa Pickett five hundred Dollars, James E. Pickett four hundred Dollars. The Ballance if any there should be Equally divided between my children as follows, Emeline Allen, Joshua W. Pickett, Jonathan T. Pickett, Elizabeth Wright & James E. Pickett, all of the house hold and kitchen furnature that I give my wife to do as she pleases with at her death. Lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint James E. Pickett and O.B. Wright my Executors in witness where of I do to this will set my hand and seal this the 17th day of February, 1861.

Hicks, subscribing witness to said will or paper writing who being first duly sworn in open court deposes and says they were acquainted with Andrew Pickett, the testator of said will or paper writing that the said testator acknowledged the same in their presence to be his last will and testament and that he requested them the said witnesses, Griffith, Vannatta and Hicks, to subscribe their names to the same and that they did so at his request and in his presence and the presence of each other the day the same purports to bear the date (17th Feb., 1861) and that said testator was of sound mind and disposing

memory at the time of said signing and that he has since died in DeKalb County, Tenn. Ordered that said will or paperwriting be admitted to record. It further appearing from said will that the testator appointed James E. Pickett and O.B. Wright Executors of said will where upon the said James E. Pickett and O.B. Wright appeared in open court and Entered into Bond in the sum of five hundred Dollars with James Vannatta and J.J. Ford their securities Condition as the Law directs which Bond was duly acknowledged in open Court and approved. Where upon the said Wright and Pickett was duly sworn in open court. Ordered that Letter testamentary with a copy of this Will issue to them which is done First day of April, 1861.

HISTORY:

Gard's Point Cemetery in Wabash County, Illinois is located some eight miles northwest of Mt. Carmel, along the former Maysville Road. It is about three miles southwest of Friendsville, and about three fourths of a mile north of the Cabbage Corner Crossroad. The latter is also the northwest corner of Sherrill's (now Goodson's) Orchard and is the site of the former Nisbet Chapel Methodist Church which was removed during the year 1972. This cemetery is adjacent to Nye Chapel (formerly United Brethren), United Methodist Church.

“The Twenty-sixth Regiment was enlisted during the summer of 1861, from the counties of Effingham, Stevenson, LaSalle, McLean, Sangamon, Champaign, and one company at large, so that it represented every portion of Illinois. In August 1861, seven companies that were at that time organized, were hurried off to the defence of Quincy, which was then threatened with an attack from Price, Green and their followers. They had no arms, no clothes, no blankets, and went forth to meet the foe. The remaining three companies recruited under the most discouraging auspices, and only by the most strenuous personal exertions, did not join the command until January 1862, up to which time a dreary fall and winter was spent guarding the Hannibal and St. Joseph Railroad, fighting bushwhackers, and kindred occupations.

“ILLINOIS AT VICKSBURG”

“This regiment was organized at Camp Butler near Springfield and was mustered into the United States service on August 3, 1861, with seven companies. Three more companies were organized later and by January 1, 1862, the organization was completed, the regiment having in the meantime performed guard duty at Quincy, Illinois, and Hannibal, Missouri. February 19, 1862, it left Hannibal, Missouri, arriving at New Madrid on March 3rd and participated in the action there.

Thence it marched to Point Pleasant where it arrived on the 6th day and where it engaged Confederate gunboats with its sharpshooters. After the evacuation of Island No. 10 by the Confederates it returned to New Madrid, from which point it participated in an expedition against Fort Pillow. Thence it proceeded up the Ohio and Tennessee rivers to Hamburg Landing and marched to Corinth, Mississippi, participating in the siege at this place. On May 8th and 9th it was engaged at Farmington, Mississippi, and on May 28th was in an encounter with the Confederates near Corinth. Company G of this command is said to have been the first Union force to enter Corinth after its evacuation. The regiment served in the vicinity of Corinth till August, 1862, when it marched to Tusculum. Thence in September to Clear Creek. On the 18th of September to Iuka, Mississippi. Was engaged at this place on the 19th and joined in pursuit of the Confederate force, arriving again at Corinth on October 3d and participated in the battle of Corinth.

After this action, it followed the retreating foe to Ripley, then returned to Corinth on November 2d. It became part of General Grant's army in the northern Mississippi campaign, going as far south as Oxford, where it remained until December 20th and was ordered to Holly Springs to prevent the capture of that place by Van Dorn, which place it reached only after its capture by the Confederates and after they had fled. Thence the regiment moved to La Grange, Tennessee, where it remained until March 8, 1863. On this day it moved to Collierville, Tennessee, and was engaged in fortifying the place and defending the railroad leading to Memphis. On June 7th it broke camp here for Memphis and Vicksburg, it disembarked at Haines' Bluff about June 11th and went into camp at Oak Ridge, forming part of the line of defense across the Yazoo and Big Black Peninsula, opposing General Joseph E. Johnston's relieving army.

Upon the fall of Vicksburg on July 4th, in the afternoon, this regiment formed part of the column to disperse this relieving army. The regiment participated in the second battle of Jackson and about July 22d began its return march to the Big Black River. Here it remained until September 28th and returned to Memphis on the 7th of October.

After a few days' preparation, the regiment started for its long march from Memphis to Chattanooga on October 11th. Reached Bridgeport, Alabama, on November 15th and participated in the battle of Mission Ridge on the 24th and 25th of November. Before daylight on the 26th, it followed the retreating Confederate column to Ringgold, Georgia, and then took up its march of two hundred miles to the relief of General Burnside at Knoxville. It returned with full ranks on March 3d and remained at Scottsboro until it started on the Atlanta campaign May 1st. The regiment was engaged in the campaign and capture of Atlanta and then became part of General Sherman's army, in its march to the sea.

It participated in the siege of Savannah and capture of Fort McAllister and then proceeded to Beaufort, South Carolina, and served there and at Port Royal Ferry until the beginning of the Carolina's campaign. It was in the action of Columbia and battle of Bentonville. Thence proceeded to Goldsboro, North Carolina, and on April 10th started on the march to Raleigh. Left Raleigh May 1st for Washington. Was in the grand review at Washington. Thence proceeded to Louisville, Kentucky, where it remained until July 20, 1865, and was mustered out of service.

Started for Springfield, Illinois, and received its final pay and discharge on July 28, 1865. "

**8. Hugh<sup>2</sup> CAMPBELL** (James<sup>1</sup>) was born Abt. 1795 in Kentucky\VA, and died 07 Mar 1867 in Wilson County, TN. He married **Sarah HEARN** 24 May 1816 in Wilson County, TN, daughter of George HEARN and Tabitha SKEEN. She was born Abt. 1796 in North Carolina, and died 1870 in Wilson Co., TN.

Notes for Hugh CAMPBELL:

HUGH CAMPBELL was born ca 1796 in Kentucky, four years after statehood was gained from Virginia. Thus far, we know very little of his early life in Wilson & Smith County, Tennessee except that in 1816 he married Sarah Hearn, daughter of George & Tabitha Skeen Hearn. He was a trustee of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, near the present day community of Watertown, on the banks of Round Lick Creek. His family lived previously or had lands nearby in Smith County, possibly near Hickman Creek or Smith's Fork, which he sold to his two oldest sons, George and James when, in 1847 he decided to move further west in Wilson county, just south of the county seat of Lebanon. He supported his family here, farming on 317 acres for eight years, then, between 1850 - 1855, sold his lands, (at a very good profit), and moved to the westernmost reaches of the county, to a community on Suggs Creek, at the time called, Rural Hill, (later also known as 'Dodoburg'). Here he purchased 345 acres and was quite prosperous, raising a large family, growing crops, and making shoes until the Civil War and Union armies ravaged his land and livelihood. He died on the 7th of March 1867 and is remembered still to this day. -sjc 1996

DIVISION OF LAND - HUGH CAMPBELL HEIRS 1867 WILSON COUNTY, TN

We the undersigned Freeholders & Citizens of Wilson County have been called upon by the heirs & widow of Hugh Campbell dec'd to lay off a small portion of the real estate of said Campbell ---- to his widow for her dower in which we will hereafter describe & which amount is as much as the heirs & to partition the balance among the heirs of said Campbell, have met on the premises in the 25th district of Wilson County & provided to discharge the duty assigned us by first having the entire tract surveyed, we then laid off to the widow the amount she deserved for dower 36A 3R & 36 poles which is bounded as follows to wit Beginning at a large cedar, thence South 165 poles 16 links to a stake in Wrights line, thence South 87 [degrees] East 55 poles & 8 links, thence north 166 poles 21 links to a stake, thence north 85 1/4 [degrees] West 35 poles & 21 links to the beginning. We then proceeded to partition the remainder of the said real estate of said Hugh Campbell deceased among his six surviving children namely George H. Campbell, Elizabeth Hughley, James S. Campbell, Mary Bostick, Thomas M. Campbell, + Edy Adelaid Dobson, in the following manner, to wit fourteen lots or parcels, six being lots of wild uncultivated land covered with cedar forest. George H. Campbell drew lots No. 3, 7, + 9 composing 50A 0R & 29 square poles with one cribb & stables attached. James S. Campbell drew lots No. 6 & 13 with shoe shop + wood shop attached. Mrs Elizabeth Hughley drew lots No. 4 & 14 comprising 55A 3R 39SP. Then Mary Bostick drew lots No. 6 & 10 comprising 50A 11R 20SP with negro kitchen attached. Thomas M. Campbell drew lots No. 5 & 11 comprising 47A 3R + 38SP and Mrs Edy Adelaide Dobson drew lots No. 2 & 12 comprising 46A 2R + 12SP. The following is a synopsis of the six lots in order of the drawing, George H. Campbell Lots No. 3, 7 + 9 comprising 50A 0R 29SP. James S. Campbell Lots 6 + 13 comprising 57A 3R 36SP. Elizabeth Hughley No. 4 + 14 55A 3R 39SP. Mary Bostick 6 + 10 50A 11R 20SP. Thomas M. Campbell No. 5, 8 + 11 - 47A 3R 38SP. Edy Adelaide Dobson No. 2 + 12, 46A 2R 12SP. Widows Dower 36A 3R 36SP. Common Aggregate 345A. 0R. 10SP.

Campbell + Edy Adelaide Dobson being of lawful age + heirs of Hugh Campbell deceased having chosen John Crudup, [Gregg] Gleaves + John Cawthon Freeholders and Citizens of Wilson County Civil District No. 25 Commissioned to divide land for us, all now [cordially] accept the division set forth by said commissioners + drawn by us [this] [the] foregoing synopsis of said division drawing [will show]. Now all are mutually agree to + with each other to relinquish all the right [title claims] + interest that we in common as children of said Hugh Campbell deceased held in + to his real + undivided estate + [especially] in + to the several lots drawn by each other + by this relinquishment it is been [intention] made by to invest in each one of them all the rights, title, claim + interest that they held in common to the lots that we individually have drawn. In testimony of which mutual [relinquishment] we have here unto set our hands + affixed our seal this 31st July AD 1867.

It is known that two officers in Oliver Cromwell's Army were named Hearne, and a number of his chaplains were ministers in the Baptist Church. One of these officers was William Hearne of Anglo-Norman descent, born in London, 1627, and was a wealthy merchant, he served as Captain with Cromwell, in all his famous battles, and after the restoration, found it not wholesome or safe to remain in London, hence with his wife, Mary--whom he married in London, a lady of culture and highly educated--he left London and went, in 1660, to St. Christopher's, in the West India Islands, and opened a large trade in general merchandise from London to these islands, and the colonies on the coast of Maryland and Delaware. On his return trips to London he took large cargoes of Muscovada sugar, as his old ledgers show. In 1681 two of his brothers, Derby and Ebenezer, came with him, and settled in the then Province of Maryland, near what is now the Maryland and Delaware line, but on the Delaware side. Derby settled where what is known now as Theodore Brewington's Mill, and Ebenezer at the Line Meeting House, The merchant, William, was called by many of the colonists "The Blanket Merchant," because of the large quantities of blankets he handled in his trade, which he continued back and forth between London, the islands and colonies until the spring of 1688, when he settled near his brothers, but on the Maryland side of the line, near the present town of Delmar, in Somerset County, where he built a residence that he occupied till his death.

THE Fifth (Union) Regiment of Tennessee Cavalry, sometimes called the First Middle Tennessee Cavalry, was organized at Nashville, Murfreesboro, and Carthage, from July 15, 1862, to March 26, 1864, to serve three years, and was mustered out of service August 14, 1865. The regiment consisted of twelve companies and was recruited by Col. William B. Stokes, acting under authority from Military Governor Andrew Johnson. The regiment was in various battles and skirmishes during the latter part of 1862 and was in the battle of Murfreesboro, or Stone's River. >From that battle till the close of the war the regiment was employed mainly in detachments in the eastern part of Middle Tennessee. One battalion was stationed at Shelbyville for some time and was in several skirmishes there. The other portion of the regiment was stationed at Carthage and was kept busy also, as, among other duties, it was required to carry the mail from that point to Gallatin. A portion of Stokes's command, under Captain Cain and Lieutenant Carter, was in the battle of Lookout Mountain. A part was also at Chickamauga and Chattanooga under Lieuts. Wingate T. Robinson and Nelson. Subsequently the regiment was ordered to Sparta, Tenn., to break up the guerrilla bands under Ferguson, Hughes, and Bledsoe, a contest in which no quarter was given.

In the memoranda of the volume by Adjutant General J. B. Brownlow giving the rolls of Tennessee Federals for 1861-65 it is said of Stokes's Regiment that it was in the routing of Colonels Bennett and Ward on the Dickerson Pike in September, 1862; in the defeat of Colonel Dibrell, driving him out of Neely's Bend, in October, 1862; in the battle with Forrest on the Franklin Pike, and drove him from the field at Lavergne. It was in numerous skirmishes around Nashville and on Big Harpeth in the same year; fought at Triune December 27, 1862, and was in the battle of Murfreesboro from first to last; a part, under Colonel Murphey, was at Bradyville; and, under Colonel Blackburn, a part was in the battle of Milton and in numerous engagements around Liberty and Snow's Hill. **27. Thomas M.<sup>3</sup> CAMPBELL** (Hugh<sup>2</sup>, James<sup>1</sup>) was born 18 May 1837 in Smith County, Tennessee, and died 22 Jun 1916 in Nashville, Tennessee. He married **Sarah Ann DOBSON** 15 Oct 1856 in Wilson Co, Tennessee, daughter of William Dobson and Margaret BROWN. She was born 20 Mar 1842 in Wilson County, Tennessee, and died 29 Dec 1914 in Nashville, Tennessee.

Notes for Thomas M. CAMPBELL:

THOMAS M. CAMPBELL was born in Smith County, Tennessee, in the year 1837. He was the youngest of three known sons, born to Hugh and Sarah Hearn Campbell. By the time Thomas was thirteen, his family had relocated their homeplace three times. He had experienced much and was probably learning the skills of farming and shoemaking. By 1850 he was living in Rural Hill, as was the large family of William Dobson, whose daughter, Sarah Ann, Thomas was to meet and marry in 1856. Sarah was still 3 months short of her 15th birthday !

Thomas and Sarah began their large family, only to be interrupted by the Civil War. Being a young man, Thomas was caught up in the fervour; whether by choice or force we will never know. He became a member of the 38th Tennessee Infantry, Company H and was promoted to corporal. His outfit fought gallantly at the bloody battle of Shiloh, TN, and soon became part of the infamous, Army of Tennessee, under General Braxton Bragg. He was accompanied by two of his brother-in-laws, William J. and Thomas M. Dobson; William being the company cook. The army eventually marched into Mississippi, across Alabama, north to Kentucky, where they participated in various skirmishes culminating in the battle at Perryville. After this, the army retreated back to Tennessee and eventually into Georgia. A major epidemic of measles had attacked the army and Thomas was one of those who became critically ill. As recorded in his application for Confederate Pension, some fifty years later, he had become so incapacitated by his illness, that the southern army was forced to give him a discharge from active service. This all came about when the South was in dire need of fighting men, thus indicates how very sick Thomas was. After the war, Thomas was apparently either unable to keep up the farm or financially ruined by the war's presense in the are and sold his prosperity in land.

Like many others after the Civil War, Thomas took his growing family west. Blossom, Texas, in Lamar County, was home for a few years. Things apparently didn't work out. They also lost their youngest son, Charles (Seymore), in October 1880, at the age of only 6 months. Thomas brought his family back to Tennessee. They sold the land in Wilson County that Sarah had inherited from her aunt, Jane Dobson Curry and moved finally to Nashville where Thomas became a grocer, then shoe-repairer, and did what he could to support his family; which by now had grown to nine. From the records it appears that Thomas and Sarah did what they could to raise their family; attended the Tulip Street Methodist Church and took life in stride. Their children grew up and went out on their own, though it seems that a few of them continued to live near by.

Sarah died in 1914 at the age of 72, Thomas at the age of 79, in 1916. They are both now resting in the historic, Spring Hill Cemetery, on the north side of the Cumberland River, in Nashville, Tennessee.

Notes for Robert Looney CAMPBELL:

ROBERT LOONEY CAMPBELL was born in the town of Rural Hill, a small community just east of Nashville, Tennessee. It had been only 3 years since the close of the Civil War. He was the fifth child born to Thomas M. and Sarah Dobson Campbell. His father was a veteran of the Civil War who fought with the southern army. Robert was named after his father's first commanding officer, Colonel Robert Fain Looney. "PaPa", (pronouced PawPaw), as he is known to his grandchildren, lived for a time in Nashville, TN, then Blossom, Texas, and then in Wilson County, Tennessee, where as a young man in 1895, he met and married his first wife "Mary". It is thought she had 3 children from a previous marriage. One died by age 15 the other two married 'Jones'. By 1900 Mary had also passed away.

About the year 1904, PaPa moved again to Texas, where he met Eula Lee Todd. They married in 1906 in the town of Alvin. Relocating to Houston, they had four children; Robert Donnell, James Edward, and twins, Dorothy Lee & William Todd. PaPa was a gentle man, enjoying the peacefulness of his front porch, his guitar and harmonica. He supported his family working with his hands. As an accomplished cabinetmaker, one of his jobs was constructing road signs for the Texas State Highway Department. He also had a furniture store on Leland Street, in downtown Houston, Texas.

He was of medium height, blue eyes, dark brown hair, with a slender but, solid build.

This outfit was the 38th TN Infantry 2nd Co H. William fought up through, (and survived!), the 1864 battle of Franklin, TN. Ms Edith Nolen of Nashville, his only surviving descendent, told me he was a cook for the company and that his wife, Eadie A. (Campbell) Dobson, snuck through enemy lines to bring him food before the battle. He survived the Civil War and was living in the Nashville area in the 1890s.
