He sailed numerous ships for Great Lakes Shipping until going to work for the Government as a United States Government Pilot, sailing and directing overseas vessels on the Great Lakes. He retired from sailing in 1971 after forty some years, including the U. S. Coast Guard, as a Lt. jg in WW 2.

 FIRST REGIMENT OF ARTILLERY (LIGHT; VETERAN).
 Morgan's Light Artillery. (Three Years)

This regiment was organized at Elmira to serve three years; it received its numerical designation October 16, 1861. Eight companies, commanded by Col. Guilford D. Bailey, left the State October 31, 1861, Companies I, K, L and M November 21, 1861. At the expiration of its term of service, those entitled thereto were discharged, and the regiment continued in service. Its service was as light artillery and by batteries in the Armies of the Potomac, Virginia, the Cumberland and Georgia. The field and staff were mustered in the service of the United States at Elmira, October 17, 1861, and honorably discharged and mustered out under Col. Charles S. Wainwright at Elmira, June 21, 1865.

During its service the regiment lost by death, killed in action, 5 officers, 54 enlisted men; of wounds received in action, 1 officer, 41 enlisted men; of disease and other causes, 5 officers, 161 enlisted men; total, 11 officers, 256 enlisted men; aggregate, 267; of whom 9 enlisted men died in the hands of the enemy.

Battery K--Fort Plain Battery--Capt. Lorenzo Crouse, recruited principally at Fort Plain, Stockbridge, Jasper, Elmira and Canandaigua, was mustered in the United States service November 20, 1861, at Albany, and December 15, 1861, its surplus men were transferred to the other batteries of the regiment. It served at and near Washington, D. C., from November, 1861; in the Military District of Washington from April, 1862; at Harper's Ferry, W. Va., and in the 2d Brigade, Sigel's Division, Department of Shenandoah, from May 27, 1862; in the 2d Division, 2d Corps, Army of Virginia, from June 26, 1862; in the 2d Division, 12th Corps, Army of the Potomac, from September, 1862; in the 1st Division, 12th Corps, from October, 1862; in the Department of Washington from February, 1863; in the 1st Division, 12th Corps, Army of Potomac, from April, 1863; in the Artillery Reserve, Army of Potomac, from May 12, 1863; in the 4th, and later in the 3d, Volunteer Brigade, Reserve Artillery, Army of Potomac, from May, 1863; in the Artillery Reserve, Army of Potomac, from July, 1863; in the 3d Volunteer Brigade, Artillery Reserve, Army of Potomac, from October, 1863; in the 1st Brigade, Artillery Reserve, Army of Potomac, from March, 1864; and in the defenses of Washington, 22d Corps, from March, 1864. Commanded by Capt. Solon Walter Stocking, the battery was honorably discharged and mustered out, June 20, 1865, at Elmira.

Twentieth Cavalry.-Cols., Newton B. Lord, David M. Evans; Lieut.-Cols., David M. Evans, Jacob S. Gates; Majs., Charles F. Smith, John G. Cudworth, John Bower Preston, Hiram H. Carpenter, Jacob S. Gates, John O'Hara, Patrick Fitzpatrick.

The 20th, called the McClellan cavalry, was organized in the summer of 1863 at Sacket's Harbor, and was there mustered into the U. S. service during the month of September for three years. The companies of which it was composed were recruited in the counties of Jefferson, Lewis, St. Lawrence, Oswego, Onondaga and Albany.

Col. Lord, who had been authorized on June 19, 1863, by Gov. Seymour to recruit this regiment, had previously commanded the 35th infantry throughout the bloody series of battles of 1862, and many of his men reenlisted in the 20th cavalry. The regiment left the state on Sept. 30, about 1,200 strong, and was stationed at Portsmouth, Va., as part of the 22nd corps until Jan., 1864, when it was assigned to Heckman's division, 18th corps, remaining at Portsmouth until April, when it was transferred to the District of East Virginia, Department of Virginia and North Carolina.

In Dec., 1864, it joined the 1st brigade, Gen. Kautz's cavalry division, Army of the James, with which it remained until the close of the war. Part of this time, Co. D was on detached service at Fort Pocahontas; Co. F at Fort Powhatan; Co. G in the 1st brigade, Mackenzie's division; and Co. I with the provisional and 10th corps.

The heaviest casualties sustained by the 20th were at Smithfield, Va., in Feb., 1864, when it lost 21 men captured. It was active at Suffolk, Currituck, Chuckatuck, Wood's mills, South Quay, Winton, N. C., Guiam's ford, N. C., Jamestown island, Murfree's depot, siege of Petersburg, Darbytown road, campaign of the Carolinas, and in the Appomattox campaign.

Its losses were not heavy, owing to the fact that it was largely

employed in garrison duty and siege operations. It was mustered out on July 31, 1865, Cos. E and H at Fortress Monroe, and the other companies at Manchester, Va. The regiment lost while in service 7 enlisted men killed and died of wounds; 2 officers and 121 men died of disease, accidents, in prison, etc., a total of 130.

McClellan Cavalry

June 19, 1863, Col. Newton B. Lord received authority to recruit this regiment, which received its numerical designation October 8, 1863, and was organized at Sackett's Harbor, where its companies were mustered in the service of the United States for three years: A to G September 3, H September 4, I and K September 17, and L and M September 22 and 23, 1863, respectively.

The companies were recruited principally: A at Sackett's Harbor, Champion, Denmark, Pinckney and Wilna; B at Sackett's Harbor, Brownville, Clayton, Dexter, Lyme, Philadelphia, Orwell and Watertown; C at Antwerp, Alexandria, LeRay, Theresa and Watertown; D at Cape Vincent, Clayton, Ellisburg, Mannsville, LaFargeville, Sackett's Harbor and Watertown; E at Champion, Diana, Croghan and Wilna; F at Copenhagen, Redwood and Syracuse; G at Albany, Cape Vincent, Evan's Mills, Rome, Syracuse and Watertown; H at Antwerp, DeKalb, Edwards, Fowler and Gouverneur; I at Cape Vincent, Oswego, Rome, Sackett's Harbor, Syracuse and in St. Lawrence county; K at Albany, Sandy Creek, Sackett's Harbor, Wilna and Watertown; L at Norwich, Oswego, Penn Yan, Sackett's Harbor and Syracuse; and M at Sackett's Harbor, Albany, Herkimer, Norwich, Mannsville, Oswego, Rome, Theresa and Watertown.

The regiment left the State September 30, 1863, and served in the 22d Corps from October, 1863, Company F at Portsmouth, Va., from October, 1863; all at Portsmouth, Va., in the Department of Virginia from November, 1863; in Heckman's Division, 18th Corps, from January, 1864; in the defenses of Portsmouth, Va., in the district of East Virginia, Department of Virginia and North Carolina, from April, 1864; in 1st Brigade, Kautz's Division, Cavalry, Army of the James, from December 3, 1864; Company D at Fort Pocahontas, Va., in Separate Brigade, defenses of Bermuda, from January, 1865; Company F at Fort Powhattan, Va., and Company G in 1st Brigade, Mackenzie's Division of Cavalry from March, 1865; Company I with the Provisional and 10th Corps in March, 1865.

The regiment was honorably discharged and mustered out under the command of Col. David M. Evans July 31, 1865, Companies E and H at Fort Monroe, the other companies at Manchester, Va.

He may have lived there before the filing date, which seems odd to me but was quite common.

In an e-mail from Steve Dawidowicz, Great-great Grandson of Lawrence, Steve writes:

"BTW, although he went by "Lawrence", Lawrence's given name may actually have been William - the death certificates of Charles and William lists their father as "William Lawrence Dygert" and "Wm Lawrence Dygert" respectively. All other documentation, including the probate records use Lawrence.

I've also gotten my hands on the probate records for both Lawrence and his son Daniel (who is my great grandfather). Lawrence died 26 Mar 1886 in Albion Township, Wright County, Minnesota. His probate records include his will. In his will, he leaves his 142 acre farm to his sons Thomas and Daniel, to split between them. To his other children, he left various sums of money:

Charles A. Dygert, 5 dollars.

Margaret L. Spencer, 5 dollars.

Martha Phyemy Cole, 1 dollar.

John E. Dygert, 5 dollars.

Eugene Dygert, 50 dollars.

Rosey E. Dygert, 5 dollars.

Lawrence was either unable to write, or to feeble to sign his name to his will, so he made his mark on 27 Feb 1886.

My grandfather, Daniel O. Dygert died 8 June 1898, also in Albion Township, Wright County, Minnesota. He was about 32 years old. My grandmother, Emma Allen, was only 22 at the time, with two children, my grandfather Orville, then about 2, and my grandfather's sister, Ethel May."

Colonel Charles R. Brundage, 33d State Militia, received authority, July 5, 1861, to organize a regiment of infantry, of which his regiment of militia should and did form the nucleus. The regiment was organized at Ogdensburg October 25, 1861; it received its numerical designation; and, October 30, 1861, Col. Wm. B. Hayward having succeeded Colonel Brundage, it was mustered in the service of the United States for three years. At the expiration of its term of service, the men entitled thereto were discharged and the regiment retained in service. In June, 1865, the enlisted men of the 107th, 136th and 150th Infantries, not mustered out with their regiment, joined this by transfer.

The companies were recruited principally: A at Canton, Hermon, Potsdam, Russell, Madrid, Colton, Parishville and Gouverneur; B at Gouverneur, Macomb and DePeyster; C at Hammond, Morristown, Oswegatchie, Edwards, Rossie, Russell and Fowler; D at Russell, Edwards, Pierrepoint and Canton; E at Malone, Bangor and Brandon; F at Ogdensburg and Heuvelton; G at Madrid, Waddington, Louisville, Massena and Norfolk; H at Champlain, Mooers, Ellenburgh, Altona, Chazy, Saranac and Lisbon; I at Lawrence, Stockholm and Brasher; and K at Stockholm and Richville.

The regiment left the State November 4, 1861; served between Baltimore, Md., and Washington, D. C., from November, 1861; under General Dix in the so-called Railroad Brigade, at Baltimore and Relay House, Md., from March, 1862; in 2d Brigade, Sigel's Division, Department of Shenandoah, from June, 1862; in 3d Brigade, 2d Division, 2d Corps, Army of Virginia, from June 26, 1862; in same brigade and division, 12th Corps, Army of the Potomac, from September 12, 1862; in 2d Brigade, 2d Division, 12th Corps, Army of the Potomac, from October, 1862; in 3d Brigade, 2d Division, 12th Corps, Army of the Potomac, from April, 1863; on veteran furlough in December, 1863, and January, 1864; in 3d Brigade, 2d Division, 20th Corps, from April, 1864; in 3d Brigade, Bartlett's Division, 22d Corps, from June, 1865; and, commanded by Col. Lester S. Willson, it was honorably discharged and mustered out, July 17, 1865, at Alexandria, Va.

During its service the regiment lost by death, killed in action, 2 officers, 37 enlisted men; of wounds received in action, 1 officer, 27 enlisted men; of disease and other causes, 5 officers, 96 enlisted men; total, 8 officers, 160 enlisted men; aggregate, 168; of whom 3 enlisted men died in the hands of the enemy.

The Sixtieth Regiment was organized at Ogdensburg in the autumn of 1861, and started for the seat of war November 1st, of that year. It was stationed on guard along the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad during the following winter. On the retreat of General Banks' army in the Shenandoah Valley, it was ordered to Harper's Ferry, and thence up the valley to Winchester. It was on active duty at the front again, during the Second Bull Run campaign, under General Pope. It participated in the battle of Antietam, where Col. William Goodrich was killed; also twenty-two others, killed and wounded. The regiment also participated in the battle of Chancellorsville, in which 9 were killed, 44 wounded, and 8 were missing. At Gettysburg, 11 were killed and 39 wounded; at Lookout Mountain, 37 were killed and wounded (the Sixtieth capturing one cannon and battle flag); at Ringgold, 4 were killed and 14 wounded. The regiment at this time had only 175 men fit for duty.

After the close of the campaign and while located in Lookout Valley it re-enlisted as a veteran regiment, received furlough, and returned to Ogdensburg as a regiment. Returning to the Army of the Cumberland before the opening of the campaign in 1864, it participated subsequently in the battles of Resaca, New Hope Church, Peach Tree Creek, and the movement on Atlanta. It marched with Sherman to the Sea, and northward through the Carolinas, and was in the battle at Bentonville. After the surrender of the Rebel armies under Generals Lee and Johnson, the Sixtieth marched with the victorious army to Washington, and was in the Grand Review of Sherman's army. Soon after that event it returned to Ogdensburg, where it was mustered out of service. From first to last it had a most honorable record.

There is a story that Joseph Brant (Mohawk Chief) passed through the Mohawk Valley traveling east and a man named Dygert who lived in the Mohawk Valley trailed Brant all the way to New York city. When Brant arrived at that city he went to consult a lawyer and while telling the lawyer that he had been followed all the way from the Mohawk Valley he looked toward the office door and exclaimed, " There he is now." Dygert was standing in the law office door, looking at Brant.

The lawyer walked up to Dygert and told him that if he had killed Brant during the war he would have been considered a great hero but now that the war was over he would be accused of murder. Dygert heeded the lawyers advice and returned home without taking Brant's life.

I am describing the above from memory, therefore any wording might vary some from the printed article.

The question has been asked, who this Dygert was? But I cannot answer. He probably was some Dygert who lost a relative in the Revolutionary War. There was a Severinus H. Dygert killed in the Revolution. He was the son of Henry P. Dygert and wife Anna Margretha. This Henry was an uncle to Henry Dygert who married Mary Cunningham.

Peter H. Dygert, son of Henry P., claimed his brother's bounty, being the heir at law of Severinus H. Dygert, deceased. Henry P. Dygert, the father of Severinus H. died before Severinus was killed.

Perhaps Dygert might have been commanded to trail Brant through the valley by some militia officer. After the Revolutionary War the patriots of the Mohawk Valley passed a resolution to not allow even their own relatives who went over to the enemy, to return to their homes and naturally they would have been suspicious of Joseph Brant.

In the 1790 census of German Flatts, Herkimer County, New York, Peter H. Dygert is listed as head of household with 1-2-4 meaning 1 male over 16 years of age, 2 males under 16 years of age, and 4 females. Anna was 1, Susanna was 2 and 2 more females not identified.

The early wars for independence very nearly wiped out of existence the few scattered homes of the hardy pioneers who had settled the section then known only as German Flatts. The French and their Indian allies overran the region, burning cattle, homes and mills, and occasionally even scalping a luckless settler. At the time of Brandt's Raid, the historian Benton says there were about 70 houses in this area while Almon in his Remembrancer states that there were 63 houses, 57 barns, 3 grist mills, and 2 saw mills burnt in this raid. This indicates that some 7 escaped.

From this time to the end of the War of 1812, the valley was part of a defensive military position. Heavy military supplies such as cannon went west over the Mohawk River while troops marched along the adjoining turnpikes.

Records show that German Flatts furnished its full quota of men, especially in the Revolutionary War. Because Thomas later listed himself as a stonemason on his U.S. immigration papers, he may have worked at that trade in his last years in Scotland.

An now it's the year 1832, the season probably late spring, with the shipping season just underway. Thomas Menzie Ritchie, Ann Robertson, his wife, and six children are on the docks of one of the small ports of Strathclyde; it might be Greenock or Saltcoats or Irvine where so many of the outbound sailing ships departed.

Thomas and Ann had finally reached the decision that their future was in the new country of the United States of America. As they boarded the ship to face the wild, surging seas of the North Atlantic, they knew the only time they would see beautiful Scotland again would be in their dreams.

All of the children of William Hudson and Phoebe Yeadon were born in England, but there no records showing the number who accompanied their parents when they came to America.

William Hudson and family sailed from Hull, England in 1825. William was sixty-two years old when he arrived in this country. The fact that William was sixty-two years of age when they made this venture makes it unusual, for few men dared accept such a challenge at that age.

Canton courthouse records indicate that on 4 Oct 1827 William Hudson purchased 28 62/100 acres for \$140.00 from Jacob A. Van Heuvel. Van Heuvel was the man Heuvelton was named for. Also on 25 April 1837 Soloman Simons and Sarah Gore Simons sold to William Hudson 27 34/100 acres for the sum of \$200.00, current lawful money. William Hudson also purchased other lands, some form a Michael Page.

The Hudsons built a home and out-buildings on this acreage and cleared the property. William and Phoebe then sold to Ann Hudson, their daughter, 28 62/100 acres for the sum of \$200.00, drawn up in 1842 and recorded 1846, and on 19 Jan. 1849 conveyed by deed to daughter Ann, the homestead for \$400.00.

In 1851, the daughter Ann (1816-1893), married James Bell (1826-1908). James came from Northern Ireland, and before his marriage, his occupation was sailing the St. Lawrence River and the Great Lakes. After marrying, he resided on the farm with the Hudsons. William and Phoebe deeded over the remaining acres to Ann and James Bell in return for care and life use for themselves. James Bell gradually added the acres needed to support a growing family.

The road was named Partidge Road, after an old man named Partridge, when the Hudson's came. This road's name was later changed to Bell Road, after the above James Bell family. Later still, it was renamed the Irish Settlement Road.

William Hudson died 15 July 1858 at age 95 and Phoebe died 30 Nov 1858 aged 80 years.

AFFIDAVIT OF PETER TYGERT

On the ninth day of August one thousand eight hundred and thirty three, personally appeared before me a Justice of the Peace of the Town of Palatine County of Montgomery and state aforesaid Peter Dygert of the same town county and state aforesaid who being duly sworn according to law, depose and saith that by reason of old age and the consequent loss of memory he cannot swear positively as to the precise length of his services, but according to the best of his recollection he served not less than the periods mentioned below and in the following grades.

Year 1775 as a private under Capt. Breadbeg, Lieut. Zielly, 2nd Lieut. J. Eaker, Nicholas Van Slyck Ensign under Co. Klock, Lieut. Col. Waggoner, Major John Frey, Major Eisenlord and Major Van Slyck in Palatine Montgomery County, New York State. Applicant enrolled under Capt. John Breadbag in the fall of seventy five and called in company training to the house of Phillip Empie; there organized an trained. That he was born 24th Nov. 1759 and is now aged 73 years 8 months and 7 days on the 31st of July 1833.

Year 1776 date not known but in spring he served 17 days as private with Capt. Breadbeg, 14 days in Jan., being under Gen'l Herkimer's orders to march to Caughnawaga to Veeders Flats the company on alarm there stationed 3 days; from thence they marched to Stone Arabia there stationed two weeks and ordered out the whole brigade, joined Gen'l. Schuyler at Caughnawaga, there stationed for several days. All men paraded in the ice then all went under command of Gen'l. Schuyler causing Sir John to surrender with about 300 men with arms.

Year 1777. In May or June served 8 days and during summer and fall 28 days under Capt. Breadbag. On alarm ordered out to Saratoga, after marching to Amsterdam countermanded to march to Johnstown; there stationed several days then discharged. Drafted twice under Capt. Breadbag to Herkimer each time 14 days, to Fort Dayton in the service of the United States by order of Gen'l. Herkimer. August 6 went on duty 15 days then 22 days under Capt. Breadbag of Gen'l. Herkimer brigade engaged in that memorable battle and continued until the enemy were withdrawn- Battle at Oriskany, at which battle Gen'l. Herkimer slain; Col. Cox; Major Eisenlord, Major Clapsaddle, Major Van Slyck and killed in battle. Brigade Major Frey wounded and taken prisoners; about 200 slain on that day and a number of our men taken prisoner and wounded his own. Capt. Breadbag wounded.

Year 1778, in the course of the winter, served 2 months 19 days then 6 days pressed by soldiers to take soldiers from Fort Plain to Fort Stanwix,

In the spring enlisted in the United States services under Capt. Leffler attached to the company of boatmen boating on the North River, transporting provisions and supplies for the United States troops stationed at the respective forts'

Year 1779 9 months under Capt. Leffler, again enlisted for the second period for 9 months to the same boat company and faithfully served during the said term in the United States service, never received a written discharge, only verbally on each term. At time of the general conflagration at Caughnawaga while others were ordered out to march in pursuit of the incendiaries the applicant was directed and positively with some others by his superior officers to guard the inhabitants moved into Fort Keyser; and accordingly did watch and guard the same.

During the summer served 24 days and same fall 14 days under Capt. Zielly of Col. Wagner's Regt. ordered out and stationed a 3 different times exclusive of the first time at Fort Keyser performing garrison duty same year each term eight days. Ordered out and stationed at Fox Fort fourteen days rendering garrison service in succession.

Oct. 19th served two days under Capt. Zielly with Col. Brown. Was ordered out in battle under the immediate command of Col. Brown in Palatine at Stone Arabia, generally called Browns Battle, against Sir John Johnson, his army or force consistion of about one thousand and our force not exceeding 200. Col. Brown was slain in battle, about 45 killed. In our retreat, and the old settlement of Stone Arabia totally desolate with the little exception only, as well then up and down the Mohawk Valley for about 20 miles or exceeding.

Year 1781. In July served 3 days with Col. Willet. The enemy put of flight Oct. 25; with Capt. Zielly served in Col. Willet's command ordered out with Col. Klock's Reg't., engaged in Johnstown battle against Major Ross and Capt. Butler with 800 Tories, Indians and some regular troops, attended with a number of lives lost prisoners, taken, and wounded on both sides and Capt. Zielly, ordered out and stationed at Fort Keyser rendering garrison duty. During summer and fall served 1 month 15 days with Lieut. Waggoner, ordered out and stationed at Fort Fox performing garrison duty.

Some time in winter seved 15 days with Ensign Van Slyke drafted to Fort Remsnyder at the time Capt. Kyser and sons were taken prisoner. Latter part of winter served 14 days under Capt. Zielly of Col. Klock's Reg't., ordered out and stationed at Fort Timmerman on an alarm at another time, year forgotten, served 8 days under Capt. Zielly of Col. Willet's Reg't. ordered to Bowmans Creek under Col. Willet in pursuit of the enemy

Total length of service 3 yrs. 8 months and 14 days; and for such service I claim Pension.

Conrad Klock

Conrad Klock, the son of Hendrick Klock, was born about 1722. Conrad was a soldier in the Revolutionary War and survived the battle of Oriskany. The battle of Oriskany was one of the bloodiest battles of the Revolution. In the work of Sherman O Klock, Conrad is described as, " a man of powerful physique who when his ammunition gave out, wielded a hug club over the craniums of several of the enemy." Conrad was a Pvt. In Col. Jabob Klock's Regiment of the New York Militia.

Conrad and his sons, Jacob and Joseph were captured in Fairfield during one of the British raids and were taken to Canada. There they enlisted into the British Army. They were ordered to the Mohawk Valley to fight; instead they deserted the British Army and returned home to the Mohawk Valley. THE GERMAN ANCESTRY OF WORNER DEICHERT

It has been known for sometime that the emigrant ancestor of the Palatine Dygart Family was the " 1709er " Warner Deichert.

After checking the originals of all the messages on Warner, the author was able to come up with a theory of origin for this prominent 1709er ; somewhere in the " Vogelsberg " region , Northeast of Frankfort. This was arrived at after studying the

names of other emigrants whom Warner appeared near on surviving Palatine documents in their original , unalphabetised state. One of my best genealogical researchers was sent to the area theorized to investigate the ancient churchbooks there , hoping to locate Warner. After fifteen villages were searched on several separate investigations , my theory of origin was finally proved correct : THERE HE WAS !!!

Deichert Report

Warner Deichert was a resident of the tiny village of Huettengesaess in the parish of Langenselbold , northeast of Frankfort. The old churchbooks at Langenselbold record the marriage of the emigrant : " Worner Deichert , son of Hans Deichert of Huettengesaess , was married on 16 January , 1690 to Anna Catharina , daughter of Valentin Ahl "

The children of this couple were registered in the registers of Langenselbold , prior to their emigration in 1709. Of the children , Anna Magdalena , Elisabeth , Johann Peter , Sabina , and Severinus were all born at Sebold. Anna Margreth , Ottilia , and Johann Conrad at Langenselbold. Anna Magdalena died at 19 weeks - so did not survive to emigrate. Johann Conrad died in 1708. These entries at Langenselbold finally prove the implied relationships of " Johan Pieter Diegert " and " Sefreen Devgert " - both naturalized at Albany on 31 January , 1715/1716 : they were brothers , both sons of the emigrant Worner Deichert.

The probable father of Hans Deichert was the Sebastian Deucher, widower of Issigheim near Hanau, who md. an Anna (Kiese?) 8 June 1640 (Langenselbold Chbk.) Langenselbold:

Worner, s/o Hans Deichert at Huettengesaess, md. Anna Catharina, d/o Valentin Ahl, 16 Jan 1690 at Langenselbold parish. Worner Deichert of Huttengesass was listed 3 March 1701 with 2 oxen and 1 cart in a mss. found at the Birstein archives; on the same roll were members of the Kuhn, Bellinger, and Bender families who later emigrated to colonial N.Y.

Werner Deuchert made his first appearance on the Hunter Lists (#130) 4 July 1710 with 5 persons over 10 yrs. and 3 under 10 on 4 Aug 1710, and to 6 persons over 10 yrs. and 3 persons under 10 yrs. 24 June 1711. Werner Reichert of Queensbury was a Palatine soldier in the Canadian expedition (Palatine Volunteers To Canada). Warner Deygert was nationalized 11 Oct 1715 (Albany Nats.), and on the 1717 Simmendinger census at New Queensberg (Schoharie) N. Y. with wife Catherine & 6 children. In October 19, 1723 he got lots 1 & 47 on the Stone Arabia Patent. Warner Dygert purchased more land of William Coppennoll in 1730. Most info. is from charts of Dygert genealogist Frank Dygert Deuel and (The Palatine Families of New York 1710) by Henry Z. Jones, Jr. Also information was acquired as a basis for a database from info recorded in William V.H. Barker's book titled : Early Families of Herkimer County , New York , Descendants of the Burnetsfield Palatines. EARLY STONE ARABIA

The name itself, variously spelled and pronounced, has long been a matter of curiosity, conjecture and myth - and may always remain so.

In the Old Testament and later times, Arabia carried the idea of blessedness, happiness and security. This connotation has passed down the centuries in many lands and languages. The name Stone Arabia, in its Dutch spelling, is found in Dutch writings long before its use in America.

Thus it may be that Steen Rabi was the land of promise to various groups settling in America in the 17th and 18th centuries. At least we find the name applied to a region on the west side of the Hudson near Kingston, to the site of the present North Troy, and later to our Stone Arabia in the Mohawk Valley.

One story of the derivation of the name still current locally is the name "Steen Raby" came to be the name of the section when certain travelers passing through the territory saw a Dutch girl aiding in clearing the land from stone, and seeking to have sport with her, said, "What are you doing my pretty maid?" and received the reply, "Steen Raby, you fools," which being translated was "Picking stones." The words do not fit themselves very well into the Dutch dialect, and the story can hardly be harmonized with considerations already mentioned. Moreover, Stone Arabia is not particularly stony in the part first settled. The fact that the name is in use elsewhere 50 years before the Stone Arabia Patent is granted renders the old story highly improbable.

But perhaps we have a clue that comes from the Hudson Valley. Under patent dated 19 October 1668, Robert Sanders and Harmen Vedder bought of the Mahican Indians land called by the Indians "Taescameasich" lying on the east side of the North River and stretching along the River from the second to the third spring which runs over to the west side of the river straight into the woods up to the high hills. On 21 August 1670 Harmen Vedder conveyed his interest to Robert Sanders. Reference to this land is made in a lease given by Robert Sanders to Hendrick Meussen Vrooman, 3 May 1670, wherein it is described as "lying over against the long island" and named Steen Raby. In 1680 Robert Sanders sold his farm on the east side of the Hudson's river, obliquely over against the farm of Anthony van Shayk, commonly called Steen Arabia. Captain John Schuyler in his report of his journey to Canada in 1698, says, "we went from Albany and came to Stony Arabia 8 miles up the river, where we lodged that night". All these references are to Stony Arabia on the site of modern Lansingburg or North Troy. This is also the Stein Raby at which an outpost of 10 men was stationed as early as 1710.

It is possible that the name was transferred to the Mohawk Valley location through Robert Sanders, an Albany merchant who was interested in the Lansingburg Stone Arabia and acted as Indian interpreter for the governor, and who may have assisted the Stone Arabia patentees in their purchase from the Indians.

The name is still applied to the central and southeastern portion of the original patent. For a few years just before the Revolution, Stone Arabia was given as a name to that section later to be called the Palatine District extending from the Nose to the Falls and northward to Canada, but on March 8, 1773, it lost this wider application and from that time was confined to the patent.

It is probable that a number of families from the Hudson Valley Palatine Camps never settled in Schoharie at all but went directly to Stone Arabia in 1712-15. Some families drop out of the Kocherthal-Berkenmeyer Records of the Camp and Schoharie for about nine years appearing later in Stone Arabia. Research made in Switzerland recently by one of the Palatine families reveals relationship by marriage with the Frey family several generations before 1710. If Hendrick Frey was in this immediate section before 1712-13 it is fair to assume that the relationship established in Europe before coming to America would still hold and he probably was the cause of several families coming directly to Stone Arabia from the Hudson. Indeed Simms says some of the party had relatives or friends there [Stone Arabia] who located at the time the Schoharie settlements were begun, which induced them to remove thither. Frothingham says they were on the ground before 1723.

The original patentees were, with one or two exceptions, of German ancestry coming from the Rhine Valley in Switzerland and Germany.

The Indian deed for the Stone Arabia land cost 300 pounds in Indian goods and bears date of 12 February 1723 and approved 9 March 1723. The warrant to grant was issued 14 September and the patent dated 19 October 1723. On the first division, most of the patentees took 100 acres, two lots of 50 acres each; in 1733 another division was made. The survey was made by Nicholas Schuyler. A third division is said to have been made but we have never seen any record of it. In 1793 the lines about the patent were re-run because of variation of compass in former surveys and disputes which had arisen with neighbors in other patents. The field books of both surveyor Schuyler of 1733 and of surveyor Beekman of 1793 are extant and were studied. The first is in the possession of Mr. Wyman of Fonda and the later and last survey is in the possession of Joseph H. Reaney of St. Johnsville.

The survey of 1793 recites the boundaries of the original patent and, coming 70 years after, indicates the outlines of the patent more clearly than any description of boundaries made earlier. We quote from Beekman's notes:

Beginning at a certain Black Oak tree standing in the South East corner of a Tract of Land granted to John Schuyler and in the line of the Lands granted to Col. Abraham De Peyster and Harmanus Van Slyck, which tree is 125 chains East from the Mohawk River, and runs from the said tree along the line of the aforesaid Lands granted to John Schuyler, north 19° 30' west 193 chains to the Tract granted to Francis Harrison, Esq. thence along his line North 16° West 65 Chains to a certain Bruck called by the Indians Garoga, then up the stream of the said Bruck to another Bruck which falls into it and is called by the Indians Cajadutta, thence up the stream of said Bruck called Cajadutta 96 Chains measured on a straight line, thence south 63° East 250 chains to a bruck called the Canada Kill, thence down the stream of said Bruck 80 chains measured on a straight line, then south 61° West 355 Chains, then south 6 chains to the above mentioned land of Abm De Peyster and Harrison [?] Van Slyck, then along their line 153 chains to the place where it begun containing 12 thousand 700 acres with allowance for Highways.

Beekman adds a note more definitely located the starting point of the original deed:

Black Oak Tree, which Tree being the North East corner of De Peyster's and Van Slyck's Patent, and the letters D P and its cyphers 1716 cut in the Bark of said tree, and appears that it had been done at the time of the first survey of the said De Peysters and Van Slycks Patent was made which said line runs to the place of beginning of said De Peysters and Van Slycks Patent opposite three small Islands in the Mohawk River.

This quite definitely fixes the "beginning point" of the patent, for one can be east of the Mohawk River only in the vicinity of Nelliston and the three small islands are there.

The 27 names which appeared in the patent were: Johan Christian Garlack, John Lawyer, Andries Feink, Hendrick Frey, Warnar Digart (Warner Dygert), Bartholomew Picart, Johanne Schnell, Johannes Cremse, Johannes Emigen, William Vocks, Mardan Dellinback, Adam Emigen, Teobald Garlack, Suffereinas Deigert (Severinus Dygert), William Copernall, Hans Deterick Cassalman, John Joost Schnell, Christian Feink, Simon Erchart, Mardan Seibart, Elias Garlack, Johannes Ingolt, William Nellese, Andries Peiper, Lodowick Cassalman and Gerhart Scheffer. Of the patentees, the last two took no share in the first division; on the other hand such a share was granted to Bartholomew Picard, Jr.

In the second allotment, made in 1733, we find that 14 who took land in the first division took none in the second. Ten years had witnessed the death or removal of these or they were convinced they had enough land. 26 different titles were given in the 2nd allotment; 4 were titles in partnership. The 30 men who thus shared were as follows: Martynis Tillebagh, Johannis Lawyer, Andris Finck, Nicholas Pickard, Lodewyck Casselmann, Andreas Finck, Jr., Symon Erhart, Jacob Snell, Johannis Snell, Adam Emge, Wilhelmis Casselman, Dierik Loucks, Sutferynes Teyger (Severinus Dygert), Johannis Myderse, William Brower, Johannis Crams, Hanes Erhart, Barhanadus Van Diere, War(ner) Teygor (Warner Dygert), Johannis Miller, Jacob Sible, Jurig Houck, PiterSoots,

Johannis Schulthuys, Johannis Wies, Van Schullne, Hendrick Six, William Nellis, Nicolas Stensoll, and Robert Garther. Deeds were given to all who shared in this allotment, a few of which are still in existence. Most of the new grantees were sons of the patentees, in several instances were men from Schoharie, and in some cases Dutchmen.

The first allotment had given title to 2550 acres, the second to 9169 acres, a total of 11719 acres. There was but little left. Another survey and allotment was made in 1793. Variations and errors in lines previously run called for corrections. By order of court in 1792 Jacob Eacker, Abraham Coopman and Jacob G. Klock were appointed commissioners; Cornelius Beekman was employed as surveyor. As a result six different narrow wedged shaped parcels of land were added to the patent and divided. These pieces contained over 1000 acres making the total acreage of the patent nearly 13,000 acres.

The Christian name Warner has been passed along through nearly all the branches of the Dygert family for the last two hundred fifty years in America.

1730; Warner Dygert purchased more land of William Coppernoll. (Stone Arabia, NY) May 9, 1732; obligated himself under a penalty of 100 pounds, to convey a desired lot of 50 acres for the church, to Andreas Fink, Werner Diegert and Johannes Schnell by this date. This present churches currently occupy this same lot. The price was 20 pounds New York currency. The Stone Arabia settlers were found, with the settlers in the other districts, in the Valley militia of the colony which in pre-Revolutionary days met regularly for training and was subject to call to arms when emergencies arose. One familiar with the Stone Arabia family names may readily see the part they took in the military preparations in the Valley, by perusing the roster of the company commanded by Capt. Soffrinus Deychert from 1757-1762. This was the Stone Arabia company in the 2d battalion of Palatine militia. Still living in the Valley are found many of the descendants of these Stone Arabia colonial soldiers, e.g., Keyser, Louck, Markell, Swits, Coppennoll, Finck, Cook, Roller, Dillenbeck, Brower, Roof, Kilts, Becker, Snell, Getman, Empie, Nestell, Lasher, Nellis, Dygert, Davy, Walrath, Saltsman, Shults, Baum, Frank, Christman, Wick, Duesler, Fox, Dockstader, Edick, Wert, and others.

And then came the struggle for independence. The Stone Arabia settlers were signally American on their stand. Nearly two years before the Philadelphia Liberty bell rang out independence, the Stone Arabia farmers had drafted their declaration of American Principles. This took place 27 Aug. 1774 in the tavern of Adam Loucks, known as the White Tavern and identified by some as the upper tavern, which for generations has now been called the Red Tavern, while the White Tavern or Corners is a few rods above the churches.

These resolves read in part as follows:

III [in part]. That We think it is our undeniable Privilege to be taxed only with our own Consent given by ourselves (or by our Representative). That Taxes otherwise laid and exacted are unjust and unconstitutional....

IV. That the Act for blocking up the Port of Boston is oppressive and arbitrary, injurious in its principles and particularly oppressive to the Inhabitants of Boston, who we consider as Brethren suffering in the Common Cause.

V (in part). ...that we will join and unite with our Brethren of the Rest of this Colony in anything tending to support and defend our Rights and Liberties.

As indicative of the attitude of mind of Loucks, the tavern keeper, to current conditions, which of course reflected the mind of the Stone Arabia settlers, there was to be found on the walls of the tavern the portraits of Martin Luther, Frederick the Great, George III, and Louis XIV, visible tokens of a loyalty to religion, to the old home land and the new home in America and of a lasting and intense hatred to the one who drove them from their Palatinate homes on the Rhine, for the picture of the French King was inserted in its frame upside down and under it- these lines-

This is the man we all should hate,
Who drove us from our home,
Who burned the old Palatinate
And sent us forth to roam.

Major Zielly and Andrew Dillenback (later killed at Oriskany) were early appointed on a committee to secure material for war. The people of Stone Arabia were alert and informed. The fertile Mohawk Valley and the fields, particularly of Stone Arabia, were sources of supply for the Continental Army throughout the long struggle. Especially in 1780 did Washington look to the wheat and oats of Stone Arabia. Hence the Raid of 1780, with its intensive destruction, was a telling blow to the cause. It should be noted that there was more unanimity among the Palatine farmers in opposition to the British policy than in some other districts in the Valley. There was scarcely a family, however, that was not divided between loyalty to the crown and loyalty to the cause. Canadian records reveal the extent to which the Valley population contributed to the British interest.

Two forts, Keiser and Paris, were reared on Stone Arabia soil. Twice the enemies ravaged Stone Arabia, in the Ephratah-Dillenburgh raid in 1778 and the direful raid of 1780. Oriskany took its sanguinary toll. And yet showing the spirit of the Stone Arabia settlers, we find Governor Clinton saying of them in 1781, "Most of Tryon and Schoharie have been destroyed. They are not however abandoned; the inhabitants having recovered themselves, continue to improve their farms and assist in the general defense." Truly Stone Arabia played a telling and significant part in the early life of New York and America.

There was a Palatine Eckhardt family in the Schoharie region, and one in the Mohawk area. But, after allowing for the fact that the founder of the family in each region may have been either Nicholas or Gertraud, the two family structures appear to have been in one or the other.

PALATINE HISTORY

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The Palatinate or German PFALZ, was, in German history, the land of the Count Palatine, a title held by a leading secular prince of the Holy Roman Empire. Geographically, the Palatinate was divided between two small territorial clusters: the Rhenish, or Lower Palatinate, and the Upper Palatinate. The Rhenish Palatinate included lands on both sides of the Middle Rhine River between its Main and Neckar tributaries. Its capital until the 18th century was Heidelberg. The Upper Palatinate was located in northern Bavaria, on both sides of the Naab River as it flows south toward the Danube and extended eastward to the Bohemian Forest. The boundaries of the Palatinate varied with the political and dynastic fortunes of the Counts Palatine.

The Palatinate has a border beginning in the north, on the Moselle River about 35 miles southwest of Coblenz to Bingen and east to Mainz, down the Rhine River to Oppenheim, Guntersblum and Worms, then continuing eastward

above the Nieckar River about 25 miles east of Heidelberg then looping back westerly below Heidelberg to Speyer, south down the Rhine River to Alsace, then north-westerly back up to its beginning on the Moselle River.

The first Count Palatine of the Rhine was Hermann I, who received the office in 945. Although not originally hereditary, the title was held mainly by his descendants until his line expired in 1155, and the Bavarian Wittelsbachs took over in 1180. In 1356, the Golden Bull (a papal bull: an official document, usually commands from the Pope and sealed with the official Papal seal called a Bulla) made the Count Palatine an Elector of the Holy Roman Empire. During the Reformation, the Palatinate accepted Protestantism and became the foremost Calvinist region in Germany.

After Martin Luther published his 95 Theses on the door of the castle church at Wittenberg on 31 October 1517, many of his followers came under considerable religious persecution for their beliefs. Perhaps for reasons of mutual comfort and support, they gathered in what is known as the Palatine. These folk came from many places, Germany, Holland, Switzerland and beyond, but all shared a common view on religion.

The protestant Elector Palatine Frederick V (1596-1632), called the "Winter King" of Bohemia, played a unique role in the struggle between Roman Catholic and Protestant Europe. His election in 1619 as King of Bohemia precipitated the Thirty Years War that lasted from 1619 until 1648. Frederick was driven from Bohemia and in 1623, deposed as Elector Palatine.

During the Thirty Years War, the Palatine country and other parts of Germany suffered from the horrors of fire and sword as well as from pillage and plunder by the French armies. This war was based upon both politics and religious hatreds, as the Roman Catholic armies sought to crush the religious freedom of a politically-divided Protestantism.

Many unpaid armies and bands of mercenaries, both of friends and foe, devoured the substance of the people and by 1633, even the catholic French supported the Elector Palatine for a time for political reasons.

During the War of the Grand Alliance (1689-97), the troops of the French monarch Louis XIV ravaged the Rhenish Palatinate, causing many Germans to emigrate. Many of the early German settlers of America (e.g. the Pennsylvania Dutch) were refugees from the Palatinate. During the French Revolutionary and Napoleonic Wars, the Palatinate's lands on the west bank of the Rhine were incorporated into France, while its eastern lands were divided largely between neighbouring Baden and Hesse.

Nearly the entire 17th century in central Europe was a period of turmoil as Louis XIV of France sought to increase his empire. The War of the Palatinate (as it was called in Germany), aka The War of The League of Augsburg, began in 1688 when Louis claimed the Palatinate. Every large city on the Rhine above Cologne was sacked. The War ended in 1697 with the Treaty of Ryswick. The Palatinate was badly battered but still outside French control. In 1702, the War of the Spanish Succession began in Europe and lasted until 1713, causing a great deal of instability for the Palatines. The Palatinate lay on the western edge of the Holy Roman Empire not far from France's eastern boundary. Louis wanted to push his eastern border to the Rhine, the heart of the Palatinate.

While the land of the Palatinate was good for its inhabitants, many of whom were farmers, vineyard operators etc., its location was unfortunately subject to invasion by the armies of Britain, France, and Germany. Mother Nature also played a role in what happened, for the winter of 1708 was particularly severe

and many of the vineyards perished. So, as well as the devastating effects of war, the Palatines were subjected to the winter of 1708-09, the harshest in 100 years.

The scene was set for a mass migration. At the invitation of Queen Anne in the spring of 1709, about 7 000 harassed Palatines sailed down the Rhine to Rotterdam. From there, about 3000 were dispatched to America, either directly or via England, under the auspices of William Penn. The remaining 4 000 were sent via England to Ireland to strengthen the protestant interest.

Although the Palatines were scattered as agricultural settlers over much of Ireland, major accumulations were found in Counties Limerick and Tipperary. As the years progressed and dissatisfactions increased, many of these folk seized opportunities to join their compatriots in Pennsylvania, or to go to newly-opened settlements in Canada.

There were many reasons for the desire of the Palatines to emigrate to the New World: oppressive taxation, religious bickering, hunger for more and better land, the advertising of the English colonies in America and the favourable attitude of the British government toward settlement in the North American colonies. Many of the Palatines believed they were going to Pennsylvania, Carolina or one of the tropical islands.

The passage down the Rhine took from 4 to 6 weeks. Tolls and fees were demanded by authorities of the territories through which they passed. Early in June, the number of Palatines entering Rotterdam reached 1 000 per week. Later that year, the British government issued a Royal proclamation in German that all arriving after October 1709 would be sent back to Germany. The British could not effectively handle the number of Palatines in London and there may have been as many as 32 000 by November 1709. They wintered over in England since there were no adequate arrangements for the transfer of the Palatines to the English colonies.

In 1710, three large groups of Palatines sailed from London. The first went to Ireland, the second to Carolina and the third to New York with the new Governor, Robert Hunter. There were 3 000 Palatines on 10 ships that sailed for NY and approximately 470 died on the voyage or shortly after their arrival.

In NY, the Palatines were expected to work for the British authorities, producing naval stores [tar and pitch] for the navy in return for their passage to NY. They were also expected to act as a buffer between the French and Natives on the northern frontier and the English colonies to the south and east.

After the defeat of Napoleon (1814-15), the Congress of Vienna gave the east-bank lands of the Rhine valley to Bavaria. These lands, together with some surrounding territories, again took the name of Palatinate in 1838.
