All debts and funeral charges are to be paid out of personal property, that is, from the produce of my farm and from the sale of two breeding mares; the whole remainder of personal estate shall remain an the farm I now occupy for the benefit of my family; to wife, Anna, one-third of my said farm during the time she shall remain my widow, but in case she shall be remarried, then the said one-third is to be divided equally by my three sons, John Michael, Thomas Valentine and Timothy Farrell; remaining two-third of said farm is to be divided equally between said three sons as they severally become of lawful age; executors are to pay to each of my three daughters, Sally Ann, Katharine and Dorothy Ann, one hundred dollars each, as the they severally arrive to the age of twenty-one and also a cow and bed to each of said daughters when they marry; to son, Thomas, a silver watch; to daughter, Sally Ann, one large bible; remainder of personal property (if any), after paying and complying with all the previous provisions contained, shall be equally divided to all my said children, also my' sons, John Michael and Thomas Valentine, shall out of their portions herein given, purchase for and give to my son, Timothy Farrell, one good silver watch; a certain piece of land on my said farm as now marked out, I hereby direct shall be forever reserved for a burying place, said piece of land being about fifty feet long and twenty-eight feet wide, more or less.

History of Northwestern Iowa

He was born August 16, 1848, in Ypsilanti, Michigan, and is the second of the five children in the family of Thomas and Jane (Wilson) Redman. The others are Frances, the widow of Andrew Troutner, of Charles City, Iowa; Catherine, who married Daniel Ritts, now deceased, and is living in Washta, Iowa; Annie, the widow of Scott Scoles of Cedar Falls, Iowa; and John W., a resident of Lawler, this state. The mother was born in London, England and the father was a native of New York state. He was a cabinet maker and a master craftsman.

When Hiram W. Redman was a child of three his parents settled in Wisconsin and he was reared and educated in the Badger state, in which he lived until 1863. When a youth of fifteen his patriotic spirit prompted him to offer his aid to the Union, and for one and a half years he was a soldier in the Thirtieth Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry. He was a gallant defender of the Stars and Stripes and was detailed to guard those implicated in the assassination of President Lincoln. After his discharge Mr. Redman returned to Wisconsin. His father being dead, he and his mother started for Iowa in September, 1865, in a covered wagon, and crossed the Mississippi river at McGregor. About the last of the month they reached Bradford and located near the "little brown church in the vale," where Mr. Redman lived until the fall of 1878, when he removed to O'Brien county, Iowa, and in March, 1880, located near Aurelia, Cherokee county. Since 1908 he has resided at his present home in Cherokee.

On February 9, 1873, Mr. Redman married Miss Violetta Watkin, who shared with him life's joys and sorrows for fifty years, and on July 16, 1923, she responded to the final summons. Five children were born to them: Myrtle, the wife of Ira Fountain, of Linn Grove, Iowa; Henry Warren, who lives in Cherokee; Edith May, now Mrs. Andrew Sutton, of Cherokee; Pearl, the wife of William Mumert, of Cherokee; and Andrew Jessie, who also resides in this community.

Mrs. Myrtle Fountain was born January 23, 1875 at Nashua, Iowa, the daughter of Hiram and Violetta Redman. On February 5, 1896 she was united in marriage to Ira Fountain and moved to the Linn Grove community. They farmed until 1917 and then moved into town, where they have lived since.

Surviving Mrs. Fountain are her husband, Ira; one daughter, Mrs. Esther Reid of Vinton; one son, Rex Fountain of Sloan; and one brother, Jesse Redman of Chicago. One daughter, Hazel, preceded her in death. There are 11 grandchildren, 23 great-grandchildren, and 1 great-grand-child surviving.

She passed away in Linn Grove on June 7, 1962.

Funeral services were held Sunday, June 10, at the Riverside Presbyterian church, in Linn Grove, with Rev. Elmer Bates officiating. Interview from the local paper:

IRA FOUNTAIN IS DEAN OF OLDSTERS

Linn Grove-- Ira Fountain, 91 is the dean of this community's senior citizens.

His father came to Iowa from Virginia answering the lure of Iowa land for sale. The elder Fountain thought \$6 an acre too high a price for some of the tracts so settled for a tract in the Pleasant Hill district west of Linn Grove, which he obtained for \$2 an acre.

He built a basement home and farm buildings and the next Spring sent his wife and children, including seven- year- old Ira, to join him. They arrived by train at Aurelia where they were met by Mr. Fountain. On the return trip they forded to cross the river and traveled on a prairie roadway rutted in the sod by other travelers.

In 1880 the family was excited to learn that the long awaited survey of the Northwestern Railroad had

been made and that the rail line would come within a half mile of the Fountain farmstead.

Mr. Fountain's mind is rich with memories of those days. He remembers when the Pleasant Hill school was so crowded three children shared each desk. A large work camp a mile distant was set up for rail workers who sent their children to the school resulting in the overcrowded conditions.

He recalls scoldings from his parents because he was more interested in observing the railroad work than in watching the cows to keep them out of the corn. At eight years of age, the railroad was for him, an absorbing subject.

"The railroad brought prosperity to Northwest Iowa," he says, "because it meant the farmers could send livestock and grain to market. But it brought fire too from the embers of the coal-fed steam engines. When it was train time farmers were hard pressed to keep their horses in line when they reared in fear of the puffing engines."

But he says the railroads had their troubles, too, with flash floods from the creeks everytime there was a heavy rain

Fountain, his brother, John, and their father, who were carpenters, often went to Peterson after the railroad came, and built business places and homes. As Linn Grove also grew, they put their talents to work there.

Mr. Fountain also remembers the harvest work when neighbor helped neighbor, using horse-powered and hand-fed threshing equipment. But in the 1870's the community suffered crop losses and food was very scarce. Billy Brooks, who had a cabin on the south side of the river, had stored some old corn, which he sold to some 40 people southeast of Sioux Rapids with the promise to pay for it when they could. In this way, the families survived the winter. and remained in Iowa to become the forebears of many of today's residents. Railroad people also in need of corn for their horses, paid a dollar a bushel for precious corn--an unheard of price in those days.

Mr. Fountain met his future bride while working on a farm near Cherokee. She was Myrtle Redman who greeted her suitor during their courtship days after he had forded a river and ridden across country to visit her.

He soon bought a farm about two miles from Linn Grove but although he still was not 21, his father signed the necessary papers for him.

By now a very few homes boasted a telephone. Ira and his father hooked up telephones between the two farms attaching the wires to native poles. Sometime later a telephone switchboard was installed at the Joe Roberts drugstore in Linn Grove and more and more telephones began to be installed.

Mr. Fountain still chuckles at the memory of a telephone checker game. "Henry Powell, another Linn Grove pioneer and I played over the telephone so you can see it wasn't a very busy line." Mr. Fountain is also an expert cribbage player.

While still on the farm, Mr. Fountain was injured in a runaway team accident. He now uses a crutch and heavy cane but continues to do yard work and is proud of his flowers. He also loves birds and feeds them during the winter. He caught 73 starlings last winter by a special method, but snared no other birds.

Mr. Fountain has served on boards of the school, telephone co-op, Peoples Co-op stores, has been a councilman and has promoted numerous civic projects. He also has cared for the small main street-park in Linn Grove, keeping the hedges neatly trimmed. He also is an avid fisherman and enjoys trips to Okoboji where his daughter, Esther, resides.

A kindly and cheerful man, he is loved by his family and admired by all those who come to know him. He continues to be mentally alert and delights in recounting the events of his 84 years in the community of Linn Grove.

He spends his summers in his own home with his daughter looking after him. She is Mrs. Esther Reid. His son, Rex and family live at Sloan. A daughter, Hazel, and Mr. Fountain's wife have died.

A two-story building in Linn Grove bears the Fountain name. it. was erected in 1916 after a fire had wiped out most of the west side of the business street. Mr. Fountain went into the hardware business and remained in business for the next 25 years in that building. It now houses the post office and Legion Hall and serves as a monument to an illustrious citizen.

Twenty-three youngsters are privileged to call him "Grandpa" and two others call him *great-grandfather."

The history of the family comes to them now from the man who knows it best--because he's lived it.

Note: There are a few inaccuracies in the article. Ira injured his leg falling out of a tree. Esther Reid never lived in Okoboji. She also didn't spend summers looking after Ira. 23 people called him grandpa or great-grandpa, and two others called him great-great grandpa.

Mr. Fountain was born April 11, 1873, in Brentsville, Va. He came to Linn Grove with his parents and lived there 82 years. He farmed for a time and later operated a hardware store until his health forced retirement. He lived with his son and family at Sloan. Later he lived in a retirement home at Aurelia before going into the hospital at Cherokee.

His parents, his wife, Myrtle, and one daughter, Hazel, preceded. He was one of Buena Vista County's oldest residents.
