He was the son of James Robert(Bob) Etherton,Jr. and Ruth Elizabeth Gurtz.

Notes for Sandra(Sandy) Mae DeWitt:

Sandra Mae DeWitt Etherton (Sandy) was born in Coshocton, Oh. in 1934 & raised in Millersburg, Oh. She attended Millersburg high school where she was a member of both the golf & girls basketball teams. Her senior year she was "homecoming queen" for the high school. She graduated from Millersburg High School in 1952, becoming one of three generations to graduate from the high school (her father Chet & her grandmother Lucy graduated from the same high school).

She attended Miami University of Ohio for two years & became a member of Chi Omega sorority. She was captain of the girl's golf team & in 1954 represented Miami at the "National Intercollegiate Golf Tournament" at the famous "Greenbriar" golf course. She transferred to the University of Ky. where she met Jim (her roommate at Miami, from Louisville also transferred). She won the women's intramural golf title both of her years at U. of Ky. Her senior year she was crowned "Kappa Alpha Rose" of the Theta chapter of KA. Graduated in 1956 & married in 1956. Began teaching elementary school in Lexington, continuing to teach in Pensacola; taking two years off to have her two children Jay DeWitt and Stacy Leigh. After teaching 34 years she has retired to the Osceola Golf Course.

Notes for James(Jim) Robert Etherton III:

James Robert Etherton, III (Jim), b. in 1933 in New Albany, Ind. Graduate of Male High School in Louisville, Ky. Was 1st trumpet & Band Colonel of the famous Male High School band. Attended the Univ. of Ky. on a music scholarship & became a member of Kappa Alpha fraternity. In 1954 he was "Aide to the President" at the university graduation (an honor given to the junior ROTC student with the highest grade average in military science). He graduated in 1955 & married Sandy Dewitt, whom he met at the University. After serving 6 months as an Infantry officer at Ft. Benning, Ga., he returned to Lexington, Kentucky & taught band for two years at Lafayette Jr/Sr High School. In 1958, moved to Pensacola, Fl. teaching band & orchestra at Warrington Jr. High School for 4 years & Escambia High School for 6 years. In 1968 he joined the music department at Pensacola Jr. College. He directed the PJC Band; founded the PJC Jazz Ensemble & the Pensacola Civic Band (adult band), & attained the rank of full professor. Retired after teaching at PJC for 22 years (34 years of teaching).

Notes for Chester Howard DeWitt:

Chester Howard (Chet) DeWitt (1901-1963) & Ella Marie Lamb (1901-1969) were married in 1926 & had two daughters, Sandra Mae and Marcia Ann.

Chet, a native of Millersburg, Oh., graduated from Millersburg High School. He began his almost 50 years of drug store experience at 13 working for the Patrick Drug Store in Millersburg. He attended pharmacy school at Ohio State, & was a member of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity. After graduation, he returned to work for the Patrick & Rottman Drug Store in Millersburg. Later Mr. Patrick opened his own store, selling it to Chet in 1929. Chet opened the DeWitt Drug Store in 1949 & operated it until his retirement in 1961, when he sold it to his nephew Winton Krill. The store remained open until Winton retired in 1993. The store & it's contents were sold at auction on April 13, 1994, ending 45 years of service to the community. Buried in Millersburg, Ohio.

Notes for Ella Marie Lamb:

Ella was from Columbus, Oh., graduating from Ohio State University with a degree in education. She was a member of Phi Mu sorority. Ella taught school in Glenmont, Oh. Buried next to husband in Millersburg, Ohio.

Notes for Commodore Perry DeWitt:

STORY OF THE "CHEF" - Commodore Perry DeWitt

When he was 10 years old his mother died and he became proficient in the art of cooking since he was now responsible for most of the household duties. He was a big man, with a hearty laugh, full of practical jokes, who liked his "home brew". He opened his first restaurant in Nashville, Ohio.

After marrying Lucy, they moved to Des Moines, Iowa where Commodore worked in a grocery store. Lucy got homesick so they moved back to Mansfield & then to Millersburg. He became "chef" at the Central Hotel and was also connected with the Marchand grocery.

Commodore became widely known for his culinary art and was offered the job as chef of the "Waldorf Astoria Hotel" in New York City. Since his wife Lucy did not want to leave her twin sister Lulu, he rejected the offer.

In 1926, a few years before Commodore's death, he came to visit his nephew, Herbert Fisher, & said: "Bert, let's you and I start a restaurant in Millersburg. One is badly needed. I shall be the cook, & you, with your good business head, can run the place." Herbert, a plasterer, was reluctant & said he didn't know a "damn thing" about running a place to eat. Commodore convinced Herbert & it was arranged with just a handshake (without papers). Commodore knew that Herbert's back had been bothering him, causing him to miss a lot of work. It was time to change his occupation. The "Fisher's Home Restaurant" was such a success that people would wait in line to get in. It was a family affair with Herbert's wife, Effie working full time.

In 1929 Commodore got pneumonia, was ill for sometime, dying of a heart attack. The business was sold in 1947 & became the "Home Restaurant".

Notes for Lucy Bell Marchand:

STORY OF THE MARCHAND TWINS-Lucy & Lulu

NOTE: Much of this information came from Harry Krieger (son of Lulu Dell Marchand) and from newspaper stories about the twins.

On Feb. 18, 1868 twins were born to Hannah & Frederick Marchand, Jr., at their home on Massillon Road (known as Posey Point). Dr. Joel Pomerene and a neighbor Nancy Skelley delivered the twins. One was considerably smaller and showed very little sign of life. So the doctor said "Let us devote our time and efforts to saving the other; it looks like we can't save the little one." But through the efforts of the neighbor, they both made it.

Their parents were at a loss for names, and so they were not named. They named themselves when they got big enough to talk. Lucy was know as "Big Pet" (being the biggest) and Lulu was "Little Pet." At 6 they went to school and were sent home crying to return with "real" names. The teacher had asked their names and both responded - "Pet.". Lucy Beegle was sewing at the Marchand home that day so the larger one decided on Lucy Bell. The other twin decided on Lulu Dell (similar sounding). To most they were still "Big Pet" and "Little Pet."

When 10 their father died so the two oldest boys, Sant then 24, and Jesse then 18, assumed his home responsibilities. It is said that the girls shined their brothers shoes and did other chores to gain a few nickles to spend on Saturday night. This should have signaled that the twins were to be a little mischievous. Stories include:

One day they were dismissed from school early for shooting paper wads. They decided to kill time until school was out to avoid suspicion at home, so they followed a funeral procession for something to do. When the procession arrived at the cemetery they discovered that one of the pall bearers was their brother Sant.

The Marchand's were Lutherans but most of the eligble beaus were in the Methodist Church. Not telling their mother, the twins would go to the Methodist church on Sunday nights. Didn't fool their mother because the Methodist's were always longer winded with longer sermons so the twins got home later than usual.....a dead giveaway!

The twins were encouraged not to frequent public dance halls since nice young ladies were not seen at public halls after 9:30 (normally there were fights at the dance halls after 10:00). But the twins could be seen at the dance halls in the early hours of the evening until brother Sant rang the Marchand curfew.

In 1885 they graduated from Millersburg, High School in the smallest class ever to graduate. Lulu was valedictorian and wanted to be a teacher. Lucy wrote the class history and prophecy and wanted to help her mother with housework after graduation. Still being close, Lucy went with Lulu to the Teachers' Institute, which was somewhat of a dating bureau. The twins normally did their courting in pairs so beaus would normally bring along a friend. Many beaus saw the twins.

A harness maker courted Lucy and brought a friend for Lulu who was a man who owned a jewelry store. Both girls got rings (but didn't take them seriously). Lulu said "he probably got them wholesale" and Lucy gave up on the harness man because he was too short for her. There was a baker (who brought them "goodies"); a hotel operator; and a railroad worker (Sant didn't like him and said - "Lulu, he has a girl to meet him at every railroad depot along the line & he tells the same things to all of them").

A country boy from Farmerstown, named John William Krieger, came to town to work at Rudy's hardware store and met Lulu at a party. He asked to walk her home and she accepted, but he was disappointed to find that she lived just across the street. He then asked he r out again, she accepted, but discovered later that her date book had another man coming the same night. That night Lucy met John Krieger at the door and told him that Lulu had to go away that evening and he should come back the next night. He did and kept coming by until they were married in 1892. Lucy began to see a "Nashville Romeo" named Commodore Perry DeWitt. They were married in 1894

and went to Des Moines, Iowa where he was employed in a grocery store. Lucy got homesick so they came back to Mansfield, and then to Millersburg. Lulu, who lived in Killbuck, Ohio got homesick also, and her family also moved back to Millersburg.

They both taught school in Holmes County for several years (until their marriages) and spent almost all of their lives in Millersburg, living within a few blocks of each other. They maintained their own separate homes most of their lives and spent most of their leisure hours together. They were separated only five years, when Lucy lived in Des Moines, Iowa and Mansfield and the last 8 years of their lives when Lulu moved to Ashland, Ohio. Since the twins were

Holmes county's oldest twins, birthday parties were annual events with pictures and guest lists in the local papers. Sandy DeWitt (Etherton) is listed as attending her grandmother and aunts 70th birthday party in 1938 at the age of 4.

Lulu died in 1954 seven days short of her 86th birthday & Lucy died in 1959 at 91.

William G. Lamb (1865-1931), born in Kent, Oh. married Laura Mae Workman (1876-1931), born in Mr. Vernon, Oh., in 1893. He was 28 and she was 17 1/2 when they wed. William was a railroad engineer. He started with the Atlantic & Great Western Railroad (now the Erie RR) in 1879. In 1887 he went with the Wisconsin Central Railroad as a fireman and in 1888 he went to the Pennsylvania Railroad as a fireman. He was later promoted to Engineer and to passenger service where he served until his retirement. He served with the Pennsylvania RR for 42 years, retiring as an Engineman. They had 3 children.

He married Susana Shank (1829-1887) in 1851 and had 8 children. According to the 1870 census of Holmes and Knox Townships, all were born in Ohio.

- i. Leander Marchand, born 1846; died 1865 in (Civil War Death).

Notes for Leander Marchand:

Killed in the explosion aboard the Ship "Sultana" while returning from the Civil War. Leander & his friend Gardner, who enlisted with him, were thrown into the water. Leander could not swim & Gardner tried to save him. He couldn't save him because both men were in a weakened condition caused by their imprisonment. When Leander finally went down, Gardner was able to save himself and returned to Millersburg bringing the story of Leander's death to his family. Leander's body was never recovered.

The 102nd Ohio Volunteer Infantry was organized at Mansfield, Ohio and was mustered in 1862. Leander joined in 1864 at age 19. In September, 1864 a portion of the unit went in relief of Athens, Alabama. The fort was cowardly surrendered to the enemy when an overwhelming force captured and destroyed many members of the 102nd. The officers and men were taken to and imprisoned at Selma and Cahawba, Ala. Prison camps were hard places with many men dying in the camps. Most of the survivors were little better than semi-invalid. With the Civil War over, the prisoners were exchanged in April, 1865 and sent to Vicksburg, Miss. for transportation to their northern homes. Leander boarded the Sultana at Vicksburg for his trip home.

After the American Civil War, the army offered steamers 50 cents a head to transport soldiers home. The owners of the Sultana jumped at this fine opportunity to make profit and pressured the captain of the Sultana to transport as many passengers as possible. The ship left New Orleans April 21, 1865 and started up the Mississippi river. By law, she could carry 376 people. It was at her regular stop at Vicksburg that an engineer discovered the boilers leaking badly. It was decided to repair the boilers and continue on to Memphis, Evansville, Louisville, and Cincinnati while loading it's passengers. There was a stampede of passengers who came onboard in great numbers, far beyond the Sultana's capacity. Army reports do not give exact numbers but it is estimated that the ship left Vicksburg with some 2300 on board including 1700 Union veterans who were going home. Leander & 80 men of the 102nd got on board.

Somehow the Sultana started upstream, breasting a current made stronger by the rivers flood stage. To increase their speed from Vicksburg to Memphis, the Sultana also increased its boiler pressure. By doing so, the Captain put the steamer and everyone on it at risk. For the next 48 hours it went on without trouble, docking at Memphis on April 26. The boiler again began to leak and was repaired. At close to midnight the Sultana went on up the river. Most of the soldiers were dozing when the one of the worst maritime disasters of all time happened. It resulted in over 1800 deaths. Although much is still unknown about the final cause of the Sultana's explosion, the design of its boiler system was most likely an element and the actions of the head engineer are also to blame. The decks of the steamboat were made out of thin and flimsy wood planks, and the paint on the floors were made from flammable chemicals like turpentine and benzene. The boilers were surrounded by flammable objects. The most widely accepted cause for the explosion was the lack of water in the boilers. This would have caused the boilers to overheat and explode.

From an article from the Plainville Times from Plainville, Kansas, and dated May 28, 1908

about James R. Collins, who survived the Civil War and the sinking of the Sultana.

At about three o'clock in the morning of the 27th day of April, after having steamed ten miles up the river from Memphis, while every soldier on the Sultana was wrapped in slumber, suddenly, without any kind of warning, an explosion rent the air, and the Sultana was splintered from bow to stern by a mighty force, which sent men and timbers flying through the air to fall into the surging waters of the great river. A scene of horror, death and the most frantic confusion ensued. The first I knew of the terrible catastrophe that had befallen us was when I awakened from sleep by the timbers of the upper deck together with clouds of cinders and ashes, falling on me and pinning me to the deck. Hundreds of other soldiers were sleeping on this lower deck, crowded together as thick as they could find room to lie. The other two decks were likewise crowded with sleeping men.

Never will I forget the scene that I then witnessed. Quickly following the explosion the Sultana caught on fire and soon she was a blazing furnace of angry, devouring flames. Many of the men who had not been killed at first were burned alive before our eyes. I knew that we could remain a very few minutes as the flames were mounting higher and higher so I knew we would have to try to save ourselves the best way we could. We bade each other good-bye, and at once prepared to jump into the river.

Men died by the hundreds in the water near the wreck. Most of the men preferred drowning to being burned alive, and leaped into the water. Many could not swim, others had been half-starved for months and were in bad physical shape. Leander drowned after his friend Gardner tried to save him. Gardner was just too weak to save his friend Leander who could not swim.

When dawn came, survivors dotted the river all the way to Memphis, clinging to logs, rafts, barrels, and other bits of wood. Many rescue crafts from Memphis put out to do what they could and hauled half-dead men out of the cold river. One former Confederate soldier in a small boat is said to have rescued fifteen Union soldiers single handedly. Between 500 and 600 men were taken to Memphis hospitals. Some 200 of these died soon afterward. Estimates of the number killed ranged from 1,500 to 1,900.

What is known is that the Sultana, fearfully overloaded, was struggling against an abnormally strong current when defective boilers exploded, the wrecked ship then took fire, and most of the men aboard were killed.

Oddly enough, this catastrophe got only a moderate amount of newspaper attention at the time. The nation's mind was fixed on the closing scenes of the Civil War. Lee had surrendered. The country had a new President (Lincoln had been dead 11 days when this happened) and was beginning to worry about the problem of rebuilding the shattered Union. The Army was not anxious to publicize the accident. Therefore one of the worst marine disasters in history had a hard time making it into the history books.

Notes for Henry Sanford Marchand:

Sanford Henry Marchand-"Uncle Sanky" (1854-1936) was born in Millersburg. Sanford was a millwright, housing contractor, lumber dealer, master carpenter and cabinet maker. He was considered more than just a "millwright" as he worked for Nordyke and Marmon milling machinery Co. installing the milling machinery and then building the mill around the machinery. He traveled extensively from Duluth to Memphis and the middle west. Since he was away from home much of the time he spent much of his time reading the "classics" and became known as a "classics" scholar. He was just 24 when his father died at 55. Since Leander died in the war, he was left as sole support for his mother, 3 brothers & 5 sisters. He performed faithfully, postponing his marriage until he was 36. He married Rosa Etta Hammond (1861-1952) in 1891 and had one child - Isha (married Frank Manly). All of his brothers & sisters regarded him with awe & respect since he put them all through high school (except Charlie). He served many terms as Democratic Party Mayor of Millersburg & member of the town council. He is buried in the Millersburg cemetery.

- v. Charles Frederick Marchand, born 1857; died 1939; married Abbie Henderson 1878; born Unknown; died Unknown.

Notes for Charles Frederick Marchand:

Charles Frederick Marchand (1857-1939). Considered the "blacksheep" of the family. Most of the family had little respect for Charlie who was always drunk. Married Abbie Henderson in 1878. It is said that on one occasion he wrote home from Virginia asking for money to get home. He said he needed the money "because his leg had been amputated."

Jesse, Alexander, & Lulu wanted to send their poor brother the money but Sanford refused to permit it. He told them "it's just one of his tricks to get money for drink." The money was not sent and in time Charlie walked into Millersburg on his own two legs. After his death his sister Annie saw that he was buried in the Uhl cemetery.

- 5 ix. Lucy Bell Marchand, born 1868 in Holmes County, Ohio; died 1959 in Ashland, Ohio; married Commodore Perry DeWitt September 20, 1894.
- x. Lulu Dell Marchand, born 1868 in Millersburg, Ohio; died 1954 in Millersburg, Ohio; married John William Krieger June 29, 1892; born Unknown; died 1934.

12. William George Lamb, Sr., born 1837 in Edinburg, Scotland; died 1922 in Kent, Ohio. He was the son of **24. John W. Lamb, Jr.** and **25. Isabelle Milne**. He married **13. Anna Williamson** 1862 in Canada.

13. Anna Williamson, born 1839 in Aberdeen, Scotland; died 1914 in Kent, Ohio. She was the daughter of **26. George Williamson** and **27. Janet Ferguson**.

Notes for William George Lamb, Sr.:

William Lamb, Sr. (1836-1922) was the last of 5 children in his family to pass away. He married Anna Williamson (1839-1914) in 1862 in Toronto. William was born in Edinburgh, Scotland. He lost his father when he was 6 weeks old. He was educated in Scotland's first Free School, the John Herrick Free School in Edinburgh. He braved the perils of a sailing vessel trip to Toronto, Canada with his mother and stepfather when he was 18. He worked for 6 years in Toronto at cabinet and carpenter work. Always proud of his home country, he had vivid recollections of the hours spent in and around Edinburgh Castle and Princess St. Also a lover of literature, esp. Scotch literature, and rated Bobby Burns as the greatest poet.

William and Anna moved to Kent, Ohio in 1865 when it was known as Franklin Mills. William went to work for a Marvin Kent as a carpenter and then to work for the Atlantic & Great Western Railroad (now the Erie Railroad) as a coach builder and carpenter. He was employed in the Erie Railroad Shops for 51 years of continuous service since their construction and his retirement. He was a citizen of Kent for 57 years. They had 4 children:

3 sons-all railroad engineers:

Albert A. Lamb - with the Erie Railroad

William G. Lamb - with the Pennsylvania Railroad

Frank (Fred) C. Lamb - with the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad

1 daughter: Eleanor Mary Lamb who married Frank C. Ingersoll (also a railroad engineer). She changed her name to "Ella Mae."

William and Anna celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on Oct. 16, 1912. Anna died Dec. 24, 1914. After her death, his daughter Ella moved into their house. They later moved to Warren, Ohio where she became a teacher at Warren High School. William died of a stroke in Warren in 1922 at 86. William and Anna are buried in Standing Rock Cemetery in Kent, Ohio.

Notes for Anna Williamson:

Anna was also born in Scotland. Born in Aberdeen, she came to Toronto, Canada with her parents. At the time they crossed the ocean, steamers were unknown, sailing vessels being the only means of ocean travel. Their vessel, "The Renown of Aberdeen," was 6 weeks and 3 days in crossing, having drifted into the Arctic Ocean & being tossed among the icebergs for several days.

Notes for Frederick C. Lamb:

Worked with the Baltimore and Ohio railroad.

14. Zachariah Workman, born 1835 in Knox Co., Ohio; died 1908 in Brinkhaven, Ohio. He was the son of **28. Samuel (1st husband) P. Workman** and **29. Sarah Hibbets**. He married **15. Mary Ann Wolfe** 1859.

15. Mary Ann Wolfe, born 1839 in Wooster, Ohio; died 1890 in Brinkhaven, Ohio. She was the daughter of **30. William Wolfe** and **31. Sara Bear (Bair)**.

Notes for Zachariah Workman:

Zachariah Workman (1835-1908) was born in Knox Co., Ohio (1/2 mile north of Brinkhaven). He is buried in Brinkhaven, Ohio. He was a Civil War soldier.

Following from: Roster-96th Ohio Volunteer Souvenir Book & 96th Ohio Volunteer Infantry History

Zachariah enlisted (at Camp Delaware, Ohio) in the 96th Ohio Volunteer Regiment in the Union army, for 3 years. The unit was formed in August, 1862. He enlisted in Company B (in Knox County, Oh.) at age 27. He was left sick at Covington, Ky. in Oct., 1862. Rejoining them in Jan., 1863 he participated in:

*The battle of Arkansas Post (Jan. 1863)

*The expedition to Greenville, Mississippi. (Feb. 14 to 27, 1863).

*The siege of Vicksburg, Mississippi. (with Gen. Grant's army) (May 18 to July 5, 1863).

The battle of Grand Coteau, Louisiana. (Nov. 3, 1863) where he was taken prisoner. After 53 days in prison, he was exchanged on May 9, 1864. He spent from July of 1864 to January of 1865 in a hospital in New Orleans.

During this time he was transferred (on Nov. 18, 1864) from Company B to Company C of the 96th. With Company C he participated in:

The battle of Spanish Fort, Alabama. (March 26 to April 8, 1865)

The battle of Fort Blakely, Alabama. (April 9, 1865)

The siege of Mobile, Alabama. (March 26 to April 12, 1865)

The battle of Whistler's Station, Alabama. (April 13, 1865)

He was mustered out on July 7, 1865 at Mobile, Ala. The 96th Regiment was discharged at Camp Chase, Ohio on July 29, 1865. Regiment lost: 2 officers & 46 enlisted men killed; 5 officers & 286 enlisted men by disease. TOTAL 339.

Notes for William "Osborn" Workman:

The following story has been passed down through the years by his relatives: Osborn's 3 children were washed down the Mohican River in a flood. He searched and searched but could not find their bodies. Later he heard of an old hermit fortune teller that lived up in the hills. Being desperate to find his children, he went to the hermit. The hermit told him "go down the river until you find an old yellow buggy wheel, under the wheel you will find your 3 children's bodies." He followed the old hermits instructions and found the old yellow buggy wheel. He also found his 3 children under the wheel.

Notes for Polina Ellen "Ella" Workman:

Polina Ellen (Ella) Workman (1877-1964) had 5 husbands, outliving all of them. She never had any children of her own but raised the children of several of her husbands who had been married before. Ella never had piano lessons and played by ear. She played for tent revival church services during the summers and indoor services during the winter. Her nieces Ella DeWitt and her sister Edna Weis wanted her to move from her farm into town after her last husband died. She consented but only if she could find a house without indoor plumbing, for Ella didn't want to change her ways of country life completely. They finally located a house of this type in Danville, OH., and so she moved. 1st husband was Frank Shrimpland (1855-1913), a telegraph operator. Married in 1898 in Greer, Ohio. Later married a Charles Alexander and finally a Charles Robinson. Ella P. Workman Robinson is buried in Brinkhaven, Ohio.

In 1875 David DeWitt had a farm near "Jimtown Corners" (the crossroad on "DeWitt Ridge") about 1 mile west of Glenmont in Richland Township, Holmes County, Ohio. A little farther west was land owned by Joseph DeWitt and his brother James H. DeWitt (do not know if any relationship yet).

Notes for Frederick Marchand, Sr.:

Frederick Marchand, Sr. (1785-1865) was born in Switzerland (then considered a part of France since it had been conquered by Napoleon) in a village at the foot of the Alps. At 15 he went into Napoleon's Army and was chosen to be one of his "Elite Guards," who were all over 6 feet tall. He was with Napoleon for 9 & 1/2 years, crossing the Alps with him in his second invasion into Italy in 1800.

Only the sturdiest men made the crossing of the Alps. The soldiers carried their iron kettles on their backs. Cavalry, baggage and artillery were brought up narrow paths normally used by goat herds. Masses of snow and ice on cliffs threatened the 40,000 man army with avalanches. Guns were put into excavated trunks of trees and drawn up the mountain by ropes. To be undetected they would wrap the wheels of the caissons and horses feet with straw. On the return march, in the winter, their shoes wore out and they walked in the snow and ice in their bare feet. Frederick's feet were deformed (from freezing) and he was always slightly crippled. His service was one of unbroken success before leaving the Army in 1809.

Frederick returned home occasionally during those 9 & 1/2 years to visit an army buddy and neighbor named Jean Giaque. Jean had a daughter, Margaret Sophia Giaque (1803-1895) (18 years younger). Frederick would bounce her on his knee and tell her that if he lived to return from the Army, he would marry her. Even though he was in his late 30's, he returned from the Army and kept his promise. They were married in 1823 and they emigrated to the U.S., accompanied by her family. They settled in Holmes County, Ohio & lived on a small farm south of Millersburg.

In 1840-1841 there was a tavern in Millersburg located at the Bowers Hotel. The Bowers House (on the NE corner of Main and Cross streets) was kept by Frederick Marchand, Sr. He was referred to as the "Frenchman" because he came from what was known as "French Switzerland." He possessed the "sword & rosettes of the immortal order of Napoleons Invincible Guards," and had a "sword-gash" on one cheek. It was said that he was a very large man, over six feet tall, built in proportion, and a perfect gentleman.

About 1850 their son Jacob brought them to Wooster and purchased a farm for them just west of town. They

lived there until 1862 when Jacob passed away. They then went to live with their son Charles at Larwell, Ind. Frederick died at 83 and is buried in Larwell, Ind. in a church yard, on land given by their son Charles for the cemetery.

After Frederick's death Margaret stayed with their son Charles. She could read no English at all. She loved to meet someone with whom she could talk about her early life in Switzerland and her "hero" Napoleon, whom she adored. Hattie Yates, her great granddaughter visited her in 1889 at Uncle Charles, and spent a lot of time with her. Hattie said that each morning Margaret would take her hand and lead her into the front room. On the wall was a picture of Frederick (her deceased husband). Margaret would stop before it and ask "do you know who this man is? He went to war & was gone 9 1/2 years, then he came home & married one woman." The granddaughter began to wonder if Frederick had 2 wives. Finally one day, after repeating her question, she added "You know that woman was me." Margaret died Claypool, Ind. at 92 & is buried next to her husband in Larwell, Ind. They had 7 children.

They spent the remainder of their lives on this farm. Charles died in Holmes County, Ohio at age 73. Barbary died at age 71. Both are buried in the Uhl homestead cemetery near Millersburg, Ohio.

Archibald Uhl (b. 1827) was born in Hardy Township. His early life was spent on his father's farm. He was given as good an education as the schools of that day afforded. When reaching manhood he devoted his attention to agriculture. He owned 170 acres of choice land, 80 of which were part of his father's homestead, and a part of the original entry of his grandfather. He was married August 22, 1849, to Miss Susan Close, daughter of Peter Close. She died leaving 3 children: Rowl, Jerome and Mary Jane. He then married Sarah Wolgamot, daughter of Joseph & Susan (Everett) Wolgamot. 8 children were born to them: Charles, Susan, Ida, Bigham & Joseph; one daughter, Eliza, died after reaching womanhood, & 2 children died in infancy. Archibald always took an interest in the affairs of the township, and while not a politician was active in promoting what seemed to him to be of benefit to the community.

The trade name of the leather's was "Empress Leather." His wife, Catherine Gibson, was a sister-in-law to Dr. Abraham Groves who performed the first appendicitis operation ever accomplished. George and Catherine had 8 children - one being Chuck Lamb's grandfather George Lamb, born in 1861 in Omemee.

From articles in the Whig-Standard (Canada) newspaper:

George booked passage for his family to Australia, but was forced to cancel because two of his daughters, of marriageable age, were not married. Thus they could not go to Australia. So the family set sail for Canada. Heavy storms were encountered in route to their new home in Canada. At that time ocean steamers were unknown, sailing vessels being the only means of ocean travel. Their vessel, "The Renown of Aberdeen," was 6 weeks & 3 days in crossing, drifting into the Arctic Ocean & being tossed among the icebergs for several days.

The family arrived in Montreal where George came in contact with a man who needed a blacksmith. He was hired for the job which was to work between Pike Falls and Smiths Falls. They stayed there for a year and a half before moving to Brockville. When the Brockville tunnel was started, George secured a job working on the tunnel.

George is buried in Old Protestant Cemetery in Brockville, Ontario, in a plot in Potter's Field. He was 92 years old. There is no marker. Death registration states the cause of death was "old age." No doctor in attendance and records state: "grave dug themselves." The 1881 Canadian Census shows George "widowed," age 80, living in Brockville, Ontario.

William A. Williamson was a monument builder in Gananoque, Ontario, Canada. As a youth, he started his working career at 14. He got a job as a fireman on an engine carrying material out of the Brockville tunnel during its building. He fell from the engine and was almost killed. The urge to wander took him to the United States at 15. He took a job on the Lake Shore Railway in Cleveland. Later he took a job on a boat to Chicago even though he knew nothing about being a sailor. In Chicago he left the boat & worked in an iron ore mine. Returning to Chicago, he got a job on a ship. Heavy seas in Lake Michigan sank the ship. For 3 days he clung to a piece of wreckage until he was rescued. Unconscious when rescued, he spent a week in the hospital. After 2 more bouts with "death" he gave up sailing. At age 23 he learned his trade as a "stone cutter." Finally in 1872 at age 27 he went to Gananoque and started his own monument company. He still owned the business at age 90 in 1935. His "gentle Lambs" he did for the death of children became famous. He died 1 month before his 94th birthday in 1938.

Garrett County, Maryland Historical Society has an article entitled "First Settlers in the Glades Country; from the "Glades Star", Garrett Co., Historical Society and other sources (<http://midatlantic.rootsweb.com/MD/garrett/earlysets.html>), which indicates that John Friend, Sr. and Gabriel Friend purchased land from the Indians in 1764. Charles Friend and Augustine Friend both purchased land in 1765. Settlers in the Sang Run Area (sang is short for ginseng) included John Friend (who lived near Friendsville) and Henry DeWitt. Settlers at Hoyes (formerly known as Johnstown) included John DeWitt.

In 1781 the Maryland General Assembly reserved fifty acre lots for Maryland patriots who had served in the Revolutionary War. In 1787 a gentleman by the name of Deakin surveyed the land west of Fort Cumberland, Maryland for the fifty acre parcels. Deakin compiled a list of people who were already living on the land. In 1788 the Assembly passed an act to permit the settlers already on the land to purchase it for not less than 5 shillings and not more than 20 shillings. A commission of three men was formed to determine the value of the land. Values were listed as follows (note: I have only listed the individuals that are connected to Holmes Co., Ohio early pioneers. For a complete listing go to the Garrett County, Maryland GenWeb web page):

"Given to those settlers to purchase 636 lots by them respectively settled , to be discharged in three equal annual payments in the years 1789, 1790 and 1791: in default of any payment the land should be liable to proclamation by any citizen of Maryland".

Charles Uhl, Sr. (1761-1828) was born in Wittenburg, Germany. In 1763 (at 22 years of age) he came to the U.S. with his parents and his brothers Jacob and Peter, settling in eastern Pennsylvania. The three brothers joined the "Continentalists" and fought in the Revolutionary War. Peter lost his life but Charles and Jacob fought until the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown and the final victory. Jacob raised a large family in Maryland. Charles married Catherine Close in 1784 at age 23 and moved to Allegheny Co., Maryland, where they raised a large family and lived until their deaths. (Catherine had a first husband - Abraham Arnold.)

After the war, Charles was given the privilege of going west and buying government land. He came as far as Holmes Co., Ohio, in 1813, traveling by wagon. He bought 600 acres in Hardy Township, paying \$1.25 an acre for it with money he earned by his own labor. He also bought 320 acres in Mechanic Township and 160 acres in Tuscarawas County. He then returned to his home in Maryland.

Seven of his sons and one daughter (Catherine) came to Ohio and became residents. Besides Charles, Jr. and his family (who came in 1815), Jacob, William & George Uhl came in 1818, followed in 1820 by Samuel & Jesse. In 1832 the oldest brother John came and settled in Hardy Township. These brothers cleared and cultivated much of the land west of Killbuck Creek and southwest of Millersburg.

Carl (Charles) Uhl served in the Revolutionary War as a Corporal in Jacob Lodicks Co., Col. Ely's Battalion, Pennsylvania Militia Berks County Penn. (Reference-Pennsylvania Archives Ser. 6. Vol 2 Page 602. DAR Patriot Index Page 694 also Pennsylvania Archives Ser. 5 Vol. 5 Page 279)

Michael Korn, Sr. was born in Berks County, PA. in 1760. He married Susannah Baker (or Boucher) in 1781. An old diary says that Susannah was the sister of Colonel Jacob Baker of the Continental Army. Sometime after 1791 they went to Bedford County, PA. It was here that a land grant for 200 acres of land was granted to Michael and his brother, Jacob Korn. Somerset County was organized in 1795 and that part of Bedford County was added to Somerset County at that time. The farm was nestled in the foothills of the Allegheny Mountains. His home was the pride of the community. It was formerly the seat of the government of the Southampton township, where elections were held and all government meetings were held.

The religious life of the Germans in Somerset County was found in the Wellersburg Reformed and Lutheran Church. The church was formed in 1803. Among the first members were: the Korn, Uhl, Hoymans, Witts, Wilhelms, Reichers, Wingers, and Gaumers. The sermons were delivered in German in the early years, later in English.

Susannah died in 1811 and was buried in Cook Cemetery. The cemetery is located 1/2 mile from the Korn home on a knoll close to Wellersburg. The obituaries on the stone slabs are written in high German. Many of the Korn family are buried there. Michael died in 1824 and is buried there.

After Susannah's death, he remarried in 1817. Her name was Magdalena (last name unknown, a widow named Korn). Probably his housekeeper. Michael was considered a wealthy man. His estate amounted to between \$8000 and \$10,000.

NOTE: After marrying Charles Uhl, Barbara accompanied her husband to Holmes County, Ohio in 1815 to farm his fathers land he received from his service in the Revolutionary War. Charles Korn, III also went to Holmes County in 1825. Charles served in the War of 1812 and the Mexican War. All of his children were born in Holmes County, Ohio.

Know as Dirck Jans, in 1680 he resumed the surname, Woertman. He married Marrietje Teunis Deynse (b.1644) abt.1660 in New York. In 1661 they were admitted to the Brooklyn Dutch Church. They owned property in Brooklyn, N.Y. and owned and operated the Brooklyn Ferry until he sold it in 1687. Dirck was also a town officer in 1673 in Brooklyn.

John Derick Workman started the move west in 1699 when he moved from Brooklyn Heights, N.Y. to Somerville, New Jersey. By the year 1704 he had located in Raritan, New Jersey where he remained for a number of years. He then moved to Pluckemin, N.Y. where he erected a long old-fashioned house made of logs that was to be known for many years as the "Workman Homestead". Here a descendant, Jan Woertman, known as Squire Wortman (due to the fact that he owned 500 acres) entertained the patriots, Gisbert Sutphen, Aaron Melick, and Colonel Stephen Hunt when they met to plan their resistance to the

British army a year before the Declaration of Independence was signed. It was herem, too, that Jan Wortman, trained by his father in the family trade as a blacksmith, shod the horses of George Washington and his entourage during the Revolutionary War. The Woertman tradition in America had been one of civic loyalty. Richard John (Derick Jans) had begun it in 1673 when he became an officer of his own in Brooklyn. John Derick (Jan Deric) continued it as Justice of the Peace in New Jersey. Squire Jan Wortman, his nephews and sons planned and worked for the revolutionary forces.

Anna Marie Andries was the daughter of Andries Jureadusen and Annetje Pieteise Praa. Annetje was baptized in 1652 in Leyden, Holland. She was the daughter of Pieter Praa and Maxine.

Dirck's father was John William Workman, born most likely in England. John immigrated to Amsterdam because of the religious persecution during the time of the Puritan upheavals. Jans(John) William Woertman married Harmtje(Hannah) as early as 1628 & had at least 3 children in Holland. All 3 children left Holland and came to the New Netherlands in America. At this time the colony was under the judicial powers of Peter Stuyvesant. The area was not named "New York" until 1664 when the area was captured by the English.

John died in Amsterdam before the year 1647. In Holland, they adopted the naming customs of the Dutch using the "patronymic pattern." So.. John William's son Richard is recorded as Dirck Jansen (translated as Richard the son of John) in Dutch records.

Before 1639 he appears to have occupied a plantation on Manhattan Island. He married Femartje (Pheobe) Sales in the Reformed Dutch church in Manhattan , New Amsterdam, New York in 1640. In 1646 he bought a house and lot on the Great Highway opposite the gardens of the West Indies Company on Manhattan Island for 160 guilders. In 1647 he inherited land of his father-in-law (John Seals or Sales). In 1655 he bought a plantation at Faltbush, Long Island. In 1658 he was a resident of Brooklyn and in 1661 he was a magistrate of that town. He and Phoebe had 7 children. After the death of his wife he married Jan Corneliszen Buys.
