Notes for ANDREW MCFADDIN:

Tradition states that John McFadin was the son of Andrew (b. 1675-83 SCOTLAND) and Marsey Mallory (b. ca. 1672 Derry, IRELAND) who were married in 1693 in Derry, Ireland. They lived in the town of Garvaugh in the county of Derry on the Bannwater at a place called Summersett. There they had several sons including John.

Marsy died, and in 1704 Andrew married Jane Lindsey (b. 1684 IRELAND). In September 1718, the ship Maccallum arrived in Boston, Massachusetts Colony, from Londonderry, Ireland, with Andrew and his family. However, Puritan residents forced the new arrivals away from Boston, and the Andrew McFadin family settled to the north, far up the Kennebeck River near Merry Meeting Bay between the Cathence and Abagadusset Rivers.

2. JOHN STEPHEN² MCFADDIN (ANDREW¹) was born 1700 in Donegal, Ireland, and died 1776 in Tyron Co., North Carolina. He married UNKNOWN Jun 09, 1737 in Suffolk Co., Massachusetts.

Notes for JOHN STEPHEN MCFADDIN:

John McFadin has become known to many genealogy researchers as John Stephen McFadin. This resulted from an erroneous transcription of his probated estate records in the North Carolina State Archives which incorporated his apparently deceased son Stephen's

name with John's. Both because of this name by which he has become known, and for the purpose of differentiating this John McFadin from the many other "Johns" in genealogical records, he will be identified in this record as John [Stephen] McFadin. Likewise, in order to differentiate several McFadins of the same name when referring to them within this record, brackets [] will be used in the name structure of one of the individuals.

The first documented evidence of John [Stephen] McFadin is in Frederick Co., Maryland, in 1748. Land transactions between 1754 and 1757 as well as other evidence of he and his sons appear in the Maryland State Archives. His first wife was apparently deceased by 1757, and he married again in Maryland.

Shortly after 1766, John moved his family to Tryon Co., North Carolina (later to become Rutherford Co., NC). On 16 DEC 1769, he purchased 300 acres of land from Thomas Johnston on McFadin Creek off the Second Broad River. (subscript 6) He died there in 1776, and the names of his children were listed in his will, which was probated in 1777.

Most (if not all) of John [Stephen] McFadin's sons served in the Revolutionary War, primarily with the North Carolina Militia. In the early 1780s most of his sons trekked westward through Tennessee toward Kentucky. They settled in Davidson and Montgomery Co., Tennessee, and the counties of Warren, Christian, Simpson, and Todd in Kentucky. In 1806, the families of sons Andrew and William McFadin were among the first permanent settlers in Indiana. They founded McFadin's Bluff, which later became Mt. Vernon, Indiana.

Between 1822 and 1830, branches of this McFadin family were again on the frontiers in the counties of Jefferson, Liberty, Washington, and Shelby, Texas, and Randolph Co., Missouri, as well as other parts of Missouri, Illinois, and Arkansas.

Tradition states that John McFadin was the son of Andrew (b. 1675-83 SCOTLAND) and Marsey Mallory (b. ca. 1672 Derry, IRELAND) who were married in 1693 in Derry, Ireland. Marsey died, and in 1704 Andrew married Jane Lindsey (b. 1684 IRELAND). In September 1718, the ship Maccallum arrived in Boston, Massachusetts Colony, from Londonderry, Ireland, with Andrew and his family. However, Puritan residents forced the new arrivals away from Boston, and the Andrew McFadin family settled to the north, far up the Kennebeck River near Merry Meeting Bay between the Cathence and Abagadusset Rivers.

Over the centuries as many as seven different children have been attributed to Andrew McFadin and his two wives, not all of which are conclusively documented. These include John, Thomas, William, James, Andrew, Daniel, and Summersett.

Andrew McFadin's family moved to Georgetown, Maine (which at that time was still a part of Massachusetts), perhaps as early as 1722, likely after the death of Andrew. The younger children and their families appear to have remained in and near that area for many years. John appears to have lived near the vicinity of Boston, perhaps later sailing to Philadelphia (unproven) and moving inland to near the vicinity of Chambersburg before moving into Maryland. The whereabouts of Thomas and William (if, in fact, members of this family) are still unknown.

3. JOHN STEPHEN³ MCFADDIN (*JOHN STEPHEN², ANDREW¹*) was born 1744 in Frederick Co., Maryland, and died Nov 26, 1839 in Bowling Green, Warren Co., Kentucky. He married RUTH UNKNOWN Bef. 1764 in Frederick Co., Maryland. She was born Abt. 1744.

Notes for JOHN STEPHEN MCFADDIN:

John McFadin was the third son of John [Stephen] McFadin. His birthplace is unknown but is likely to be either Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, or Maryland. He is not referred to as "John, Jr." in his father's will, nor was he generally known as a "Junior." However, in order to differentiate him from numerous other John McFadins, he has come to be known as John [Stephen] McFadin, [Jr.].

Prior to 1763 John served with his brother William in the Maryland Militia in Captain Joseph Chapline's Company. In the same regiment were a number of men who were among those prominent in the settlement of Western North Carolina, Tennessee, and Kentucky including several who followed Daniel Boone.

By 1771 John and his family were in old Tryon Co., North Carolina, where other members of his family also resided. The North Carolina State Archives cite a series of land purchases by him over the period 1772-1775 amounting to more than 600 acres. Between 1777 and 1779 John sold off this land and appears to have departed the state, reportedly for Davidson Co., Tennessee. John was reputedly at PaintedStone, Virginia (later Shelbyville, Kentucky), in June 1780 with Squire Boone's Company of the Kentucky Militia.

From at least 1782, and for a period of several years, he is recorded as having resided in Davidson Co., Tennessee, as supported by various records of the county court. Brother James was apparently also nearby. In October 1784, John sold his land in Davidson Co. to his son David. He is then said to have been with his brothers William and Andrew on Silver Creek, a branch of the Red River, just over the disputed border in Kentucky during the period 1784-85.

In September 1799, John McFadin purchased land in Christian Co., Kentucky, and appears to have resided there until at least 1820 when he apparently moved to nearby Warren Co. His three youngest daughters are believed to most likely be from a second marriage.

John died in 1839 at the age of about 95 in Warren County, Kentucky, where his will was entered for probate in November with George Sumpter named as administrator of the estate. In his will John McFadin named his sons and daughters who had not predeceased him and the four orphaned minor children of his daughter Cynthia.

4. DAVID⁴ MCFADDIN (*JOHN STEPHEN³, JOHN STEPHEN², ANDREW¹*) was born Aug 14, 1764 in Frederick Co., Maryland, and died Jun 12, 1835 in Clarksville, Montgomery Co., Tennessee. He married MARY ELLIOT 1786 in Clarksville, Montgomery Co., Tennessee. She was born Aug 15, 1770, and died Oct 19, 1849 in Clarksville, Montgomery Co., Tennessee.

Notes for DAVID MCFADDIN:

The eldest of the children of John McFadin, David was born in Maryland before the family departed for old Tryon Co. (later Rutherford Co.), North Carolina. By 1782 his father, John, moved the family to the area of Silver Creek, a branch of the Red River, northwest of Nashville in what would become the state of Tennessee. Four McFadin brothers, William, James, John, and Andrew resided there until late 1784 when John sold his land to this son David and within a short time moved to Christian Co., Kentucky, not far away. William and Andrew soon departed for Warren Co., Kentucky.

David McFadin appears on the 1787 tax list of Davidson Co., Tennessee, and in 1798 was listed as having taxable property in newly formed Montgomery Co. (It was recorded as "450 acres where (sp) he now lives" in (tax) Captain Willson Gibson's Company by Robert Helson, Esq.)

On 3 DEC 1805 he was appointed by the County Court of Pleas of Montgomery Co., Tennessee, a "valuer (appraiser) of property taken for debt" in Stephenson's Company.

David and his son William both signed a petition in 1812 from the citizens of several counties to the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee "for the privilege of building flour mills on the Red River between the junction of Sulphur Fork and the Kentucky line . . ."

David was also a clerk of the Miller Creek Baptist Church in Montgomery Co.

5. JAMES ALFRED⁵ MCFADDIN (*DAVID⁴, JOHN STEPHEN³, JOHN STEPHEN², ANDREW¹*) was born May 05, 1789 in Clarksville, Montgomery Co., Tennessee, and died Mar 27, 1845 in Natchitoches, Louisiana. He married ELIZABETH MACKEY 1818 in Lake Charles, Louisiana. She was born 1788 in North Carolina, and died 1846 in Beaumont, Jefferson Co., Texas.

Notes for JAMES ALFRED MCFADDIN:

James McFaddin reputedly left home in 1813 to join a Tennessee Volunteer group to serve in the war of 1812 and is said to have been at the Battle of New Orleans in January 1815. He married in Louisiana in 1818, and three of his children were born there prior to moving to Texas. He moved his family only after taking a trip out beyond San Antonio in 1821.

The James McFaddin family first arrived in Texas in 1823 and settled at Moss Bluff near the mouth of the Trinity River in the Atascosita District on land that was rich but not legally open by the Mexican government for colonization. It would be about eight years before his land settlement claim was granted. His grant of a league of land (4,428 acres) cost him \$45 and 5 Mexican Reals.

James later removed his family to Louisiana during the period 1832-33 because of his opposition to the "Anahuac troubles," an armed insurrection that removed the nearby garrison commander. Upon their return to Texas in 1833 they settled at Trevis Bluff (later Beaumont, Jefferson Co.) on the west bank of the Neches River as only the fourth family in the area. James' brother William also moved to Texas ca. 1829-32 and settled a few miles to the west in Liberty County. Over time, these branches of the family have adopted the "McFaddin" spelling of the surname.

In 1836 James served in the Texas Revolution for which he was granted 320 acres of land in Williamson Co. He failed to patent this land due to a conflict, and it was later sold by his son William in 1849 for \$55. That, however, did not impede this family's ultimate land acquisition program during following generations.

The 1840 Republic of Texas Census shows James McFaddin with land, 185 cattle, and 4 horses. On this same census, the holdings of his wife, Elizabeth, are nearly similar but separate as they had legally separated. No divorce is recorded, however, prior to James' death but it is believed that they had divorced as Elizabeth McFaddin independently entered into several contractual agreements in following years. James died in 1845 in Natchitoches, Louisiana, after falling ill enroute home from settling his father's estate in Montgomery Co., Tennessee.

Notes for WILLIAM MCFADDIN:

The first record of William is his 1812 signing of a petition together with his father and the citizens of several counties to the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee "for the privilege of building flour mills on the Red River between the junction of Sulphur Fork and the Kentucky line . . ."

In early 1813, the Governor of Tennessee dispatched Andrew Jackson, major general of the Tennessee militia, and 1,500 volunteers to the defense of New Orleans. William was one of 670 Tennessee volunteers who joined Colonel John Coffee's cavalry regiment at Franklin, Tennessee, for what became known as the Natchez Expedition in the War of 1812. He served under Capt. Smith in Troop 7. The regiment met up with Jackson's other forces near Natchez on 16 February 1813. After one month they returned to Tennessee having seen no action. Later, William may have participated in the Creek War.

William is said to have spent some time in Louisiana, and removed his family to Texas ca. 1829-32 settling in Liberty Co. near the Trinity River. His brother, James, settled on the Neches River several miles to the east.

He married RACHEL WILLIAMS Apr 04, 1838 in Jefferson Co., Texas. She was born Mar 18, 1821 in St. Helena, Louisiana, and died Mar 12, 1899 in Beaumont, Jefferson Co., Texas¹.

Notes for WILLIAM M. MCFADDIN:

One of Beaumont's earliest pioneers, McFaddin fought throughout the Texas Revolution and in the Confederate army. Although only 16 years old, William McFaddin of Beaumont joined Captain Andrew Briscoe's company at Liberty and fought at the Battle of San Antonio between December 6-9, 1835. He was standing only a short distance from Colonel Ben Milam when that immortal Texan was killed in action.

With San Antonio captured and secured, the retreat of Gen. Perfecto de Cos' army apparently instilled a false security among the Texans. Unknown to them, other large Mexican armies led by Generals Santa Ana and Urrea were at that moment approaching the Rio Grande River en route to Texas. Most of the San Antonio veterans had returned home and were tilling their fields when news of a second emergency, William Barret Travis' appeal from the Alamo, was carried by horseback by Joseph Dunman, reaching Liberty on March 2, 1836. William McFaddin was at that moment en route home afoot, having lingered on in San Antonio long after his discharge.

In 1853, William McFaddin, the man Sam Houston left in charge of the baggage, sick and wounded while he went on to San Jacinto, prospered enough in the cattle business to erect a two story home in the Beaumont area. McFaddin was only seventeen years old, when Houston gave him and Robert McNutt the assignment just prior to the Battle of San Jacinto. When McFaddin died in 1897, he owned 4,574 acres, and had an interest in another 1,214 acres. A leading stockman and landholder, McFaddin's descendants dominated the county's cattle industry for decades afterward. William McFaddin gave his son, William Perry Herring McFaddin, control of the McFaddin businesses when the son turned seventeen. The son increased the family holdings extensively. For a time, the McFaddin name was very fashionable. Restaurants in New York advertised their beef, as "McFaddin beef." Clothes designers in London advertised their clothes were made from "McFaddin pelts."

Sea Rim Park, and the J. D. Murphree and McFaddin Marsh Wildlife Preserves were created from McFaddin holdings. Today the largest beach in Jefferson County is McFaddin Beach.

Another prominent early settler, William McFaddin, came to Liberty County with his parents, James and Elizabeth McFaddin of Louisiana, in 1823. In 1833, he moved to Beaumont, where he married Rachel Williams in 1837. Besides service to the Texas Republic, the 43-year-old cattleman entered the Confederate army and served as a beef buyer for the Confederacy's Trans-Mississippi Department during the Civil War.

Perhaps no other Jefferson County resident foresaw the potential value of land better than William McFaddin. During the 1870's, he helped organize the Beaumont Pasture Company, with the intent to obtain the rangelands of South Jefferson County and stock them with cattle. Eventually, he bought out his partners, and the company became known as the McFaddin ranch, a cattle domain that once exceeded 100,000 acres in size and included the upper twenty-five miles of the Texas coast. As of 1880, the ranch owned 900 horses and 3,000 head of cattle, reaching its peak in numbers after 1900. McFaddin, who engaged in many business pursuits, died at Beaumont in October 1897. His son, Perry McFaddin, continued the family's ranching and business enterprises thereafter.

MCFADDIN, WILLIAM M. (1819-1897). William M. McFaddin, rancher and participant in the battle of San Jacinto, son of Elizabeth and James McFaddin, was born in Lake Charles, Louisiana, on June 8, 1819. The family moved to the vicinity of Liberty, Liberty County, Texas, in 1823 and to Beaumont in 1833. At age sixteen William served at the siege of Bexar. He was a member of the group commanded by Thomas J. Rusk that buried the victims of the Goliad Massacre. He subsequently joined the army of Sam Houston at Columbus and was detailed to guard the wounded and baggage at San Jacinto. He was discharged on his seventeenth birthday, June 8, 1836. As a veteran and colonist, McFaddin received a headright in Williamson County and grants totaling 1,137 acres in Jefferson County. He inherited a fourth of his father's headright and began a lifelong practice of buying and selling land. He and his son William Perry Herring McFaddin founded the McFaddin Ranch of Beaumont and formed several companies in partnership with Obadiah Kyle and Valentine Wiess for acquiring land, raising cattle and rice, irrigating, and milling rice. During the Civil War McFaddin was detailed to supply beef cattle for the Confederate Army and obtained a license to ferry and swim cattle across the Neches River. He was appointed captain of Patrol District No. 1 by the county court. In 1837 he married Rachel Williams, daughter of colonists Nancy and Hezekiah Williams and sister of San Jacinto veteran Hezekiah R. Williams. They had nine children and also reared the children of several relatives. McFaddin, who had not received a formal education, maintained tutors for his children and those of his neighbors. The McFaddin home, known for hospitality, often sheltered travelers overnight and was used for funerals of neighbors. It burned in 1905. Oaks that sprang from acorns McFaddin brought from the San Jacinto battleground still stand on the grounds of the McFaddin-Ward House, the home built by his daughter in 1906. McFaddin

died in 1897, leaving 4,575 acres in his estate and interests in jointly held land.

Notes for JOHN ANDREW MCFADDIN:

About the battle:

When the secession movement reached the county's voting polls in February, 1861, George W. O'Brien was one of sixteen voters in Jefferson County who opposed the ordinance. Nevertheless, he bowed to the will of the majority, and the following May, just as he was admitted to practice law, he enlisted in Company F, 5th Texas Infantry of General Hood's Brigade, which was commanded by a cousin, Capt. King Bryan of Lynchburg, Texas.

George Washington O'Brien of Beaumont mustered Company E, comprised principally of early Beaumonters, in March, 1862, and was soon elected its captain. The new unit was soon assigned to Likens' 6th Battalion at Sabine Pass, which the following June, became Col. A. W. Spaight's 11th Texas Battalion of Volunteers, a mixed unit of six cavalry, artillery, and infantry companies.

Company E's most memorable experience came between June and November, 1863, during a Louisiana campaign under General Richard Taylor. There they fought a number of offensive and defensive battles and skirmishes against an invading army advancing along the Bayou Teche, the most important engagement being the Battle of Fordoche Bayou, fought on September 29, 1863, resulting in 500 casualties among the Union regiments. Three Beaumonters of Company E, Samuel McKee, John Andrew McFaddin, and John A. Willis, were killed in that battle, and a number of others wounded. O'Brien kept a pocket diary and a daily record, lasting eight months, of that Louisiana campaign. 8. DAVID HUTCHINSON⁶ MCFADDIN (*WILLIAM⁵, DAVID⁴, JOHN STEPHEN³, JOHN STEPHEN², ANDREW¹*) was born May 22, 1816 in Montgomery Co., Tennessee, and died Aug 07, 1896 in Circleville, Williamson Co., Texas. He married JERUSHA D. DYCHES Mar 19, 1838 in Beaumont, Jefferson Co., Texas. She was born 1812 in Louisiana, and died Jul 07, 1880 in Circleville, Williamson Co., Texas.

Notes for DAVID HUTCHINSON MCFADDIN:

David H. McFaddin, a cousin of the well-known William McFaddin of Beaumont, was born in Montgomery County, Tennessee in 1816, and came to Liberty County with his parents, William and Sarah Jett McFaddin, in 1828. (His uncle James' family had arrived in Liberty Co. in 1823, and later settled in adjoining Jefferson Co. in 1829.) Both families were involved in cattle ranching.

On March 6, 1836, he joined Captain Logan's company and subsequently fought at the Battle of San Jacinto. Later, his company followed the retreating Mexican armies to the Rio Grande River, and after returning to Goliad, McFaddin helped bury the remains of Colonel James Fannin's ill-fated volunteers. In February 1842, he resigned as a constable in Jefferson Co. to run for sheriff to fill a vacancy. He won unopposed with 45 votes and served from 7 FEB 1842 until 13 JUL 1846, including being re-elected in JUN 1845.

After settling at Beaumont, David McFaddin married Jerusha Dyches of Pine Island settlement in 1838, and in 1843 was elected sheriff of Jefferson County. In 1848 he moved to the San Gabriel River, east of Georgetown, and soon after carried the petition to Austin, which resulted in the organization of Williamson County. He became a prosperous cattlemen, miller and slaveholder and died there in October 1896. A son, also named William, was killed in action while serving in the Confederate Army.

In 1846, having purchased a 640 acre land grant on the south bank of the San Gabriel River from his cousin William, McFadin moved his young family to the fertile area that would soon become Williamson Co. The small community of Circleville developed one mile west of the McFadin ranch. In 1848, Williamson County was organized from Milam Co. and David Hutcheson McFadin was elected one of its first four county commissioners.

In 1857, together with Christopher Columbus Gillett, he erected the Star (flour) Mill on the north bank of the river ¼ mile west of the community at a site known as Campground Springs.

Cotton farming was introduced to the area in the 1840s. Soon afterward, David Hutcheson McFadden built the McFadin Cotton Gin. By 1877, Williamson Co. was the largest cotton processor in Texas with over 89,000 bales.

MCFADIN, DAVID HUTCHINSON (1816-1896). David Hutchinson McFadin, soldier, public servant, and pioneer, was born in Montgomery, Tennessee, on May 22, 1816, and moved in 1828 to what later became Liberty County, Texas. He left home at age fifteen and was employed in the stock business until the Texas Revolution. McFadin served in the Texas army from March 2 to September 2, 1836, and participated in the battle of San Jacinto. After the war he went back into the stock business, served as sheriff of Jefferson County, and married Jerusha Dyches on March 19, 1838. In 1846 the McFadin and Dyches families moved to the vicinity of Circleville, on the San Gabriel River in Williamson County, and were among the earliest settlers in the county. McFadin was elected to the first group of county commissioners in 1848 and served in that capacity for the next twelve years. By 1850 he was one of the wealthiest farmers in the county, and in 1859 he built a mill near Circleville. He opposed secession and took no part in the Civil War. After the war he was a member of the Grange and the Farmers' Alliance. McFadin also belonged to the Christian Church. His first wife died in 1880, leaving him with at least three children, and his second wife, the widow of attorney James Armstrong, died in 1892. McFadin died on August 7, 1896, and was buried in the McFadin family cemetery one mile east of Centerville.

David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/2.1), the only child of William McFadin (M7/1.2) and Sarah Jett McFadin (J7/1.4), was born in Montgomery County, Tennessee May 22, 1816, according to "History of Texas," 1893. William McFadin (M7/1.2) was the son of David McFadin (M8/1.1), native of Ireland who emigrated to Tennessee. William McFadin (M7/1.2) had arrived in the colony of Lorenzo de Zavala in 1830 and settled in what is now present-day Liberty County. A William McFadin "who arrived in Shelby County, Texas in 1832" was entitled to 1/3 league of land, according to records of that county. He was influenced to Texas by his in-laws James Jett (J7/1.1), Absalom Jett (J7/1.2) and John Jett (J7/1.3) who had arrived in 1824. James McFadin (M7/1.1) and William Mc-Fadin, Jr. had established

themselves there in 1825 and had received Mexican land grants. James McFadin (M7/1.1), oldest son of David McFadin (M8/1.1) and Mary Elliot McFadin (E8/1.1), was born in Clarksville, Tennessee. He was graduated from the University of South Carolina and participated in the Battle of New Orleans January 8, 1815. He was married in 1818 to Elizabeth McCoy (M7/1.1), according to "More Early Southeast Texas Families." Another source shows her name as Elizabeth Lackey (L7/-1.1). Their third child Eliza McFadin (M6/1.3) was born in 1823. James McFadin (M7/-1.1) received a military land grant of 320 acres in Williamson County. A William McFaddin gave a deed July 15, 1874 to Jacob Beaumont to an "undivided half interest in 640 acres in the Breeze Survey located on the east bank of the Neches River, 25 feet below the Collier Ferry landing," according to Orange County Deed Book F, page 113.

Members of the McFaddin family remained in Beaumont and became very prominent landowners in the area during the 160 years they have lived there. The ancestral home of the family situated on a block at 1900 McFaddin Street in Beaumont, now called McFaddin-Ward House, is open to visitors. The property is owned by Caldwell McFaddin, attorney, son of William Perry Herring McFaddin.

David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/2.1) had enlisted in Second Company, Third Regiment of the Texas Army March 2, 1836 and was discharged September 2 of that year. He was a rancher in Jefferson County following the revolution. He appeared in the 1840 tax list of the county as the owner of a slave and seven head of cattle.

He received a deed January 21, 1841 from James Drake to "land in the Josiah Dyches Survey on the West bank of the Neches River, adjoining William M. McFadin and James McFadin," for \$500, according to Jefferson County Deed Book E, pages 68 and 129.

He was elected sheriff of the county in 1842. On March 2, 1842 he gave a sheriff's deed involving slaves and land in the Richard Balew league and in the Stephenson Jett league to Milberry Balew, according to Jefferson County Deed Book A, page 395. Alexander Calder, county clerk, certified the transaction. David Hutcheson McFadin, "Sheriff of Jefferson County, Texas" gave a sheriff's deed to Simon Wiess June 7, 1842, according to deed records of Haskell County, Texas.

Bounty Land Certificate No. 9512 issued to William McFadin and bargained to David Hutcheson McFadin was later located in Haskell County. The certificate called for 320 acres, according to Haskell County Deed Book 17, page 298.

It is recorded in the Williamson County Courthouse that he first came to Williamson County in 1842 [perhaps on a scouting trip.]

On May 27, 1845 David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/1.2) participated in a partition agreement with "William McFadin, Sarah Herring, wife of W. P. Herring and Elisa Chesson, wife of McGuire Chesson, heirs of James McFadin, dcd, to avoid litigation and make a speedy settlement," according to Jefferson County deed records. The agreement provided that "McGuire Chesson to have land they live on, 52 acres at \$1 per acre; David McFadin to take remainder of said labor at \$1 per acre and one pair of oxen at \$49; W. P. Herring and wife to take female slave Caroline and her child Hannah, seven months old at \$500 and claim of \$186 against estate of deceased father in Tennessee at appraisement of \$50, also 1 pair of oxen at \$20; William McFadin to take Military Claim of 320 acres granted to deceased at a price of \$20; cattle appraised at \$5 per head to be divided; land on Trinity River to be divided into four parts; household stuff, guns and horses to be divided; and David McFadin to get hogs." The agreement was later recorded in Williamson County Deed Book 1, page 311.

"William McFadin et al" gave a deed to the "Military Claim" for 320 acres in Williamson County to Joseph Josiah Dyches (D6/1.3) March 25, 1850, according to Williamson County Deed Book 1, page 314.

In 1846 he "traded with a cousin" [William M. McFadin] and acquired a league of land in Milam County [later Williamson], according to "History of Texas." He moved there with members of the Dyches family in December 1846 when only four other settlers lived in the county. On the San Gabriel River at McFadin's Bend a log cabin was constructed to accommodate the family. Later a second cabin was built, separated from the first by a breezeway.

In 1847 his property was rendered in the Milam County tax list as "2,214 acres, \$1,107; one negro, \$400; 4 horses \$135 and 100 cattle, \$400." On the total rendition of \$2,042.00 he paid a tax of \$5.08. His settlement was at Circleville, Texas, a town which was "laid out in a circle, according to "History of Central Texas."

David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/1.2) was elected to the first county commission when Williamson County was organized in 1848 with land from Milam County. He gave a bill of sale to his brother-in-law Joseph Josiah Dyches (D6/1.3) February 19, 1849, according to Williamson County Deed Book 1, page 55. He appeared as the head of a household in the 1850 census of Williamson County, Household 89-98:

Jerusha D. Dyches McFadin (D6/1.7) received a bill of sale from Columbus Gillet reciting that he had sold to her husband "a male slave about 30 years old, black and about 6' 2" tall for \$900 and 50 cows and calves," July 16, 1852, according to Williamson County Deed Book 4, page 26.

David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/1.1) gave a gift deed to "James and Caroline B. Armstrong" May 17, 1854 to 320 acres on the San Gabriel River, "part of the headright granted to William McFadin," according to Williamson County Deed Book 15, page 308. He conveyed an additional 640 acres on the San Gabriel, "land surveyed for D. H. McFadin and warrant issued to him by War Department, Republic of Texas," to James Armstrong August 21, 1854 "for the kind regard I have for him," according to Williamson County Deed Book 5, page 429.

Jerusha D. Dyches McFadin received a deed from her mother October 29, 1854 which conveyed her league and labor to her children. The land was later located in Haskell County, Texas, and the deed was recorded there March 13, 1919 in Haskell County Deed Book 77, page 388, as well as in Williamson County deed records.

A partnership was established between Columbus Gillet and David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/1.2) July 3, 1857, according to Williamson County Deed Book 7, page 170. They agreed to build a mill to be known as "Gillet's & McFadin's Mills" on 25 acres of land on the San Gabriel. They were equal partners in the business valued at \$1,000, and the contract included a buy-or-sell agreement.

For \$200, David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/1.1) received a deed December 14, 1858 from Lucinda Dyches "in obtaining my land certificate for my own headright in selecting, locating and surveying said headright [in Haskell County, Texas] 1/3 of my headright, 1/3 league and a labor, the other 2/3 having been by me previously given to my children and descendants," according to Williamson County Deed Book 7, page 467. Witnesses were Isaac B. Low and Joel Low.

In 1859 he contracted with William Durgan to construct a stone residence for them. Another

source identifies the contractor as "Hughes from Austin." Stone was quarried from the creekbed behind the building site, and lumber was freighted in from Galveston, Texas. The house, with 27-inch interior and exterior stone walls was still under construction when the Civil War began. William Durgan, who was being assisted in the quarrying and construction by the McFadin sons, elected to join the Confederate army before the house was finished. William D. McFadin (M5/1.2) accompanied Durgan when he left. Neither returned, and no military record has been found for either. Consequently the house was never finished and never paid for, according to Judge Kirby Vance of Taylor who purchased the property from the McFadin heirs in 1950.

Judge and Mrs. Vance spent several years in restoring the McFadin home and obtained Texas State Historical Commission registration for it. The Vances maintained the home as a weekend retreat and to entertain guests. They have been very considerate of the descendants of the McFadin family, allowing them access to the home, the ranch and the cemetery upon every request. When an interview was requested in October 1987 by Arlee Claud Gowen (G1/6.2) the Vances graciously offered a tour of the property and the cemetery, and Margaret Vance presented her guest with a square nail from the original construction site and a bouquet of native Kansas City Gay Feathers from the cemetery.

Jerusha D. Dyches McFadin (D6/1.8) lit a lamp in an up-stairs window every night until she died 18 years later "to guide her son home from the Civil War," according to Vonveree McFadin (M4/1.10), a granddaughter.

David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/1.1) served one day of jury duty March 31, 1860 at \$1.50, according to Williamson County court records.

David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/1.2) received a deed July 26, 1866 from Margaret Stanley, according to Williamson County Deed Book 10, page 400. He was a county commissioner November 1, 1869 when he signed a deed following a sheriff's sale, according to Williamson County Deed Book 11, page 450.

He sold the land he received from Columbus Gillet to J. S. McGuire for \$1,500 February 1, 1871, according to Williamson County Deed Book 12, page 550.

He received a deed October 10, 1872 from William M. McFadin "of Jefferson County, Texas for all my interest in my Headright League Certificate located in Williamson County issued to me August 30, 1838" for \$1,660.50 in notes, according to Williamson County Deed Book 14, page 137. Part of this land he sold July 13, 1874 to L. L. Hatcher for \$47.50, according to Williamson County Deed Book 15, page 351. He sold an additional 246.9 acres, "part of the East half of the William McFaddin League," to J. W. Nalley for \$246.90 October 19, 1875, according to Williamson County Deed Book 16, page 562.

He received a deed February 19, 1873 from Isaac B. Low, Jr. to 10 acres located "at the southwest corner of the William McFaddin League," for \$50, according to Williamson County Deed Book 14, page 197.

Jerusha D. Dyches McFadin (D6/1.8) died July 7, 1880 and was buried in McFadin Cemetery on Comanche Bluff, according to "History of Texas." "She was an active member of the Christian Church and prominent in all good works, and her death was a signal for universal sorrow."

David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/2.1) deeded "all of the William McFadin League I now own on the San Gabriel 15 miles below Georgetown" to his sons Irvin Arnet McFadin (M5/1.3) and John Newin McFadin (M5/1.1) October 8, 1880 "because they remained near me," according

to Williamson County Deed Book 29, page 114. However the grantor retained the use and control of the land during his lifetime.

"In 1881 Mr. McFadin was married to Mrs. Armstrong, widow of the late Col. James Armstrong, an attorney of more than ordinary prominence," according to "History of Texas." "She was born in Kentucky, but was reared in Missouri. Her life was spared for eleven years after marriage, her death occurring June 9, 1892, many friends remaining to mourn her loss."

David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/2.1) received a deed from John Newin McFadin (M5/1.1) April 20, 1883 to Lot 2, Block 28 in Taylor, according to Williamson County Deed Book 28, page 532.

On August 1, 1883 he conveyed to John Newin McFadin (M5/1.1) for \$1,000 "my interest in undivided 2/3 interest in 903 acres in Eastland County, Texas on Savanna Creek patented to me by the State of Texas May 4, 1871; also all of 640 acres in Haskell County, Texas patented to me by State of Texas, Abstract No. 331; and also 103 acres in Williamson County bought in sheriff's sale June 7, 1883, according to Williamson County Deed Book 50, page 318.

On November 17, 1885, David Hutcheson McFadin, joined by his two sons, John Newin McFadin and Irvin Arnett McFadin, conveyed for \$1,000 to John D. Hughes of Haskell County their undivided interest in one third of the league and labor of Lucinda Dyches, according to Haskell County Deed Book M8, page 376. Involved was 1,151.25 acres known as the Lucinda Dyches Survey. The deed mentioned a suit pending between "the heirs of Lucinda Dyches, plaintiffs and Thomas P. Hughes et al, defendants" over the property.

"Cordelia K. McFaddin, formerly Armstrong, and husband D. H. McFaddin of Williamson County," deeded 503 acres in the M. J. Drake Survey to William D. Guy May 19, 1887 for \$125, according to Orange County Deed Book J, page 310. On June 4, 1887 "Cordelia K. McFaddin, surviving wife of James Armstrong et vir D. H. McFaddin of Williamson County" deeded 320 acres in the Peterson Loyd Survey "on the east bank of the Neches River in the northwest corner of Orange County in the partition of the estate of James Armstrong" to John W. Keith for \$80, according to Orange County Deed Book J, page 326.

David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/2.1) gave a deed to Womack & Sturgis April 9, 1892 to 45 acres for \$10, according to Williamson County Deed Book 61, page 72.

"He has been highly successful in his undertakings and has accumulated a large and valuable amount of property and means which he uses to the best advantage in surrounding himself and family with all the comforts and many luxuries of life, as well as contributing liberally to all worthy enterprises tending to advance the welfare of the community in which he lives," read a passage in "History of Texas" which was published in 1893. "He served with his usual ability as Commissioner of his county for twelve years. He is a member of the Grange and Farmers Alliance, to both of which he has devoted his best endeavors. He enjoys the distinction of being the oldest living settler of Williamson County where he is well and favorably known. No one is more deserving of universal veneration than this veteran and hero of San Jacinto."

He died on October 7, 1896 and was buried in McFadin Cemetery.

Notes for JERUSHA D. DYCHES:

Jerusha D. Dyches, daughter of Josiah Dyches and Lucinda Dyches, was born in 1812 in St. Tammany Parish. She was brought to Jefferson County in 1834 by her mother. According to family tradition she was married in November 1836 to David Hutcheson McFadin who had served as a private at the Battle of San Jacinto in the Second Regiment, Third Company with her brother Joseph Josiah Dyches.

For some reason David Hutcheson McFadin (M6/2.1) and Jerusha D. Dyches McFadin (D6/-1.7) elected to remarry two years later. It was probably because her brother Joseph Josiah Dyches (D6/1.3) and his wife Elizabeth Lewis Dyches (L6/1.1) were planning to repeat their marriage vows. It is possible that their earlier marriage ceremony had been performed by a Catholic priest as required by Mexican law. In any event both couples were married, perhaps in a double ceremony, March 19, 1838.

Col. Henry B. Millard, their former commanding officer at San Jacinto, performed the ceremonies, according to Jefferson County Marriage Book A, page 13:

"Marriage License
 Republic of Texas
 County of Jefferson

To any legally qualified officer whereas David McFadin has this day applied to me, a qualified deputy clerk of the county court of Jefferson County for license to marry Jarusha Dykes of said county, you are therefore authorized to celebrate the rites of matrimony between said David McFadin and Jarusha Dykes. According to law, you will return this to my office within 60 days after said celebration.

Hereunto I have set my hand the 19th day of March, 1838.

MCFADDIN, JAMES ALFRED (1840-1916). James Alfred McFaddin, rancher, was born on May 5, 1840, near the site of Beaumont, Texas, the eldest son of Rachel (Williams) and William M. McFaddin. His grandparents, James and Elizabeth McFaddin, moved to Texas in 1821 from Tennessee. William McFaddin established a ranch in Liberty County, where he received a land grant from the Mexican government in 1831, and the following year the family moved to Jefferson County, where William established a ranch about a mile from the site of present Beaumont. In 1858 James McFaddin established his first ranch on Melon Creek in Refugio County, using 130 cattle from his father's ranch in Jefferson County. He married Margaret V. Coward in 1861, and their first child, Allen M. McFaddin, was born while McFaddin was in the Confederate service. In 1863 McFaddin joined the Refugio Guards as a second corporal under Capt. Dan Doughty, and he appears to have attained the rank of first lieutenant by the end of the war. After the war he returned to Refugio County and continued his interest in developing cattle ranching and farming in the area. For years he served his neighbors as a "one-man bank," keeping their money in his safe until a bank was established. He commanded a company of militiamen for Refugio County and in 1875 was involved in overseeing road construction in the county.

McFaddin bought up land in Victoria County in the fork between the Guadalupe and San Antonio rivers in 1878 and moved his family there around 1881. During these years he began to incorporate Brahman blood into his herds; he was one of the earliest cattlemen to do so. By 1879 he had begun cross-breeding experiments which later resulted in a recognized new breed under his grandson, Claude K. McCan. He continued to use the M6 brand, designed by his father in 1837, and added the N6 and Z brands. McFaddin was also one of the first to fence pastures with barbed wire, and he drained and reclaimed about 5,000 acres of swampland by building a twelve-mile levee along the Guadalupe River. In February 1884 he helped organize the Building and Loan Association, and in 1897 he invested in the Guadalupe Valley Railroad, which was abandoned in 1899. When the St. Louis, Brownsville and Mexico Railway was established in 1903, one of the stations was placed on the ranch

and named after McFaddin. To combat rustling, he became one of the founders of the Cattle Raisers Association of Texas. With J. J. Welderqv and Harry Rathbone, he helped organize the Guadalupe Navigation Company, which extracted and transported sand and gravel to clear the rivers for riverboat traffic. In 1883 McFaddin, Thomas M. O'Connor, and others organized the Texas Continental Meat Company, the first meat-packing plant in Texas, which employed at its peak eighty-seven butchers. By 1885 McFaddin was one of the wealthiest ranchers in the county, with land worth \$95,800 in three ranches. He died on June 25, 1916, at his home in Victoria and was buried in Victoria.

History of McFaddin, Texas

Captain James A. McFaddin was a Civil War veteran who had a ranch here in 1876. It was simply known as McFaddin's Ranch until the railroad came through in 1906 and started referring to the stop as Marianna.

In 1923, Al, the son of James McFaddin had the town's name changed back to McFaddin. The McFaddin family operated the general store. The store is still in operation in 2001.

McFaddin has three Texas Historic Commission plaques - for the original post office - the store - and the church.

For 30 years the population stayed at about 75 people, with the school somehow surviving consolidation. Today, however it stands empty.

Other Historical sites

The O'Brien Ranch House, located on Melon Creek about two miles north of Refugio, is thought to be not only the oldest, but the only pre-Civil War house still standing in Refugio County.

The house was built circa 1858 by James A. McFaddin, who established a ranch in Refugio County at this location. In 1861, McFaddin married Margaret Virginia Ward and they began their married life in this house on the Melon Creek.

The older, central portion of the house consists of two rooms with 12 foot high ceilings and fireplaces back-to-back. Since one fireplace juts out into one of the rooms, it is thought that is the second room to have been built. Wings on each side with ceilings only six feet 10 inches high and a kitchen "L" in the rear were added no later than the 1870's. The house was not used during the Civil War because when McFaddin left in 1863 to join Capt. Dan Doughty's Company as a first lieutenant in the Confederate Army, he sent his wife to stay in Galveston.

McFaddin sold his holdings in Refugio County in 1876 and the property which was to become the O'Brien Ranch was sold to Alfred Huddleston.

MCFADDIN, ALLEN MINOR (1863-1930). Allen Minor McFaddin, rancher, was born on August 7, 1863, in Galveston County, Texas, son of Margaret (Coward) and James A. McFaddin. He married Ada Pettus of Goliad in 1888, joined his father in ranching in Victoria County, and was one of the first ranchers to urge the use of Brahman cattle in breeding programs. With others such as Abel P. Borden and James Sartwelle he crossbred Brahmans and was a consultant to the King Ranchqv in its breeding program. He was a founder of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Associationqv and was its first president in 1912-13. He served a term in the Texas legislature and was on the Livestock Sanitary Commission (now the Texas Animal Health Commission). He was a director of the Victoria National Bank and worked in the 1920s with W. C. Tyrrell in the Heywood Oil Company at Spindletop oilfield in Jefferson County. McFaddin died on May 31, 1930, in Victoria and was buried there. On his death all public offices and business houses in Victoria closed, and the district court in session in Cuero adjourned so that its members could attend the funeral.

Funeral services for Mrs. Royston Nave, member of a pioneer Texas family and one of Victoria's long time residents were held at 3 o'clock this afternoon from the Nave home at the corner of North Glass and West Commercial and later from the First Presbyterian Church. Mrs. Nave died at her home Sunday after an illness of about four months.

The Rev. P. B. Hill, pastor of the church of which she had been a lifelong member conducted services both at the home and at the church. Interment in Evergreen Cemetery, beside the body of her late hus and, Royston Nave, who died in 1931, followed the services directed by J.E. Ryan and Son.

Mrs. Nave was born Emily D. McFaddin, the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.A. McFaddin. Mrs. McFaddin was the former Margaret Coward, and both she and her husband moved to Refugio County in 1858 from their homes in Jefferson County, Texas. Mrs. Nave was born in Refugio County. Mr. McFaddin was the son of William McFaddin, who had moved to Texas in 1820. When the McFaddin family moved to Refugio County, he engaged in the ranching and mercantile business, and then moved to Victoria County in the 1870's. He founded the famous McFaddin Ranch and also the town of McFaddin about 20 miles south of Victoria. Mrs. Nave's brother, the late Al McFaddin, was a former president of the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

ROYSTON NAVE, about 47, well known Victoria artist, died suddenly about 12:30 o'clock this afternoon at Harlingen, where he went yesterday morning to visit to his brother, Ty Nave. Mr. Nave was in his hotel room conversing with two friends when he complained of feeling badly and a doctor was summoned. He said he felt better after taking some medicine but as the physician was leaving the hotel he suffered a heart attack and before the doctor could return to his room he had expired. Mr. Nave was widely noted as a portrait painter and landscape artist and made his home in Fort Worth before locating in Victoria. He saw service in the World War as an Artillery officer. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss EMMA McFADDIN, sister of the late A.M. McFADDIN.

A century ago, Royston Nave began his life-long passion to paint what he loved, perfecting his talent throughout his life. He sought the fellowship and support of his peers and collaborated with mentors as he found his own style, preserving his vision of beauty and truth on canvas. He was not a craftsman. He was an artist. His images invoke the senses to feel what he felt as he painted the land and people that he knew. His works wake up the imagination to ponder the beauty and mysteries of nature and to search for the uniqueness that is in each of us. He captured the sounds and smells of sea life, the swaying breezes moving through the wildflowers, and the beckoning expression in a young woman's face. He dedicated himself to his art, interpreting his world with a vitality and exuberance in color and form that made him one of Texas' most accomplished artistic talents.

HIS EARLY YEARS

Royston Nave was born in La Grange, Texas, on November 5, 1886, to Jack and Lou Scott Royston Nave. Besides Royston, the Naves had another son, Ty Nave.

Royston spent part of his boyhood in San Antonio and later moved with his family to Fort Worth. In 1913, Royston moved to New York City to study under the tutelage of such accomplished painters as Lawton Parker, I.R. Wiles, Walt Kuhn, Robert Henri, and the sculptor, Pompeo Coppini.

After his studies in New York, Royston traveled and painted all through the western portion of the United States. He painted portraits and landscapes of the sprawling beauty he found there. His landscapes had a romantic and impressionistic style. Nave also painted seascapes, Texas wildflowers, and still lifes, mostly in contemporary styles.

After traveling the West, Royston returned to Texas to paint his native state and settled in Fort Worth. However he did maintain a studio in New York for several years. At one point he came to Victoria to work with fellow artist, J. F. McCan, well known for his paintings and murals at the King Ranch. McCan's paintings hang in several San Antonio buildings.

During this period, Nave exhibited at the National Academy in New York, the Pennsylvania Academy, St. Louis Museum, and the International Show at Pittsburgh. He also exhibited in Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, and Fort Worth with other Texas artists.

One of Nave's best-known paintings hangs in the Legislative Reference Library in the Capitol building in Austin, Texas. This painting is the portrait of Mrs. Rebecca Jane Fisher, who is called the "Mother of Texas." Mrs. Fisher guided the development of the Republic of Texas Museum on the Capitol grounds in Austin. As a very small child, the Comanche Indians captured Mrs. Fisher and her brother, when they killed her parents near Refugio in 1842. Texas Rangers rescued the two children.

It was in 1917 that Royston Nave married Emma McFaddin McCan. The wedding took place on November 28th in San Antonio at the Presbyterian Church.

Nave and his wife, Emma, left Victoria and returned to New York to live when he exhibited at the Milch Gallery, where he had a one-man exhibition. His work received critical acclaim in New York art circles. His one-man exhibitions were written about in the Art Review International in 1919, when the magazine described him as "a Texan who paints with a big, free stroke and an exuberance of color – a true spirit of the sweeping Southwest." The Art Review also wrote, "He works with great sensitivity and seizes character firmly and uncompromisingly.... such an artist as we much need in these days of aesthetic shams and affectations." The next year, the Art Review said, "He paints with a free hand and an open mind, attempts no tricks and exploits no 'isms.' An honest determination to render character, dominates his work and he was evidently born with an

acute color sense." The New York Times said, "At the Milch Galleries is the work of Royston Nave, a Texas artist who has studied under the most famous artists of his day."

Royston Nave and his wife returned to Victoria after their stay in New York. Royston painted extensively in and around the Victoria area during the remainder of his life. It was said that one seldom found him without his paints and easel during his wanderings. Although he had returned to Texas to live and paint, he did continue to exhibit in New York with the Eclectics, a group of artists including Sidney Dickenson, Philip Hall, George Luks and Eugene Higgins.

The Naves lived in Emma's home on Glass Street in Victoria. Emma's father, rancher James A. McFaddin, built this neoclassical revival style-home as a wedding gift to Emma upon her marriage to her first husband, James Ferdinand McCan. James and Emma's marriage ended in divorce.

THE NAVE MEMORIAL

The year after his death, Royston Nave's widow, Mrs. Emma McFaddin McCan Nave, commissioned the building of a memorial to honor her late husband and to house his paintings. She hired the prominent San Antonio architect, Atlee B. Ayers, to design the neoclassical Greco-Roman style hall. Ayers was quite an illustrious architect, designing museums, commercial buildings, hotels, and mansions in San Antonio and as well as courthouses for Refugio, Cameron, Jim Wells, and Kleburg Counties. For a time, Atlee B. Ayers was the State Architect for Texas.

The Nave Memorial, 306 West Commercial, opened February 1933. In the 1960s, the Nave building was enlarged by the addition of the rear space now called DeTar Gallery. The front gallery was named the McFaddin Gallery. The Nave measured 1,510 square feet after the addition.

Mrs. Nave allowed the library of the Bronte Club to place its 7,000-volume library in the Nave for many years. When Victoria got a new library in October 1975, the Nave family gave the building to the City of Victoria to be used as a fine arts museum for the region.

The Victoria Regional Museum Association was formed in 1976 to oversee the museum. The city then leased the Nave to the Association. The mission of the Victoria Regional Museum Association is to reach out "to enrich, enlighten, and educate all people through visual art and cultural history." The Nave Museum owns the largest collection of Royston Nave paintings that exist. Royston Nave's works are exhibited at the Nave Museum every few years. The museum features traveling exhibits of both important contemporary work and artwork from the past that continues to be relevant to today's understanding and appreciation of art.

MCFADDIN, WILLIAM PERRY HERRING (1856-1935). William Perry Herring McFaddin, cattleman and capitalist, son of Rachel (Williams) and William McFaddin, was born in Beaumont, Texas, on February 5, 1856. He attended Texas Military Institute at Austin for one year and also took a business course in St. Louis, Missouri. He entered the cattle-raising business with his father and at twenty-two started to acquire land with his first purchase of 4,428 acres. His ranching interests at their largest extent comprised approximately 120,000 acres in Jefferson County and 48,000 acres in Knox and King counties. With his father, Obadiah Kyle, and Valentine Wiess, he formed several companies-land, rice-milling, canal and irrigation, and oil-of which he was the managing partner. Arthur Edward Stilwell bought the townsite for Port Arthur from the McFaddin's Beaumont Pasture Company, and it was on land leased from the McFaddins that Anthony F. Lucas drilled the Lucas Gusher, the discovery well of the Spindletop oilfield. The McFaddins' canal and irrigation company built thirty miles of canals and a 200,000-gallon capacity pumping plant. The system, capable of watering up to 18,000 acres of land, facilitated the first large-scale rice-growing in the area. McFaddin diversified his family's holdings, doubling them in the process. He built downtown office buildings in Beaumont, bought the Crosby Hotel, famous during the Spindletop boom, started a cattle-feeding and meat-packing operation, and started one of the South's largest muskrat farms, producing over 200,000 pelts a year. He participated in early cattle drives to Louisiana and later shipped by rail to Kansas City. The McFaddin family was one of the first to bring Brahman cattle into Texas. McFaddin was vice president of the First National Bank of Beaumont, vice president of the Beatty Oil Company, a director of the J. M. Guffey Petroleum Company, and a director of the Beaumont Board of Trade and Oil Exchange. In 1928 his holdings were placed in the McFaddin Trust, managed by his sons, W. P. H. McFaddin, Jr., and J. L. C. McFaddin. McFaddin married Emma Janes of Beaumont, with whom he had three children; after her death he married Ida Regina Caldwell (see

MCFADDIN, IDA) of Huntington, West Virginia, with whom he had three more children. He died on November 6, 1935.

MCFADDIN RANCHES. The McFaddin Ranches of Beaumont consisted of a Jefferson County ranch of approximately 120,000 acres and a 48,000-acre ranch in Knox and King counties. Beginning with James McFaddin (1789-1845) and his son William M. McFaddin (1819-1897), five generations of the family accumulated the lands that became known as the McFaddin Ranches. The principal builder was William Perry Herring McFaddin (1856-1935), called Perry, under whom the ranches reached their largest extent, about 160,000 acres. In the 1890s large portions of the Jefferson County ranch were sold to the developers of the Gulf, Beaumont, and Kansas City Railway and to the Port Arthur Townsite Company, and Perry McFaddin began additional acquisitions in Jefferson County. In 1916 he bought the ranch in Knox and King counties. At first the herds of the area ranches mingled on the open range, and yearly roundups of several weeks' duration were required for branding calves and making up herds for cattle drives to market in Louisiana. The principal brands used by the ranches were the M6 and the Mashed O. Perry McFaddin, the first man to try to fence the local range, built a fence from the Neches River marsh to Rodair Gully in 1878. The ranches ran as many as 20,000 head until pasture improvement and conservation measures were undertaken and herds were reduced to between 6,000 and 10,000 head. Perry McFaddin experimented with feedlot and meat-packing operations; at one time "McFaddin Steaks" were advertised in New York restaurants. He also commercialized the trapping of muskrats and maintained warehouses and yearly auctions for the fur trappers on the ranch. Several oilfields were on the ranches. In the early 1930s the Jefferson County ranch was crossed by the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway, and a unique practice of coastal ranches began: the yearly swimming of the herds south to winter pasture and north for the summer. With twenty miles of beach front, the ranch contained extensive wetlands, now included in the 14,000-acre Sea Rim State Park, the 42,000-acre McFaddin National Wildlife Refuge, and 8,500 acres of the 12,000-acre J. D. Murphree Wildlife Management Area. Ownership of the ranches was in the McFaddin Trust from 1928 to 1948. After the trust dissolved, the separate holdings were still run as a unit until the sale of all but a few scattered tracts between 1951 and 1979 ended a century and a half of McFaddin family ranching in Southeast Texas.

MCFADDIN, IDA REGINA CALDWELL (1872-1950). Ida Regina McFaddin, Beaumont civic and social leader, was born on September 24, 1872, the daughter of James Lewis and Mary O'Bannon (Smith) Caldwell of Huntington, West Virginia. She attended Mary Baldwin College in Staunton, Virginia, and married William P. H. McFaddin of Beaumont in 1894. They had three children. Mrs. McFaddin was a philanthropist who supported the United Charities, the YWCA, the Beaumont Children's Home, and Lamar College (later Lamar University); she also donated the land to establish the Daughters of the American Revolution State Forest at Jasper. She served as local and state regent of the DAR and vice president general of the national society and was active in the National Society of Colonial Dames and other patriotic organizations. During World War I and World War II, as the head of Red Cross Volunteer Services in Beaumont, she organized citizens to roll surgical dressings and help with hospital work. After her father and brothers died, Ida McFaddin became president of the Caldwell Company of West Virginia and managed the family's interests in banking and mining. She died in Beaumont on March 21, 1950. The McFaddin home at 1906 McFaddin Avenue has been converted into the McFaddin-Ward House Museum.

WARD, MAMIE LOUISE MCFADDIN (1895-1982). Mamie Louise McFaddin Ward, philanthropist, daughter of Ida (Caldwell) and William Perry Herring McFaddin, was born on November 5, 1895, in Beaumont, Texas. She was a descendant of Elizabeth and James A. McFaddin, immigrants to Texas in 1823, and William M. McFaddin, a veteran of the Army of the Republic of Texas. She attended Belle Austin Institute in Beaumont and Gunston Hall in Washington, D.C. On May 21, 1919, she married Carroll E. Ward; he died in 1962. Mamie McFaddin Ward inherited a considerable fortune from her parents in Texas ranching, rice-farming, and oil interests, including interests in the Spindletop oilfield and in coal mines and real estate in West Virginia. As a young woman she began a lifelong involvement in charity and the arts. She served for more than forty years on the board of the Beaumont Children's Home and was a founding donor to the Beaumont Art Museum and the Beaumont Heritage Society. She gave generous donations to health services, including an endowment for thirty yearly health-services scholarships at Lamar University. The Mamie McFaddin Ward Health Sciences Building at Lamar University; the Mamie McFaddin Ward Cancer Center at St. Elizabeth Hospital, Beaumont; and the Mamie McFaddin Ward Biocommunications Research Laboratory at the Texas Heart Institute, Houston, bear witness to her benevolence to those institutions. Ward established the Mamie McFaddin Ward Heritage Foundation to maintain the McFaddin-Ward House (a colonial revival house built in 1906) as a museum and to provide grants for other projects in health, education, historic preservation, and the arts in the Beaumont area. Other of her philanthropic acts included the gift of several buildings to All Saints Episcopal School; of a parking lot and meditation garden to St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Beaumont; and of a diorama to the Alamo long barracks in San Antonio. She also made gifts to the Spindletop Museum in Beaumont, the Huntington Art Museum and Trinity Church in Huntington,

West Virginia, and the Episcopal Diocese of West Virginia. Ward was a member of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, the Texas Gulf Coast Historical Association, the Daughters of the American Revolution, the National Society of Colonial Dames of America, the Kappa Delta Sorority, the Magnolia Garden Club, the Beaumont Art Museum, and the Beaumont Heritage Society. She was the recipient of the Exchange Club of Beaumont Golden Deeds award in 1981. She died in her home in Beaumont on October 24, 1982, and was buried at Magnolia Cemetery, Beaumont.

When Bill was nine months old, the large McFaddin Ranch in Jefferson County, TX was sold. Perry chose to move his family to ranch in Arkansas instead of the large ranch in Knox

County, Tx. We built a home in Fulton Co on the ranch, called "Trail's End".

Bill was 2 1/2 when his father died. He, of course, continued living with mother and brother and sister at Trail's End. When he was about 3 1/2, he started talking about an imaginary male friend... "Jim", which seemed to be a super hero. Concerned, I took him to the doctor and talked to him about it. The doctor said it was not unusual for this to happen when a child lost a father early in his/her life. "Jim" would disappear in time and most certainly would disappear if I remarried. I was also consulting doctors concerning Bill's 'wandering eyes' but was told by several doctors that there was nothing that could be done to correct the condition.
