The initials "J.D." were always claimed by J.D. and Rosa not to stand for any given names. There has, of course, been speculation about this since "James Doss" would fit very nicely.

J.D. took the surname of his stepfather, Paul Bailey Maness, sometime after 25 December 1925.

J.D. is listed as "Doss, J.T. Jr." in the 1920 census.

In J.D.'s army discharge papers he is listed as having hazel eyes, brown hair, 5'9", and 150 lbs.

After marrying Sarah, Sam sold his store and moved to Cooke County and established what became known as the Hog Eye Ranch or B2 Ranch.

"During the Civil War, Sam furnished all his cowboys and others who wanted to go to war, horses and equipment, thus doing much to forward the cause of the Confederacy. Later Sam Doss himself joined the Regiment under the command of Col. James Bowland [Bourland] and remained in the Frontier Service." "Sam Doss was quite successful until the big break in the price of stock in 1883-1884, which affected him materially. He was at that time feeding for the market 960 big steers, but of this number 445 head died of a disease. This caused another loss, from which Mr. Doss never fully recovered.... Doss purchased 7480 ac at Bourland's Station in the Red River valley of Montague County, Texas...." From "Capt. B.B. Paddock's History of North & West Texas", Vol. II, p. 232-5.

From "Indian Wars and Pioneers of Texas" by John Henry Brown, comes this story of an Indian raid on the families in Cooke County. One group of the Indians camped "immediately below the farm of Samuel Doss and within a mile of Gainesville...." One of their captives, a Mrs. Shegogg, had "managed to escape and secrete herself till morning, when almost nude and suffering greatly from cold, she found refuge in Mr. Doss' house."

From "Early Days In Cooke County" by C.N. Jones: "...she [Mrs. Shegog'] was left here and after the Indians had

gone, she discovered by the barking of a dog or perhaps by the crowing of a rooster that there was a house on the hill just west of where she then was. Making her way as best she could through the brush and briars in Elm creek bottom at that time, and in the darkness of the early morning she come to the home of a Mr. Sam Doss. A family of negroes living in Mr. Doss' yard were the first to discover Mrs. Shegog and thinking that she was an Indian and believing that they were about to be attacked, rushed into the house and told Mr. Doss that there were Indians in the yard. Mr. Doss soon discovered that instead of an Indian being in the yard it was a half frozen white woman who not more than 30 minutes before had escaped from the Indians. Of course she was kindly cared for and soon returned to her desolate home some 20 miles west of Gainesville. The writer became well acquainted with Mr. Doss and his excellent family some years after the events recorded here. He and his family are still remembered by many people in and near Gainesville now."

Sam sold the old Hog Eye Ranch and purchased 7480 acres at the Bowland [Bourland] section in the Red River Valley of Montague County, Texas.

William married first, 25 June 1839, in Wilson County, Tenn, a Letitia B. Shepherd, who he divorced in 1842. He moved to Texas about 1844-45. He held a commission in the 1st Brigade, 1st Division, Texas Militia, 15 October, 1846 of Brigadier General. He was in the Texas legislature in 1851. He owned the first drugstore in Paris, Texas and was a physician for many years.

From "The History of Lamar County" by Neville: "The legislature having enacted a bill authorizing county courts to exempt from military service such physicians as were considered 'absolutely necessary to the benefit of the citizens of the county' the court in February 1864, recorded such exemption for Drs. R. A. Scales, Thomas E. Griffis, A. S. Johnson, James W. Harmon, Alex. Johnson, B. Bywaters, P. W. Vining, R. H. Robertson, Houston Hancock, G. M. Pennybacker, D. H. Gibson, W. W. Stell, I. J. Osburn, T. P. Hall, W. T. F. Coles and George W. Lane, as being 'respectable practicing physicians'."

From a letter from Valletia Nixon Mooneyham to Ferne Nixon Little, dated 5 Sept. 1968: "... My father was Liberty Franklin Nixon...." "My grandfather [Francis Marion Nixon, Jr.] was killed at Roseville, Arkansas during the Civil War. He had taken the family there to get on boat to go back to Illinois to be near her people and he was going to enlist in the Northern Army. The bushwhackers had come in to the town to pilfer and Grandfather joined the town citizens to defend the town and was killed. Grandmother took the children by boat down the Arkansas River and up the Mississippi River to Ill. My father never forgot the pickled pig feet they served on the boat. I think he was about five years old." "Grandmother married again in Ill., a Mr. James Bullock. They came back to Grandmother's property near Ratcliff. They had two sons Jim and Bob Bullock."

From a draft of a family history by Wanda Nixon Bruce dated 1 August 1978: "...My grandfather Nixon, who was also Francis Marion (named for the great Southern general) fought on the Northern side of the war and worked as a double-agent. He was killed in the last year of the war. My daddy never saw his father, as he was born after Grandpa Nixon left home on his last furlough. The North re-patriated my grandmother Nixon and all her children. Father told me all about it one time and I wrote it all down, so I'd never forget it. Grandmother left Arkansas with her little brood of children, boarding a flatboat at Fort Smith on the Arkansas River, thence to Memphis, where they boarded the Memphis Belle, that famous old river boat. I don't think I can name all the children. I never saw but two of them, maybe three. There was Pendleton Graves Nixon; George, Liberty, and her one daughter, Augustine, and my father, a babe in arms. It must have been a treat for those country people from the backwoods of Arkansas, traveling on a fancy three-decker paddle wheeler, as grandmother told father. He told me that his mother related all this history to him as he was growing up, so his decedents would know about it. They sailed up the old Mississippi disembarking at Cairo, Illinois. From there, I don't know where they went - to live with some of Grandma's relatives, I believe. Those kids must have had a great time. Such an experience for them! I can just see those little boys and that little girl running around the decks of that grand old river boat. It may be that the Army just billeted them somewhere. Daddy didn't tell me. They stayed up north until the war ended by the south having lost the war. Then they came back to the farm in Logan County, Arkansas, and Grandma had a brand new husband, named Bullock. They had children, so there were two sets of children growing up on the farm...."

From Kathleen Diane Cormack: "The following story was taken from a letter written by Velletia Nixon Mooneyham (Granddaughter to Francis Marion Nixon Jr.) to Ferne N. Little on October 10, 1968. " I presume it was an episode that Lycurgus (son of Francis Marion Nixon, Jr.) had that made Grandfather decide to take his family back to Illinois and enlist himself in the army. Some way Grandfather got word that the bushwhackers were looking for him and he hid out. When they came they took Lycurgus out and strung him up to a tree until he was almost dead trying to make him tell where his father was. They did this several times but finally let him go. If he knew, he never told. But he immediately enlisted in the Army. He was in only a short time and died of pneumonia."

William enlisted 1 September 1863, at Fort Smith in Company D, 1st Regiment of the First Arkansas Volunteer Infantry (Union Army), and served until discharged at the same place 10 August 1865. He served on detached duty, and was wounded at the battle of Big Creek, 26 March 1865. He was "shot in the [right] arm while on detail duty with a mixed squad, in the Big Creek country, shortly before the close of the war. Shot by bushwhackers.... another member of the County, was shot dead on the same occasion."

BOURLAND, JAMES G. (1801-1879). James G. Bourland, soldier and state senator, was born in South Carolina on August 11, 1801, to Benjamin and Nancy Bourland. He was married twice, to Catherine Wells and Nancy Salina, and had seven children. He lived in Kentucky and Tennessee, where he traded in slaves and horses, before he moved to what is now Lamar County, Texas, in 1837. He led a volunteer company against Indians in 1841. Later that year he served as second-in-command to William C. Youngqv in another campaign and stayed when Young organized the Third Regiment, Texas Mounted Rifles, for the Mexican War.qv After serving as a deputy surveyor, he became the collector of customs for the Red River District in 1842 and was elected to the Senate of the First and Second state legislatures. A clash over customs duties with the crew of a United States ship in 1843 led to his being awarded a substantial sum of money by a United States court five years later. After his father, who had also settled in Texas, died in 1851, Bourland invested in a mercantile enterprise and founded a plantation on land now in Cooke County. During the late 1850s he again led a volunteer company against Indians. When the Civil Warqv began, he served as provost marshal for the region in which he resided and in that role directed the investigation that climaxed with the Great Hanging at Gainesvilleqv in 1862. Afterward, he was authorized to organize and lead the "Border Regiment," which remained in North Texas although it was in Confederate service, and was later given control of all troops on the northwestern frontier. He was accused of atrocities, in addition to the Great Hanging, but Confederate officials ignored the accusations. After the war ended he received a presidential pardon and was acquitted by a civil court. He subsequently lived in seclusion until his death, on August 20, 1879.

Col. James Bourland was the "Float-Senator" in the Texas Senate from the district of Fannin, Red River, and Bowie Counties. 25 Feb, 1846, 1st Session. He served for 4 years.

"During the Mexican War (1846-47), Bourland, along with William C. Young, raised one thousand troops and marched them to San Antonio, where they were mustered in. From " Wright, "Texas in the War..."

In the "Encyclopedia of the New West," ed. by William S. Speer, Marshall Texas: The United States Biographical Pub. County, 1881, it states "When William C. Young raised a regiment [3rd Reg., Texas Mounted Volunteers] for the Mexican war, ... Mr. Bourland was elected lieutenant-colonel, and his brother William Bourland, major. But the war closed about the time they reached the Rio Grande and they never participated in any battle." The Regiment was later surrendered by General E.K. Smith, commanding Trans-Mississippi Department, on 26 May 1865. Also know as the "Texas Border Cavalry Battalion" and later the "Texas Border Cavalry Regiment."

"Among the prominent families of Delaware Bend was Col. James Boreland [sic]... and his son-in-law, Col. A.B. Manion. These two men came with their families to Cooke County several years before the Civil War and located at the upper end of Delaware Bend, which in those days was on the direct route between the East Texas markets and Fort Arbuckle, fifty or sixty miles nearly directly north. Boreland and Manion engaged in the mercantile business and dealt with the soldiers at Fort Arbuckle and the Indians from the north side of Red River. The carried a large stock of merchandise, and also raised much corn and many hogs., which they sold principally to the government." "Fall Term of Court, 1857: Ordered that James Bourland be appointed presiding officer at all elections for the year 1857 for precinct 3, and the elections to be held at the store or house of James Bourland.

Capt. James Bourland, Commanding Officer of Texas Rangers, Mounted Volunteers. Enlisted 28 Oct, 1858, discharged 28 Apr, 1859. In the Civil War, the "Bourland Texas Cavalry" was organized in early 1863. Col. Bourland commanded a regiment whose duty it was to "protect the North-western frontier against the hostile Indians in the darkest day ever known in that region."

In the cartoon "Texas Lore" by Patrick M. Reynolds, a story is told this way: "During the Civil War, as Sophia Coffee was wining and dining some Yankee scouts at Glen Eden (her plantation in Grayson county,) she heard they were seeking Col. James Bourland, the Confederate leader of Texas' Frontier Defenders. While her guests were busy, Sophia slipped away, swam her horse across the Red River, warned Col. Bourland & helped prevent an invasion of North Texas. Sophia, widow of Holland Coffee, died in 1899. Today their home, Glen Eden, lies beneath Lake Texoma." Sophie was featured in the book "Legendary Ladies of Texas" by Abernathy about ladies of the evening. Patti Rochette states that a Texas list maker lists Col. James Bourland as a frequent guest.

Information from an unpublished draft manuscript titled NORTHEAST TEXAS PIONEERS 1800-1877, copyright by Skipper Steely, 1989, Paris, Texas: "They moved from Kentucky back to Weakley County, where he owned a race track with Nathaniel Herbert and Albert Early, and apparently bought and sold slaves and horses. James Bourland came to Texas according to land records, in 1836. He surveyed land as a vocation, and sometime in 1837 chose a piece for himself on the North Sulphur River southwest of Roxton. In 1842 he was named as collector of import duties for the Red River District. In 1846 he was elected to represent Fannin, Lamar, Red River and Bowie Counties. He was re-elected for a second term. In 1847 James Bourland also received a land certificate for helping build or survey the Central National Road, which ran through part of the Bourland property. James Bourland served in the Mexican War, and was an incorporator of the Memphis El Paso and Pacific Railroad. By 1853 he had moved to Delaware Bend in Cooke County. In 1858 he raised a company to stop Indian depredations. At the onset of the Civil War, James Bourland served as a member of Young's 11th Texas Regiment, but later organized the 2nd Frontier Regiment, Bourland's Texas Cavalry. In 1862 he was also named provost Marshall of Cooke County. In 1864 Indian problems became very serious, and Bourland led a group in pursuit that fall. Most of all, James Bourland is known for his part in the Gainesville Hangings. He is buried in the Orlena Cemetery."

Notes for Francis Nixon:

According to Ron Nixon, family tradition has it that "Frank" arrived in the United States with his parents about the time of the American Revolution. He was living in his parents home with a brother and sister when his parents were killed by the British. Frank escaped and his brother escaped but his sister Margaret was kidnapped and never heard from again. Another story has Margaret also escaping and being taken by another family. Nevertheless, the house was burned and the children separated.

Sometime prior to 1784 Francis was among a group led into Kentucky by Daniel Boone. The Nixon family found recorded in Kentucky were in a group from Virginia, who settled along Gilbert's Creek in Madison County, Kentucky. This group, made up of the William Young, Johnston, Hampton, Falconer, Nixon, and Chester families, built a stockade known as Gilbert's Creek Station. Later the same year, they established the Gilbert's Creek Baptist Church, the first church founded in Kentucky. Francis Nixon reached Kentucky at age 14 or 15 and lived there 17 years, where he was a frontiersman and hunter.

While residing in Limestone County, Alabama, Nixon choose a very novel way of decorating his primitive cabin on Swam Creek south of the present day Athens. In the book "The Lure and Lore of Limestone County", published for the Limestone County Historical Society, R.A. McClellan was quoted as saying, "He (Nixon) stuffed the entrails of a bear which he had killed, and draped these adornments around the inner walls of his house. To relieve the dun-colored monotony of these ornaments he interspersed them with nice pods of red pepper."

He has been described as a man of small stature (120 pounds) but possessing good running ability. His speed as a runner is said to have gotten him out of a few scrapes with indians.

From Kathleen Diane Cormack: "This is a story that was submitted to the Staunton Star-Times, on 23 February 1912 by Mrs. J. A. Wilder of West Prairie. It was in response to the newspaper asking for "Old Settler Stories." This collection of articles was reprinted by the Macoupin County Genealogical Society. "As told to me by mother when a child. In the latter part of the 18th century, my great-grandparents Piper by name, lived on the hill that Otto Funderburk lives on and at the present time, on the road going from Staunton to Bunker Hill near Cahokia bridge. In those days there were a great many so called friendly Indians in this part of the country, also a few unfriendly panthers. At one time my great-grandfather was confined to his bed with a severe spell of sickness. At the time grandmother was a young lady (Mary Piper). One day she was piecing a quilt when some Indian squaws came on the rounds of begging. One of them went to grandma and jerking the quilt out of her hand and wrapped it around her own shoulders, began dancing around the room, while the other squaws clapped their hands in glee. When she was done with it, she handed it back to grandma telling her in her own language, how pretty it was. In a few days she came again, this time grandmother was carding some wool, getting them ready to spin. They were preparing to weave some cloth for winter clothing. They were always prowling into everything that they could get their hands on that could be eaten and great-grandmother always divided everything that she could for although they claimed to be friendly, they were very treacherous at times. This time, they spied some pumpkins under the bed. The bedstead being an old high poster, the Indians were soon rolling them out over the floor and one of them, on discovering a decayed place in the pumpkin, ran her hand on it and pulling it out, she went around holding her hands to the other squaws noses and soon had them making faces. Going to grandma, she rubbed the rotten pumpkin all over her face. That made grandma so mad that she raised a card to hit the squaw but her father spoke to her quickly, telling her not to do that. After the Indians went away, he told her never to anything to provoke them or sometime they would murder the whole family. It was there, that grandmother was married to Steven Wilcox, going from there to Silver Creek to live. Now grandmother used to come over on horseback to visit her parents, usually starting in the afternoon and staying. So one day, taking my mother up in back of her and baby in her arms, she started to West Prairie. At that time a public road came up to the creek from the south toward the bridge and there was heavy timber on either side of the road. As grandma was riding along, probably crooning a lullaby to her baby, she saw some berries that people used for coloring and on riding out to examine them to see if they were ripe, she heard the snapping twigs and looking over some bushes and saw a panther smiling there. Well it didn't take her so very long to get back to the road with the panther following close at her heels; she couldn't ride very fast for fear of the little girl falling off, but she kept watching the beast and every time it started wagging its tail, she would make the horse trot so, in this manner she kept out of its reach until she came to a bunch of cattle lying down where Chas. Hoffstetter lives. There it took after the cattle and grandma was soon on the hill with her parents. After grandfather bought or homesteaded one hundred and sixty acres of what is at this time the business portion of Staunton and was the owner of the first grocery store that was ever in that city. After deciding to go to a warmer climate, he sold his farm, receiving a small payment and reserving a small part, only seven blocks, for sale or future use. He then emigrated to Arkansas, dying there without he or his heirs realizing anything more for the sale of their home, after going through many hardships of the war. Grandma died 20 years ago, at the ripe old age of 91."

Wilcox, one share, fourth to Polly Page one share and fifth to James Munro Wilcox, son of my deceased son Jeramiah M. Wilcox, one share. If any of the said heirs should by leaving us lawful heirs, previous to receiving their share as alas, then their true said share shall revert back in equal amounts to the remaining surviving heirs. Item third: I nominate and appoint my beloved wife Nancy Wilcox to be my Executrix of this my last will and testament and I hereby request that no security be required of her for the performance of the duties that may devalue upon her in carrying out the provisions of this my will. Item fourth: After the decease of my said wife, it is my will that the advertising and selling of my lands shall be conducted by my son Stephen Wilcox and I do hereby nominate him to perform said business and collect, receive and divide the proceeds and pay over their respective shares to the proper persons, dispersing and to do and perform all other business that may pertain to the final closing and settling up, this my last will and testament.

Gorey, Ireland (a.k.a. Newborough) is a small town in the north of County Wexford, about 26 miles from Wexford and 48 from Dublin. It's charter states that there shall be a Sovereign, 12 Burgesses and free Commons, to be admitted by the Sovereign and the Burgesses. The Sovereign to govern the Town in absolute and ample manner; with the consent of the major part of the Burgesses to appoint a deputy and the Sovereign to be Justice of the Peace for one year next after the year of his Government. Several times Thomas was Sovereign of Gorey, and was also "Registrar" of Gorey. He was the "middleman" in leasing property in Counties Wexford and Wicklow, one who leased large tracts of land and then in turn leased them in smaller tracts to other people. In 1734 he was listed as Thomas Cole(s), Attorney, Exchequer and is listed in Kings Inn Admission Papers [The Law].

Meyer and John Frederick Dorman, editors, "Adventurers of Purse and Person, Virginia: 1607-1624/5, (Published by the Order of First Families of Virginia, 1987, 3rd edition), p 257-8.: "Francis Epes, baptized 14 May 1597, was in Virginia by April 1625 when he was elected from Shirley Hundred to sit in the Assembly at James City on 10 May ensuing but was missed in both the census of 1623/4 and the muster of 1624/5. Ensign Francis Epes testified, 9 Jan. 1625/6, in the controversy between Mr. Thomas Pawlett and the Rev. Greville Pooley. He was appointed commissioner for the Upper Parts, 8 Aug. 1626, and commander of forces with Capt. Thomas Pawlett to attack the Weyanoke and Appomattox Indians, 4 July 1627. There is no record of him in Virginia between 7 March 1628/9 and 21 Feb. 1631/2. He probably returned to England with his wife and two sons, for on 8 Sept. 1630 "Thomas, son of Francis Epes and Marie was born" in London. Back in Virginia, Francis Epes was a member, 1631/2, of the House of Burgesses for Shirley Hundred, Mr. Farrar's, and Chaplain's. On 26 Aug. 1635, as Capt. Francis Epes, he was granted 1700 acres in Charles City County on Appomattox River, a portion of which tract remained in the family until 1978. Headrights named in that patent were himself, his three sons, John, Francis, and Thomas, and thirty servants. He served in the House of Burgesses for Charles City, 1639/40 and 1645/6 and, after having been recommended June 1637, was a member of the Council in 1652. He consolidated his land, 4 Oct. 1668, in a patent for 1980 acres and was dead by 30 Sept. 1674 when his son and heir John Epes renewed the patent in his own name. He also held land on Shirley Hundred Island, now Eppes Island, in 1644 according to two patents to others.

He married Mary \_\_\_\_\_, who as "Mrs. Epps" was left money for a ring and "my Bible" by the will of Capt. Thomas Pawlett, dated 12 Jan. 1643/4. "Godson" Francis Epes was also named in this will. Issue: John, Francis, Thomas.

Was Mary a relative of Capt. Thomas Pawlett? According to the Virginia Historical Magazine (vol 23, pp 38-39), Thomas Pawlett was born about 1578, immigrated to Virginia on the ship "Neptune" in 1618, and lived at West and Shirley Hundred. He was a son of Chidioc Pawlett (whose wife was Frances Neville--a descendant of King Edward III of England) and a grandson of William Pawlett, 1st Marquis of Winchester--a descendant of King Edward I of England-- and Elizabeth Capell.

In his will, Thomas Pawlett named his brother, Sir John, Lord Pawlett, executor, mentioned his brother, Chideck Pawlett, and referred to Sir William Berkeley as "my much honoured kinsman." Thomas Pawlett appointed Capt. Francis Epes and Mr. Walter Aston overseers of his will."

Which we performed; and coming to the ship's side he called twice or thrice, but whether answer were returned I know not. Then Mr Wyatt requested Mr Thomas Mallory to go aboard the ship and fetch the hammocks, telling him where he left them. Which Mr Mallory did and found the hammocks aboard in the same place Mr Wyatt directed him unto and threw them into the boat. And in his way back stood a jug of wine beverage, which with a free consent of all that were in the boat, was handed down and brought away the jug, in my judgment, containing near a gallon. Mr Wyatt went not out of the boat the same time and further saith not. Thomas Epes. Jurat coram me, 24 February 1665. Robert Wynn."
