Emigrated from West Prussia, with wife Frederika in about 1884. They stopped briefly in Cleveland, then moved to Seattle in 1887. Friedrich worked briefly as a wooden cornice maker, then started his own bakery. With his German zeal, he made of the bakery a great success, with a fleet of horse-drawn wagons delivering bread and sweets all over Seattle. When he died, the bakery was willed to son Adolph.

From the "Heyer-Ullman Families of Seattle", written by Dorothy Ball Gough

pp. 1-2:

My mom's father, Frederick Heyer, emigrated from Germany to the United States alone in 1883 at age 23 and settled in Cleveland, Ohio. Chester A. Arthur was the President at the time and had become President after the assassination of James A. Garfield. Grandfather was born in April 1860 and died January 14, 1913, at age 52. My Mom told me he died from leukemia and was the second person known in the United States to die of leukemia. The first person was a doctor in the East. Also that on his dying bed, his last words were, "Push the rye bread, it holds more vatter." He was a redhead, wore a mustache, and it appears from a picture taken in 1907, that he was about the same height as my Mom who was 5'7". He had a disposition to go with his hair and my first cousin once removed, Viola, said he could be nice if he had to. He used the name "Fritz" rather than his given name and his children called him "Papa." The 1900 census shows that he was a saw maker and rented a home in Seattle at 2233 Atlantic Street and lived there with his wife, Frederiche; daughters Antonette, Elsie, and Clara; son, Adolph Ernst, as well as his Father-in-law, Julius Ullmann. This was an area where immigrants from several different countries settled such as: Sweden, Ireland, Canada, Italy and England. In 1900 they had been married fourteen years which would indicate they must have been married in 1886 which made him twenty-six he was married and grandmother twenty-one. The Census stated that grandmother had mothered six children indicating she must have lost two before 1900. Also that he could speak English and was naturalized. On February 25th, 1892, he filed his intention to become a citizen of the United States under the name "Fritz Heyer," and "renounced particularly to the Emperor of Germany." So far, I have not found his citizenship papers.

Fritz worked in a lumber yard and during the panic of 1893 when there was no exchange of money, he brought lumber home in payment for wages earned. He was a hard worker and a good business man. About that same time, Frederiche baked bread and Fritz carried the bread in a basket to the neighbors. This was beginning of the Heyer Bakery.

At his death, he owned a very successful bakery located at 1422 23rd Avenue South. He bought the property on which the bakery was built on March 11, 1904, for \$275 from John Davis, a single man (this information from the Stewart Title Company). He also invested in property and houses. He built or had built two houses across the street from the bakery, a double house and a house for grandmother's father. He came from a wealthy family in Germany who owned flour mills. His father's name was Eduard Heyer born in 1833 and deceased in 1899. His mother was named Wilhemina Krause, born 1835 and deceased 1900. He had one brother named Adolph and four sisters whose names were Emma, Helene, Bertha and Hedwig. None of them, as far as I know, came to the

Last Will and Testament of Fritz Heyer:

In The Name of God, Amen.

I, Fritz Heyer, of the City of Seattle, King County, Washington, being of sound mind and memory, and not acting under duress, manage or fraud, and free from any undue influence of restraint of any person whatsoever, do hereby make, publish and declare this my last will and testament in the following manner, to-wit:

FIRST: I bequeath and devise to my daughter, Elsa Stevens, Lot Ten (10), Mt. Baker Pk. addition.

SECOND: To my daughter Antoinette Ball, Lot Eleven (11), of my Mt. Baker Addition Property.

THIRD: To my son, Adolph Heyer, my bakery and property upon which it is situated at 23rd and Atlantic St.

FOURTH: To my daughter Margaret my two (2) cottages designated as 1416 and 1422 23rd Avenue South.

FIFTH: To my daughter Adaline the Southwest corner of 23rd and Atlantic St., all in the City of Seattle and King County, Washington.

SIXTH: I further provide that my son Adolph Heyer, shall pay out of the property bequeathed and devised to him, to my daughter Margaret the sum of Twenty-five (25.00) Dollars per month, and to my daughter Adaline the sum of Twenty (20.00) Dollars per month and he, the same Adolph Heyer, shall also pay all bills outstanding against me as well as all bills for Doctor bills and funeral expenses, excepting the Seventy-five (75.00) Dollars provided by the Lodge, Sons of Herman which shall be applied towards all such expenses, and I further direct that my insurance in the Order of the Sons of Herman in the amount of Five hundred (500.00) Dollars be first applied to the paymentds of all the special assessments to and improvements upon the property, bequeathed and devised to my daughter Margaret and any surplus remaining after the payment of such improvements and special assessments shall go to my daughter Adalline but shall not be used for any other purposes except the payments of improvements upon the real property bequeathed and devised to her.

SEVENTH: I do make, constitute and appoint, F. A. Aushad, executor of this my last will and testament, and it is my will that no bond shall be required of him.

EIGHTH: I hereby revoke any and every other will or testament heretofore made by me.

IN WITNESS THEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and seal to those presents of this 13th day of January, 1913.

There was a mystery as to what happened to the bakery following the death of Fritz Heyer. As was the custom, Adolph, the only son, inherited the family business. Judging from the information available, business had been poor. Dorothy Ball Gough, in her book "The Heyer-Ullman Families of Seattle", pp. 53-54 states:

I was not satisfied not knowing what happened to the bakery, so I called the Stewart Title Company and they were kind enough to give me this information. Grandfather Heyer bought the property from John Davis on March 11, 1904, for \$275. on May 1, 1918, Adolph sold the property to his sister, Elsa Stevens for an undisclosed amount. On March 22, 1922, Elsa and Bill Stevens sold it to the Superior Hard Tack Importing Company for \$3500. Chapter IV "Frederick Heyer's Will" explains where some of the money from the baker was to be distributed.

Antoinette Helene Heyer was born May 4, 1887 in Cleveland, Ohio. . . She was the eldest child of Frederick Heyer and Friederike Ullmann Heyer. Her middle name (Helene) may have been after one of her father's sisters, who remained in Germany. Her godfather was Ernst Ullman, the brother of her mother.

Following the death of her husband, John Joseph Ball, in October 1929, Nettie moved to San Francisco, California with her two daughters, Dorothy and Ruth. It was a struggle for them to make ends meet and when Ruth moved further south to the Los Angeles area, leaving her mother and sister on their own, things got even more difficult. Dorothy really needed to be on her own and when an opportunity arose for Nettie to move back to Seattle and work as a housekeeper for a Mr. Greenfield and his family, she took it. Mr Greenfield was an auctioneer in downtown Seattle.

Mr Greenfield had a summer home on Mercer Island and Nettie went with the family on weekends during the summer months. It was there she met Ernest Burt, who worked for Mr. Greenfield at the store and he spent the weekends working on little jobs around the house. He was a kindly man, about Nettie's age.

After a short courtship, Nettie and Ernest were married. Nettie left the employment of Mr. Greenfield and the newlyweds moved into a small home they rented.

The Heyer-Ullman Families of Seattle, 1994, and From This Day Forward, 1998:

Dorothy was born July 18, 1908 at the family home at 23rd and Atlantic Street, kitty corner across the street from the Heyer Bakery in Seattle, Washington. On June 14, 1909, John and Nettie purchased property at 5209 Dawson Street for \$750. John built a home for his family at that location and Ruth was born during the time they lived there. This home would later be known as the "Kitty House" to Dorothy and Ruth, because when they moved away from there they had to chloroform a kitten they were unable to take with them.

The family moved from Seattle to Aberdeen, Washington in 1911. Following the death of both of her parents, Dorothy's aunt, Adeline Heyer, age nine, came to live with the Ball family in Aberdeen. In August, 1914, they moved to Elma, Washington, where the family lived in a large, white house, which was very homey. It was a wonderful house with a large yard. There was a cupola, which provided a wonderful play room for Dorothy, Ruth and their friends.

In 1916, they moved back to Seattle, where they lived in the "Kitty House" again. That same year, Adeline left in the fall to attend Western State College in Bellingham (formerly Bellingham Normal School). In about 1918, the family moved again -- this time to Centralia, Washington, where they rented a house at 810 "H" Street. Dorothy and Ruth attended Edison Elementary School and then on to Centralia High School, from which they graduated.

By the time she was sixteen years of age, Dorothy was 5'11-1/2 " tall. She had dark brown hair and very brown eyes and resembled her mother.

Dorothy's father (John Ball) had been employed by Foster Company, a wholesale grocery business for whom he was a salesman. In 1922, he and Nettie had an opportunity to purchase their own grocery store in Centralia, which they did. They named their store White Front Grocery and Meat Market. John ran the grocery store and Nettie was the bookkeeper.

After graduation from high school, she enrolled at Bellingham Normal School, with a dream of becoming a teacher. She returned home after two semesters in Bellingham and enrolled at a business college. The following year she enrolled at Centralia Junior College. During this time she also worked at the grocery store after school and on Saturdays. The store did very well until the depression came. The family ran the store after all the employees had been laid off.

Dorothy and Ruth moved to Seattle for a while and stayed with their aunts (Ruth with Aunt Elsie and Dorothy with Aunt Margaret). They returned home, not able to find work, but then Dorothy went to live in Portland, Oregon. There she found a job with Lipman Wolfe Department Store in the stationery department, earning \$13.20 per week. She lived with friends of her parents, paying room and board.

Following the sudden death of her father October 13, 1928, the grocery store was dissolved. Nettie and her daughters made a decision to move to San Francisco. a previous marriage.

Dorothy loved to travel and had the opportunity to take many wonderful vacations, including cruises to Hawaii and Alaska. Dorothy and Jack also volunteered their time for many causes during their years together in Seattle.

John (Jack) Gough was born in Seattle on September 20, 1896 and was a first cousin to Dorothy Ball. When Jack was five months old, his father left the family leaving his wife to support five children. Their names were Alice, Art, Lucy, Edith and Jack. His mother placed Edith and Jack in an orphanage.

When he about four years old he was taken from the orphanage as a foster child of Dr. P. E. Beard and his wife, Martha. He remembers going with them to New York and then on a ship out into the ocean. When they returned they settled in Deadwood, South Dakota. At that time it was a wild Indian town where he was the only doctor. They later moved to Oregon City, Oregon where his father was again the only doctor in town.

His mother married a man named Harry Gregson, so Jack decided to go to his new family who had moved to Seattle. He left Oregon City and crossed the Columbia River on a ferry as there was not a bridge at that time. However, his stepfather was very cruel to him. As a result, Jack decided to leave his family.

He left Seattle for Canada when he was seventeen as he wanted to join the army before the United States was in the war. When he was eighteen (1914) he joined the Canadian army. He fought in France a short time when a shell burst near him and injured his knee. He was sent to a hospital in London where the doctors wanted to amputate. He refused to have the surgery and suffered with that knee much of the remainder of his life.

A friend of his in Seattle knew a girl named Ada, who lived in London, and she asked her friend to visit Jack in the hospital. After a short courtship he married Ada.

Jack was about twenty-one when he returned to Calgary and then to Vancouver, where he was hospitalized and learned the trade of how to make shoes. He then returned to Seattle where he opened a shoe repair shop in the Wallingford district. In the later years he worked for Boeing.

When he was settled he sent for Ada, who had remained in England. They had seven children -- four boys, George, Robert, Stanley and Don. There were three girls -- Joan, Peggy and Janice. Ada died in their Seattle home on August 7th, 1960 of a heart attack. He then married a woman whose name was Ida, and she died in front of the house from a heart attack.

He met Dorothy in San Francisco the day before her 60th birthday. They dated for a while and enjoyed each others company very much. He proposed marriage to Dorothy during a visit to Seattle a short time later, but she refused. He continued to pursue her, and after much thought and discussion she finally decided to marry him. Following their marriage they remained in San Francisco for a time and then moved to Seattle so Jack could be near his children.

Life in Seattle was very busy for Jack. He had many volunteer activities, as well as social activities with many close friends. Jack's health was not good during the ten years of their marriage and he was in and out of hospitals with various problems, including his knee. It eventually required surgical replacement of the knee joint.

Elsa was born in Cleveland, Ohio on November 21, 1888, while her father was in Seattle. Fritz had gone to find a job and a place for his family in the new frontier. The family joined him in about 1889, when Elsa was still a baby -- about one year of age.

Her parents took a trip to Germany in 1910, looking for medical help for Friedriche, who suffered from a kidney disease. During this time, Elsa, age 22, cared for her two young sisters (Margaret, age 9, and Adeline, age 7). She was like a mother to those two little girls. She loved them and continued to care for them after the death of her mother. Fritz sent money to Germany for a niece of his wife's (Hedwig Seefeldt), to come to Seattle to care for his two young daughters. Elsa could not bear to see someone else coming into the family home to take her mother's place. Hedwig arrived sometime late in 1911. Before she arrived though, Elsa left home.

Elsa loved to dance and frequently attended dances down the street from the bakery on Rainier Avenue South. It was there that she met a tall, handsome man named William Stevens, of Polish-German descent. They fell in love

and were married October 11, 1911. A daughter, Bernice Fredericka, was born August 5, 1912 and a son, William Martin Stevens, Jr., followed December 15, 1916.

Elsa was an immaculate housekeeper and a wonderful cook. Dorothy recalls that that she made wonderful "smashed" potatoes, scalloped potatoes topped with lamb chops and Mulligan Stew. She made her own sauerkraut in a five gallon crock, which had a slicer on the top; after the cabbage had been seasoned, a board and a rock were placed on top. The sauerkraut crock was inherited from Bill's mother. They also made wine and root beer and had a capper to cap the bottles. Everything she cooked was so tasty. The family quite often had cake or pie for breakfast. One of Elsie's favorite vegetables was corn on the cob. It was a treat to watch her eating corn, one ear after another, as she truly loved it.

In addition to her accomplishments in the art of cooking, she also was a fine seamstress. She also enjoyed knitting, crocheting and cut embroidery. Elsa loved beautiful clothes, as did the other women in the Heyer family. She made all of her own clothings, and later for her daughter, Bernice. She would make an outfit and then have a photograph taken of herself in the new outfit. In her later life, she sewed professionally.

Elsa was a very kindly and hospitable woman. she loved her family and during her married life she planned family reunions.

William Martin Stefanski was born February 2, 1887 in Stevens Point, Wisconsin, the eldest son of Polish-German immigrant parents. Dorothy recalls that he had dark brown hair and piercing blue eyes.

Bill moved on to Seattle, Washington sometime before 1910 and took a job as a policeman in Ballard, before it was annexed to Seattle, and later he was employed by the Seattle Police Department. Bernice remembers that when he worked as a traffic cop at 4th and Pike, he would stop at the "Pig and Whistle" (a soda fountain and candy store) and purchase a sack of candy for her. He spoke very sternly and the younger children in the family were a bit frightened of him. Dorothy recalls that several times he handcuffed her. Bill loved to tease and I am sure this was all in fun.

Bill loved to dance. He met his future wife, Elsa Hedwig Heyer, at a dance held near the bakery on Rainier Avenue South. They fell in love and were married October 11, 1911. Their daughter, Bernice Fredericka, was born August 5, 1912. A son, William Martin Stevens, Jr. joined the family on December 15, 1916.

Bill and Elsa bought land on Whidbey Island, which lies in Puget Sound. Access to it was by ferry. By the 1940's they had built a home and lived there year-around.

In 1917 he decided to go into the fuel business. He leased forty acres, cleared off the land and sold the wood from a leased truck. Part of the land that he leased is where the University Village now stands. In addition to his fuel business, Bill Stevens sold fireworks north of the Seattle city limits at about N. 85th and Aurora. The fireworks that were left over he would take up to Whidbey Island and put on a fireworks display for the family and friends. He sold the fuel business about 1957.

Bernice recalls that when she was a young girl, her father would take her many different places and to see many different things. He was a wonderful father to her.

The Life of Bernice Fredericka Stevens Dowdy, in her own words:

I was born on August 5, 1912 in an area of Seattle which was between Woodland Park and the suburb of Ballard. The address of this house was 4448 8th Avenue NW in Seattle. Guess I was very young when we moved to the house at 221 W. 47th, which was owned by Uncle Tom, my Dad's older brother. Grandma Stefanski lived in the basement apartment. I think Aunt Francis, Uncle Ed (Lohrman) and Aunt Helen lived there also. Had so many relatives around in my younger years. We picnicked, went to Lincoln Beach and many other things. Had an Uncle Jack and his wife, Amelia, and their daughter, Phyllis, who was a year younger than me. They lived up the hill much closer to Woodland Park.

When I was five years old, my Dad walked me to the Woodlawn Grade School from beginning kindergarten and first grade, then to the Ross School until February, when we moved to 6218 - 32nd NE, and went to Bryant School. We lived in a large house we rented from a Mrs. Lane. My dad had quit the police department.

My mother taught me how to sew and to knit. I would stand beside her, while she was working at her sewing machine and she taught me as she went.

Daddy leased and cleared about thirty acres of what is now the area around University Village. He cut the trees and then cut the wood into different lengths. Much of the wood he cut was sold to the Marlatt's Bakery, which was located in the University District. They used the wood to fire their baking ovens. I went with him often and I would pick wild blackberries and eat them or pull up small trees.

At school I was in the May Day Flagpole dance and also in the play that was put on.

We went camping at Mt. Index and Mt. Rainier with Dean and Marie Efner and his mother. My cousins, Dorothy and Ruth Ball, came to visit us from Centralia and I went to visit them for Easter Vacation. My folks took me there or I went on the train. Sometimes Uncle Jack and Aunt Nettie took me home.

Daddy took me to the ball game (baseball) at Dugdale Park on Rainier Avenue. We would go on Wednesdays, which were Ladies Day. We would stop on the way and get a big bag of warm peanuts. During the playoffs in October, we would go downtown to the area in front of the Seattle Times. On the front of the building was a marquee, which would move around to show what was happening in the game.

Before wrestling was permitted in Seattle, my dad would take me to watch wrestling near Des Moines. Later, when wrestling was permitted in Seattle, we would go there to watch.

When President Harding came to Seattle there must have been a parade. We saw him, but I don't remember how old I was.

MEMORIES OF MY DAD, BY THE AUTHOR:

In his later life, my father began to have a desire to learn about the family of his mother. Through the years, he was never particularly generous with information about his life, but particularly about his childhood. This could have been at least in part because he did not remember that period clearly, or it could have been that he chose to block it out, due to the unpleasant nature of that time. He was born in Charlie, Clay County, Texas and lived there with his parents until sometime in the first half of 1920. At that time his mother, who was ill, took her two children, Harold and Gwendolyn, and left Clay County for Estancia, Torrance County, NM, which is where her parents and older sister were living. Willie Jane died there the following year.

My grandfather married Eoline Bullock 16 October 1920. It appears as though they may have lived in either El Paso, Texas or Albuquerque, New Mexico following their marriage. Though there does not seem to be any documentation of the time of her death, it appears that Willie Jane died about October 1921. Sometime following her death, Frank and Eoline headed to Estancia to pick up the two children from their grandparents. Upon arriving there, my grandfather found that Walter P. Waggener, father of his deceased wife and grandfather of the two children, had been appointed their legal guardian and did not want to hand the children over to their father. With the help of Willie Jane's older sister, Esther E. Waggener Garrett, my grandfather was able to re-gain custody of the two children and they headed to their new home in the Phoenix, Arizona area. I remember my father telling me a few things about living in Arizona, such as sleeping on a screened porch during at least a part of their time living in that area. He would wake in the morning and find tarantulas crawling on the outside of the screen. There were also picnics in the desert with other family members, primarily with his step-mother's sister, Bertille, and her son, Joe.

Until sometime in the mid-1920's, the Dowdy family remained in the Phoenix area. Frank Dowdy was making a living in the food business and eventually became a District Manager for General Foods. He later moved his family on to Salt Lake City, Utah, Portland, Oregon and eventually to Seattle, Washington, where they arrived sometime prior to April 1930. Harold graduated from Roosevelt High School in Seattle, Washington in the class of 1932. He did not attend college, but was employed in the grocery business, following in the footsteps of his father. When I was very young he was the manager of an A&P grocery store in Bremerton, Washington. He later went into the grocery brokerage business and retired from that work in 1975. Both Harold and Gwen lived the remainder of their lives in the Seattle area.

My father loved baseball. I can remember attending A&P company picnics at Norm's Resort at Cottage Lake in the Woodinville area and watching my dad play in a game with his friends and co-workers. He took me and my sisters to games at Sick's Seattle Stadium to watch the Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast League play too. That was in the late 1940's and early 1950's. He was also a very big fan of the Seattle Mariners and loved to watch them play. He was able to attend many games in the KingDome, but died before SafeCo Field was built. He also enjoyed basketball, but baseball was his first love. Of his five children, at least three of them are baseball fans as well. He obviously taught us well.

Harold Dowdy was extremely proud of his family. There was never any doubt that he loved us all and we certainly loved him as well. He left behind many bright and shining lights, who continue on in his image today.

Adolph was twenty years old at the time of the death of his father. The Heyer Bakery was left to him, but he was not really ready to manage the business at that point of his life and the business declined steadily. He sold the bakery to his sister, Elsa and she eventually sold it.

Margaret Valentine Wilhemina Heyer was born July 6, 1901, about eight years after her brother, Adolph. She was her father's favorite daughter. She had a hip problem, which made it difficult for her to walk; this may have contributed to the favoritism by her father. When she was six, he took her to Germany to talk to doctors in the hope that something could be done with her the problem, but there was nothing that would help. This problem continued throughout her life. When she returned home, though, she had learned quite a bit of the German language and even spoke with a German accent.

Margaret was sometimes allowed to help her father count the money from the bakery. Sometimes she would slip a coin or two to her sister, Elsa.

In June 1910, Fritz and Friedriche Heyer made a trip to Germany, which lasted about three months. While they were away, older sister, Elsa, took care of her two younger sisters. She was like a mother to them and loved them both very much. On the return trip from Germany, Friedriche died as a result of complication from the kidney disease she suffered. When Fritz returned home, he sent money to Germany to pay for the trip to Seattle for a niece of his wife's who had expressed an interest in coming to America. This niece was Hedwig Seefeldt, who was about twenty-four years old at the time she arrived. Before she arrived, Elsa moved out of the house as she

did not want to see a stranger come in and replace the mother she had loved. Hedwig arrived in late 1911 and remained until following the death of Fritz in January of 1913. At that time, Hedwig returned to Germany and the girls were separated -- Adeline (age 10) going to live with the Ball family in Aberdeen and Margaret (age 12) with sister Elsa, her husband, Bill Stevens, and their baby daughter, Bernice.

Margaret attended Ballard High School during the time that she was living with the Stevens family. It is not known if she graduated. She worked at "The Times", a Seattle newspaper, and while employed there she purchased a baby grand piano and took lessons from a teacher named Mrs. Haddock. She and Hedwig had also taken piano lessons when Margaret was a child, during the time Hedwig was living with the family.

Also during the time she was living with the Stevens family, she asked them one night to attend a Revenue Tax Payers meeting with her. While there, Margaret met a tall, blond, handsome man named Lawrence Hennings, who was studying to be an attorney. They were married June 20, 1922 in the home of Elsa and Bill Stevens. They were married, along with Frank and Faye Burns, in a double wedding at the home of Elsa and Bill Stevens. Frank Burns was a school friend of Lawrence. Margaret and Lawrence were very much in love through their married lives.

Margaret and Lawrence moved to Berkeley, California so Lawrence could attend Law School. He was in practice with Hennings and Shinn, Attorneys-at-Law in Seattle, Washington for sixty-five years.

Margaret was slender and short in stature (partially because of her hip problem), a brunette with very thick, dark brown hair. During the twenties, she wore rats (a clump of material used to extend the contour of the hair outwardly to give a bouffant effect, over her ears to make her hair appear more full. Her eyes were bluish in color and deep set, like the other Heyers. She had beautiful skin and was a very happy, cheerful person.

Margaret and Lawrence traveled extensively. I know they visited Germany at one time and had a chance to visit some of our German relatives. They also traveled to Russia in the first years when it was possible for Americans to enter the country.

Margaret joined the first unit of the Orthopedic Guild and was quite active for many years. There is a memorial plaque in the Children's Orthopedic Hospital (now Children's Hospital) in her memory.

Adeline Sophie Heyer was born May 13, 1903 in Seattle, Washington. She would be the last of the children born to Fritz and Friederich Heyer. Like her older sisters, her early life was spent in the bakery. Some family members fondly recall the fun that they all had at the bakery.

In 1910, Fritz and Friederich make a journey to Germany in search of a cure for the illness which plagued Friederich. Older sister, Elsa, had taken care of her two younger sisters during the time their parents were away. With the death of their mother on the return trip, she continued to care for Margaret and Adeline until the arrival of Cousin Hedwig Seefeldt from Germany. Elsa was like a mother to the girls and loved them very much. Hedwig, however, was a stranger to the girls; she remained in Seattle until the death of Fritz in 1913, a total of little over one year. (The Seefeldt family appears to be linked to the Wittig side of the Ullmann family).

Fritz Heyer died January 14, 1913 and Hedwig returned to Germany. At age nine, Adeline was separated from her sister, Margaret, to whom she was very close, and went to live with her eldest sister, Antoinette (Nettie) and John Ball and their two daughters, Dorothy and Ruth. Adeline was like an older sister to Dorothy and Ruth, but she was not happy living with the Ball family. She felt as though she were not wanted. The Ball family was living in Aberdeen, Washington at that time. The following year the family moved to Elma, where they rented a wonderful, large home. In the summer time there were visits by Margaret and cousin, Bernice Stevens. The girls all had a wonderful time together.

In 1916 they were transferred back to Seattle and returned to the Ball's house on Dawson Street. With the increased size of the family John Ball, with the help of Adolph Heyer, remodeled the house to make it more comfortable for everyone. There was no bathroom, so they bathed in a galvanized wash tub.

Adeline attended Franklin High School in Seattle, Washington. It is not known if she graduated, but she went on to Bellingham Normal School, which is now Western State. It was probably at that time that she left the Ball

family.

As an adult, Adeline stood about 5'4" in height, had light brown hair that was very fine. Her eyes were green. Very slight in stature until her later years, at which time she became a little heavier. Adeline had a very dry sense of humor and talked very fast. Adeline loved beautiful clothes and dressed very fashionably.

At some point, Adeline moved to the San Francisco area. She worked in a sport shop in San Francisco. Through mutual friends in Oakland, she met her future husband, Earle Smith, while living there. It is not known how long they courted, but they married August 24, 1926.

They moved on to Hollywood, California, where their daughter, Earlene, was born, but did return to the Bay area about 1929. This was about the time that Nettie, Dorothy and Ruth moved the California following the death of John Ball. They later moved to Burlingame, California, which is down the peninsula from San Francisco. They joined the California Gold Club as Earle was an ardent golfer. As a young woman, Ad played tennis. At age 47, she decided to take golf lessons but did not continue for very long.
