The Duke's Theater on the Coburg Schlossplatz was a very imposing structure. Though a dull stone monolithic building from the outside, in contrast, its interior glittered. The richly upholstered seats and ascending rows of gold gilded balconies and private boxes reached up to the blue and white rococo-plastered ceiling. In the center of the ceiling, hung a huge, ornate crystal chandelier that was mechanically raised at the beginning of each performance so audiences seated in the balconies would have an unobstructed view of the stage.

This was a place of magic where in dim stage light, tales unfolded. Reality slipped away until no boundary existed between the actors and the audience, love and hate, battle and song, became as real as the quickened heartbeat in each chest.

This was the life of Wilhelm and Sabine Hartmann. They were a part of a large organization that produced and performed a constant stream of productions. The Duke's Theater was an organization that had dozens of full-time employees, from musicians in the orchestra, to dancers, singers, and actors down to stage hands, carpenters and scene painters as well as administration staff.

The theater was and had always been subsidized by the Wettin Dukes of Coburg and was used to amuse their royal and aristocratic guests. And there was always a stream of royals to be entertained.

The children of the Wettin Dukes of Coburg had long proven to be fertile marriage grounds for the royalty of the rest of Europe. In the course of the 19th century alone, sons, daughters and grandchildren of the house of Coburg ascended through marriage to the thrones of the mightiest ruling families of Europe. Albert, son of the duke, married Victoria Queen of England. Albert's Uncle Leopold became King of Belgium, and a Coburg princess married the Russian czar, and son on and so on. So it was little wonder that the Duke's theater in Coburg frequently entertained visiting heads of state. However most performances were also open to the paying public.

It was also in the Duke's Theater that Wilhelm first met Sabine Muther, a lithe young girl who joined the company in 1845 as a dancer.

Sabine's graceful body had immediately caught Wilhelm's attention. For someone so young, she seemed remarkably self-assured. She possessed a natural charm, beauty and grace of movement, that seemed far in excess of her age. As time passed, Wilhelm found himself more and more attracted to her and she to him.

So they lingered after rehearsals to talk about the plays and musicals in which they performed. They walked the still, black streets of Coburg, crossed a bridge, listened to the River Itz whisper long forgotten secrets and looked up and saw lights in the sky shimmering from the windows of the castle fortress floating high above the city. She felt in him a kindred spirit, a teacher, a mentor.

They continued to meet frequently and passionately... the thirty-three year old actor and the seventeen year old dancer. Their mutual attraction resulted in Sabine's pregnancy. Because she was not yet married, and to avoid embarrassment, Sabine delivered her first child, Nina Marie on March 6, 1852 in the neighboring Duchy of Gotha. Nina was baptized in the castle church of Gotha. A couple of months later, on May 27, 1852, Sabine and Wilhelm were married in the St. Moritz Church in Coburg.

Wilhelm had wanted to marry Sabine before the baby was born but he didn't have the money to pay the required marriage fee. Like most actors in the theater, he received a regular paycheck. But also like most performers, he tended to live above his means. Wilhelm had even petitioned his employer, the Duke of Coburg, for additional money, but was refused.

However with marriage and the arrival of other children, life for Wilhelm and Sabine began to settle into a predictable pattern. Wilhelm and Sabine continued to work side by side in the theater while Wilhelm's financial position steadily improved until he was the highest paid performer in the theater company.

Because of Wilhelm and Sabine's association with the Duke's Theater, their next four children, including Albert, the youngest Hartmann child, were all baptized in the Wettin Duke's luxurious private chapel in his palace directly across the plaza from the theater.

In the years that followed, the Hartmann girls appeared in various theatrical productions when youngsters were needed, and later in more major roles. They also performed with Wilhelm and Sabine as private entertainment for royal guests in the beautiful palace ballroom.

By 1876, both Nina and Jenny had become local celebrities. Jenny had received several gifts from royalty, including a bracelet with alternating red and white agates, and a gold watch from the Kaiser in appreciation of her singing abilities during a private concert at the Duke's palace. Nina sang with various regional opera companies, and Jenny, after many awards, had moved to Berlin to study voice.

In 1882, Clara received a letter from Jenny saying she had married. This was quite unexpected. The letter revealed that while in Berlin singing and studying voice, Jenny had met and fallen in love with Friedrich Fieger, a customs officer. When he was transferred from Berlin to a customs post in Alsace-Lorraine, Jenny followed, and on March 11, 1882, the two were married in the small town of Morchingen, where Friedrich was in charge of the customs station.

pp.7- 8:

By the age of twelve, with his sisters Nina and Jenny enjoying celebrity status with their careers in the opera and theater, only Clara and Albert remained living at home with their parents. By 1875 the Hartmann home had ceased to be the place of warmth and music it had once been. Wilhelm and not been well for several years, suffering recurring bouts of pneumonia that would leave him bedridden and sometimes unconscious for several days at a time.

With his father's death on April 3, 1878, Albert's dissatisfaction with his life bubbled over. Not only was he angry at a fate which had befallen his father, but at a military service that was now obligatory. While it was held to be an honor by most north German youths to serve a time in the Prussian service, the residents of Bavaria mostly thought otherwise. The pompous military arrogance of the Prussians had become the butt of music hall jokes throughout the south. Military service became a thing to avoid if at all possible.

At sixteen, Albert announced that he had no intention of serving in the military, and he intended to depart for America. He would simply wait out the years until he could return without the military obligation hanging over his head. Albert said he would write faithfully, and promised his mother he would continue with his violin lessons as soon as he found employment in America. And so, in January, 1881, he booked steerage passage on the Rhein, from Bremen to New York.

Albert's infrequent letters home told of a dynamic city bursting with life and a personal freedom unheard of in Germany. With the help of other German immigrants he had settled in quickly and had found work as a clerk.

pp 5-6:

By the time Clara was six, Prussia had defeated Austria, the last obstacle to a united Germany. The battles had been fought just north and south of Coburg. The Duchy of Saxe-Coburg had not yet formally joined the German Confederation, but the direction was irreversible. The new Reich had begun.

But Clara was not interested in her parents' animated political discussions. Rather it was the songs and music filling the high ceilinged, airy rooms of her Coburg home that spoke to Clara's heart.

Sunday afternoons at the Hartmann home were always warm, wonderful times, often ending with the family singing and playing various instruments. They were often joined by friends of Wilhelm and Sabine from the

theater for impromptu concerts around the piano. The house pulsed with music. The Hartmann children were always proudly paraded for the visitors as each developed his or her musical talents. And then, as the afternoon waned, there appeared bread, sausages roasted on pine cones and cakes oozing whipped cream, to be washed down with amber beer, rich wines, and strong coffee.

When it was Clara's turn to perform, her little fingers dutifully roamed the keys of the piano looking for chords and scales. But it was evident that she didn't possess a particular talent for music. On weekdays during her practice sessions she would often drift from her arpeggios to be lost in wonder at the dancing lights on the wall, as the afternoon sun reflected rainbow spots from the overhead chandelier.

When Clara was in her twelfth year, she learned of America from a book. At age sixteen, her schooling finished, she was unmarried and living with her parents, but she dreamed of something, she knew not what. By 1875, her father was in failing health and her mother began having her own physical and mental problems. Her father succumbed to pneumonia on April 3, 1878 and her mother continued to suffer depression and she would have long periods when she seemed to escape from the realities of this world.

pp. 24-47:

When Ernst was a child, the Ullmann family lived in Schwetz located in the Kossowo area of Westpreußen, on the banks of the Vistula River. Ernst loved the wide, calm river and enjoyed watching the passenger ferries as they carried traffic from Schwetz to Culm and back again. Barges and other crafts also attracted his attention and for a time he dreamed of becoming a sailor.

Ernst emigrated to America aboard the S.S. Rugia, in September 1884, following his parents and two sisters who had departed five months earlier, having settled in Cleveland, Ohio. At the time his parents and sisters emigrated, Ernst was still serving out his term of military service, stationed in Schneeberg, Saxony, near the Czechoslovakian border. By July of that year, Ernst had extricated himself from the military service and he too was on his way to America.

Ernst arrived in America at Castle Garden, New York, clearing customs July 24th, 1884. He was met by members of the German American Society, a volunteer organization that greeted most new German immigrants. They assisted him in finding lodging in his new country. Ernst was intrigued with New York and decided to stay a few weeks to give himself an opportunity to work and save up some extra money before continuing his journey on to Cleveland. He wrote to his father to let him know that he would be arriving later in Cleveland and Julius was not happy with this news. Ernst received a shrill reply from his father demanding that he come to Cleveland.

Ernst loved New York, found it exhilarating and began to revel in the freedom of spirit and environment he had never before experienced. The few weeks that he had expected to stay on in New York stretched into months. He convinced himself, as he had told his father, that each week meant more money earned to help out when he arrived in Cleveland. He really didn't want to leave New York but his nagging Prussian sense of duty told him otherwise. He delighted in being free of the restraints of his father and for the first time in his life he was truly a free man. When all was said and done, he knew that he must join his family, if only for a brief time. With this decision made, he purchased his train ticket to Cleveland, and told acquaintances that he would be leaving in a few days time.

On his final Sunday afternoon in New York, he visited one of his favorite beer gardens near the west end of Central Park. He had just taken a seat when he noticed a figure moving through the crowd. As the man approached, Ernst recognized him as a fellow he had met at the beer garden a week or so ago... Albert Hartmann. Though of opposing personalities, the two had made an instant friendship. With Albert this day were two ladies, one of which he recognized... a thin porcelain faced girl whom Albert had introduced before as his fiancée, Dorothea. The other, slightly shorter and heavier, he had never seen before. Albert introduced her as Clara Hartmann, his sister who had recently arrived from Germany.

Ernst was instantly attracted to Clara. She looked directly into his eyes when she spoke to him. She seemed open, almost bold. He liked her smile and the far away look in her eyes. She, in turn, delighted him by giving him by giving him her full attention, as he told of his military experiences, although none in battle. She seemed impressed by his Prussian, non-nonsense manner and arrogant plans for the future. She danced only with him that afternoon. Ernst had met his future wife. He wanted to turn in his train tickets and remain in New York, but another letter from his father arrived the following morning. In it Julius demanded that Ernst come immediately to Cleveland. The tone was so severe that it smacked his remembrance of past thrashings for disobedience. Ernst folded the letter and packed his bags.

The day before he left, he called at Clara's place of residence. He was ushered into the sitting room but Ernst and Clara were left to themselves. For a moment Ernst was speechless but then he began his good byes... he might be able to get back to New York, but he was not sure how things would work out in Cleveland. He asked Clara if it would be all right for him to write to her. She nodded almost before the question had been asked. And she would write to him. At the door she placed her hand on his arm, a simple gesture that stirred emotions he would not forget.
