Played the cello professionally, toured around the world to almost 40 countries played in front of thousands of people, many who rarely had an opportunity to hear an accomplished musician.

One story he told me was about a time he played in India during the war torn years. As was true for several places he went he had to travel around in an armored car for safety. After performing in front of thousands of people who greatly appreciated and admired his music a petit woman came up to him and complimented him, saying "you are the only musician who has not cancelled due to 'sickness'" He was then told that she was Mother Theresa.

He has 10 cd's produced accompanied by his wife Dian Baker who played the piano.

He was very kind and loving, a true gentleman. Great story teller, with many fascinating stories of his touring around the world.

He died after a three year battle with a rare form of Leukemia.

Roger Drinkall, Cellist

May 10, 1937 - December 15, 1997

Noted cellist, chamber musician and philanthropist Roger Lee Drinkall passed away December 15, 1997 following a three year battle with leukemia. He left this world as he desired--performing until three days before his passing. He and his wife, Dian Baker-Baker, known internationally as the Drinkall-Baker Duo, had just returned from a multi-week tour of Asia.

After graduating from the Curtis Institute at 19, Roger performed as a recitalist, chamber musician, and concerto soloist on the world's major concert stages for three decades. Throughout his life, Roger was known for his philanthropy. As a recitalist in the early 1970s, Roger was the only musician willing to perform in Calcutta and Delhi during India's bitter conflict with Pakistan. After the concert, Drinkall recalled, a Catholic nun came backstage, telling him she was "so proud of you." Then, she jokingly remarked that he was "the first musician who hasn't had a cold for the last six months." The little nun was Mother Teresa. Similarly, all proceeds from a

1976 Latin and South American tour were donated to the relief effort of the tragic Guatemalan earthquake of that year. Throughout his career, he gave well over 1000 concerts in more than 35 countries.

Roger met Dian Baker when she became a last minute substitute accompanist. He proposed after their second rehearsal, and their 1986 marriage followed. Since then, the Drinkall-Baker Duo has concertized throughout the U.S., Europe, Asia, and Latin & South America. In the last six years, the Duo had recorded ten compact discs for Pyramid, Claves, Klavier, Wilson Audiophile and others. Chinese Television had just completed a one hour documentary on the Duo which has already been picked up by PBS-New York and CBC-Vancouver. Air dates will be announced when available.

Roger Drinkall was born May 10, 1937 in Cleveland. After graduating from Curtis under Leonard Rose, he earned a master's degree from the University of Illinois, where he also did doctoral work. He served on the faculty of the University of Tennessee for eight years, Florida State University for thirteen years (where he also chaired the string department), and joined the faculty of Brigham Young University in 1989. He is survived by his wife, a sister, four sons--James, Mark, Scott and Roger, Jr.,--and one grandson. The family suggests memorials to the BYU String Scholarship Fund.

Robert left Texas and came to Chicago and became the largest motorcycle dealer in the world. He saw Ruth at a concert and fell madly in love and married her in six months. He then began to sell Nash autos and later as a side line sold a few travel trailers. He was so successful that he soon was not selling autos any more. Before his death Robert gave two Steinway grand pianos to the town of Bay View, MI. In 1980 Ruth gave a 4 Manual Schantz pipe organ to the Bay View Auditorium in Robert's memory. roo

Ruth was a beautiful talented teenager (see photos) when she met Robert Crist. She was a talented artist. She taught piano and gave recitals of high quality(see programs) . Magnus offered her either college or additional musical training. She chose music. She had been accepted into the conservatory of music and was on the verge of

going to Europe to study when she met Robert. She was swept off her feet and was married in six months. After her marriage she played for the church. Ruth and Robert ended all correspondence with the initials "I. L. Y." meaning I love you. At the bottom of their grave markers are the same initials(See photos). They also had many pet names for each other but the most consistent was Ruth's for Robert "Jgoog." Ruth is often photographed wearing a three drop diamond necklace given to her by Robert very early in their relationship. This is from Ruth Crist Dyer. roo

I can find no evidence he served in the Civil War. There were some Wisconsin units in the Union Army. The link from this John to his roots in England has so far evaded my research. There are so many John's. John G. used his middle initial on all of his records so he was easy to track except here on the 1870 census but his age location and parents seem to say this is his family the 1880 census he has moved the family to Fillmore CO MN and the kids are still with him, and this is where John G. raised his family. This time he is listed as 58 which would make him born in 1822 and may connect Him to the Drinkalls of Alkborough, Lincolnshire England. The lineage is rock solid to this point and I am very suspicious the next two generations are correct also. That is John/Bertha and William. roo

The reason for the migration to Texas was due to land that Minnie had inherited. John B. Crist, his brother, evidently became the heir to the family farm or bought the others out. This is suggested by the census of 1880 where John is listed as the head of the household and confirmed by the recollections of Grace Crist Goebel. At any rate Robert left Virginia with his new wife and child and went to Texas taking with him several of the family's former slaves and two of Minnie's Aunts Alice and Rose. In 1880 Minnie and Robert are living with John B. Crist, who is head of the house hold, the year after their marriage and a few months before the birth of Charles They stayed in Texas at first to allow Minnie to recover her health. but, in reality, Minne, Rose and Alice had grown up in Blanco and near-by Comal Counties.

James Polk Crist says in his history and the Crist family Bible that Robert's middle name was Craig after the county? The Charlton family came into the county in the late 1870s from Monroe CO WVA and William Charlton married Robert's sister Virginia Easter Crist in October of 1879 and became owner of at least part of the family farm. Robert married in 1879 and left permanently for Texas in 1881. The train stop closest to the Crist farm was later named Charlton. Did he change his middle name? Census records all list him as "Robert C. Crist." Or did 75 year old James have him confused with another grandson? I suspect this mystery will never be solved but the obituary below from New Castle seems to have the same problem.

Obit for Robert C Crist. From Scrapbooks of Agatha Ross Obituaries - in proofing. From Clyde Givens, New Castle Virginia Craig CO Historical Soc,

"Crist, Robert Craig (or Charlton), b. 01-30-1853, d. 04-21-1925 at his home at Blanco, TX. He was 72 years old. He was the son of Phillip and Mary (Trevy) Crist. His sister, Mrs. William A. (Virginia Easter Crist) Charlton, brothers Phillip Crist IV, Benjamin E. Crist and James Polk Crist, and daughter Lucy Crist, preceded him in death. Survivors: wife, Minnie Sue (Boon) Crist; sons, Charles Eugene Crist, Robert Charlton Crist II; daughters, Mrs. Patrick Neal (Virginia "Ruth" Crist) Fulcher, Mrs. Anton (Grace S. Crist) Goebel; brother, John Buchanan."

To make the confusion worse I recently received some data and photos of the graves of the Crist family in Blanco TX and Robert's tomb stone says he was born 1855 instead of 1853. but several reliable sources say 1853. I chose to believe the stone is wrong.

When he got to Texas he was well versed in farming but found the land around Blanco difficult to cultivate and so he decided to build and start a general store and farm implement store. The store was opened by 1889 and he was partnered with Charkes P. Boon. The store was called Boon and Crist Groceries and Tinware, Hardware, Watches Jewelry. It was Crist and Sons by 1911. This was the beginning of a very successful series of business adventures including a bank. post office and the courthouse. According to Grace Goebel, he brought the first auto

and telephone and many other modern conveniences to Blanco.

CRIST, R.C.-was born January 30, 1955. His wife, Minnie S. Crist, was born October 3, 1860. Mr. and Mrs. R.C. Crist were prominent citizens of Blanco County until their death. R.C. Crist died April 21,1925, and his wife died July 29,1946.

After the death of her mother giving birth to her, Grace remembers Minnie's grandmother took Minnie back to New Castle, VA to raise. Grace remembers the grandparents as Charles and Virginia however I can find no Charles and Virginia Hamilton in 1870 in Virginia and instead find Charles and Minnie Sue Boon living in New Braunfels, Comal CO TX with William and Medora. Her father had bought much land in Blanco, TX (see tax role for George and Virginia.) When Minnie's father died around 1880 her brother wanted his inheritance in cash. Minnie and her husband and new child, Charles, went to Blanco to settle the estate. She was not in good health herself and Robert decided to stay in Texas until she was stronger. They never left. They became the benefactors of the town and county. Blanco is just North of San Antonio and later became famous as the location of the ranch of Lyndon Baines Johnson, who was born in Blanco CO. In fact Ruth Crist Dyer relates that her father remembered Lyndon as an infant and he was held by his sisters while taking elocution lesson from Lyndon's mother Rebekah.

Minnie's age is an interesting phenomena. Starting in 1870 the census data says she was born in 1858; in 1880 she was born in 1862; in 1900 she was born in 1864; in 1910-1863; in 1930 -1862 and on her tombstone 1860. It is more confusing since Virginia continues on the tax roles until 1863. roo

He worked with his father in a general store, and was a founder of the Blanco National Bank in 1904. The Crist and Posey share of ownership in the bank increased rapidly over the next 20 years. Later he had hardware and lumber business, and large wool and mohair business. He remained officer of the bank until his death. Charles E. Crist passed away June 25, 1951. The first use in the family of the modern Magnus instead of the Norse Måns. Aunt Linnea Lindstrom, Otto's sister-in-law, says that Magnus was a very tall man. He was very active in the "Swedish METHODIST Church" and he had three children, "two boys and a girl." He was a carpenter and then later a contractor(census records 1920) Magnus was five years older than brother Otto. He married eleven years earlier than Otto and had his first child ten years earlier. By 1920, when Richard was nine, the 1920 census says that Magnus(56) and Augusta(62) were empty nesters. She was six years older than Magnus.(See notes on Augusta regarding age] Like Otto and Olaf, Magnus lost his oldest child. Arthur died in 1912 at the age of 22. In addition to Aunt Linnea my parents said that Otto had a brother Magnus but that they were not close.

In talking with Ruth Crist Dyer it seems that after 1922 the two families did not talk about each other; therefore, it is essential that the connection between the boys be correct and strong. Their birthdays on their death certificates and their birth and baptism parish records from Sweden match EXACTLY(see copies for both). The birth records of each confirm the same parents and the page and district (Södra Kårr) for the family in the Parish Household Census record (Husförhörslängd for Söderåkra Socken) where all eight children are found. The dates of emigration match within a year between their contracts and the dates of immigration reported in the US Census of 1900. This in census records which do not have the years of birth correct either each being off by one year. The death certificate for Magnus says his father was John Olson. Not possible! According to the Swedish naming system, his father's name had to be Olaf "something." The John and the Olaf have been reversed- John Olson instead of Olaf Johnson. The death certificate for Otto says his father was " Olaf Olson," but there is no doubt it was actually Olaf Jönsson(see Copies for both). Most Jönssons became Johnson on arrival in the USA just as Olsson became Olson. The Swedish surname change with each generation was just not understood here. The US Census of 1900 and the soundex record says Magnus and Augusta lived at 804 W. 67th St (Marquette). The City Directory of Chicago for 1895 on page 1330 says he lived at 804 and he was a carpenter. The same book page 1331 says carpenter Otto Olson lived at 804 (see copies for both pages). This is true each year until 1898 the year Otto married and moved to 6833 S. Green St. He was living there when Linnea came to Chicago in 1899 according to the ships manifest (her recorded destination "my sister Mrs. Otto Olson 6833 S. Green St., Chicago, Il." and the Chicago City directory for 1899 "Otto Olson,motorman." In 1900, Otto lived at 940 W. Marquette one block from Magnus. In 1901 Magnus and Augusta were the witness to Marguerite's (Otto's oldest daughter) baptism in The Swedish M.E. Church.(See copies of all these documents) Linnea's letter says Otto met Maria in the Choir of the Swedish M.E. Church. Her funeral was held at that church as was the funeral for Leslie, Otto's son. Linnea tells us that one of their sisters came to the USA and stayed in the East. In fact Karolina Margrette did travel with Magnus to the USA and then disappears. This confirmed by both the emigration records and the ships manifest.

Lastly in her letter, Linnea described Otto's brother Magnus's family as being active in the Swedish Methodist(she underlined the methodist) Church and having " three children two boys and a girl." Ruth Crist Dyer says that her Grandparents had the Pastor to Sunday dinner nearly every week. The only Magnus Olson with this family make up in the US Census for 1900 and 1910 in Illinois was this family. Their family plots are within 100 feet of each other in Mount Hope Cemetery. The oldest son of each man is buried there having died one year apart (1912 & 1913). The US Census of 1890 was destroyed by fire in 1921 and is no help, and neither brother was in the USA

for the 1880 census. Ruth Crist Dyer has now identified some of the photos from the Fred Waldmann Estate as containing pictures of Augusta, Magnus, Arthur, Ruth and Harry. I can identify Otto, Maria and "Pat" in the same photos. Pat, who was Ruth's piano student, kept programs, a birth announcement and a Christmas message from the Crist family. roo

Now that the family Bible has been found we know that many of the suppositions made on the basis of the census and vital records are correct. The notes which follow were written as the facts were found and in their own way they validate the family memory

Philip is present in the 1830 census with a 20-30 y/o female and two elderly people namely a 60-80 y/o male and female probably Philip Sr. and Margaret. These are not Mary Jane or her parents as they did not marry until 1844. Her father, Jacob Trevy, is found living independently in the 1830 census in Botetourt CO. In 1830 Philip is listed as Philip Crist. The 1840 census lists him as Philip Crist, Jr. and all of the females are gone and a young

male probably Benjamin and a 80-90 y/o male probably Philip Sr. live with him. (Confirmed by 1840 Revolutionary War Census)The older man is gone in 1850 and Philip, Jr.'s second wife, Mary Jane, is now listed. Just a reminder that none of these people are given names until the census of 1850.

The 12 y/o son Benjamin was listed in 1850 as the first born Crist was probably from his previous marriage. If the new marriage date is correct and I think it is because there are six years between Benjamin and James and the other six children are born in a eight year period. Benj. is not Mary Jane's child from a previous relationship as he would not have been called Crist. That was the custom at the time. We also know there was a male child in 1840.

Philip's sons are Benjamin Franklin, James Polk, Thomas Jefferson, John Buchanan.

The Philip who is reported dead of consumption in 1858 must be Jr. because we know Sr. died before 1850 and the deceased Philip in 1858 fits Jr.'s age.

There was a young couple Morris and Clarissa Caldwell living on the farm in 1850.

The Crist Family Cemetery is located on Rt. 612-613 on the north side of Craig Creek. It is at the top of the hill above the junction of SR 612 and 613 near Charlton Crossing. It is not maintained. Some of the graves are marked but many are not. The land is owned by the Murphy Family. There are several Charltons buried there also. Based on James notes there are probably between 20 and 40 souls buried there. The best contacts for it's location are Don and Pat Charlton of New Castle, VA.

Philip's will was not filed with the court but a large inventory was with some estimated value. There was no sale reported so I believe Mary Jane must have inherited all the personal and real property. It is sad the will never made it into the record although Craig County records were carried into the Courthouse yard and burned during the Civil War and many records were lost. The administrator of the estate was Andrew Mc Murtery. roo

This from the Virginia 1860 Slave Census -one older male, three teenage males and four females, one older, and three youngsters including a seven year old. Mary Jane's will was not filed with the court but the inventory and the sale of personnel property was. James P. and Robet C. Crist were executors and there was a large sale of personnel Proper held. Much was bought by James and Robert some by Thomas and much was bought by their neighbors, the Walker, Hannah and James McMurtery Family. The value of the sale was around \$2500. The property was what one would expect on a large farm in the 1850s. There was no livestock or land sold. roo

The Botetourt Artillery

In the words of the authoress Mary Johnston, the Botetourt Artillery fought all over. These three words briefly describe their four years of service to the Confederacy.

The origin of the unit dates back to 1859 when they were formed as a militia unit. This unit was among the first to answer the call when the war began. They first saw service at the First Battle of Manassas as members of Company I, 28th Virginia Infantry Regiment. In early 1862 they transferred to the artillery branch and were assigned to Kirby Smith's small army in Eastern Tennessee. Later that same year they participated in the invasion of Kentucky. In December of 1862 they received orders to move south to Vicksburg, Mississippi.

The Botetourt Artillery saw service through the entire 1863 Vicksburg Campaign and suffered grievous losses. They were actively engaged in the battles of Port Gibson and Champions Full and were in the trenches during the 47 day siege of Vicksburg. Following the Vicksburg ordeal they returned to Virginia in the fall of 1863 and were stationed in Southwest Virginia.

During the 1864 Valley Campaign they participated in the Battle of Lynchburg and were with General Early's command until December 1864. James served for two years and was Number 4 gunner at the Vicksburg siege.

In April 1865 the war ended for the Botetourt Artillery in Christiansburg, Virginia where the unit was disbanded. In all 500 men of this unit were killed, wounded or captured.

Captains included Joseph W. Anderson (to major April 4, 1863), John W. Johnston, father of the author, (to major Sept. 2, 1863), and Henry Clay Douthat.

In 1880, James is in West Virginia listed as a widower and Laura is shown by the US Census of Craig Co to be living as "granddaughter" with Archibald and Pamela Givens and three of Pamela's daughters and one son.

December 31, 1919 James writes and signs and dates the family history as he knew it. What a wonderful gift to the family. I have now confirmed 95% of the data as he remembered it. I have only found one or two errors, and then the great mystery of whether Robert was Craig or Charlton. He was certainly Charlton after Virginia. The first generation Philip is the next challenge to investigate.

Notes for Thomas Jefferson Crist:

Family rumor says Thomas was responsible for building the Eads Bridge in St. Louis. The Eades Bridge was the first arched bridge over the Mississippi River. The construction techniques were later used in building the Brooklyn Bridge. This bridge is attributed to James Buchanan Eads, one of the top five architects in the United States. He became very rich salvaging sunken cargo from the Mississippi River bottom with special ships and diving bells that he designed. He was also credited with building the first ironclad ships on the river which were used by Grant in the successful western campaign which lead to Grant becoming the General of the Union Army. The bridge was one of the first to use caissons to tie the bridge into bed rock and workers were some of the first to experience the bends during construction. He also used arched girders which allowed normal river traffic. The arches were built simultaneously from the shore and the central collums which as noted were tied to bedrock. This allowed the spans to balance each other and traffic obstructing supports were therefore not necessary either during or after construction. The bridge was started in 1867 and finished in 1876. According to the 1880 Census Thomas was still in West Virginia. It is possible this is a different Thomas Crist but the middle initial and age are about right and he is living with James P. Crist, his brother, and other members of the Givens and Eakins families. Thomas arrived in St. Louis about 1890 since he married his Missouri bride about then according to the 1900 census. roo

SKETCH OF THE HISTORY OF THE CHARLTON FAMILY

The Charltons were English born and came from the British Isles and settled in Pennsylvania about 1750. One of the family, a Thomas Charlton lived in the city of Philadelphia and in the year of 1788 made his will (dying in 1791) leaving to his Cousin, Thomas Charlton, of New London Township, Chester County, Pennsylvania, the sum of thirty pounds (English money), and his wearing apparel of every kind. About the year 1792 this cousin Thomas provided himself with an old-fashioned four horse wagon with a canoe shaped bed, (the first wagon of its kind, ever in Monroe County), loaded his wife and eight children and started the long journey from Chester County to the Greenbriar Country having to

cut his way in many places through the forest, and landing on the hill in front of now New Lebanon Church, (by the spring near the home of the George B. Irons), and built a log cabin divided by a partition of logs into two rooms.

Thomas Charlton (No. 1) was born September 11, 1741 and his wife Alice (Perry) Charlton born May 10, 1742. They were married November 20, 1763. Thomas Charlton (No. 2) born December 3, 1769, John Charlton February 13, 1771, Alice September 27, 1772, Margaret born May 3, 1771., Lettice March 9, 1776, Isabelle March 28, 1778 (married a James Humphreys In 1800), Charlton's baby born-October 2, 1780 (died unnamed), Elender Charlton's July 29, 1782. Joseph Perry Charlton (No. 2), our great grandfather, born October 2, 1781. Thomas Charlton's (No. 1) died at the home of his son, Joseph Perry Charlton's (No. 2) in 1819. This one (Joseph Perry Charlton's), the youngest child, the only one having any descendant in Monroe County, married Ja±el wing In 1807 and they had seven children. Fannie Oliver, Thomas (No. 3) our Grandfather, Jennie or Janet, Lettie, Joseph Perry (No. 3) and James E. Charlton.

The three sisters named above never married like their three maiden aunts: Alice, Margaret and Lettice.

In the will of Thomas Charlton's (No. 1) dated March 22, 1619, made a specific bequest of a pair of Spoon Moulds to his son Thomas (No 2), if his son died without heirs, then to his grandson, Thomas Charlton's (No 3), our grandfather. However they were to be used by all of his children. This Thomas (No. 2) married Mary (Rector) Jones (widow of Daniel Jones), our great grandfather. They had one son Joseph

Jones Charlton, the father of the Charltons of Summers County, West Virginia. J.

J. C.'s first wife Nancy Parker and they had three children, Tillie (the oldest), Mary (m. Silas Hinton) and Jesse Rector Charlton. His second wife was Sarah Wilson of Paint Bank, Virginia. They had ten children, namely : Ida, Nannie Lucretia, Virginia Ann , Lee ("Annie") married Madison, Martha Ellen (married Dr. Bigony), Sarah ("Sally") and Edna Lydia; 6 girls and 4 boys, William, Charles, Aldine; Thomas Edgar Charlton.

Daniel Jones and Isabelle Hunter, his first wife, were married May 30, 1790 (by the Rev. John .Alderson, Sr.), C Jane (in. Keeney), Isabelle (m. William Francis), Rebecca (m. Charles Friend).

The children of Jane (Jones)Keney were Fannie (m. Burke of Ohio), Lydia (1st m. Joseph Perry Charlton's (No. 3); 2nd in. Abram Argabrite of Greenbriar County), Isabelle (m. George W. Charlton (No. 14), Lorenza, Joseph, John and Clark Keeney. Isabelle's 2nd husband was Charles Hedrick of Alderson, West Virginia.

The Charltons settled on a stretch of land extending from near New Lebanon Church to near Hinsdale.

John Charlton lived on the land known in later years as the Joseph Parker, Jr. place, joining the lands of Thomas Charlton (No. 3), our grandfather. Joseph P. Charlton (No. 2) built a house on the land now owned by Forrest Young.

Previous to 1792, not a single Eglantine or sweet briar (so tradition says) grew within the limits of Monroe County; that Alice (Perry) Charlton's brought a package of seed with her and on top of the hill opposite New Lebanon Church, the first sweet briar bush came up,

The seed pods are yellowish -red, the rose is single pale pink and has five petals. The spoon moulds mentioned, are in possession of some of Joseph J. Charlton's heirs in Summers County, West Virginia From a manuscript provided by Don and Pat Charlton the preparer is unknown to me. roo

Notes for George Boon:

George Boon was reported to have come to this country to fight in the Civil War. There were several Boon immigrants in Bath CO VA in 1850. Whether he served in the Mexican War of 1846-1848 could not be determined. He married Virginia A. Hamilton in Bath CO in 1853 and Charles Price Boon (His wife's grandmother's maiden name was Price) was born in 1854 in Bath CO VA. George and Virginia and Charles apparently went to Blanco CO TX with William Hamilton and family about 1855. They were reported to be one of the first thirty two families in the Blanco Valley by John W. Speers another early settler in his Time line of Blanco CO. George purchased significant acres of land as his estate was large enough for his daughter and son-in-law Robert C. Crist to travel back to Blanco in 1881 from New Castle VA to divide the estate with Charles. Both of his children stayed in the Blanco City, TX area after the estate was settled.

In 1856 George Boon appears for the first time on the Blanco/Comal County tax assessment roll with 200 acres of the Thomas Webb land grant on Flat Creek, valued at \$300, 1 horse valued at \$25, 10 cattle valued at \$95 and miscellaneous property valued at \$125. His total property value in 1857 was \$535. George Boon must have been living in territory that became a part of Blanco County in 1858 since the Thomas H. Webb land grant is located east of the present town of Blanco on Flat Creek, a tributary of Martin's fork (upper or north fork) of the Blanco River. The Thomas H. Her total property value for the year of 1860 was \$808.

In 1861, Mrs. Virginia Boon appears on the Blanco County tax assessment roll with no land listed but 2 horses valued at \$150; 30 cattle valued at \$180. Her total property value was \$330.

In 1862, Mrs. Virginia Boon's name appears on the Blanco County tax assessment roll but any classification of her property was omitted.

Notes for Charles Price Boon:

Charles birth is reported in the Bath CO birth index as being in 1854 and his parents are George and Virginia. This is interesting since Virginia's father William was reported born in Bath CO. and later (1850) was living in Pocahontas County which was carved out of the old Bath CO in 1821. In 1870 he is living with William, Medora and Minnie in New Braunfels, TX. He is 15 y/o. Charles life starts off on a positive note after his grandparents and sister leave for Virginia, C. P. Boon marries F. A. McCormack in Blanco on December 5, 1877. He becomes postmaster of Blanco in 1878 Grace reports that it was Robert Crist that began regular mail deliveries to Blanco but there is evidence that that service was actually begun during the stewardship of her Uncle Charles Price Boon in 1879 and that he was postmaster for 10 years. About 1880 when his father died it was Charles' desire to have his inheritance in cash. That brought Robert C. and Minnie Boon Crist to Texas. Apparently Charles and his brother-in-law R.C. Crist opened a store in Blanco, Boon and Crist Merchandise. Charles and Phil Cage were awarded the contract to build the Courthouse in 1885. After Florence's death in 1894 Charles disappears From Blanco. I find a Charles Boon in San Antonio with a wife, Sarah and two more of Florence's children in 1910. He was born in Virginia his father, England and mother, Virginia. Charles was selling real estate. I talked with Minnie Ella Lemons and although she is starting to have memory problems she did remember Charles lived in San Antonio and he sold real estate and remarried.. She could not remember Sarah's name but was sure he remarried. In the book "Blanco County History" by John Stribling Moursund he relates Crist and Son's Hardware and Merchandise was in 1889-1890 called Boon and Crist. The store was Crist and Son in 1911. When the name changed for good is not available. What happened to Charles? Florences death maybe. roo

20, 1896 in Torås, Sweden.²³⁷. She was the daughter of **186. Anders Månsson** and **187. Anna Stina Nilsdotter**.

Notes for Olaf Jönsson:

Linnea says in her letter from 1958 that Olaf was a sailor who went to sea each spring but did not return from a trip when Otto was a child. According to Parish records he was an "owner farmer" at the time of his marriage but by Otto's baptism he was called "tenant farmer." What financial reverses he might have experienced can only be surmised, but many farms were lost because they were of such poor quality and low financial return that the farmer went deeper in debt each year. These farms were called crofts and the farmer was often called a crofter. This is also taking place with the great famine of 1866-1868 in the back ground. The famine spurred a great push of emigration.

The parish records say in 1869 he went to America and did not return. We now know that he bought an emigrant contract and left from Göteborg on June 6, 1869 with Chicago as his destination. He was traveling with Lars August age 20. We do not know who he was. The Göteborg authorities say they left on the SS Najaden bound for Köpenhalmm. The agent was Fredrick Nelson. The ship's manifest of the SS Guiding Star from Copenhagen shows Olaf Johnson and Lars August arrival on June 29, 1869 at the Port of New York (see copy of manifest). I am sure this is our Olaf. The age of both is right and the two have consecutive passenger numbers. This makes sense because they were both traveling on Olaf's ticket. The only death during the crossing according to the manifest was a two year old child. Where Olaf went from here is not known at this time but his ticket was to Chicago. There is one Olaf Johnson in Chicago in the 1880 census born 1833 in Sweden, and he is a tailor. He also was married with one child. I cannot find him again in the 1900 census. Linnea says Otto could not remember his father. Olaf's wife became a professional cook for parties, funerals and weddings and raised the children "as best she could." The "son" or patronymic surname tradition was carried through. The name Olsson is from Oleifr (Old Norse) "son of Olaf" (Genealogy Resource Center). Olsson is first apparent in the Parish census of 1880. Anton and Jöhan were identified as Olsson. The second "S" was routinely dropped after emigration by all the Swedish "sons". There was a story that the family name had been Jönsson but the story did not include which generation was involved. roo

Notes for Otto Olsson:

Otto Olsson, was born in Södra Kårr village or farm, Kalmar County, Småland Province, Sweden on January 17, 1869. He was one of eight children. In 1869 his father moved the family to town and two weeks later left for America and as far as I can tell was not heard from again. A brother died when Otto was one year old. His oldest sister died when he was two. Otto was raised in Rotavik, a village near-by. Otto left for America at the age of eighteen. Young men left Sweden for several reasons. They left because there was no hope of inheriting any land from which to make a living and they, as a result, were going to have to sign themselves into indentured status which was akin to slavery. Some went to sea and either never came back or came back and then emigrated to a new land as Anton and Jöhan, his brothers, did to Australia. As farms were divided up among the male children at the death of their fathers, the farm or croft gradually got smaller. By the 1850 to 1880 many of the crofts were under ten acres and of poor quality. It took three acres to farm and keep a cow and ten acres to keep a horse. (The Emigrants) The church had mandated that every citizen needed to learn to read so they could study for and pass exams on their entry into the state church. It was because of this that many young people learned of jobs and land available in the new world. Magnus and Otto had no hope of inheriting any land. Their father, Olaf, had been a tenant farmer and had not returned home after he went to America in 1869. It took 200

to 400 dallers(\$35.00 US) to afford the passage. The emigrants traveled to the sea coast by horse, ox drawn cart and later by train. They could take with them a trunk with what ever belongings they could pack into it. Otto, Magnus and Karolina Margrette all departed from Målmo, Sweden, and probably went either to Hull, England then to Liverpool or to Copenhagen then to New York. Depending on the point of entry they spent their first night in New York in the open in Battery Park. Linnea says Karolina Margrette apparently stayed in the East; she married but had no children. The boys took the train to Chicago. The New York Central had consolidated its New York to Chicago operation in 1878. Otto arrived safely in New York aboard the SS Hekla on July 24, 1886, and the year he arrived he declared his intention to become a citizen. This is remarkable in that he was saying he would probably never see his family again. The family members were known to feel as they said good-bye to their loved ones that they were actually attending their loved one's funeral. They would likely never see them again(The Emigrants).

The City of Chicago had been designed in 1830 when the canal from Chicago to Ottawa (Lake Michigan to the Mississippi River) was planned. and the city at each end was laid out in a grid form with major streets being laid out a mile apart. By the Chicago fire in 1871 the population was 300,000. (A Short History of Chicago) The burning of 40,000 wooden buildings was actually a stimulus to rebuilding of better, safer, fire proof buildings. Life in Chicago had its hazards. 2000 people a year died of typhus, and one out of five children did not live to adulthood. The location with lake and rail transportation made Chicago a natural as a hub from which immigrants spread out over the Midwest. By 1890 the population had grown to 500,000 and by 1900, 1.5 million. The Swedish population grew so that by 1900 there were more Swedes in Chicago than Göteborg, Sweden's second largest city. (A Review of Swedish Immigration to America) Here are some statistics for the Year 1906, one hundred years ago : The average life expectancy was 47 years. Only 14 percent of the homes had a bathtub. Only 8 percent of the homes had a telephone.

There were only 8,000 cars and only 144 miles of paved roads. The maximum speed limit in most cities was 10 mph.

The average wage was 22 cents per hour. The average worker made between \$200 and \$400 per year. A competent accountant could expect to earn \$2000 per year, A dentist \$2,500 per year, a veterinarian between \$1,500 and \$4,000 per year, and a mechanical engineer about \$5,000 per year.

More than 95 percent of all births took place at home.

Ninety percent of all doctors had no college education. Instead, they attended so-called medical schools, many of which were condemned as substandard

Sugar cost four cents a pound. Eggs were fourteen cents a dozen. Coffee was fifteen cents a pound.

Most women only washed their hair once a month used borax or egg yokes for shampoo.

Five leading causes of death were:

1. Pneumonia and influenza 2.Tuberculosis 3.Diarrhea 4. Heart disease 5. Stroke

Two out of every 10 adults couldn't read or write. Only 6 percent of all Americans had graduated from high school. Eighteen percent of households had at least one full-time servant or domestic help.

We know that Otto became active in the Swedish Methodist Episcopal Church at 66th and Normal. He sang in the church choir(Linnea).

Otto became naturalized on August 20, 1892 at the age of 21 years. We know that Otto lived and worked with his older brother as a carpenter until 1897. It is intreting that the "Panic of 1893" produced four years of depression and Otto's life made a big change as the depression came to a close. In 1897 he went to work for the Chicago City Railway Company, married Maria and moved to his own home on Green St. (Chicago City Directory 1995-1900).

Street cars were first seen in Chicago in 1859. They were horse drawn until 1896 when the horse drawn and cable cars were replaced by electric cars. The conversion was complete by 1906. At first the streetcars were owned by three different companies and because of the location of his home Otto probably worked for the Chicago City Railway which merged in 1914 with the two other companies to form the Chicago Surface Lines which became the Chicago Transit Authority in 1947.

The men who worked for the CSL were carefully screened The wages were low. In 1900 the pay was \$0.25 per hour and the men worked 10 hours per day six days a week. Young, steady, sober, married, healthy, reliable, intelligent, cheerful, neat appearing, well spoken, coordinated- these were some of the qualities CSL wanted in it's trainmen. If you were a young man applying for work on the cars your references would be carefully checked.(Chicago Surface Lines- An illustrated History)

CSL wanted nothing to do with drifters. A tough face-to-face interview with a top official followed. If you passed this preliminary screening which eight out of ten did not, you took a physical exam. If you passed your physical you had to pay a deposit on your badge and uniform. This deposit in 1898 was \$50.00 a large sum for a job paying \$0.25 per hour!!

The first day on the job was spent at a training school. The next fourteen days were spent on a street car under the eyes of an experienced motorman and conductor. If you passed a five hour exam on operating and mechanical problems at the end of this period you were assigned to a car house. Otto probably worked out of the car house at 69th and Ashland about ten blocks from his home. You were then placed on the extra list to fill in on extra runs. You might spend a year on the extra list. You did not get a pay check until you made a run. The training period was without pay.

The CSL was a semi military organization that placed many restrictions on its employees. They could not

moonlight on second jobs without company consent. They had to undergo company physicals. They could not frequent taverns even during off hours. They had to be in proper uniform at all times and they were discharged if their wages were garnished. If they were late one time they could lose their seniority. The employees were eventually unionized with better pay and shorter hours. They struck in 1913, 1915, 1919, 1921 and 1922. We know from Union buttons of the Amalgamated Ass. of Streets and Electrical Railway Employees of America that he was in the union (Division 241 of the streetcar and trolley employees) at least from 1925-1937. He also received commendations for no accidents for several years. The buttons were worn on the lapel or the cap in later years. According to his death certificate Otto worked until two weeks before his death at age 69.

Otto like his son Richard had a devilish sense of humor and there is a story of his laughing so long and hard over some crackers in his pocket that he had to stop the street car and the entire car was in tears. He must have spoken with something of an accent because in one story about the family cat stealing an egg off the stove Richard quoted him with an accent, "Yumpin' Yimini! Thärs a ghost in the House!" When you think that Otto lost two siblings, his father, his oldest son, a daughter, and his wife before he was fifty and traveled half way around the world away from the rest of his family, his stamina for living was remarkable. roo

Notes for Emelie Maria Hammar:

Maria emigrated from the parish of Tyrserum a parish just south of Norköping, Sweden. Richard's birth certificate says she was born in Norköping. We now know from parish records and confirmed by her Bible that she was born in Öster Ed Parish on the sea coast. This is a beautiful rural area which was known for logging for ship building and it has a unique church with an unusual spire. Next to the church is the Åsvik Manor. This is also confirmed by "Pat"'s notes on the birth dates and places for the family. Maria's father became a farm foreman in 1876, and she spent her formative years here. She had her first communion and confirmation on June 9 and 10, 1889 at Tryserum Church. (see her confirmation Bible) She left Göteborg on July 28, 1893 on the ship Ariosto (Police Chamber of Göteborg) bound for Hull, England. The Ariosto was the largest ship to call on Göteborg at that time and was about 2700 tons. The fare was 7# She would have taken the train to Liverpool for an additional 1# and then set out for New York. The emigrant agent was Charles A. Berglund. She arrived in New York aboard the SS Aurania, a ship built for the Cunard lines in 1883 and later sunk by the German submarine fleet in 1918. She passed through Ellis Island, according to records from there, on August 14, 1893. She then would have traveled by train from New York to Chicago. We do not know what brought her to Chicago but we do have a story from Linnea told to Karen Olson that Maria had a boy friend who was very smitten with her, and he went to the ship with her and gave her a single red rose as a parting gift. What made this young woman travel this incredible distance at age 18 is hard to imagine. Linnea tells us Maria was extremely beautiful and very intelligent. She sang in the church choir. Maria was pregnant five times, and lost two of her children to infection. Thanks to Aunt "Pat" we now have several pictures of her, her family and Magnus and his family.

Maria's sister, Alfrida age 15, came to Chicago in 1895. Her arrival is noted in the Ellis Island records and we have a picture taken of the two girls in Chicago in 1895. We do not know whether she went back or stayed and married. I cannot find any record of her marrying in Illinois or her death there. We know from the Ellis Island records that Maria paid for a ticket for her sister Linnea to come to the United States and she arrived at Ellis Island on June 2, 1899 on the SS Norge out of Copenhagen. It must have been a visit. We have records that Linnea and Axel Fridolf Hammar came to Englewood (Chicago) in 1903. (Emihamn emigration records) They arrived in Boston Harbor November 19, 1903 aboard the SS Saxonia (see photo). Their destination is to Maria's home. Maria is clearly a central figure in the Hammar family in the USA.

We know that Maria was not well after Leslie's death in 1913. In 1915 Maria and Richard and Rhomie

went to San Francisco "for Maria's health." We now know she visited her brothers, George and Axel, while she was there. In the letter from the "kids" to their sister, "Pat", from San Francisco, Rhomie says she left her dolls in Oakland, George's home. Maria was very close to her brothers, and they wrote her often and visited the family frequently considering the jobs they had. George in particular wrote to Marguerite for years after Maria's death. Maria stayed at 1123 Devisaders CT. San Francisco, CA according to a letter dated 8-1-1916.

In discussing her grandmother with Auntie Linnea, Karen Olson says Linnea said Maria was very beautiful and she had a presence and a strength about her that drew people to her. It was so strong that it suggested a nickname, "The Queen". I think you can see that in the group picture of the family. Your eyes are drawn to her.

Maria's death notice in the Swedish American newspaper in Chicago (Swedish Evening Tribune) from March 17, 1917 - "Maria Olson - wife of Otto Olson died early last week. Her funeral was held on Thursday at the Methodist Church at 66 St and Normal Court. (this was the address of the Swedish Methodist Episcopal Church of Englewood and the Minister in 1916 was E.J. Eliasson according to Kevin Lenard, the archivist of the United Methodist Church of Chicago. She was buried in Mount Hope Cemetery of Worth." Best guess is that the Swedish Methodist Church became the Auburn Park Swedish Church then the Auburn Park Grace Church then The Faith United Methodist Church 335 W. 75 St. Phone 773-783-4202.

One interesting and never explained fact of the Olson family life was the conversion of both Richard and Marguerite and later Richard's wife, Helen, a Roman Catholic, to the Christian Science Faith. How Maria's death may have influenced this is unknown but Otto underwent surgery to treat his colon cancer. roo

Notes for Corporal Nils "Norman" Peterson:

The name Norman is evidently a title or military name. In his younger years he is Corporal N.P. Norman. In the 1880s he is Nils Peterson. His children are clearly Nilsson and Nilsson. Literally the name is "north man." The military names came from the fact that the parishes had to provide a fixed number of soldier militia to defend the borders. They were given names that reflected their job, a skill, a location, etc. This was done to end some of the confusion of the "son" names. If or when the soldier was called to battle and killed the parish or farm had to provide a replacement. At times the supply of men 20-40 became so depleted while traveling in the farms and villages one would not see a mature adult male except for old men. The lineage of this relative is suspected but not confirmed. The parish is right the birth date is right the approximate date of emigration is right. The middle name is wrong. If in fact the sister's name was Beda I cannot confirm her. The next step is to see if there is a Beda Nilsson emigrating from this County in the 1880s. roo

Notes for Philip Crist II:

Botetourt (pronounced "Boat e tot" or "Boat tour")CO, VA is in the Western portion of Virginia and is in a valley which runs for three hundred miles from the Potomac River/C&O Canal, twenty miles wide, just west of the Blue Ridge Mountains, and just East of the Appalachian Mountains, to the Virginia-Tennessee border. It was named after Baron Botetourt one of the only Governors of the Virginia Colony to actually live in Virginia and he died there. A statue of him is on display on the William and Mary College campus. The Valley acted as a buffer between the Indians and the Tidewater Virginia Colonies. "Dunsmore's War" was fought at Pleasant Point Botetourt CO with the western tribes in the late 1760s and resulted in the Indians being taken out of the equation during the Revolutionary War. Many Botetourt residents were involved. Other counties which are in the valley are Augusta, Rockbridge and now Craig.

Settlement of the Counties was not out of the Tidewater Colonies but came instead from the German-Irish of Maryland beginning in 1730. James history says Philip came to Botetourt around 1780, and he settled on the Michael Toomy Farm. The first land grant to Philip in Botetourt CO is in 1799 for which Philip paid L 400. This is a very large sum and may represent "his inheritance." Philip purchased property at an estate sale for Thomas Wiers in 1813 in Botetourt, Virginia. It is hard to be sure whether Philip II or III is head of the household until 1830 but the advanced age of his parents in the 1830 and 1840 Census fits very well with the Phillip II. Two other Crists marry in Botetourt Co in the 1820s namely George and Jacob, Philip II's sons. There is also an Adam Crist. who owns land just seven miles to the East of Philip. Based on age and the location of his land and the of land to Philip, Adam may be the brother James relates. James says he was not married but I have court documents that say his wife's name was Polly.

There are many Crists in Rockbridge and Augusta Counties of "The Valley" but no Philips. These seem to be children of Johann Jacob of Maryland or York CO PA.

Once in a while God smiles on genealogists with the evidence that proves the suppositions we have made on the basis of circumstantial evidence are correct. The 1840 Census of the Revolutionary War, State of Virginia-Western District page 134, Botetourt CO (cont.) The Pensioner is Philip Crist the next Collum brings tears to your eyes because it says he is 82 years, which means he was born in 1758, and the third Collum blew me away completely because it says that Philip was living with Philip Jr. on June 1, 1840. So our supposition that the elderly couple living with Philip Jr. was Philip Sr. and Margaret is correct. This confirms our estimated date of birth in the 1750s. This also confirms Philip's participation in the Revolutionary War.

The American Revolution brought much change to Virginia, including a new state government. Because of the upheaval, no grants were made between 1775 and 1779, when an act establishing the Land Office was passed. A register, elected by the General Assembly, was to administer the distribution of Virginia's waste and unappropriated lands. This system remained the same until the mid-twentieth century.

Under the act a person could purchase as much vacant land as desired by payment to the treasurer of a fee-£40 for each one hundred acres, later changed to dollars and cents. The treasurer issued a receipt for this payment, which was presented to the state auditor, who in turn issued a certificate noting the amount of land to which the person was entitled. The certificate was then taken to the register of the Land Office, who issued a warrant, called a treasury warrant, authorizing any surveyor to lay off the quantity of land specified. There are both old (1779-1783) and new (1787-1952) treasury warrants, each series consecutively numbered beginning with one. Treasury warrants contain the name of the warrantee, the amount of acreage and money paid for the warrant, the warrant number, to whom the land was ultimately granted, the reference to the grant book and page number, and the name of the county in which the land was granted.

More than thirteen thousand acres were claimed by the Honorable John James Mound. Later on he sold his land to a large number of people including the Crists who eventually accumulated almost 5000 acres them selves.. The

Iron Mound or Craig Creek branch of the C&O Railroad passed through the Craig Creek Valley with stops at Barbours Creek, Charlton and Oriskany (Iron Mound). It had been built to bring out the iron ore in this area. The Crist farm was less than two miles from Charlton on the Craig Creek and along Rt 612&613(See the maps). The Crist Family Cemetery is on the old farm now owned by the Murphy Family.

Before the Bible was found with the 1891 translation of the old Dutch Bible by John Buchanan Crist (this Bible is listed in the inventory of Philip II's estate), I had found only five of the 11 children and only sketchy birth information, and I only knew Margaret's given name from Rachael's death notice. The Bible and James' history changed everything.

The following will is transcribed from the recorded and copied will of Philip Crist on October 2, 1843 at the November 1843 Botetourt CO Court. Philip apparently died between October 2nd and the November Court.

I Philip Crist of the County of Botetourt and the State of Virginia do make this my last will and testament in manner and form following to with,

1st, it is my Will and desire that my funeral expenses and that all of my just debts be first paid out of my personal estate.

2nd, I desire that the residue of my personal property to be equally divided amongst my children, male and female ergo: my sons, George, Daniel and Philip and my daughters, Rachael, Sarah, Polly, Peggy, Patsey and Anna. It is my will and desire that my son, Philip shall have the tract of land which I purchased of James Crawford on Craig Creek to him and his heirs forever (over and above) and that he shall have an equal share of the remainder of my estate with the rest of my children, and whereas I have given to each of my children who have left me, money, and other effects at sundry times for which I took their receipts: now it is my will and instruction that what each one has received of my estate shall be considered a part of and shall be deducted out of the legacy hereby deemed to them, so that each shall share equally in my estate with the exception of my son, Philip, as above specified.

3rd, it is my will and desire that my executor hereinafter named shall as soon as after my decease as he may deem proper sell my lands on Craigs Creek in Montgomery CO which I purchased from Kelly, and also my entry joining Jacob Lemmon and Joseph Hannah on such terms as he may think proper so as to procure the best price for the same. And the proceeds of both when collected to be equally divided amongst my children as above enumerated.

4th, it is my will and desire that the portion of my estate above devised to my daughter, Rachael, shall be vested in the hands of my executor, here with to named, for her sole use and benefit.

5th, I do hereby constitute and appoint my son, Philip Crist, executor of this my last will and testament. In witness there of I have here unto set my hand and affixed my seal this 2nd day of October 1843.

Signed Philip Crist (SEAL)

Signed and sealed and published as the last will and testament of Philip Crist in the presence of Joseph Hannah, George Goode, James Reynolds. Published in the November Court, Botetourt CO. Signed W. Robinson D. C.

The inventory is long and includes \$74 in gold, a bedroom set valued at \$4.00, numerous notes, from the Sizer, Eakin, Biggs, and Crawford families, one pair of saddle bags valued at \$1.25. His coffin cost \$5.00 and the musicians at his burial \$2.00. The total value was \$2,075 plus land.

Jacob and Elizabeth are not mentioned in his will nor is his wife who had died before 1840. Rachael may have been singled out because in 1850 Rachael Franklin is living in Roanoke, VA out of Botetourt CO. Montgomery CO is southwest of Roanoke much closer to the Tennessee border and it is somewhat surprising that Philip purchased land so far from the family farm. Philip signed his name with a flowery scroll. roo

Notes for William Hamilton:

Bath County is the confirmed site of William and Medora's marriage. The county was formed in 1791 out of Botetourt and Albermarle Counties and then later in 1821 it, in turn, was divided to make Pocahontas CO which after 1863 became part of West Virginia. There was a fairly large group of Hamilton. Charles Hamilton was William's father. In 1830 Charles has 11 or 12 children including one male which fits William's age. Remember the 1790-1840 census do not list the family members by name only their age and sex and free or slave. In 1840 Census page 16, William is living on a two generation farm next to Charles and Charles Jr. The family make up of age and sex fits our William's family at that age. Five of Charles children are gone from the household. In 1850 William is gone from Bath CO and is now found in Pocahontas CO. There are also a number of Boon families from England in Bath CO but none in Pocahontas CO.

In 1850 in Pocahontas CO (W)VA, William and Medora and the children(age) are listed. They are Virginia(15), Margaret(14), Alice(12), Mary(10), John(9), Ellen(8), Roxanna(4) and Eugena(1). He is a merchant.

In 1870 William, Medora and children, Alice, John, Rosa, Eugena and Charles and Charles and Minnie Boon age 15 and 12 are living in New Braunfels Comal CO Texas making a living trading in cattle. (Listed on page 4). Rita Steitle says he was Sheriff for a time.

William and Medora are found living in the "village" of New Castle Va in June of 1880 working as a magistrate. Alice, Rosa and son Paul, a retail grocer, are with them (ED 23 Page 19.) John B. Crist, Robert C. Crist and pregnant Minnie Sue Boon Crist are living not far away.

Rita Steitle lists "William and Medora's children as Margaret, Alice, Martha Sophia, John, William, Ellen Frances, Rose, Eugenia, Charles Atley and Paul Price. They came to Texas (to Blanco later) and he was Sheriff of the county."From Rita Posey Steitle 2006

In the book History of Highland County by Oren Morton published by the Regional Pub. Co 1985.page 357-358- Charles son, William, is said to have gone to Texas. The real question is why did William and his daughter's family, George and Virginia Hamilton Boon and son Charles Price Boon, leave Virginia and go to Texas in 1855? The first whites had settled only two years earlier. One possible answer if he was a colonel would be if he served

in Texas in the Mexican War and passed through the area. I have not been able to make that connection either for William or George Boon. What ever the reason that decision changed the history of the Hamilton, Crist and Posey families forever. Again why did he take the family including his granddaughter (Charles stayed behind in Blanco to marry Florence) back to New Castle in Virginia? One might surmise the reason for the move back to Virginia was a combination of reasons. Charles was married; his daughter was dead; he could take Minnie with him; her father may have been dead; William's life in Texas had been hard with Indians, and in the 1870s there were many robberies and murders by both Indian and white in Blanco and there was severe draught. Lastly he may have wanted to move back to the area his family was from. What ever the reason that move brought Minnie Sue and Robert C. Crist together once again changing the family history.

"By 1836 the Comanche had claimed all lands within the present boundaries of Blanco County. This hostile tribe made war on Apaches and white settlers alike, causing them to band together to fight their common enemy. Capt. James Hughes Callahan first visited the Blanco River area on his way to an Indian battle. He was apparently impressed with the land along the river and so returned in 1853 with his friend, Eli Clemens Hinds. Both men built homes on the Blanco River in 1854, thus becoming the first white settlers in what is now Blanco County. Later that year Joseph Bird established Birdtown, now known as Round Mountain, in the northern part of the county." 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"Wagenfehr Cemetery Location: South on 281 out of Blanco about seven miles. Across the highway from the Little Blanco Inn, The cemetery is about 200 yards north of the wind mill under a big oak tree. There are probably 7 graves believed to be the family of Andrew Wagenfehr, Sr.(this is one of the first 32 families in the Blanco Valley). It is believed he, his wife and 5 children were killed by Comanche Indians and were buried on their place. They do not appear on the Blanco County Tax rolls after 1859. These murders occurred about the time William became Sheriff and supports the Hamilton history published in the Pocahontas CO in 1901. Could it have been the reason William ran for Sheriff? Huckoby, Carl Koch, Joseph Reteman, Christian Schmidt, William Bruemer, Henry Rohan and Andrew Wagonfhur with their families settled on the Little Blanco. Elder Jacob Talley was pastor of the Baptist Church. John B. Tennyson of the Christian and the Blanco Methodist circuit was served by Rev. Samuel Johnson.

"I hope our young ladies will not think that at that time we were a rough, uncouth, hoosierish set. (a hillbilly or rustic; an unmannerly or objectionable person. Hoosier has had this meaning since the late 1820s.) Not a bit of it, for even in that day the ladies were well read-up on "Godey" and "Madam Demorest," and this writer saw ladies dressed in that most bewitching of all dresses, the full Bloomer style'. The men as a general thing, did not put on much style: hickory shirts with woolen over shirt, jeans-breeches with buck of goat skin leggings, a six-shooter and butcher knife, hung by a broad belt around the waist, and large jingling spurs. The Sunday dress was about the same with the exception of a calico shirt instead of the hickory. Very few had overcoats, but used their camp blankets instead. All carried six-shooters, from the cowboy to the minister; and, strange to say, there were very few personal difficulties and no quarrels, for a quarrel between well-armed men meant blood. From A History of Blanco County by J. W. Speers a contemporary of William. page 20.

The war, with all its horrors, began to be realized early in 1863. The conscript law was enforced, or rather, threatened to be enforced, which hurried some men into the army, and some few who were determined not to fight went to Mexico, while others took to the brush. In 1864 the Conscript Law was enforced, and William Hamilton was enrolling officer. He acted very carefully and managed to get all that were subject to military duty to come forward and enroll. A few were found to be seriously afflicted, got certificates of disability, and were not further molested. From Speers 1864

"Hamilton, William-in 1857, appears on the Cornal County tax assessment roll for the first time. His property included the following: 100 acres of the Thomas Webb on waters of the Blanco, valued at \$150; 1 horse, \$25; 18 cattle, \$180; miscellaneous property, \$162. His total property value in 1857 was \$517. The Thomas Webb grant which was the residence of William Hamilton in 1857, is located southeast of the town of Blanco on waters of Flat Creek, a tributary of the Blanco River. (George Boon and Virginia owned land in the same area.)

In 1859, William Hamilton appears on the Blanco Country tax assessment roll with 160 acres of the T.H. Webb land grant on Flat Creek. This is a tributary of the Martin's Fork of the Blanco and this tract was located several miles east of the present town of Blanco and was next to 100 acres owned by his daughter Virginia Hamilton Boon. In 1860, William Hamilton appears on the Blanco Country tax roll with 160 acres of the T.H. Webb grant on Flat Creek, valued at \$500; other property included 3 horses, \$150; 125 cattle, \$750; miscellaneous property, \$170. His property value was \$1570 and he paid a poll tax of \$0.50 in 1860.

In 1861, William Hamilton appears on the Blanco County tax assessment roll with no land listed but 5 horses valued at \$300; 140 cattle, \$840; 25 sheep, \$75; and miscellaneous property, \$200. His total property value in 1861 was \$1415 and he paid a poll tax of fifty cents.

In 1862, the name of W. Hamilton appears on the Blanco County tax assessment roll with no land but 6 horses valued at \$280; 75 cattle, \$450; miscellaneous property; \$420. His total property value in 1862 was \$1150 and he paid a poll tax of one dollar. At the end of the tax roll for 1862, it is shown that William Hamilton had money at interest amounting to \$600.

In 1863, W. Hamilton appears on the Blanco County tax assessment roll with: 320 acres of the J.W. Craig land grant valued at \$160; 640 acres of the W.W. Davis land grant, \$320; 440 acres of the H.H. Downman land grant, \$220; 500 acres of the Jesse R. Davis land grant, \$250; 320 acres of the Fred Grimes land grant, \$160. His total property value in 1863 was \$3530 and he paid a poll tax of one dollar. From Blanco County Families for 100 Years by J.S. Moursund 1981 Burnett Texas, page 181-182

During William's time as sheriff there were a number of murders of Confederate sympathizers as well by a group known as "bushwhackers". Also during his time as sheriff his holdings increased dramatically from \$1500-\$3500.

"This woman was the grandmother of Medora Hamilton Crist and the great grandmother of Charles Eugene Crist. Grandmother and Grandfather Crist were second cousins. William Hamilton married Medora Sabina Beard Price, whose portrait this is, on May 14,1834. She died in 1882."

"Obituary. Mrs. Medora S. B. Hamilton was born April 11th, 1813 in Botetourt county, Virginia; was married to William Hamilton May 14th, 1834; professed religion and joined the M.E. Church South when very young; she lived a consistent and exemplary member to the day of her death, which occurred November 10th, 1882 in the residence of Mr. R. C. Crist, of Blanco City. A large concourse of friends followed the deceased to the cemetery where she was buried. She leaves an aged husband and several children; to them we would say mourn not for her, but strive to meet her in that land so free from all sorrow and pain. S. A. Comer. Information about Olaf was sent to his brother-in-law, Olaf Jönsson, by the authorities in America. Olaf, however, had already left for America never to be heard of again. He was supposed to have died in Tallant City, Pulaski Co. Mo. We searched Pulaski CO and Miller CO for a burial site. The Swedish record said Tallant City but no Tallent City can be found, and no Tallant family can be found that has lived in Pulaski CO that long. The town of Swedeborg has a Swedish Cemetery which opened in 1869. We walked the markers and no Olaf or Fredrick Anderson. None listed in the official registration of graves for the county. The Miller CO Historical Society just to the west of Swedeborg has 140+ grave yards but no Olaf or Fredrick Anderson. The record says he died of "sun sting" probably sun stroke. He is probably the relative supposed to have been killed by Indians. We have found Tallent City. It was a Post Office in 1868-69 in the Northwest corner of Pulaski Co. very near Swedeborg. The town was probably a farm and or store and became Humbolt after the store keeper. It was later abandon for Croker a mile south on the railroad. There is also a Johnson Cemetery in that area.

The hand written family history by James Crist lists this generation and these details.

Lancaster and York Counties are on a direct line through Frederick CO MD to the upper "Valley" of Virginia. Despite the fact that there are Philips in Frederick CO MD who disappear from Maryland and appear in Virginia records at about the right time to be our Philips I doubt that they are in the line. The biggest reason is the statement from James that Philip II had a brother Adam. Since Botetourt records confirm the existence of Adam and that he did business with Philip and lived only 7 miles east of him and that the Philip of Frederick CO did not have a brother Adam, I am left with a little known Philip.

I recently found this Philip Christ in York County which was originally part of Lancaster CO and is across the PA/MD line and just North of the "Valley of western Virginia. No Philip is mentioned but according to James Crist's history written in 1919 Philip II was already in Virginia.

In the name of God amen. I, Philip Christ of Paradise Township in the County of York yeoman being sick and weak in body but of sound discerning mind and memory do make ordain and publish this my last will and testament in manor and form following, that is to say-First I commend my my soul into the hands of the almighty who girth and my body to the Earth to be buried in a Christian and decent manor at the direction of my executors hereinafter named And as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me with I give devise and bequeath the same in the following manor.

First my will and desire is and I do Order that all my just debts and funeral charges be fist paid and satisfied by my executors here after named as soon as convenient after my death;

Item: I give devise and bequeath to my son Adam Christ my new dwelling Plantation adjoining John Sherrick, Mathis Grafe, Daniel Reisker now in tenure of John Stauffer, John Appelman, Rudolph Spangler, John Meyer, and Elias Eister containing two hundred and eighty-six acres and twenty in peaches and the refal allowance be the same more or less to them my said son, Adam Christ, his heirs and assigns forever.

Item: I devise and bequeath unto my son Adam Christ all my personal estate out of which he has to pay to the heirs of Frederick Stober the sum of thirty pounds of lawful money of Pennsylvania to be paid when my said son, Adam Christ, youngest son John Christ shall arrive to his full age of twenty one years and in case if said son John should die before his full age he is to pay it one year after the full age of twenty-one yeas of his son Jacob Christ beginning as follows:

First to Nicolas Stober the sum of three pounds six shilling and eight pence, to Philip Stober the sum of three pounds six shillings and eight pence to henry Stober the sum of Three pound six shillings and eight pence to Adam Stober three pounds six shillings and eight pence, to Jacob Stober the sum of three pounds six shillings and eight pence, to Michael Stober the sum of three pounds six shillings and eight pence to Frederick Stober the sum of three pounds six shillings and eight pence to Goerge Stober the sum of three pounds six shillings and eight pence, to Christina Stober the sum of three pounds six Shillings and eight pence like lawful money aforesaid.

And lastly I hear by nominate and appoint my trusty friend Peter Wolf, Esquire to be my executor of this my last will and testament hereby revoking disallowing and make void all other former wills by me heretofore made ratifying allowing and holding this for form and effectual. In witness thereof I the said Philip Christ, the testator, have hereunto set my hand and seal the Fourth day of March AD one thousand seven hundred and eighty four.

The family of Charles is documented poorly in that you get glimpses of the children from many sources, census, books, marriage records, etc. In the book "A History of Highland CO Virginia, Oren Morton records that Charles children are William I who went to Texas, Gawan, Mary and Rachael." The 1830 census indicates he had 11-12 children. The 1850 Census, Charles and Alice are living on the farm with James, Margaret and Charles. In the 1840 census Charles Sr. and Jr. and William are all living on the Farm, The rest come from marriage records of Bath County. William's family fits the sex and age distribution of his family in the 1840 census which only records the sex and age of family members. In 1850 William had moved on to Pocahontas CO. The short biography of Medora and William from Pocahontas CO leaves little doubt of his roots.

"Visitors began coming to the springs of Bath County by 1750 and by the early 1800's records indicate 6,000 visitors were coming to the springs annually. An act of the Virginia assembly, passed December 14, 1790, created Bath County from the counties of Augusta, Botetourt and Greenbrier. The first court in Bath County convened on May 10, 1791, at the home of Margaret Lewis in Warm Springs, which became the county seat. Named for the English resort city of Bath, the county quickly became a national resort attraction. The soothing mineral waters that flow from our springs have attracted visitors for over 200 years

The county is rich in history and there are many period homes and buildings still standing from its early years. The Price and Beard family have been researched by several researchers including a professional genealogist . Will Johnson. I have been in contact with him and his work seems carefully done. It was found on Ancestry.com entry 59816 up date 11-30-2004. I have included it in this report. I have looked only for the first generation myself but from looking at his work it seems to be carefully done. There are also 36 researchers who have published their work on the Price family but there is no consensus on Thomas' age, place of birth and parents. To trace this back further would be major undertaking because of the lack of records in the late 1700-early 1800. I

believe there is a strong possibility he served in the Revolutionary War as did Philip Crist. He also likely had two wives. Margaret Beard being number two. Today, July 3, I spent 4 hours at the Lancaster County Historical Society searching for the Phillip Crist family in this county.

The one source that gave me a clue about this family's location was a 1749 Administration Bond for Maria Christy, relict of Henry Christy, deceased of Heidelberg Twp. (Exhibit 1). This area was originally part of Lancaster County, but became part of Berks County. Prior to this record, I found no evidence of this family in Lancaster County. A basic search of limited Berks County resources revealed:

John Adam Christ was born 1753 to John Adam and Eva Christ. Exhibit 2

Philip and Adam Christ served in Revolutionary War from Berks County, Adam being wounded in the chest at the Battle of Brandywine. Henry Christ was a commander of at least one of their units. Exhibit 3

Adam Christ received a land warrant in 1776. Exhibit 4

In 1777, Adam Christ took the Oath of Allegiance at the Lancaster County Courthouse. Exhibit 5

In 1783, Adam Christ witnessed a will in Berks County. Exhibit 6

After the War, there is no continuing evidence of Phillip Christ in Berks County. However, as you noted, there is evidence of Phillip in York County as per your notation of his 1787 will. Of interest is a burial record (Exhibit 7) of a daughter of Phillip and Anna Clara Christ. Phillip is noted as deceased by the time of the daughter's burial. The record is unclear as to the exact date of this daughter's death.

In the 1790 Census, Phillip Christ and 5 family members (3 males under 16 and 2 females) and 1 other free person are living in Paradise Twp., York County. (Exhibit 8) It is possible the one free person could be the widow of Phillip, deceased 1787.

Adam Christ, in 1790, is in Dauphin County with 6 family members (3 males under 16 and 3 females). Exhibit 9 There is no Census evidence of Adam in Berks County beginning in 1790.

I believe the families of Phillip and Adam migrated southeast from Berks County after the War.

You note in your document that Phillip III was born in Virginia in 1796. A check of the 1800 Census indices reveals this about Philip Christ (accounting for spelling variations):

Philip Crist in Herkimer Co., NY, p.120

Philip Crist in Frederick Co., MD, p. 149

Philip Crist in Franklin Co., PA, p. 909

Philip Christ in Paradise Twp., York Co., PA p. 341

I do not have access to York Co. microfilm and my online 1800 images are down as of the writing of this report. This information comes from the AIS Index CD published by Ancestry.com. It is possible that you will have to take another look at the birthplace of Phillip III.

In 1810, a Philip Christ is enumerated in Botetourt Co., VA. (Exhibit 10) He now has 11 children: 4 sons and 7 daughters. In addition to his presumed wife is one additional female over age 45. This could be the "other" free person listed in the 1790 Census and may be his widowed mother.

In 1820, the Philip Christ family in Botetourt Co., VA consists of 1 male 10-16, 1 male over 45, 2 females 10-16, 3 females 16-25 and one female over 45. Exhibit 11

This is as far as I took the Census records, due to the information and dates you already have going forth from this time period.

Conclusion:

I believe Philip and Adam have their first roots in Berks County, PA. Without creating any records in Lancaster County, they migrated directly to York County (Philip) and Dauphin County (Adam). Philip then proceeds to Virginia.

The only Christ I found with sufficient age and given name connection to be a father of these two is John Adam who fathered John Adam in 1753 in Berks County. The first name of John or Hans is common among early Germans and it was also common to drop the first in favor of the second name.

Note: While examining Christ evidence in Berks County, I saw a stream of historical documentation for one Henry Christ who held various public offices prior to and during the Revolutionary War. I photocopied these just in case there proves to be a connect down the road. How often we wish we had retained a source when we first looked at it. There is no charge for this portion of the documentation being sent to you.

In the process of this search, the name spelling variation included Phillip and Philip for the one given name. The surname covered the range of Christ, Crist, Christy, Grist, Cress, Krist, Kreiss and Greiss.

The Rosendahl name is very biblical but is a common name in Finland, Sweden and Germany. It is frequently accompanied with a biblical first name. It is not a Jewish name as all the members of the family were baptized into the Swedish Lutheran Church.

Notes for Karin Andersdotter:

The surname of the family changed from one generation to the next. This was accomplished using the "patronymic system of names." The daughter took the father's given name plus dotter. The son took the father's given name plus son. The second "S" makes the father's name possessive (the son or daughter of, in this case, Ander). The dotter is frequently abbreviated in the Swedish records as are many other terms which makes reading

them much more difficult. (Kristianopel is frequently spelled Christianopel. It is also abbreviated some times on the same page "Xianopel." This makes things more interesting because the letter "F" in Gothic script looks like an "X") Occasionally the mother had a superior position to the father and so some children took the name of the mother plus son or dotter. When the daughter married she did not take the surname of her husband but kept her old surname. This meant the surname of the family changed with each generation. There were two exceptions. If the given name of the oldest son for three generations was the same the surname stayed the same. The other was when the surname was not a "son" name such as Rosendahl, Hammar or Tollquist. These names usually had some meaning to the family: they were in the military, the location they lived in or their job. The problem with this system is that there are thousands of individuals with the same name. Middle names were used only occasionally, and when they were the individual frequently went by that name. The only way you can identify who is who is by where they are from and their date of birth. Unfortunately ages are occasionally off by a year one way or the other. The best way to sort this out is to find the individual in several records or in several places in the same record. I was very lucky in accomplishing this in many cases. Fortunately the Swedish Parish records are very redundant with some ministers being especially thorough. This system of naming was abolished by law in 1901.

THE TRUE STORY OF THE WALLACE FAMILY OF ALBEMARLE COUNTY

In the numerous genealogical essays on the Wallace Family that settled in Albemarie County, Virginia, early in the 18th century there are many different versions that have appeared at different times in different sources. All of

these have been carefully considered by the writer of these lines, and none of these accepted as being authentic, since they all contradict each other and disclose total lack of any sort of proof. One or more of them go so far as to agree that the ancestor was Peter Wallace, but that he never came to this country, or is he did that his is buried in Pennsylvania. The Peter Wallace who actually was the ancestor, is probably in some forgotten unmarked grave in either York or Warwick Counties in Virginia.

Rev. Edgar Woods, who wrote the History of Albemarle County, Virginia in 1900-50 years ago - was the grandson of Archibald Woods, and a direct kinsman of these Wallaces and he has written what we consider the most harmonious and accurate account and the shortest that appears anywhere. It appears on pages 336 and 337 of his valuable volume, and is as follows:

Three brothers named Wallace came to Virginia with Michael Woods as his sons in law, about 1734. They were Peter, Andrew and William (Wallace). Peter married Martha Woods and settled in Rockbridge County. He was the father of Adam and Andrew Wallace, who displayed great gallantry in the battle of Culford, Courthouse; the latter yielding up his life on that field. The other brothers remained in Albemarle. Andrew Wallace married Margaret Woods. His home was near Ivey Depot, on part of the Charles Hudson entry, where Charles Harper afterwards resided. He died in 1785. His children were:
