He married **(2) Catherine Zuercher** 17 Jan 1855 in Medina Co., Texas, daughter of Michael Zuercher and Catherine Romann. She was born Abt. 1806, and died 1861 in D'Hanis, Medina Co., Texas. He married **(3) Elizabeth Rudinger** Abt. 1864 in Medina Co., Texas(?), daughter of Joseph Rudinger and Maria Braun. She was born Abt. 1829, and died 24 Sep 1893 in D'Hanis, Medina Co., Texas.

Notes for Andreas Brieden:

From: Papers of Adele Pingnot Jones (1899-1972):

Andreas Brieden and Elizabeth Zuercher came to the United States about 1846 (1850 census, Vandenburg Texas) with all five of their children, all boys. They were accompanied by Leopold Zuercher, Sr (1802) and a sister who married a Gartieser. Leopold Zuercher had several children: Leopold Jr., Joseph, Alois, Christine, and Mary (who both married Ehlinger) and another daughter, Thresa who married a Mangold from LaCoste, Texas. (Jones). They

sailed the Atlantic Ocean to Galveston on the Texas coast and traveled by ox-cart through San Antonio to Castroville (Paul Brieden, a great grandson in Devine, still has the iron axle to the cart). (Ruben Tschirhart, library).

Andreas Brieden and his family came from Alsace near the town of Colmer France and settled at Vandenburg community, West of Quihi and northwest of Hondo. They farmed 20 acres on Arroyo Verde. They grew crops and raised livestock (cows, sheep, horses) (Tschirhart, library 198). The settlers arrived about the middle of the 1840's and settled along what was known as Lucky Creek, a running stream. It obtained the name from Sam Lucky, one of Jack Hay's Texas rangers. He was shot at this location by Mexicans during General Adrian Woll's retreat from Texas in 1842. Later the creek name was changed to the Verde because of the many evergreens that grew along the banks.

In the contract they signed with Castro, each married man received 640 acres plus 20 acres to be used for a garden. A single man received 320 acres plus 20 acres for a garden. These 20 acres were part of the town of Vandenburg. Many years later these lots were all purchased by Joe Decker.

One family of the early settlers all tragically died (except the mother and two small sons) when they ate a poisonous plant. Also Indians were a large threat. The settlers combined efforts and dug a large trench, about 8 feet deep, around the settlement to keep the cattle from wandering off, and also for protection from the Indians. This was known as the "Thousand Acres" located just north of the Verde Creek in the area around present Hwy 173 along the east side. The Verde Creek always had a running stream, however, following a prolonged drought, it began to dry up. Most of the settlers moved to a village which they call New Fountain and a few moved to D'Hanis (Martin, library 140).

It is thought that this is when Andreas purchased property in D'Hanis and farmed on the Seco. It was near the wagon freight haul route from Port Lavaca to Mexico. Andreas and his sons joined the wagon freight train hauling freight from Port Lavaca to Mexico and made a good living, as did Chris Batot who later married Louise. They would wait for a ship to come in, load the ox-drawn wagon and honor the consignment. In Mexico, for example, for the return trip to the coast they would gather a load of coffee and piloncillo mostly for Europe. For security they had to travel in groups or trains as protection against bandits and Indians (Tschirhart, library 197). Andreas sons had several near run in with the Indians. Two of the boys were gathering grass for a thatch roof when they spotted a group of Indians. The boys left their horses and hid in some tall grass. The Indians took their horses but didn't find the boys. They stayed hidden until nightfall and then made their way home on foot. Leopold (one of Andreas sons) had another close call when Indians began to chase him while riding one day. He rode up a hillside and the Indians did not follow. It is supposed that the Indians suspected an ambush over the hill and this allowed Leopold to escape (Tschirhart, library 198).

After they had moved to D'Hanis one day Elizabeth failed to return home from her daily trip to fetch water. She was discovered drowned in the Seco and was buried in the old D'Hanis cemetery in 1857 (1854?) (Tschirhart, Library 197, 198). The Brieden girls were very young when this occurred, Louisa was 10 or 12 and had to help take care of the other two younger

girls. Regina Brieden says she remembered as a child they put her mother's body on a wagon to haul her to the grave and that she cried most of the way on account of the odor of the corpse (Jones).

Louise being the oldest girl had most of the responsibility of the home when the menfolks were out on freight routes so when she married it was hard for the other two girls to take care of things. They lived in a low stone house with a grass roof. After Louise married Chris, they moved the older Batot's out with the two younger girls. A widow lady moved nearby, Mrs. Rieter. She had three daughters and she was a big help to the Brieden girls as she taught them many essential things of washing, mending clothing and how to cook. Then when Louisa's children arrived she taught her how to take care of the babies (Jones)

In later years Andreas Brieden married his first wife's sister, who had married a Gartieser but this was after she was widowed (Jones).

Andreas Brieden was well educated and taught his children to read and write the English language as well as the German Language. The five boys were born in Germany and all three girls born in the United States. Louise Brieden was born near Castroville in a cave after they came to the states, later they were blessed with Regina and Carolyn both born north of Hondo, what was called the Vandenburg community (Jones).

He is variously called "Andre", "Andres", "Andreas", and "Andrew", depending on whether one is looking at French, German, or American records. He immigrated with his family in 1846, as part of Henri Castro's colony which was forming in the wilderness west of San Antonio, Texas. This area later became Medina County. The Briedens settled first in Vandenburg, and later moved to Castroville.

Andrew's place of birth is/was in the Haut Rhin province of France. It is one of the provinces that make up the region of Alsace. It is just across the Rhine River from Germany. Many of the people who live in the region are ethnic Germans and do not consider themselves to be French. They speak a Germanic dialect. Many of the Alsatians who immigrated to Texas in the 1840's as part of Henri Castro's colony were of this stock. They have left their cultural imprint on Castroville, Texas, and the surrounding county.

She had to die after 1853 (after Carolina was born) and before Dec. 1854, when Andreas obtained a wedding licenses to marry Elizabeth's sister, Catherina, who was also a widow.

Notes for Theresa Pichot:

Theresa Pichot's family lived in Castroville, Medina Co., Texas. During the time that she was a teenager there had been a number of reports of Indians stealing livestock. Theresa had a

horse that she prized greatly. To make sure that her horse didn't get stolen, she would tie it to her bed with its head inside her window at night. One night something woke her. When she opened her eyes there was an Indian in her bedroom. She didn't move and kept her eyes shut. When she opened them again the Indian was gone and the rope tied to her bed had been cut. The horse was gone and she never saw it again.

This story was related to me by her great great niece, Betty Jo (Riddle) Blair.

Notes for Catherine Pichot:

Catherine Pichot was being courted by Leopold Brieden and another young man. On one occasion the three young people were on a picnic outside of Castroville. The Medina County, Texas, countryside, in 1869 - 70, was still rather wild and Indian raids were common. During the picnic, a band of hostile Comanche Indians rode up on horseback and threatened them. The other young man panicked, jumped on his horse and rode away to save himself. Leopold Brieden calmly got Catherine on her horse, mounted his own horse, then whipped Catherine's and his own to get them going. He continued whipping Catherine's horse, then his own to keep them running until they were out of danger. On that day Catherine decided which man she would marry. She married Leopold Brieden on June 12, 1870.

Notes for William Leo Brieden:

He and Alvina lived with his parents and farmed and worked the land that his mother (Theresa Pichot) inherited from her father. The 80 acres East of the Medina River. William's only brother Henry died from a gun shot wound, February 7, 1900, he was 31 years old. This left William only to tend to the farming.

They were going on a hunting trip, William, Henry, Albert Pichot (William's Uncle) and Fritz Tuerpe (William's brother-in-law, Alvina brother). They were in a wagon and Albert was sitting in front, William, Henry and Fritz sitting in the back of the wagon. Everyone unloaded their guns and then they wrapped them up in the bedding in the back of the wagon. They were way out already on the road and they were getting tired of sitting there and they either moved their bedding around or hit a bump in the road when all of a sudden a gun went off. It hit Henry in the back. The doctor said the bullet was lodged in his spine and there was

really nothing they could do. They went back to Uvalde where Albert and Mary Pichot lived, he stayed for maybe three months. Then his mother wanted him home, so they moved him home, he lived 3 years? (Alvina 1973)

William Brieden was a heavy smoker and would order his tobacco leaves from some company and they would send it to him in bulk. He would lay them out and dry it in the sun. Then he would take it and remove the stems and rub it between his hands to make it fine to be able to roll it in the little papers to smoke. He would keep all his things up on the fireplace mantel. He would get up during the night when could not sleep to smoke a cigarette (Laura Brieden 1996).

When the river was high people would be unable to cross. There was a crossing point about where the bridge is now. They would come by the Briedens house and Grandpa Brieden, Leopold, and Papa (William) would ferry them across. They would straddle the buggy across the top of the boat. Then they would come back and pick up the passengers and take them across (Carrie Brieden 1977). 6 people could fit in the boat. Grandpa Brieden (Joseph) and his brother Leopold (or Uncle Henry?, Papa's brother) built it out of cypress trees. It was very heavy and it would not turn over. When Richy and Leonard's friend would come over they would try, but could never tip it (Carrie Brieden 1973).

William Brieden died August 4, 1924 (June 24, 1931). He was horned by a bull there on the place. Carrie had gotten married and moved to Devine, she just had her first baby Vivian. Alvina (his wife) was over helping Carrie when it happened. The bull was de horned, but there were still some of the horn left. He was going to tie the bull up in a shed at night so he would not get out. He would put a chain around the horns. The bull bucked him with the horns and threw him up against the wooden pen. Alvina came home and Laura (the youngest child) went to help Carrie with the new baby. Alvina rapped up his chest, but he would not go to the doctor. They think he had broken a rib and it possibly damage a lung. He was in bed until he died. Everyone tried and tried, to convince him to go to the doctor, but he would not go. One Sunday Leonard came out and convinced him to go, probably about three weeks before he died. Dr. Williamson did send some stuff into the lab but no one really ever heard results. He was spitting up something. That left the two youngest children, Richy and Laura, at home with their mother Alvina and William's mother, Theresa Brieden (Laura Brieden 1996).

No one really kept up with the farming and ranching after William Died. Richy tried to farm, but could not really keep the farm and ranching going. He finally went out and started doing other work. Some of the land was sold to the DeCocks and Karms (Laura Brieden 1996).

Notes for Alvina Marie Tuerpe:

Her parents settled in the Haby settlement, the Rio Medina area. She went to school in Rio

Medina where the Rio Medina store is now located, San Geronimo School (Photo pg 36 library 1898-1899). Alvina went to school until she was 16 years old. Both of her parents were Lutheran and they went to the Lutheran church in Castroville (Alvina Brieden 1973).

She had 3 older brothers, Alvina was the baby. She was 10 years younger than the youngest brother. Henry, Fritz, and Albert, 10, 12, 14 when she was born. As soon as she started to walk she did everything she could to keep up with her older brothers. She loved to horse back ride.

She met William Brieden in school. He lived with his parents in Castroville on the Medina River. William Brieden was Catholic religion, all the Briedens were. People were not against them getting married, but they had to get married by the county judge because they were of different religions. They were married in San Antonio on Oct. 10, 1900. William and Alvina took a wagon to San Antonio and returned to live with William's parents, Joseph Brieden and Theresa Pichot until they both died. Theresa was 90 when she died, Joseph died 7 years before her.

(they cant stay in the house all alone, moved to San Antonio between New Years and Christmas moved to San Antonio in 1900 until got married in San Antonio??).

They had 5 children: Alice, Carrie (Carolina), Leonard, Richy, and Laura, all within about 10 years. All 5 children were baptized and received communion as Catholics. The family got along fine, Alvina went to the Lutheran Church, William went to the Catholic Church. All the children were raised in the Catholic Church. Alvina did start going to the Catholic Church but not until later.

It was when one of her grandchildren were making their first communion in 1951, there was a party. She called all the children together at the party to tell them she wanted to become Catholic (Father Lenzen), she was 73 years old at the time. They were all very happy and she was then baptized. Arliss Schott and Patsy Brieden were her sponsors (Alvina 1973).

Alvina and all five children were traveling in the carriage being pulled by mules. Suddenly two bicyclers came by and scared the mules. This turned the carriage around, broke the harness and the mules got loose. Alice kept wanting to jump out, she was always the scared one. Her Mama, Alvina, kept saying, "Keep seated! Keep seated!" They finally slowed down and stopped at the bottom of the hill. They had to walk back home, Alvina was not worried, she knew the mules would be come back. They borrowed a carriage from the Noonans because William was expecting to meet the family at Alvina's parent's home, Richard and Carolina Tuerpe, he had gone in ahead to pickup some grain and feed for the cows. Alvina really knew how to drive the team and she did all the way. Willam was getting worried and when they did arrive, he noticed they had a different team and carriage. The family told him what had happened (Carrie 1977, Laura 1996).

The family would have to cross the river to go to the doctor, or fetch the doctor (Dr. Fitzsimon) and they would have to pick him up and bring him across. When Laura was still a baby, she became sick. He checked her over and told Alvina, she had diphtheria. He told her to take her home, if she lives through the night, she will be okay. It was probably the longest night of Alvina's life, but Laura made it (Laura Brieden Mangold 1996).

Carrie and Alice were at the river one time and Alice was trying to punch a log away. The

stick slipped and she fell in the river. Carrie ran to the house yelling, "Mama! Mama! Alice fell in the river! Alice fell in the river!" Alvina ran back with Carrie and she reached a limb to Alice and pulled her out. None of the girls could swim, only the boys learned how (Carrie Brieden Schott 1977).

Alvina did most of the cooking along with working out in the fields. It was rare that Theresa Brieden cooked. The children would bring the cows in from the pasture and milk them. Some household chores consisted of turning the separator to separate the milk from the cream and washing dishes in a dish pan, since they did not have running water in the house. There was a well, a windmill and a tank near the home. The water would have to be pumped. When the girls were older they helped wash the clothes. They would boil the white clothes in a large kettle. Hominy was also made in large kettle, it was cooked until soft and the hulls would come off. The hominy was then wash it real good. The family would also make their own cottage cheese (Schott 1977).

Alvina's children loved cream and molasses with a little bread. "When Grandma Brieden would go visiting, Mama (Alvina) would get a little bowl of cream out for us. She would say, 'Hurry before grandma gets home.' It was a real treat. Grandma Brieden rarely allowed us to eat the cream or butter, only on special occasions. Grandma Brieden went visiting a lot. She was always making Grandpa hook up the carriage for her. Along with her dairy good that she went around town selling, she also had a large vegetable garden. We would have to haul water out there in the wagon. It was pretty rocky out there." (Schott 1977)

They would always cross the river to go into town, even to go to the frequent dances held at Wernette's Garden, top story of the Tondre Store, or in the town square. "Grandpa Brieden and Papa Built steps over the fence so we would not have to go over or under the fence. We would take a lantern with us and leave it on the steps so we could see our way home. Mama would always take Alice and I and we would always stay till the end. Later when Leonard was 15 or 16 Mama stayed home and he started to go with us. Mama would make us dresses. Always a new one for the big dances, especially the 25th Celebrations. Lots of lace, puffy sleeves, and a sash. We would wear patent leather shoes with a strap, usually flat heels. Mama would dress Alice in blue and me (Carrie) in pink. In the Winter it would be the dark blues and reds, and then in Summer it would be the lighter shades." (Schott 1977)

The Briedens would have all kinds of people staying in the house with them during the 25th Celebrations. It usually went on for several days. The family would have to kill a handful of chickens to feed everyone.

The youngest brother, Albert, moved to Ballinger after he got married, then he moved back down to Atascosa. Henry lived in San Antonio, and Fritz he lived out in Denton.

Carrie & August went to Elsie and Alfreds to meet the boys after they got out of the Service - They road a train to Calif with the Baumls

He was born 22 Jul 1875 in Oakwood, Leon Co., Texas, and died 13 Feb 1956 in Arlington, Texas.

Notes for Lilly Elizabeth Brieden:

Lilly was the sixth of nine children born to Catherine Pichot and Leopold Brieden between the years 1871 and 1885. One of the family stories to come down to us about her is that her parents allowed each of the older children who were in the family when she was born to give their new baby sister a name. Then her mother named her Lilly because she was "white as a lily". Thus her full name: "Lilly Lenora Mary Annie Elizabeth Brieden". This story was related by her daughter, Hylma (Looney) Riddle.

When we were little, our grandmother (we called her "Inday Looney") taught us a children's poem in German. This poem was taught to her by her father, Leopold Brieden, when she was a little girl. It was apparently something that he remembered his parents reciting to him. They had brought their family to the Castro Colony in Medina County, Texas, from their home in the Alsace region of France. She would recite the poem to us in German, laced with the Alsatian dialect.

It sounded to us like this: "Iklepty gross,
 Iklepty klein,
 Iklepty vee
 Ein kleiny Shvine."

In German, it's: "Ich lieb' dich gross,
 Ich lieb' dich klein,
 Ich lieb' dich wie
 Ein kleine Schwein."

Translated literally, it says: "I love you big, I love you small, I love you like a little pig."

Back before anyone had air conditioning, Inday had a unique way of cooling down rooms in her house during the heat of summer. In the rooms that she wanted to cool, she would put up several strings like clotheslines a little above head height. Then she would drape wet cup towels over the strings. She would then direct an electric fan to blow air over the wet cup towels. The effect of the water evaporating from the wet towels would actually cool the room down. The difference would only be a matter of about 2 or 3 degrees, but on a day when it was over 100 degrees outside it felt wonderful to walk into her cooled living room.

Notes for Edward Hardin Looney:

Edward Hardin Looney was about five years old when his father died in 1879. His father,

James W. Looney was almost 70. Edward and his sister were sent to live with their half-brother Fredrick B. Looney. Their mother, Mary Rushing, "a little red-haired school teacher" had died soon after the birth of Ed's sister, Frances Mae, in 1876. Fredrick B. Looney was 38 years older than Ed. The presence of a tiny half-brother and half-sister in the household apparently created a lot of resentment. Their mother was younger than their oldest half-sister. Several of Ed's and Mae's half brothers and sisters lived in the same household at the time. Fredrick B. was a doctor and Ed called him "Bud Doc". Fredrick's wife was Martha Ann Arnett and Ed called her "Sis Annie". A half sister, Susan Looney, was "Sis Sue", and another half brother, William Riley Looney, was called "Bud Will". He may have called them "Bud" and "Sis" because he couldn't yet say "brother" and "sister" when he first knew them. Ed's older half brothers and sisters called him "Eli" and called Frances Mae "Fannie". Ed and Mae are referred to in the 1880 U. S. Census by those names. He was known to some of us as "Indaddy Looney".

Ed was not treated well. He was evidently punished often and brutally. His punishment was usually being picked up by the scruff of the neck and the seat of his pants and having his head banged against the wall. When he was about 10 years old he ran away and went to work as a water boy on the railroad. He never returned home but he would leave messages secretly to his sister in a gate post at their house in Oakwood, Leon Co., Texas.

He went on to become a railroad engineer for the old Trinity and Brazos Valley Railroad, which later became part of the Great Burlington Route. In the early 1900's he was sent to Mexico to assist in training and organizing the fledgling Mexican railway system.

Teague, Texas, in Freestone County, was a hub for the railroad systems running through the central part of the state. After the birth of their second child, Hylma, Ed and Lilly (Brieden) made their home there. They raised their family in Teague until 1920 when they moved to Fort Worth, Tarrant Co., Texas

Ed had a bad temper. On one occasion a federal inspector climbed up onto Ed's locomotive to look around. Ed didn't take kindly to this and kicked the man off the locomotive, knocking some of his teeth out. For this he was fired and was denied his retirement pension from the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

Ed, or "Indaddy Looney" as we knew him, was a Christian Scientist. At about the age of 60, his feet got tangled in some vines while walking through his garden. He fell and broke his hip. He refused any medical help on religious grounds. His hip never mended and he was hobbled for the rest of his life. He could never walk again without the help of a crutch or a cane. He refused to stay at home and become a burden to his wife, Lilly (Brieden), so he moved out of his house and into the Home for Aged Masons in Arlington, Texas. He spent the last 20 or so years of his life in the Masonic Home. He is buried in Rose Hill Cemetery in Fort Worth, Texas.

When she was a child, friends would come down to edge of river and yell for them to come get them. They would all go boat riding on a Sunday afternoon. They would take a quilt and knock down wasp nest and then duck under the quilt. All the kids friends loved to come over

and go riding in the boat.

I was holding a calf while Mama was milking it's mother. I tied the rope around my waist while I was waiting and was playing with a stalk of corn silk. Suddenly the cow started to go into the pen and the calf followed, dragging me through the pen. One of the Pichot cousins was loading hay so he jumped down and over the fence and caught the calf.

I met August at a dance I would guess. I had seen him before at church. He was nice looking and dressed well. He also played in a band at dances sometime, he played the trumpet.

My daddy died, William Brieden, after I had gotten married. He was horned by a cow there on the place. It was right after I had Vivian, we were still living in Devine. Mama was over helping me when it happened. The Bull was de horned, but there were still some of the horn left. It butted him up against the wooden pen. Mama did rap his chest up, but he would not go to the doctor. Everyone tried and tried, but he would not go. He eventually got sick and died. Aug. 4th, 1924.

Mama lived until she was 99 years old, she died March 24, 1977. We always had a pretty large family reunion to celebrate her birthday every year. They still try to have the reunion around the time of her birthday (September 13, 1877). (Carrie Brieden Schott 1977)

The family would get together for pecan thrashing. Your Dad and the uncles would thrash the trees with long poles to knock the pecans down and then everyone would help pick them up. We had lots of pecans trees at the house here and even when I was growing up, Papa planted a handful of pecan trees down by the river.

Saturdays I would make homemade noodles. I would have them all dried and be cutting them to start cooking when you would come in with your Dad. Even raw with all the flour over them, you would have to taste one. And of course you always found your way to the cookie jar. It was usually filled with molasses and sugar cookies ready for you to eat.

He would come home for lunch every day. When Jimmy was old enough he would work at the store on weekend bagging groceries and stocking shelves.

Also bought a ranch out near Devine. August would go out there frequently to work the cattle and make sure the windmills were running properly. August bought the ranch from his dad for \$20.00 an acre.

When August was a boy he would ride a donkey to get the mail when they lived in Devine.

August was a business man. Well liked in the community. He went to college in 1919 and 1920 for business. August joined his brothers (Willie and Joe) and formed a band and played at dances and other occasions, until Joe and Willie were inducted into the services during World War I. In 1923 August served as director of the 1st orchestra ever formed in Devine.

He began selling Fords for Adams Company Garage and continued to do so until 1922, this is when he started bookkeeping for Loggins & Lilly in Devine. He worked there until Jan 1, 1927 when he went into partnership with his brother Joe, to form Schott Brothers in Castroville. He continued until Jan 1, 1948 when he then bought the store in Rio Medina. Kenneth Hans joined the business and it became known as Schott & Hans Red and White. August served as postmaster until Jan 1, 1949 and then served as assistant postmaster. Feb. 5, 1966, the store was sold to Albert (Satch) and Vivian Beck.

Served in World War 2 as a radioman/gunner on an SBD dive bomber. He served on the USS Enterprise from about January 1943 to 1944. He had the rating of Aviation Radioman Second Class (ARM2/c). The Enterprise was the most highly decorated ship in the Navy during the war.

He came aboard the Enterprise, to the best of my recollection, when Air Group Ten relieved Air Group 6 sometime in Sept. or early Oct. 1942. I was already aboard and was awaiting the arrival of AG-10 so that I could come onto flying status. We had no spare pilots until AG-10 arrived. Sammy stayed with VB-10 (Bombing Squadron Ten) for the rest of that cruise and returned to the States in April 43. The Enterprise went into the Navy yard at Bremerton for repairs etc and the Air Group went to Naval Air Station, Sand Point (Seattle) to reorganize and train. When the Enterprise left the yards, we came back aboard and spent 3 more months in training in Maui. Then back on the Enterprise and the start of the Marshalls invasion as well as several more invasions such as New Guinea, Palau, etc as well as many missions against Japanese land bases and the Japanese fleet. We finally returned to the States again in July 44. That's when I lost track of most of the radioman/gunners, they going in all directions to form new units.

I had heard at one of the reunions that Sammy had gone back to Texas and nothing else. I knew he flew with Wiggins on the second tour but can't remember any more details. I am pretty sure he was not at Pearl Harbor during the attack. Believe he was still in radio operator school.

I have a few photos with Sammy in them and will look for more and send them to you to make copies if you like. Also I don't remember anything about a water landing crash altho it might have happened because water landings were pretty common. I myself flew missions from the Enterprise over 60 times, some bombing, some search and other misc. missions and I guess that was about normal for two combat tours. I never got shot down but did have AA damage a few times. (The above paragraphs are from an email message from Jack Glass ex ARM1/c on 10-6-2007)

Eddie or "Bub" graduated from Carter-Riverside High School in 1943, at the age of 16. When he turned 17 in September 1943, he entered the V-12 program at TCU in December 1943. The V-12 program was designed to give early training to future Navy aviators during World War 2. The V-12 program lasted for 3 semesters. He was then sent to pre-flight school at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. This pre-flight school closed after V-E Day and they sent all cadets to St. Mary's pre-flight school in California. He was there on V-J Day. He was sent to Primary flight training at Memphis, TN. He went through Intermediate Flight Training at Corpus Christi, TX. He went to Advanced flight training at Pensacola, FL, where he learned gunnery, aerobatics, formation flying, instrument flying, carrier qualifications. He graduated and received his Navy wings and commission as Ensign in April 1947.

He received Operational Training at NAS Milton, FL, near Pensacola, then was

assigned to an operational squadron based in Hawaii, flying 4 engine transports worldwide - all over the Pacific - the Philippines, China; Shanghai, Peking, Nanking, Tsingtao, etc. He flew co-pilot in a VIP squadron (all admirals and Congressmen). He flew Ambassador Stuart out of Peking just before the Chinese Communists moved in early in 1949. He flew Madam Chang Kai Shek out of Shanghai when she went back to speak before Congress to plead for more money. The Berlin Airlift started and he tried to get into one of the Navy squadrons flying there. He was assigned to a big squadron in Patuxent River NAS flying to Frankfurt, Germany, in support of the Airlift. He also flew missions to France, England, Morocco, and the Azores, etc. All of his flying was in 4 engine transports (DC-4's) called R5D's in the Navy.

He was released from active duty and returned to school on the GI Bill. He attended SMU and studied pre-law beginning in September 1949. He entered SMU Law School in September 1950. He was in the first semester of his senior year when in December of 1952 he was recalled to active duty as a Lieutenant Junior Grade for the War in Korea.

He was assigned to a big Military Air Transport Service (MATS) squadron at Hickam AFB, Hawaii. They were flying Lockheed Constellations (Connies) and Bub flew as Plane Commander. They flew all over the world, including Tokyo, the Philippines, Saigon, Bangkok, Calcutta, New Delhi, Karachi, Pakistan, Dahrhan, Saudi Arabia, etc.

In 1956 he was transferred to McGuire AFB flying to Europe, Panama, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, Thule, Greenland (above the Arctic Circle). He was promoted to Lieutenant Commander in 1962 and transferred to NAS Floyd Bennett Field, near JFK Airport on Long Island, NY, to train weekend reservists in 4 engine transports. In 1965 he was assigned to NAS Dallas, TX, to do the same thing. He had several trips with these reserve squadrons over to Saigon and Danang during the early part of the Vietnam War.

He retired February 28, 1967, at the age of 40. He went to work the next day for American Flyers Airline at Ardmore, OK. After 3 years American Flyers went bankrupt and the next day he went to work for McCollough International Airline. McCollough moved the London Bridge in pieces from London to Lake Havasu, AZ. Bub flew Connies, Lockheed Electras, DC-8's, and Boeing 727's with the civilian airlines. After McCollough he flew for Air Freighters Int'l, Span East Airlines, Fleming Int'l Air (they did contract hauling for UPS and Flying Tigers Airline). His last ten or so years of flying was with Emery Airfreight flying 727's. Almost all of his civilian flying was as plane captain. He retired in accordance with FAA regulations at the age of 60 in September, 1986.

He retired with a total of 30,000 flying hours and they were as he put it "HOURS AND HOURS OF SHEER BOREDOM INTERSPERSED WITH BRIEF MOMENTS OF STARK TERROR".

Riley, Jr. was a teenager when World War 2 began. He joined the Army after graduating from Carter-Riverside High School.

After boot camp at Fort Wolters, Texas, he was initially assigned to the Army's Army Science Training Program (ASTP) to study electrical engineering at Massachusetts Institute of

Technology (MIT). His army service number was: 18218388. Early in 1944, due to severe manpower needs and to aid in the buildup in preparation for the invasion of Europe, the ASTP program was drastically cut back. Riley and thousands of other soldiers were reassigned to various combat units. Riley was assigned to Headquarters Company of the 193rd Glider Infantry Regiment (GIR) of the 17th Airborne Division (AD). He was a radio operator. He underwent combat training at Camp Forrest, near Tullahoma, Tennessee. His unit was shipped to England in August of 1944, for more training.

While his Division was still training, the Germans launched a huge counteroffensive through the Ardennes Forest in Belgium. This counteroffensive became known as "The Battle of the Bulge". The 17th AD was hastily deployed into Belgium and in a little more than two weeks was seeing combat for the first time.

Riley saw his first combat about January 4, 1945, about 10 miles southwest of Bastogne, Belgium. This was the southern shoulder of the "Battle of the Bulge", which began December 16, 1944 and lasted through the month of January, 1945. Because at some point he was pressed into service as an infantry rifleman he earned the Combat Rifleman's Badge. He was later awarded the Bronze Star for actions during the battle.

The following is from the "Combat Chronicle" of the 17th Airborne:

"The 17th Airborne Division was stationed in the United Kingdom from 25 August to 23 December 1944. From 23 to 25 December, elements of the Division were flown to the Reims area in France in spectacular night flights. These elements closed in at Mourmelon. After taking over the defense of the Meuse River sector from Givet to Verdun, 25 December, the 17th moved to Neufchateau, Belgium, then marched through the snow to Morhet, relieving the 28th Infantry Division, 3 January 1945. The Division entered the Ardennes campaign, 4 to 9 January, at the Battle of Dead Man's Ridge. It captured several small Belgian towns and entered Flamierge, 7 January, but enemy counterattacks necessitated a withdrawal. However, constant pressure and aggressive patrolling caused the enemy to retreat to the Our River. On 18 January, the Division relieved the 11th Armored Division at Houffalize, pushed enemy remnants from the Bulge, and seized Wattermal and Espeler, 26 January. Coming under the III Corps, the 17th turned toward Luxembourg, taking Eschweiler and Clervaux and clearing the enemy from the west bank of the Our River. Aggressive patrols crossed the river to probe the Siegfried Line defenses and established a limited bridgehead near Dasburg before being relieved by the 6th Armored Division, 10 February. A period of reequipment and preparation began. Taking off from marshalling areas in France, the 17th dropped into Westphalia in the vicinity of Wesel, 24 March. Operation Varsity was the first airborne invasion over the Rhine into Germany itself. On the 25th, the Division had secured bridges over the Issel River and had entrenched itself firmly along the Issel Canal. Moving eastward, it captured Haltern, 29 March, and Munster, 2 April. The 17th entered the battle of the Ruhr Pocket, relieving the 79th Infantry Division. It crossed the Rhine-Herne Canal, 6 April, and set up a secure bridgehead for the attack on Essen. The "Pittsburgh of the Ruhr" fell, 10 April, and the industrial cities of Mulheim and Duisburg were cleared in the continuing attack. Military government duties began, 12 April, and active contact with the enemy ceased, 18 April. The Division came under the XXII Corps 24 April. " End of the Combat Chronicle.

The following six paragraphs are World War II anecdotes that Riley, Jr, told to me around June or July of 1951.

His unit was walking down a road when a German fighter plane strafed the road. Everyone was ordered to "hit the dirt" on either side of the road. Everyone did except for him. He froze in the middle of the road. The fighter fired its machine guns. The bullets chewed up the road on either side of him, but missed him. When the plane was gone his buddies gathered around him slapping him on the back and congratulating him on his bravery. It was only then that it dawned on him what had just happened. He said that his knees began to turn to jelly and he almost fainted.

He told me once that at the height of the battle his unit was run out of a small village (Flamierge?) by a big German counterattack. They had to abandon their vehicles and run for their lives. He said he could hear the German soldiers at the other end of the village laughing at them and shouting in English, "Come back, come back."

Another story he told me was that at first he was armed with an M-1 Carbine, a small, light rifle which fired a .30 caliber cartridge not much larger than a pistol bullet. He threw it into some bushes and picked up an M-1 Garand Rifle which was larger, heavier and fired the much more powerful .30 '06 cartridge. He carried it for the rest of the war.

In another story he told me that at one point he knew that he was about to die as he lay in a ditch during a German mortar attack. He said that the shells were hitting not three feet from where he lay. He said that he just knew that the next one was going to hit him. But he survived without a scratch.

During an artillery attack they were in trucks. Everyone jumped out of the trucks and ran for the ditches. When he was asked why they didn't crawl under the trucks for protection, he smiled and said that if the trucks had been hit the trucks' gas tanks would explode spewing burning gasoline everywhere.

His unit was on patrol when a sniper in a tree took a shot at them. Riley told me he raised his M1 and fired about 4 rounds towards the tree. They later heard a crashing sound like a body falling out of the tree. He told me that was the only time that he really thought he might have killed an enemy.

His regiment suffered such heavy casualties during the Battle of the Bulge that the 193rd GIR was disbanded and the survivors were assigned to other units. On March 1, 1945, Riley, Jr, was reassigned to the 517th Airborne Signal Company, repairing radios. A month or so later he was transferred to the 82nd Airborne Division (AD). He was with the 82nd during their occupation of Berlin. His only injury in the European Theater was during the occupation, he was walking barefooted and stepped on a rusty tin can. It cut his foot open. He also contracted yellow jaundice (hepatitis). They returned to the US aboard the the ocean liner Queen Mary late in 1945.

He marched with the 82nd AD in the Victory Parade on January 12, 1946, in New York. He was discharged from the Army and returned home a few weeks later. He was discharged from

the Army with the rank of T-5 (technician 5th class), which is equivalent to the rank of corporal.

After the war he graduated from TCU with a Pre Med degree and received his MD degree from the UT Medical School at John Sealy Hospital in Galveston, Texas. He served his internship at John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth, Texas. He opened his medical practice in Alice, Jim Wells Co., Texas, in the early 50's and was there for about 10 years. For several years before his death he was Public Health Officer for Jim Wells County. He patented a carrier for weighing babies, patent number 2931640. During the Korean War the Army offered him a commission with the rank of Captain if he would join the Army Reserve Medical Corps as a doctor. He would be assigned to the Brook Army Medical Center at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, Texas. He said he had seen enough blood and gore during WW2 for two lifetimes, so no thanks.

He was killed in an automobile accident returning to Alice from seeing a patient in San Diego, Texas, in May of 1963. He is buried at Mt. Olivet Cemetery in Fort Worth, Tarrant Co., Texas.
