2. JOHN N.² SHARKEY (EDWARD¹) was born November 04, 1832 in Ireland, and died February 14, 1928 in Council Bluffs, Pottawattamie Co., Iowa. He married ELLEN BODKIN Abt. 1866 in Ireland, daughter of AUGUSTINE BODKIN and MARY WADE. She was born June 01, 1846 in Ireland, and died November 13, 1922 in Oak Twp., Mills County, Iowa.

Notes for JOHN N. SHARKEY:

John, his wife Ellen, and their six children (Kathrine, Patrick, Charles, John Jr., Mark, and Mary) were born in County Galway, Ireland. They emigrated to the U.S. Abt. 1885 (thought to be New York). From there they moved to the Trenton, Missouri area where they had four more children (twins Michael and Julia, Delia, and Frank).

The 1900 Federal Census shows John N. Sharkey renting a farm in Lincoln Township, Daviess County, Missouri. Also living there in 1900; wife Ellen; son Patrick (farmer); son John (laborer); son Michael (in school); daughter Julia (in school); daughter Delia (in school); son Frank (in school). All of the ages are wrong on the 1900 census and so is the year that they immigrated. In those days, immigrants sometimes would hide from census takers, or lie about their age or the year that they entered the country, because some had not been naturalized or that they were paranoid about being deported.

Mark died in 1897 at about 18 or 19 years old, 3 years before the 1900 census. The headstones, both in Missouri and in Iowa, show the actual years that they were born.

By 1900, Mark was Deceased, and Charles, Katherine, and Mary did not live at home. Mary was working as a servant for the Lovell family of Sugar Creek Township, Harrison County, Missouri. Katherine (Katie) was working as a servant for the Slatten family in Jackson Township, Daviess County Missouri. Also working for the Slaten family as a servant (farm hand) was a young man named Daniel Benton Papineau (spelled Popino in the census). Daniel would soon become Katie's husband.

In the early 1900's there is a picture of the twins, Michael and Julia, taken in Paxton, Nebraska. Perhaps the entire family moved together, since it's known that Daniel, Katie, and baby Marie lived near Valentine in 1906.

Sometime before 1910, John and Ellen, with the rest of their children that were still living with them, moved to a farm near Crescent, Iowa. John, Pat, John Jr., Mike, and Frank all worked the farm, while Ellen and Julia kept the house and took care of Delia. In 1912 the family had moved to an area called "Pony Creek Hollow", Oak Twp., Mills County, Iowa. The youngest son, Frank, then 27, had rented a farm that he and his father John (88) were working. Living on the farm also was Frank's mother, Ellen (74), his brothers Patrick (53) and John Jr. (48). Both boys were working on neighboring farms for a wage. Sister Julia (33) was working as a housekeeper for a town family and sister Delia (31) stayed at home. According to this census, all the family members that were born in Ireland had still not been Naturalized. The family; except for Julia, who had married and was living in Texas, moved back to Council Bluffs in 1924.

Ellen died in 1922 in Oak Township. She was taken back to Missouri for burial next to her sons. After Ellen's death, John (89 when she died) moved back to Council Bluffs and lived with his daughter, Mary and her husband C. Will Stokes in 1924. When John died at the age of 95, he was living with his daughter, Julia McDonald, at 154 Marion Ave. After his funeral in 1928, his body was taken back to Trenton, Grundy County, Missouri to be buried in Saint Joseph Cemetery, near Trenton, next to his wife Ellen, and their sons, Charles and Mark.

Notes for ELLEN BODKIN:

Taken from "HARDIMAN'S HISTORY OF GALWAY--An alphabetical list and concise account of the ancient families of Galway":.....BODKIN

The Bodkins of Galway, and the Earls of Desmond and Kildare, were descended from the common ancestor, Maurice Fitzgerald, Lord of Windsor, and one of the first invaders of Ireland, under Strongbow. His son, Thomas Fitz Maurice, acquired ample possessions in Munster, where his descendants became Earls of Desmond. Richard, the son of Thomas, about the year 1242, held considerable properties in Connaught, under Richard de Burgo, and Thomas, his son, was the ancestor of the Bodkin family. This family name originated, according to tradition, from a victory gained by their great progenitor, Thomas Fitz Richard (about the year 1300), over a valiant Irish knight, whom he encountered in single combat, and having, in the conflict, made use of a short spear or weapon, in Irish called, a Baudekin, he was, from that circumstance, surnamed, Buaidh Baudekin, of the victory of the Bodkin, which name was afterwards retained by his descendant. Whatever doubt may attend this traditionary relation, none can exist as to the origin and descent of he family, which are fully ascertained by the testimony of antiquaries, by ancient stone sculptures and monuments, still remaining, and from the genealogies of the Geraldines, whose arms the Bodkin family bore for many generations, and whose motto, Crom aboo, they retain to this day. Henry Bodkin, the son of Thomas, was Clericus ville in the reign of Richard II, at which time, there was a street of lane in Galway, called Baudekyn's lane. They were then possessed of large properties in and about the town, particularly at Newcastle, near the reive; and at Athenry, Toherskehine, Ballynameathagh, Kilcornan and Parke. At present the principal families of the name, are those of Annagh, Carrowbeg, Castletown, Kilcloony and Thomastown.

Notes for JOHN N. SHARKEY, JR.:

Brother to Katie:

John Jr. came to Council Bluffs, Iowa with his parents. Sometime in the middle 1930's, John was in a serious car accident. He was riding with his boss in a car, south east of Council Bluffs, when the car hit the back of a truck. Someone called his brother Mike and said that he had been killed. Mike came to Council Bluffs, he found him in the hospital, not dead, but in critical condition with severe head trauma. His head was completely covered in bandages, except for his eyes. After John was released from the hospital (assume it was Mercy Hospital) he was sent to Saint Bernards hospital for the insane. He later was released from the hospital to be cared for by his family. He lived on his sister Mary's farm in Newcastle, Nebraska, where he raised sheep and honey bees. John had gotten a cash settlement from his accident. Since John had brain damage and now was rather childlike, his sister Julia handled his money and would give him an allowance of ten dollars a week (quite a bit of money for the times). He would take his ten dollars and get a ride into town every week to buy candy. A couple of times a week, he would give each one of Katie's children (Betty, Barb, John, and Dick) a piece of candy. They thought this was a great treat, and always searched for Uncle John's hiding place, but could never find it.

John lived on the farm until shortly before his death, when he moved back to Council Bluffs and died at the age of 82.

John never married.

Mary and husband (Charles) Will Stokes owned a 3 story brick apartment building at 201 East Broadway. (the corner of Broadway and Benton street). Over the years many of the family members lived in one of their apartments. It was depression time, and through one of Will's contacts, he was able to buy a farm in Newcastle, Nebraska very cheap. (Believed he got it for back taxes). During the depression no one could find work, so Mary's sister, Katy and Husband Dan Papineau, their daughter Marie and her husband Guy Faris and their 4 children (Betty, Barbara, John, and Dick) and Mary's brother John Sharkey, all lived on the farm. Later her brother Frank would come to live there too. (This was a small farm house) In 1930, their apartment building was valued at nine thousand dollars.

Notes for FRANCIS JOSEPH SHARKEY:

Brother to Katie:

Although born with the name of Francis, he never used that name and always used the name Frank. Frank and Hilda were married for a very short time. He never remarried. In about 1933, Frank moved to the "family farm" in Newcastle, Nebraska and farmed for the family until the late 1940's when he moved back to Council Bluffs, Iowa. For a few years he lived alone on an acreage just outside of Council Bluffs where he grew numerous fruits and vegetables, including grapes. In the early 1950's Frank moved in with his sister Julia until her death in 1968. After Julia's death, Frank stayed in her house for a few months until he found a small house to move into. He only lived in this house about 3 months until he became ill and had to be sent to a nursing home. Frank died at Mercy Hospital 10 months after Julia's death. Frank never had children.

3. KATHERINE ELIZABETH³ SHARKEY (*JOHN N.², EDWARD¹*) was born April 07, 1876 in County Galway, Ireland, and died January 10, 1955 in Council Bluffs, Pottawattamie Co., Iowa. She married DANIEL BENTON (POPPINO) PAPINEAU August 06, 1900 in Harrison County, Missouri (Daniel spelled his name Poppino on the licence. We're not sure just when he stated spelling it Papineau), son of JESSE POPPINO and MARY DIXON. He was born January 06, 1868 in Iowa County, Iowa, and died October 14, 1944 in Council Bluffs, Pottawattamie Co., Iowa.

Notes for KATHERINE ELIZABETH SHARKEY:

Katherine was born the fourth of ten children.

Katie, with her husband Daniel and daughter Marie, left Missouri in a covered wagon in 1903, when Marie was 6 mo. old. When Marie was a small child, Daniel worked as a carpenter at Fort Niobrara, near the Rosebud Indian Reservation near Valentine, Nebraska.

In 1920 the family lived in an apartment at 201 East Broadway in Council Bluffs, Iowa. Daniel owned his own carpentry shop. Marie was 16 and worked as a stenographer in a Bank.

The 1900 census spells his name "Popino"----the 1920 census spells it "Papinneau"--- and his tombstone read "Papineau".

Notes for DANIEL BENTON (POPPINO) PAPINEAU:

A quote from the book "The Poppinos of Orange County, New York" ;

"These, then , were the Poppinos - farmers, churchgoers, warriors when necessary.

After the Revolution when many veterans were taking up land in northern and western New York, some of them moved there; others to Pennsylvania and on west. Today there are more Poppinos than Popenoes, and a few of them have changed their name back to Papineau."

It's believed the the Papineau family originated in France, immigrated to Canada, then to states. At least two of the family members in the Civil War; Daniels father, Jesse was one, and Jesse's brother George W. was the other. Daniel's father and ancestors spelled their last name "Poppino" and "Popenoe" (Daniel was born and married with the spelling "Poppino"). Sometime after his marriage to Kate he changed it and went through life spelling his name "Papineau", but I have found as family members move around the country, the members that move seem to change they way they spell their name, and the ones that stay behind keep the original spelling. But all told, it states that the original selling WAS Papineau, and that Daniel was one of the few that went back to the "Old Way".

Daniel was a carpenter by trade. In 1903, when daughter Marie was about six months old, he moved his family near the Rosebud Indian Reservation at Fort Niobrara near Valentine, Nebraska. After working as a carpenter on the reservation for several years, the family left Fort Niobrara in a covered wagon and came to Council Bluffs, Iowa, which was called Kanessville or Kane Township at that time. In 1910, the family was living at 2906 Avenue E. Marie was seven years old and in school, Katy was a housewife, and Daniel was still a self employed carpenter. By 1920 they had moved into one of Katy's sisters (Mary Stokes) apartments at the corner of Benton St. and Broadway. Daniel had his own carpentry shop for awhile. In the late 1920's times were hard. Daniel was working more than one job. Not having any money to get from one job to another, It's believed he tried to hop a train. No one can remember exactly what happened, but his leg was mangled, and he was on crutches the rest of his life. He developed Osteomyelitis (inflammation of the bone), for which there was no treatment at that time, and his leg never healed. After his accident, unable to work, Daniel and Katy moved to the "family farm" in Newcastle, Nebraska. Later they returned to Council Bluffs, where they lived until their deaths.

She had bought a solid gold Challis for Saint Patrick's church (the church she attended). Julia also built a wing for Mercy Hospital. By the time she died, she had given nearly all of her money away. Although once considered quiet wealthy for the times, at the time of her death, her attorney said that if she had lived much longer she would have been on welfare.

In 1952, Julia commissioned the "Moore Monument Co." of Chillicothe, Missouri to erect a large granite monument with the name "SHARKEY" engraved on it. She also ordered individual headstones for her father John and mother Ellen, and her brothers Charles and Mark. The total bill for the stones was \$665.00.

E. Lyle Kubat joined the Navy at age 18, in March, 1944. He first served on the USS Piedmont then served on the Destroyer USS Gatling during WWII, was a Screening Escort for the U.S. Third Fleet; Task Forces 38 and 58. He spent the war in the South Pacific Theater of War, taking part in Island battles, including Iwo Jima, Philippines, Guam, Saipan, Wake Island, Palu, Yap, Marshall Island, Eniwetok, and finally Japan. There were also many more battles at sea, not Island related.

Among some of the events remembered: Assisted at the rescue of the Aircraft Carrier USS Princeton, taking on survivors. Shot down ten Japanese aircraft; sunk two Japanese AK's (merchant ships), taking survivors for interrogation. Boarded Japanese ship Nagade (the ship was later used in the U.S. Atomic Bomb tests). His rank was Machinist Mate.

Lyle's ship was one of the escorts taking into Tokyo-Bay the USS Missouri at the time of the Japanese surrender at the end of the war. He then was assigned to Navy Shore Patrol in the occupation of Japan, in Tokyo. Lyle was discharged in May, 1946. He received numerous war medals such as the Silver Star, Bronze Star, Victory Medal and many more.

Following his Navy service, he attended Creighton University earning a Bachelor of Arts degree. His work career was in Omaha, Nebraska. He was a foreman at the Serta Plant, working there of 25 years and then at Seating International until retirement.

MEMORIES OF MY PARENTS.....written by Jackie Sharkey, 2002

Michael Sharkey 1886-1966

John and Ellen Sharkey (my grandparents) came from Ireland and then to the U.S. and settled around Trenton and Breckenridge, Missouri. They had ten children; Kate (Papineau), Mary (Stokes), Patrick, John, Charles, Mark, Mike (my father), Julia (Miller), Delia and Frank. Mike and Julia were twins. These are probably not in order of their ages but as I remember them. The Sharkey family were all born in Ireland except Mike, Julia, Frank and Delia. It was told to me by my dad that they had a home destroyed by fire and was also in a flood on the Missouri River. This is why many family memories were destroyed.

I never knew either Grandpa or Grandma. Grandma was bed fast for over a year and passed away November 13, 1922. My mother said she was a wonderful person and never complained about being in bed. Grandpa passed away February 14, 1928, but I still cannot remember him. My mother often told me that when he stayed with us, she had to watch him because he wanted to chew the meat before I would eat it, he was afraid I would choke on it.

My Dad, Mike, never went past the 4th grade (I was told by his sisters), as he was expected to help make a living. He was a very good reader and is the only person I know who could read the newspaper and listen to the radio or watch TV at the same time and get both of them.

He loved horses and was a jockey at 14. He could ride and break horses and many neighbors would bring their horses to him to break. He broke my horse, Zeve, and he had one of the best cattle horses around. The neighbors would often come and get my dad to ride him and get the cattle out of the timber pasture when we lived between Redfield and Stuart. His horses were well kept and he did his own shoeing. I remember his braiding their tails up when the weather was muddy. That way they would not get them dirty.

After his marriage to my mother, he was a fireman on the Burlington RR between Council Bluffs and Pacific Jct. He was also a Barber in Treynor, IA. And drove the horse and buggy for Dr. Stevens in Treynor, as he made house calls at night. This was the doctor that delivered me. He also worked as a hired man on several farms around Treynor and Carson. The one I remember was the Goose Farm at Carson.

This story I am going to tell is when my dad lived in the Treynor area. He was a very good baseball player and the town of Treynor was well known for it's baseball team. Mike would either play shortstop or second base. At that time only 3 players were paid (pitcher, catcher, and whatever place my dad played). It was told to me that when the town of Treynor heard that he was going to move, a farmer offered him a job so that he would stay in the Treynor area to play ball. My Grandpa Talbott claimed he was an excellent player.

We moved to a farm between Redfield and Stuart on March 1, 1930 and lived there 10 years, and to the Guthrie Center area in 1940. In those days everyone moved on March 1st. Our move to the Stuart area was cold and snowy and very sad because we were moving 100 miles (very far at that time) from our grandparents, aunts, uncles and very dear friends. Our Model T had curtains on it but my dad was a good driver and got us safely through. I faithfully kept my gold fish on my lap so they would not freeze, and my mother had heated bricks to put on our feet to keep them warm. When we got to Stuart, we had to rent a house for a month so that the people would vacate our farm home.

We lived 2-1/2 miles from our country school and we went by horse and buggy, and when it was too muddy, by foot or horseback. My two brothers - Raymond & Jerald - took very good care of their sisters, Margaret and Jaxine. One time going to school our horse, Topsy, ran away. One side of the buggy shaft fell down and was hitting her. Raymond told Margaret and Jerald to jump but he stayed with me until he could get her stopped. I was so bundled up I could not move, but had every faith that he would get her stopped.

I remember many things about my dad. His "say" was the rule and I never dreamed of going against him. I am sure I sat on his lap and read the paper and listened to the radio or his telling stories till I was thru my grade school days. He was a very good dancer. When I was small, he would carry me while he and mom danced. Also, he could sing a square dance so that everyone could understand him. I loved to waltz with him, even after I was married. I am not sure, but when I waltzed my last waltz with him was in Audubon, Iowa at Cecil and Martha Railsback's 25th anniversary dance.

Daddy retired from the farm, moving to Guthrie Center in 1954. He worked a few years as a "Bin Site Man" for the ASCS.

He loved his grandchildren and took Terry, Dennis & Lynn to Adair to ride the train from Adair to Atlantic, where he and my mother met them. After moving to town, he always carried gum and had a stick to give to the kids on the walk home from being downtown. An act you could not do now.

He passed away at the Guthrie County Hospital, Guthrie Center, Iowa, August 28, 1966.

The memories written by his daughter, Jaxine Lucille Sharkey Ritchie

Ruth Marie Talbott Sharkey 1896-1975

I know very little about my Grandpa Talbott. He was a BIG, and a good grandpa. My dad told the story about Clum (that is what they called him), he was keeping order at the dances in Treynor, Iowa. One time two men were fighting in the dance hall and Grandpa picked them up, one in each hand and tossed them outside to finish the fight.

My dad and Grandpa were pals. When we lived a Stuart, we went to see Grandpa and Grandma. Daddy, staying at home to do the chores, as 100 miles in those days was an overnight stay and quite an excursion. Grandpa, in turn with Mr. Musson, turned around and went out to stay with Daddy. Needless to say, my Grandma was disgusted.

When I got older, I realized it was Grandpa that played Santa Claus and that is why he was never there when Santa came. I remember when he picked me up - I felt very tall and big.

My Grandma was a small petite lady. Beautiful white hair clear down to her waist. I can still see her brushing it faithfully every nite, and in the morning, putting it in a bun in the back. She was an excellent cook and fed the Sharkey family well when we came to visit. She knew each of our favorite dishes. I can still hear the hum of the tires on Daddy's Model T on the brick street going up the hill to 219 Fairview Ave. in Council Bluffs, Iowa. Grandma's house, what fun we had.

Grandpa and Grandma had 6 children: Ruth Marie Sharkey (my mom), Edwin, Ralph, Velma, Myrthel, and Darwin. My Grandma's parents (Andrew and Mary Beveridge Liddell) were killed by a Jersey cow. She had her calf and Grandpa went in to take care of her and the cow attacked him. Grandma went to help him and the cow turned on her. A neighbor found them and they passed away, hours apart.

My mother was the oldest of the Columbus Talbott family. When she would go shopping in Council Bluffs with her four children, she would sit them on a bench in Benos Department store and we stayed there till she was done. I might add that Raymond was the Chief.

She was a good cook and housekeeper. Washing on the board for years, and we were always clean. I can remember coming home from school with the aroma of her baking coming thru the door when we came in. Always goodies and pie - 6 pieces and 6 mouths ready to eat.

She was what I would call an excellent seamstress. She would take old clothes that my aunts would send us, and make Margaret and I dresses from them. One suit I had in high school was made for Uncle Dar's pants. Everything was well made and styled, all without a pattern.

She too, was a good dancer. I have the dresser set (china powder and pin dishes) that she won while dancing with my Uncle Edwin. They tell me they were quite the dancers.

After the folks moved to town, she worked at several cafes in town, the last being the "Al Cronks Cafe". She was always ready to help out in any way she could.

My mother could drive a car, but never when my dad was along. He always drove. The last time my day came to my house, my mother was driving. I knew then that something was wrong, but he wanted to come to my house and Margaret's house. That night my dad went to the Guthrie County Hospital with a heart attack and died a few days later.

Mom loved her grandchildren and her great grandchildren that she lived to see. Her cookie jar was always full for the ones that came to her house and visited. Seems I can never conquer the way that she made her sugar cookies. Also had a scotch steam pudding, but that, I was able to make almost as good as her.

My mother lived by herself in their home until August, 1974, when she went to the New Homestead in Guthrie Center at her own request. She passed away February 27, 1975.
