This regiment was organized with Iowa City as a place of rendezvous and it was mustered in Oct. 10, 1862. After a week at Davenport it moved to Helena, Ark. where a detachment of 500 accompanied a force in the direction of Oakland, Mississippi, for the aid of Grant in his effort to take Vicksburg. Smallpox kept the command in camp until Jan., 1863, when the regiment moved in the expedition up the White River as far as Devall's Bluff and returned to find its tents gone: When the men sank down into the mud to rest as best they could until something could be provided to give them some shelter from the elements. The regiment spent a week at Yazoo pass in February, cleaning the channel of the obstructions place there, and then returned to Helena. Col. Miller resigned, being succeeded by Lieut-Col. Connell and the latter by Capt. Wilson as lieutenant-colonel.

Moving for Vicksburg on April 11, the regiment was first under fire at Port Gibson, where it went into battle after a 24 hours march and fought with coolness and spirit. It was at this time a part of the 2nd brigades, 12th division, 13th army corps. It took part in all the movements, skirmishes and marches of that corps, and was engaged at Champion's Hill, where it lost 22 killed, 65 wounded and 13 missing, four companies coming out of the fight without a commissioned officer. Gen. Hovey said of the 24th and 25th IA regiments "scarcely more than six months in service, yet not troops ever

showed more bravery or fought with more valor."

The regiment went into the trenches before Vicksburg and remained until the fall of the city. At the conclusion of siege it moved to Jackson and engaged in the siege of that place. At this time it was reduced to about 250 men capable of duty, death, wounds and sickness having wrought havoc in its ranks.

On its return to Vicksburg, it was assigned to the Department of the Gulf, and accompanied on expedition into western Louisiana as far as Opelousas. On the return it was in constant skirmish, Making several Marches toward the west on two or three occasions when the enemy became too aggressive. It was next ordered to Texas, but transportation not being furnished the regiment went into camp at Madisonville.

About March 1, 1864 it proceeded to New Orleans, thence to Algiers, and a few days later to Brashear City. It was with the Red River expedition, fought at Sabine Cross-Roads, where it lost about 80 in killed and wounded, Col. Connell, being severely wounded and captured, the command devolving upon Capt. Thomas Dillon in the absence of his ranking officers. The regiment was on train guard service when the battle of Pleasant hill was fought.

When Grand Ecore was reached the regiment was joined by Lieut.-Col. Wilson with a large number of recruits. From Morganza the regiment marched to the Atchafalaya, and on its return embarked for Carrollton, where Col. Connell joined the regiment, an armless sleeve at one side.

After some minor movements it sailed for Alexandria, Va., from there to Washington, thence to Tennallytown, and went into camp. With the Army of the Shenandoah, it was in the battle of Winchester, losing nearly 90 in killed and wounded. In the pursuit it captured 6 of the enemy's guns in battery, a large quantity of ammunition and a number of prisoners in the battle of Fisher's Hill.

At Cedar, with the 4th brigade of Grover's division, it went into action as the 8th corps gave way, but being lift in an exposed position, through the failure of another regiment to come up on its right, it was driven back by overwhelming numbers, stubbornly contesting its ground for over half a mile. Lieut.-Col. Wilson was severely wounded, and the command fell to Maj. Meyer. The regiment recovered itself, pressed to the front in the charge that followed, and joined in the pursuit when the tide turned. Its losses for the day were nearly 100.

It was engaged in many minor movements until the end of the year; sailed in Jan. 1865, to Savannah, Georgia, for garrison duty; thence moved to New Berne, North Carolina, and back to Savannah; thence to Augusta and the last of June again to Savannah, where it was mustered out July 31, 1865 its total strength was 956.

GEORGE W. POPPINO -- WOUNDED IN THE BATTLE OF CEDAR CREEK, VIRGINIA

October 19th, 1864

Cedar Creek, Va., Oct. 19, 1864. 6th and 19th Army Corps and Army of West Virginia. On the evening of the 18th the Confederate forces under Early occupied a position at Fisher's hill, a short distance south of Strasburg. The Union army was encamped about 5 miles north, on the north bank of Cedar creek, in the vicinity of Middletown. The Army of West Virginia, commanded by Gen. George Crook, lay west of the pike running from Middletown to Strasburg, probably a mile and a half north of the former, Thoburn's division (the 1st) occupying the extreme left. Along the pike and extending west and still further up the creek was the 6th corps, under command of Maj-Gen. Horatio G. Wright, who, in the absence of Gen. Sheridan, was the ranking officer. Still farther to the right and up the creek was Torbert's cavalry in three divisions, commanded by Gen. Merritt, Powell and Custer, respectively.

The Federals had destroyed all the supplies between Cedar creek and Staunton, making it necessary for Early to transport all his rations, feed, etc. from the latter place by wagons—a somewhat difficult task—and for several days the Confederates had been expected to either attack or fall back for supplies. Reconnaissances on the 18th showed no enemy in the immediate front, and it was generally believed that they had retreated up the valley. To make sure, however, Wright issued orders that evening for two brigades to make another reconnoissance the next morning. One of these was to move up the Strasburg pike and the other was to take the back road, some 3 miles west and nearly parallel to the pike. Both were to move at dawn and to go forward until the enemy was found and strongly felt, in order to learn his intentions.

From the signal station at the end of Three-top mountain, which overlooked all of Sheridan's camps, Capt. Hotchkiss had on the 17th made a map of the Federal position, and it was from this map that Early planned his attack. At midnight, on the 18th Kershaw and Wharton marched from Fisher's hill to Strasburg, where they separated, Wharton continuing on up the pike to Hupp's hill, while Hershaw turned to the west along a by-road leading to Bowman's mill. Gordon, Pegram and Ramseur had marched several hours before, moving along the base of Three-top mountain to the North Fork of the Shenandoah at Bowman's ford, where they crossed and gained position on the Union's left. Fossler's command was moved by the back road to attack the cavalry.

At the first blush of dawn on the 19th the Federals were aroused from their slumbers by the roar of artillery and the rattle of musketry. The attack was commenced by Hershaw and fell upon Thoburn's division. Before the men had time to form, the Confederates, fired by the prospects of victory, were among them. The division was swept from its position, many of the men and 7 guns being captured. These were immediately turned upon the retreating troops. The corps commanders Wright, Emory and Crook, exerted themselves to form a line, with Hayes, and Kitching's divisions as a base, west of the pike for the defence of the road. Pursuant to the order of the evening before Molineux's brigade was in line, ready to start upon its reconnoissance. This brigade was ordered by Emory to cross the pike and take position on a wooded ridge, in order to support Crook, while Wright ordered two more brigades to the same locality. Had this movement been carried out it would no doubt have checked the advance of the enemy in the beginning of the engagement. But before the line could be formed Gordon and Ramseur suddenly debouched from the woods west of the pike and struck the divisions of Hayes and Kitching on the flank. These divisions were without entrenchments of any kind and the men, already demoralized by the retreat of Thoburn's division, could not withstand the sudden and unexpected assault. The line broke, thus exposing the 19th corps to an enfilading fire for its entire length. Under the circumstances Wright issued the order for the 6th and 19th corps to fall back. A dense fog prevailed on some confusion resulted in the execution of the movement, but the batteries of the 6th corps finally took a position on the ridge near the cemetery west of Middletown, where they did such effective work that the enemy was compelled to halt and strengthen his lines. About the same time Ramseur and Pegram sent word to Early that they must have reinforcements on the Union's left or they would be unable to break through. Wharton's division, the men of which were busy in plundering the evacuated camp of the 19th corps, was rallied and sent to their assistance. Wharton was met by a destructive fire from the infantry of Getty's division, now commanded by Brig.-Gen. L.A. Grant, before which the whole line recoiled, and while the confusion existed Grand charged and drove Wharton back down the hill. The charge was met by a discharge of artillery, all the enemy's guns being concentrated of the division, which was compelled to fall back. It was in this charge that Brig.-Gen. Bidwell fell mortally wounded.

A little after 8 o'clock the fog lifted and the movement of troops could be directed with more intelligence. In the early part of the engagement the general movement of the Union forces had been toward the left, to confront the enemy in his attack on that portion of the line. In falling back they had maintained a position en echelon, each corps being farther north than the one on its left, and the charge of the 6th corps was well to the Confederate right. To make matters worse for the Confederates the attack of Rosser on the Union cavalry had not been so successful as that of the infantry on the left. Here the order of the previous evening resounded to the advantage of the Federal arms. The 1st and 3rd divisions were both stirring before daylight, preparing to send men on the reconnoissance, and when Custer's pickets were driven in the men were promptly ordered into the saddle to repulse the attack that they felt sure was coming. Forming the cavalry on the right of the infantry, Torbert sent his trains to the rear, and when Rosser advanced far enough for the cavalry batteries to open on his line he was greeted by a fire that drove him to the shelter of the woods near by, where he remained

until the tide of battle was turned in favor of the Union side. In the meantime Powell's division was holding Lomax's cavalry in check at Front Royal, so that the cavalry attack might be characterized as a failure. After the fog lifted Wright ordered all of the cavalry to the left. Leaving three regiments to hold Rosser in check, Torbert promptly made the transfer. The 1st brigade, 2nd division, Under Col. Moore, which had been stationed at Burton's ford as a picket, was cut off by Gordon, but Rejoined the main body at Middletown, having made a detour around the Confederate's right. Seeing the Federals massing their strength in this quarter, Early crowded his troops farther to the eastward to prevent his right wing from becoming enveloped.

When the fight commenced Gen. Sheridan was at Winchester, where he had paused on his return from Washington. Reports of the cannonading reached him early in the morning, but not attaching much importance to it he remained at Winchester until two hours later, when it became certain that a battle was in progress. Mounting his horse he started for the scene. On the way he met and turned back many of his men who were straggling to the rear. Inspired by the example of their intrepid commander they hurried back to the front and took their places in line with a determination to do or die. Under Sheridan's orders the line of battle was formed on the prolongation of Getty's line and temporary breastwork of logs, rails, etc., hastily constructed. Early advanced and attacked, the assault falling principally on the 19th corps, which bravely withstood the shock and after some severe fighting the Confederates were driven back. At 4 p.m. Sheridan ordered a general advance. Early's promised victory became a defeat and the defeat became a rout. Custer's gallant charge with his division of cavalry was closely followed by a combined movement of all the Federal forces and the enemy was forced back across Cedar creek. The difficulties in crossing added to the confusion and all efforts to rally the men were vain. Custer's division and Devin brigade of Merritt's pursued the routed mass to Fisher's hill, a distance of over 3 miles, the road all the way being covered with abandoned artillery, wagons, caissons and ambulances. The Federal loss was 644 killed, 3,430 wounded and 1,591 missing. Most of the missing men belonged to Thoburn's division and were captured in the first attack. Early stated his casualties as being "about 1,860 killed and wounded, and something over 1,000 prisoners." The 24 cannon lost by the Union troops in the morning were all recaptured together with 24 pieces that had belonged to the enemy. Scores of wagons were piled up and burned by the Federal cavalry and 56 ambulances fell into Sheridan's hands. This battle broke the Confederate's hold upon the Shenandoah Valley. Although Early remained for some time in that part of the state he did not again assume the aggressive until Sheridan withdrew to Kemstown.

REGIMENTAL HISTORY

Fourth Cavalry IOWA (3 YEARS)

The 4th Iowa was one of the distinguished cavalry regiments of the West. it was mustered in at its rendezvous of Camp Harlan, MT. Pleasant, in Nov. 1861, and spent the winter there learning the art of war.

It went to the front with the army of Curtis in Missouri in March, 1862. The following summer it made the extraordinarily hard march from southwestern Missouri through Arkansas against Little Rock, nearly to that capital, and thence to Helena on the Mississippi River. It remained at the latter place during the winter with no chance for war's excitements. But the early May days of 1863 saw the 4th IA cavalry taking a conspicuous part in Grant's great campaign against Vicksburg. From Port Gibson to Jackson it was the advance guard, holding a post of honor in the front of Sherman's corps, while from Jackson to Vicksburg it was the rear-guard of the whole army, keeping back its pursuers. it was, until long after Vicksburg was invested, the only regiment of cavalry in that army, and was in a state of incessant activity under the daily urgent calls for cavalry service.

The regiment took part in the second Jackson campaign, and until the close of the year 1863, engaged in numerous important expeditions and raids in Mississippi, notably the one from Vicksburg to Memphis in August, in which great loss of property and army transportation was inflicted on the enemy. February of 1864 saw the regiment on the Meridian campaign with Gen. Sherman, being at that time a veteran command, having been the first from Iowa to reenlist. Enormous damage was done to railroads and property on this raid and the cavalry skirmished with the enemy daily for 150 miles. Immediately after the Meridian raid the veterans of the regiment started home on furlough.

In May Lieut.-Col. Peters led the regiment on a raid from Memphis in search of Forrest, followed by the disastrous expedition under Gen. Sturgis to Guntown. In the brilliant Federal victory at Tupelo the regiment did its full measure of duty and shared in the honors of that successful expedition of Ge. A.J. Smith. on Oct. 21, 1864, the regiment joined Gen. Pleasanton near Independence, Missouri, and the following day fought the battle of the Big Blue River, driving the Confederates out on an open prairie and routing them completely. Two day later the cavalry overtook the Confederates at the Marais des Cygnes river, when another victory was won, the 4th and 3rd IA cavalry charging a force having 5,000 men in the front line, and capturing 1,000 prisoners, including Gen. Marmaduke and Cabell. Five cannon and several battle flags were among the trophies of victory. The pursuit was continued on through Missouri, Arkansas, and Indian territory, the campaign being one of extraordinary marches and extreme hardships. The following March found the regiment concentrated with other troops at Eastport, Mill., for Wilson's great raid to Selma, Columbus and Macon.

After some garrison duty near Atlanta, and some chasing over Georgia in search of the flying head of the Confederacy, the 4th IA cavalry was mustered out, Aug. 10, at Atlanta, GA, and carried home with it a name and a fame of which not only its members, but all Iowa was proud.

A quote from the book "The Poppinos of Orange County, New York" ;

"These, then , were the Poppinos - farmers, churchgoers, warriors when necessary. After the Revolution when many veterans were taking up land in northern and western New York, some of them moved there; others to Pennsylvania and on west. Today there are more Poppinos than Popenoes, and a few of them have changed their name back to Papineau."

It's believed the the Papineau family originated in France, immigrated to Canada, then to states. At least two of the family members in the Civil War; Daniels father, Jesse was one, and Jesse's brother George W. was the other. Daniel's father and ancestors spelled their last name "Poppino" and "Popenoe" (Daniel was born and married with the spelling "Poppino"). Sometime after his marriage to Kate he changed it and went through life spelling his name "Papineau", but I have found as family members move around the country, the members that move seem to change they way they spell their name, and the ones that stay behind keep the original spelling. But all told, it states that the original selling WAS Papineau, and that Daniel was one of the few that went back to the "Old Way".

Daniel was a carpenter by trade. In 1903, when daughter Marie was about six months old, he moved his family near the Rosebud Indian Reservation at Fort Niobrara near Valentine, Nebraska. After working as a carpenter on the reservation for several years, the family left Fort Niobrara in a covered wagon and came to Council Bluffs, Iowa, which was called Kanessville or Kane Township at that time. In 1910, the family was living at 2906 Avenue E. Marie was seven years old and in school, Katy was a housewife, and Daniel was still a self employed carpenter. By 1920 they had moved into one of Katy's sisters (Mary Stokes) apartments at the corner of Benton St. and Broadway. Daniel had his own carpentry shop for awhile. In the late 1920's times were hard. Daniel was working more than one job. Not having any money to get from one job to another, It's believed he tried to hop a train. No one can remember exactly what happened, but his leg was mangled, and he was on crutches the rest of his life. He developed Osteomyelitis (inflammation of the bone), for which there was no treatment at that time, and his leg never healed. After his accident, unable to work, Daniel and Katy moved to the "family farm" in Newcastle, Nebraska. Later they returned to Council Bluffs, where they lived until their deaths.

He spent the war in the South Pacific Theater of War, taking part in Island battles, including Iwo Jima, Philippines, Guam, Saipan, Wake Island, Palu, Yap, Mashall Island, Ennewita, and finally Japan. There were also many more battles at sea, not Island related.

Among some of the events remembered: Assisted at the rescue of the Aircraft Carrier USS Princeton, taking on survivors. Charles Horace Poppino was born 10/23/1914 in Spickard, Missouri. Legally adopted as Horace Heck prior to enlistment in the Army. Was a Master Sergeant with the 43rd Chemical Battalion in World War II. Graduate of Westminster - chemistry. Horace (Charles) was quite the practical joker all of his life, and example of this was, as a student at Westminster, he and a classmate snuck in and stuffed the Organ pipes full of Chicken feathers. The next morning they watched as high ceremony was under way - as soon as the organist hit the keys, yes, Chicken feathers blew all over the Abbey!

He married Thelma M. Britt on December 24, 1941 in Arkansas. A June wedding was changed to a Christmas Eve elopement due to Pearl Harbor.

Horace originally worked at a mill in Trenton till he went to work for Stauffer Chemical Company where he remained until his retirement in 1976.
