

# *Descendants of Franklin Charles Goodell*

## *Generation No. 1*

1. FRANKLIN CHARLES<sup>1</sup> GOODELL was born September 15, 1815 in New York, and died June 02, 1894 in Decatur, Burt County, Nebraska. He married MARY A. RUNDELL. She was born 1817 in New York, and died Bet. 1860 - 1870 in Nebraska.

Notes for FRANKLIN CHARLES GOODELL:

In the 1850 Federal Census, the Franklin Goodell family was living in Hudson, Lenawee County, Michigan. Franklin (34) was a Tailor, wife Mary (33), son Francis (11), son Stephan (8), and daughter Sarah (11 mo) owned property valued at \$1000. Between 1854 and 1860, the family had moved to the Nebraska Territory. Here they lived in DeSoto, Washington County. (Which is now known as the Fort Calhoun area)

Son Francis married in 1858, Stephan A. (18) was living at home working as an engineer, and Sarah was 11, presumedly in school.

Franklin kept on with his tailoring business, until after the death of his wife Mary, sometime in the 1860's. After Mary's death, Franklin moved in with his son Francis and his family on their farm in Decatur, Burt County, Nebraska.

Franklin operated a general store in the town of Decatur. He traded with the Indians, sold them supplies when they went on their hunting trips, and would trust them until they returned in the fall. Then they would pay him in furs and hides. It was very seldom that they would not pay him. He was known to the Indians as "White Bear". He was quite a large man, not too tall, and wore a white beard.

He died June 2, 1894, at the home of his son Charlie at the age of 79 years 9 months. He was buried at Decatur, Nebraska.

" The family always seemed to think maybe great grandfather had buried some money in Decatur as he would go out in the grove and dig, and when they would ask him what he was digging for, he would say....that money"

## BELL HISTORY

This is the history of the bell on the Presbyterian Church in Tekamah, Nebraska. It was the first bell in the county. This story was printed in the Plaindeal Paper.

In the early summer of 1867, a steamboat called "The Saint Mary" from St. Louis, Missouri loaded with hardware and merchandise for the mining camps near Fort Benton, on the upper Missouri River, struck a snag just below Decatur, Nebraska, where it sank, but not until they had run anose on a sandbar on the Nebraska side of the river.

Mr. Goodell of Decatur was the adjuster for the steamship insurance, and he immediately took action to save what he could salvage for the company. Among other things, he took the boat's bell, a fine sweet sounding one which all steamboats carried at that time.

Mr. Goodell sold the bell to the people of Decatur, but they got in a dispute over whether it should be on the school house or the town hall, so Mr. Goodell loaded it on a wagon with other things and started to Omaha. He stopped at Tekamah for dinner at the home of G.P. Thomas who kept the stage station. This was where they changed horses that were carrying mail from Omaha to Sioux City on the Nebraska side of the river.

Mr. Goodell told the story in my store and said the bell was for sale "cheap". Mr Thomas suggested that a few chip in and buy the bell just to best Decatur.

The bell was of the best metal, made in Baltimore, and weighed about four hundred pounds. These four men bought the bell; G.P. Thomas, Will Harrington, Godfry Grovvenor and myself. We paid \$87 for it. After we had it, we didn't know what to do with it, but we beat Decatur. That was enough, as Decatur and Tekamah were friendly rivals. The bell was left with me, and since I had no place to hang it, I laid it on the platform of my store.

We decided to give it to the first denomination which would erect a church building in Tekamah. The Lutherans were the first to accept it. But, in the early spring we had a big wind storm which blew it flat. They were unable to rebuild it, so they abandoned the undertaking. So we still had the bell on our hands.

The Presbyterians were the next to attempt to build in 1870. C.K. Conges was the principal factor in the movement, but he did not know of our offer when let the contract for the church without a belfry. Jim and George Suterland were the contractors. When they heard of the bell proposition they said they would build the belfry for \$75, and donate it to the people just to beat us out of the bell, and that is how we got rid of it.

Steve Goodell's daughter, Ida Belle, was born in a wagon box near Devils Gate in the Wyoming Territory in 1862. The family moved on to Running Creek, Douglas County (near Denver, in the gold region of the Colorado Territory). Stephan farmed the land and had 3 more children while living in Colorado. Frank, born in 1866, Abigail, born 1868, and another daughter born in 1870. In the July, 1870 census, it shows a 3 month old daughter that had not been given a name yet. This little girl must have died since she is not in the 1880 census. About 1873, Stephan moved his family to Nebraska where he had 4 more children. Stephan was born 1873, Grace, 1876, Van was born 1878, and Cora 1880. In 1880 Stephan was farming in Blair, Washington County. Ida, his oldest daughter had just married Henry Burman and the couple was living with him.

Most of the family was living in Florence City, Nebraska around the turn of the century. ( Which is now part of north Omaha. It's been said that some of the family is buried in the Old Florence Cemetery, now the Morman cemetery. In 1900 Steve was a widow living in a rented house next door to Lucinda (Mattox) Cole and son John. Steve and Lucinda were the grandparents of Della M. Cole. Steve was her great-grandfather on her mother's side, and Lucinda was her grandmother on her father's side.

John Eddy was born February 2, 1854, near Saratoga Springs, New York. His parents moved to Radner Township, Peoria County, Illinois about 1857. In 1869 the Patrick & Catherine Connealy family moved to Burt County, Nebraska. The 1870 census says that John Eddy was 14 years. old.

On November 22, 1880, John Eddy married Sarah Ann Goodell, daughter of Francis Charles Goodell and Mary S. Murphy Senate. Shortly after John Eddy and Sara were married they moved to the sited where they lived for 59 years. Their home was located between the Mark Malloy and Vincent Connealy farms. Ed and Anna Marie (Gatewood) Sears lived in that home when it burned down sometime in the late 1950's.

John Eddy must have had some good years on the farm because by the time he got old all his children

received a farm. The boys, Edgar and Frank, received 160 acres and Mark received 140 acres. The girls received 80 acres a piece. He left around 800 to 900 acres. John Eddy was fond of big horses. There are several pictures of him either on a horse or holding the reins of a big horse. All during his life the horse was so valuable to him in the farming operation.

John Eddy and Sarah Ann must have had a powerful religious faith. They were Catholics. Looking at how strong the religious faith of their children shows their faith wasn't just words, but words supported by action.

After his wife Sarah died in 1928, John Eddy was a widower for 12 years. Several of his daughters' families lived with and took care of him.

John E. Connealy passed away at his home June 14, at the age of 86 years, 4 months, and 14 days, after an illness of three months.

John Eddie Connealy (as he was familiarly known), was born at Saratoga Springs, New York, February 2, 1854, from where he moved to Peoria, Illinois. At the age of 16 he came to Nebraska.

On November 22, 1880 he married Sarah Ann Goodell and shortly after he moved to the site where he has lived for the past 59 years. His wife and one son, Charles Montgomery, preceded him in death.

He is survived by 6 daughters - Mrs. James McCormick (Marie Catherine), Mrs. Shannon Gatewood (Marcella Grace, known as Cella), Mrs. Joe Malloy (Pauline Elizabeth), all of Decatur; Mrs. George Donahue (Anna M.) of Montrose, South Dakota, Mrs. Chris Jensen (Ellen Alma known as Nell) and Mrs. Thornton Gatewood (Agnes M.) both of Omaha; and three sons, Edgar (married to Elizabeth Badge) and Frank (married to Ida Badge) Decatur; and Mark of Baytown, Texas. One brother, James living in Decatur. Besides these there are 24 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

Funeral service were conducted by rev. William Borer at Holy Family Church on June 17 and interment was made in the catholic cemetery.

A note from Father Mike Malloy

Born April 24, 1901, five miles southwest of Decatur, Ann was a stylish fun loving woman. She visited her married sister, Pauline Malloy, at Montrose, South Dakota, and that's where she met her husband, George Donahue, a teacher at Montrose. They married in Decatur and lived with George's mother in Montrose, South Dakota.

George Donahue applied for the high school superintendent job in Decatur and he got it. In the August 3, 1951 edition of the "Montrose Herald" it states, "Montrose people were greatly shocked when word came of the sudden death of George R. Donahue at Decatur, Nebraska, of a heart attack." George Donahue was born on January 14, 1889, and died July 28, 1951.

The last few years of Ann's life she lived in the apartment above Huff and Hightrees grocery and clothing store in Decatur. Ann and George did not have any children.

"Franklin Charles, my father, was born August 7, 1861, at DeSoto, Washinton County, Nebraska. When he was a small boy his parents moved to Decatur, Nebraska. Decatur is on the edge of the Indian reservation, and in those days things were not too quiet at times. I have heard father say many was the time when his mother would hide the children under the bed and stand in the door with a hatchet in her hand when the Indians would come into Decatur for a good Time. That was before my grandparents homesteaded the farm.

When they homesteaded and moved on it, grandmother always left a light in the window for fear some one would get lost. It didn't make any difference whether it was Indians or whites, they never got turned away. They were always welcome to eat and sleep in the house.

I do not know the date grandfather and grandmother homesteaded their place, but the family was young, and they grew to man and woman-hood on it. Then as the years went by they each went their own way."

## BLIZZARD

"It was a quiet day, with several inches of snow. There was a neighbor of theirs who had to go to the hay field to get some hay. Loaded sleds were easily upset, and he managed to upset his. Father and a man that was staying with the folks went to help him straighten the sled and reload the hay. As they were ready to start out for home, the wind changed direction, and blew from the north west with such a force, the snow swirled around and blinded them. Well, father, not being an excitable kind stopped to think if they followed the direction of the wind, they would run into a fence. He took his hunch and used it, and it paid off. They followed the fence to the barn. When they got to the barn the snow had sucked up under their coats so tight they had trouble getting them off, but they made it.

Mother, Irene and Gertie were in the house. Gertie was a small baby. Mother said that when the wind changed, it forced the smoke out of the stove. It frightened her, and she poured water on the fire and put it out. She wrapped the girls up in blankets and put them in the bed. She had seen the men coming before the storm hit and started to blow. She very nearly started to the barn, but decided against it, which was a good thing, as she would have never made it.

As to the men and the load of hay, the team took them right up to the barn. The men got down on their hands and knees and crawled to the house. They were lucky. Several others who were out in the storm did not make it to safety. They told of one boy on the way home from school. He ran into a hay stack, dug a hole in it and crawled in and stayed until morning. Several schools die not let the children leave."

### Notes for MARGUERITTE ELDORA GOODALE:

"While living in Atlantic, Iowa, mother's folks ran a hotel there for a while. As I can remember, our mother mentioned something about her grandfather staying with them. And in those days, their garbage disposal was a pig. That was her grandfather's chore---to feed the pigs---and when it was ready for market, he would offer it for sale. When a buyer would come along and make him an offer, he would say, "If they are worth that to you, they are worth that to me", and he would keep on feeding them.

Another of mother's memories was her chore of emptying the chambers every morning.

Funeral services for Mrs. Charles Brant, 79, were held at the Catholic church Monday forenoon, May 18, with the Rev. Father Krass officiating. Mrs. Frank Clinton was organist. Pallbearers were W.A. Denton, B. L. Bonine, Oyer Bonine Sr., Pete Selhorn, Frank Coulter and Jess Hamilton. Interment was in Riverview cemetery.

Ida Belle Goodell was born in a wagon box along the Sweetwater, near Devil's Gate in 1862. She is believed to be the first white woman born in Wyoming. A friendly squaw attended her mother and cared for her. When a year old, she and her mother were held captive by the Indians for 24 hours. While still a baby she moved with her family to Denver, living there until 12 years of age, when they moved to Nebraska. When 18 years old she was married to Mr. Steinspring (Burman). Two children were born to this union, Elroy Steinspring of Tacoma, Wash., and Mrs. May Fisher of Casper. These with their father preceded her in death. In 1910 Mrs. Steinspring (Stanton) was married to Charles A. Brant of Basin and in 1919 they moved to Worland where they have made their home. Mrs. Brant was an invalid the last three years of her life. Her husband survives her. Other survivors include a brother, two sisters and three nieces, all in Omaha, Nebraska: a granddaughter and five great-grandchildren in Council Bluffs, Iowa; a great-granddaughter and great-great-grandson in Michigan.

The Washakie Signal Fire joins the community in sincere sympathy to Mr. Brant and bereaved ones.

I sure am in a ponder sins the 27th of march. On the 27 of march your grama died. She was buried on 29 of March. She was sick only 5 days. She died with blood clot on her brain. She surely suffered something awful. So I am left alone but Raymond is going to rent his house & move in with me, as I have a large house & more room. I could not find your last name in your last letter only Della. So that accounts for to rite Della Pain. You signed your name Kells & that was all.

This is all for this time. Hoping will find all Well & Doing well. Write soon. With I will close with regards from all to all I ? your grand Paw

"Dear Della & all

I received you very welcome letter a few day ago which I read With pleasure. Was glad to hear that You are all well up to date.

Sory to note that Vergil hasn't any work yet. I know it is hard to find work her also. But keep on trying.

Maybe he will Stumble on to something Soon. Some very best men here have bin out of work for a year.& half pay rent & lave large families on hand. I know I have been playing a loosing game the last I years, also, But I had a little surplus on hand. But the hard time & all the sickness & deaths & Sickness of myself my surplus is about exhausted. But I am living very sparingly by. So I manage to get along but drive my car any more than I have to.

No Della I haven't bin sick sins I wrote you last only down hearted & heart broken. I feel lost don't care to go any where. So if you don't here from me promptly, don't feel hard towards me. I wont forget you.

Della I don't know what went wrong with your Father he just quit writing to us some twenty years ago. You never said any thing about him. So I die not know if he was dead of alive. You tell him I would like to here from him some time . Yes give me his address. We are having fine wether now not very hot & cool nights. Croax are looking fine. Della, you remember where we lived when you was here? I live on the same old spot Keep my house up in good shape. Everything looking fine.

Well children no knowing of any special news will close for this time. Hoping to hoping to here some good news from you soon.

One closet door was ajar so I peeked in and noticed the back of the closet was a curtain, so I hopped in and drew back the curtain and it was a funeral pallor viewing room and there was a dead man at about a 45' angle in a casket. I let out a howl, turned around and ran over to my big

sister and Nell and Joe had to calm us down.

"When I was about six years old, I was bitten by a rattle snake. It had eight rattles and a button. It bit me on the shin. Of course, in those days, doctors were scarce and medicine was not like now, but they did everything as best as they knew how and I pulled through.

I was bitten in August, and did not get back to school until the next spring. I was at my Uncle John Connealys when it happened. Two of my cousins, Edgar and Frank, and myself were pulling some mustard weeds out of the oats field about forty rods from their house. Of course, we were doing more talking than work. I heard a buzzing noise and thought it was a bumble bee. But, just as I went to pull a stalk of mustard, there I was just about standing on the snake. Of course, I jumped back and the snake took a strike at me, and my shin about half way between the knee and ankle started to swell. Well, we killed the snake, took it to the house, and I said, "look, Auntie, what bit me." Well, then things commenced to happen. The first thing she did was to take a string she had on her stocking and bind my leg. As there were several children in the family and most all could ride horse back, she started them out, one to our place, about five miles, and one down to their school house where my uncle and some men were getting things ready to start school.

My uncle came right home. Another man from there went to Decatur for the Doctor, but he wasn't home. I was bitten about the middle of the afternoon and the Doctor didn't get there until about 12:00 am. He applied the best methods he had and I pulled through.

It took the rest of the summer and part of the next spring before I got to feeling better again. I went back to school then. I was told that a young person who was bitten by a snake would feel bad every year at the same time he was bitten. This would last for a week or so until I was seventeen years old. And this is what happened."

\*\*\*\*\*

"This may not be of much interest to the ones that read it, but I have carried it in my memory for several years. I was only a few months over five years old, and Mayme (Mary E.) was only about two or three months old when we moved to our own place. Well, this happened with the last load. There were a few odds and ends, including the family and the man that was working for the folks. We were all in the wagon, when mother noticed some milk for the calf splashing out of the can. She told the man who was driving the mules that the lid was loose on the can, so he reached to put it back on. He was sitting on a table turned upside down on another table, and when he reached to put the lid back on, the table slipped off the wagon and so did he, taking the lines with him. Well, the mules started to run. Irene was sitting on the washing machine. Mother told her to jump and gave her a little push. She made it o.k. Gertie and I were enjoying the ride. We were sitting on the floor in back of the wagon with our feet hanging out. Dad was holding Mayme in his arms. He gave Gertie and I a shove and we went with a roll. Then he jumped with Mayme, holding her close to him with one hand. He lit on one hand and his knees. He got bruised a little, but no one got hurt. I do not remember how mother got out. After the mules had run away, they turned a corner that was up hill, and stopped. The hired man cut across the corner of the pasture and caught them. His name was Phil Williams. He was a jailor in Sioux City several years at the old jail after he left the folks."

\*\*\*\*\*

"I do not know just where Irene and Gertie were born, but it was somewhere around Lyons, Nebraska. Then in 1889, the folks moved on a farm about four miles east of Lyons where I, Clyde, was born in 1889. In 1891 they moved on a farm about one mile east of Grandfather Goodell's. That is where Mayme was born. Then in the spring of 1894, they moved on their own farm adjoining grandfathers.

the four older children all attended Divide Center School. Irene and Gertie both finished the eighth grade there. I was in fifth grade and Mayme in second. Irene went to Lyons School and graduated from twelfth grade. Then in 1902, the folks sold their farm and bought a ranch in Garfield County, Nebraska, about seventeen miles north of Burwell, Nebraska.

Following is a little history of our move to the ranch. We left Burt County November 24, 1902, and on my thirteenth birthday. We went by train to Burwell, and from there by team and buggy. We got a man with a

team at Burwell to take a load, and Jim McCormic who was working for the family, took another load. We had what was known as a double buggy (two seats); We hitched a team of ponies on it and the family all rode in it. As we neared the ranch, about two miles away, we had to cross some ice ponds. The ponies did not have shoes on, and one was getting quite tired from slipping. Finally, she slipped and fell, and could not get up. We all pushed and pulled until we got her off the ice and she made it the rest of the way.

Mother was afraid the men with wagons would have trouble finding the house as it was getting dark, so as soon as we got there, she set a light in the window. The men with the loads had trouble. The ice would not hold under the weight. Jim was holding the lines of the team, and they pulled him off into the water. They saw the light in the house, and Jim came to the house. He was all wet, and his clothes were frozen to him. He and father went back to the wagon (the other man had stayed with the teams and wagons). They brought some things out of the wagon to eat, and as they had to leave the wagons until morning, they put blankets on the horses and brought them along.

The people that moved out had left a heating stove in one room, and as we had brought a small amount of coal along in the buggy, we soon had a fire going. Mother and Irene sat up all night to keep the fire going so the men's clothes would dry. Our beds were clear across the room on the floor, with hay under us and blankets over the top. No ill effects at all.

The house was quite large. It had four large rooms. It was a sod house, with one end of two rooms just dug out of the hill. The rest was laid sod. It also had a sod roof. The walls were about 18 to 20 inches thick. They were plastered with a white plaster or something similar to plaster. It was warm in winter and cool in summer. We also had a sod barn which held eight head of horses, a cow barn, sod chicken coop and a sod stove fuel building. The other buildings were of wood."

"While on the ranch our sister Irene taught school about half-way between the ranch and Burwell. My sister Mayme and I went to school in Burwell. The folks bought a small house in Burwell for us to live in, and Gertie and mother took turns staying with us. Gertie stayed most of the time. The folks did not like this way of living. They wanted us all together. So, in late winter of 1904, they traded the ranch for a farm three miles south of Waterbury in Dixon county. Irene stayed and finished out her term of teaching, and then joined us at Waterbury.

Our youngest sister, Frances, was born in Waterbury on February 10, 1905. In the spring of 1907, the folks traded the farm for a hotel in Allen, Nebraska, which they ran for awhile. Then in the fall of 1907, they sold the hotel and moved back to Waterbury. Father and I built and ran a livery stable for awhile. The the folks traded it for a farm about four miles south of Waterbury, which the farmed for three years. Then Bertha and I were married and farmed it for one year. Then all of us but Gertie moved to Thurston County and farmed one year. Once more we came back to Waterbury and built a new brick general store, which we all ran for awhile.

In 1914, Bertha and I built a new home while running the store. Sam and Gertie took over the store when father and I bought eight acres in 1917 adjoining our homes. We farmed around Waterbury until after the four children were born. In 1925, we sold this eight acres and moved to Bertha's folks farm four miles southwest of Waterbury. We were there twelve years. In 1936 it was very dry and our crops amounted to very little, so we decided to go on a smaller place that joined her folks place. We lived on two other places for a few years in the same neighborhood. By this time Verele and Vernagail were married. Laverne stayed with us until we had a sale and quit farming in December 1947.

Bertha and I decided to go into the shoe repair business. We started a shop in Allen in February 1948. Laverne worked at various jobs and was at home for awhile. Then he decided to go on his own. We had some merchandise, such as shoes and other foot-wear. We operated this until the fall of 1959, then we sold our stock. We moved our repair equipment to the basement of our home for ten years. Failing health and age came and we sold everything and as of now, 1970, we are in the Elms Nursing Home in Ponca, Nebraska."

#### A Family Trip in a Covered Wagon

"The trip was to Atlantic, Iowa, to visit the George Gingery family. Mrs. Gingery was mother's sister, Lizzy.

At the time of the trip, I was eight or nine years old. Now, about seventy years plus, I am trying to fill in some of the back happenings. I am quite sure it was in early fall. The party consisted of father, mother, father's sister, Aunt Annie (Sarah Anne Goodell) Connealy, and Nell (Ellen), Aunt Annie's youngest daughter at that time, babe in arms, my three sisters, Irene, Gertie, Mayme, and myself. We were all in one wagon.

The first day we got close to Blair, Nebraska and camped close to a railroad bridge across the river (Missouri river). Every time a train came through, it frightened the horses, and the folks had to sit up all night watching them. The next morning, we crossed the river on a ferry boat powered by a team of horses on the boat.

When we got to the other side of the river, the road was just a trail through wild hay that was as high as the covered wagon. We got to Walnut, Iowa, that night and made camp just out of town near a railroad track. As the horses were afraid, the folks had to sit up another night. We were also close to a well improved farm, and father went to see if it would be possible for Aunt Annie and baby to stay there, but got a no. The next morning when we were about to pull out, and father was not in a very good mood, the man came out to milk. Dad went over to him and said if he ever came to Nebraska, he was welcome to camp in the shade of his barb wire fence.

The following night, we came to a run down place, and father asked again if Aunt Annie and the baby could stay for the night. They insisted that all of us stay, and that we should put the horses in the barn. As it was about supper time, they also insisted that we come in and eat with them, and the folks accepted. They had quite a family of their own, plus another couple that had come in a covered wagon. When we sat down to eat, the man passed the food and asked, "sweet potatoes or Irish potato?" That night the folks brought in our bedding and we all slept on the floor. The next morning, we had breakfast with them also. Father offered to pay them, but they would not accept anything. This made us think the poor made the best friends.

I think we got to Uncle George's the next day. We were there a week or so. Uncle George was harvesting sorghum cane (cereal grass made into syrup, etc.). He had his own sorghum press, which consisted of two large iron rollers rolling together to squeeze the juice out of the cane. This was powered by a team of horses. They had a large iron kettle to boil the juice in until it was right for sorghum.

Father decided to take another route home for a while, and on the first evening out we stopped to see about getting Aunt Anna and the baby in for the night. It happened to be the people that were also staying at the place we stopped before we got to Uncle George's. They insisted that we all come in for the night and have breakfast with them. The next night we camped by a grove, and the third night we were back to the Missouri River and camped. It was raining the next morning, and father flagged the boat over to get us. There was another wagon there that also wanted to cross. The boatman had us all get on. There were cleats on the floor of the boat so the horses could get a toe hold. The poor old team that was pulling the boat just slipped and pulled with that big load, but they got us across, and we got home that evening.

About a year later the Gingers came to visit us, and they came by covered wagon. That was the last time we ever saw them".

"I was born in between the four girls. After coming back from Burwell, I attended the Oakdale School. I attended Wayne College for one semester in 1908 and 1909. Professor Pile ran it at the time. He died while I was there, then the state took it over. While attending Oakdale School, there was a certain young lady in front of me by the name of Bertha Mae Fegley. After January 4, 1912, she was not in front of me, but by my side and still is. We have been married for fifty-nine years as of January 4, 1971 and hope for several more good years. We have had sad times, happy times, hard times, and good times through the fifty-nine (plus) years".

FOUND DEAD ON HER BED

Mrs. May Fisher, thirty-three years of age, wife of Pete Fisher, the freighter, was found dead lying on her bed in her home in the west part of town about noon last Thursday. Mr. Fisher had been out to Salt Creek for over a week and when he returned he immediately entered his home. He saw his wife lying on the bed in a natural position, fully dressed, but when he approached the bed he discovered that she was dead. Physicians were called and they said that she had been dead about twenty-four hours. Coroner Foshay empaneled a coroner's jury composed of F.P. Bogue, J.R. Clemons and James A. Kennedy and returned a verdict that death was caused from an excessive use of strong drink. The stomach was removed by Dr. Kieth and nothing was found that would indicate suicide, although a phial partially filled with carbolic acid was found in the room with the deceased.

Miss Abbie Goodell, an aunt, and Della Cole, the 11 year-old daughter of the deceased, arrived on Saturday and the remains were interred in Highland cemetery on Saturday afternoon, services being held at the M.E. church.

"His first school was at Waterbury, Nebraska. When we relocated to live on Berth's folks farm, Verle went to Oakdale School. He attended Oakdale through the eighth grade, at which time he decided to leave school and work on the farm. He was at home until he was married to LaVonne Herfel, daughter of Elmer and Viola Herfel, on January 15, 1936. They were married at the Methodist parsonage in South Sioux City, Nebraska.

LaVonne attended school at Beacon Country School and Allen High School. After Verle and LaVonne were married, they worked as farm laborers for awhile, farmed south of Waterbury for a few years, and then moved to Ponca, Nebraska, where Verle was employed as a mechanic for O.N. Knerl and Sons - Ford Garage.

In the fall of 1943, Verle had a freak accident, which I will try to explain. He and another employee were sent to Willis, Nebraska, to get a car to be repaired. Another one of Knerl's employees came back from South Sioux with a load of gas. They stopped at Willis, and Verle got in the oil truck. Just as they were at the city limits, the drive shaft broke, and the driver lost control of the truck. The truck rolled over. As the truck rolled, the driver tried to jump out, but he was pinned under the door and killed instantly. Verle was pinned in the truck. The men took him out through the windshield. Gas was running down the ditch and people were smoking everywhere. They took him to a friend's home and called the doctor. The next day, mom and I heard about the accident, so we went right over, but he was already home. We knew that something was wrong because he kept blacking out, so we took him to the doctor in Sioux City. They x-rayed him and took one look at the pictures and put a wide collar around his neck. Verle asked if it was broke. The doctor said it was broke and shoved over so the spinal column was being pinched. Verle asked what was holding his head up, and the doctor replied, "God Almighty is". We then took him to the hospital and he laid on his back for 30 days with a heavy weight pulling on his head, to get it back in place. He was in a plastic cast for several months from the top of his head to his hip. It was about a year before he could go back to work.

Verle and Laverne also operated an automotive repair business of their own for awhile in Ponca. In May 1958 Verle and LaVonne moved to California. Verle carried on in the automotive mechanic field.

But, in 1912 she was living with her father, or another relative in Florence, Nebraska. She received a telegram from her stepfather, Pete, telling her that her mother had died. (See telegram).

Through her life, Della was shuffled around the family from mother, to aunts and to cousins. I think she might have felt like she was never really loved. As an adult it seems that she was never REALLY happy. She married John Howard Payne. They had a daughter (Jean) and a son (John Jr.), but the boy died five weeks later. One night John came home from work to find a strange car parked in the driveway. When John looked into the car, he saw his wife Della and another man embracing. In the back seat was their daughter Jean, covered in vomit. John took the baby and left. He filed for a divorce soon after. To support herself, Della took to the streets. When she met Virgil Parish she was pregnant with someone else's child. Virgil married her anyway. (Della was 28 and Virgil was 18). They moved into the Parkside Hotel in Florence (across the street from the Florence Bank), and when the baby came the doctor was late, so Virgil delivered the baby himself. The doctor finally showed up, but it was already over. The doctor still sent them a bill for the delivery. They named the little girl Bette.

Bette grew up thinking that Virgil was her real father. One night, when she was about 16, Virgil and Della got into a terrible fight. All of the kids in the house could hear the yelling. At some point Della screamed at Virgil "what if I tell Bette that your not her real father"! That night, Bette grabbed some clothes and left the house. She never returned. She moved in with her girlfriend Donna. Donna and Bette started drinking and partying. (I think that Bette was trying to numb the lies and hurt that had been thrust upon her at her young age.)

Della and Virgil were married for about fifteen years. During that time she was very mean to Virgil. If they went out for a night at a dance hall and a female friend of theirs would ask Virgil to dance, Della would kick him under the table, so he would decline. Later a man would ask Della to dance and she would jump up and turn to Virgil and tell him to "stay there", so he would sit alone at the table all night. They would always argue. One night Virgil told her that he was moving to a hotel. He said he would work two jobs and give her all the money, just keeping enough out for himself to live on. He said she could stay at the house and raise the kids. Her reply was "I've had enough of the kids, You keep them!" She packed a bag and walked out, not even saying good bye to the children. This was about 1942, Doreen was about 12 at the time. She went straight to the Windsor Hotel in Omaha where she lived until it was condemned in 1979.

About a year after Della left, Virgil moved in Ellis Button and her three kids. Ellis lived with Virgil for about 3 years and wanted to get married, but Virgil was seeing someone on the side, a divorced woman named Leora (Vokt) Garber. Finally in 1946 he told Ellis to move out. After Ellis moved out, he moved in Leora and HER three kids. A year later they were married.

Della lived at the Windsor Hotel until it was condemned in 1976 (see magazine article). She moved into an apartment in the area of 25th and Jones where she lived until her stroke sometime in the late 1980's. After her stroke, she was sent to Hallmark Nursing Home on Grover Street, where she resided until her death, December 2, 1996.

I'm not trying to make any excuses for Della's behavior during her lifetime. We all know that she was not a great mother, but this woman had lived her own hell when she was a child. Her parents divorced when she was little and she was put on a train all by herself to go back and forth between Omaha and Casper, Wyoming. Her grandmother was on her 3rd husband by the time she was 10 years old, and her own mother was on her second.

Then her mother, dying of overuse of alcohol when Della was 11. She must have seen allot of bad things when she was a child.

All in all, Della was a Grand old Lady, and this writer will be glad to see her again one day!

When Doreen's mother Della died, at the age of 96, her body was cremated. Doreen kept her mothers ashes with her for about a year and a half. Although her mother had a cemetery plot, Doreen and nephew Gary (a deputy sheriff) took the ashes to the grave site of her sister Bette, Gary's mother. They dug a hole above where they thought Bette's chest would be, and buried Della's ashes there. Now mother and daughter are together again.

When leaving the nightclub (with several cocktails under their belts), Doreen, in her white wedding dress, fell down a 4 foot embankment into a 2 foot mud puddle. John was laughing so hard, he had trouble getting Doreen out. (Wish there was a picture!)
