Notes for ELIZABETH SCHREIBER:

The 1850 census shows an Elizabeth Schreiber, age 13. I can find no further record of Elizabeth Schreiber. The will of Jacob Schreiber leaves bequests to his children, but the only Elizabeth mentioned is Elizabeth Light, who was born in 1856. The Elizabeth in question was born about 1837. The will of Simon Schreiber leaves bequests to 7 brothers and sisters, but an Elizabeth is not mentioned, only his younger sister, Lizzy Light Molter. Possibly the older Elizabeth Schreiber died young before the 1860 census and before the younger Elizabeth (Lizzy) was born in 1856.

From "Fisher-Stombaugh Families and Allied Lineages 1715-1949"- Maria Fisher was the fourth of the Fisher girls to marry preachers. Her husband was John Frederick Schreiber, an immigrant from Germany like her sister Elizabeth's husband, Phillip Wingert. John F. Schreiber was born in Baden, Germany, in 1832. From there he came to America in 1847 with his parents, who immigrated at once to Illinois and settled in Stephenson County. It was here young John united with the Evangelical Church and later felt impelled to preach the gospel.

It was in 1855 that John F. Schreiber was licensed to preach by the Illinois Conference of the Evangelical Association. In 1858 a call was made for missionaries to Kansas and Nebraska. The young preacher volunteered his services and was accepted to be assigned to Nebraska while a companion, Rev. C. Berner, was assigned to Kansas.

Since these appointments antedated the construction of a railroad across Iowa, they had to travel over roads that were hardly more than rutted trails. However, when the destination of Council Bluffs was reached on the Iowa side of the Missouri River, and John Schreiber could look into his "promised land," his achievement seemed to him to have been worth all the hardships and dangers he had endured along the way. His enthusiasm was expressed in a letter he wrote to the editor of the *Christliche Botschafter*, a German language church paper. Excerpts from this letter have been quoted previously in Chapter V.

Within two years, Reverend Schreiber was brought back to Iowa to serve under the direction of the Iowa Conference. It was during this period that he met and married Maria Fisher in Jasper Co. When the Kansas Conference of the Evangelical Church was organized in 1864, Reverend Schreiber was assigned to the Leavenworth and Lawrence missions in Kansas. The next year at the first session of that conference, he was elected presiding elder, thus becoming the first minister to be elected to this office by the Kansas Conference.

J. F. Schreiber gave 37 years of his life in the active service of his church. He was an early leader who wielded a strong influence in the expansion and establishment of his denomination in a pioneer field. In Maria Fisher he was fortunate to have a devoted wife and strong helpmate. He preceded her in death by nearly a score of years in 1896, and is buried in Leonardville, Kans. His life's work, however, goes on through two of his grandsons who have followed him in the Christian ministry. They are Ralph Roy Schreiber, son of Gideon Lincoln Schreiber, and Merton Schreiber Zeisset, son of Preseda Fisher Zeisset.

From "Fifty Years in the Kansas Conference" (pp. 13-14)- In the spring of 1858 the brethren Schreiber and C. Berner turn their faces westward and travel from Illinois through Iowa to Nebraska and Kansas. The following letter, written by J. F. Schreiber at Council Bluffs, Iowa, Sept. 27, 1858, contains a graphic description of their trip.

"Dear Bro. Koch: The trip which I made with Bro. Berner, missionary to Kansas, was, as may well be expected, connected with hardships, exertion and danger. The Lord, however, who protects his own, was with us on our journey and protected us. Our motto was: 'Forward.' How enchanted we were, after we reached Iowa's last heights from which we could see the Missouri valley spread out before us! The scene was romantic and glorious. How inviting the borders of Nebraska welcomed us through the rays of the setting sun!

"Arriving in Council Bluffs, we were received by friends, and we at once began to inquire about the German people. We also held service on Sunday. We found that the Germans were mostly very ungodly. The first place I visited was St. Mary's, on the Iowa side of the line, which contains about 100 to 125 families. This village is about four or five years old and has never had a religious service in English or German. I visited them three times, but found no reception. Possibly a door may open later.

"On June 28, 1858, I for the first time stepped on Nebraska soil. Nebraska, the great prairie territory, contains some of the best land that can be found; has good water, and a healthy climate. The country along the Missouri River is especially beautiful. It is completely scattered over the Germans. My sphere of activity is quite extended, and I have my designated places for preaching. I could find considerable more to do if the work were not too scattered for me to serve alone.

"My beginning was tolerably hard. Every beginning is hard, especially for a preacher in a new country where he must begin friendless and brotherless. The moral condition of the people is depraved, as well among the Germans as the English. Sin and vice of all kind are at home. The region is like a field of death where Satan is constantly harvesting. A child of God is driven to ask in astonishment, 'Where will this end?' Our meetings up to this time have been rather small, for which the fever is, to a great extent, responsible. I am in most instances well received. Almost everywhere I find open doors and friends who receive me, if not royally, yet heartily.

"On the 20th of September I attended a camp-meeting, held by the English Methodists. I felt at once that I was among God's children. The preachers were of the right type, some of them seemed to be genuine pioneers. The members seemed to be joined together in love. I came among them as a lonely sheep, but I went on my journey feeling strengthened, and rejoiced with the thought in my heart: When shall we, too, be able to hold camp-meeting in Nebraska?"

Of J. F. Schreiber it is related that he, on one occasion, stopped at a cabin to stay all night. This cabin was occupied by a bachelor who was a very rough man. Supper was finally prepared, which consisted of meat, which was apparently fish. After supper the host asked his guest how he liked his supper of corn bread and fish. Brother Schreiber responded that it was very good, but he was inquisitive to know how he came in possession of fish at that place, whereupon the man remarked that the meat he ate was not fish, but rattlesnake.

On another occasion Brother Schreiber inquired at a home if he might stop all night, but found the house crowded with people. The gentleman remarked that although they had no room to keep him there, he could find room for him at a neighbor's house where the people were away, providing he were not afraid to stay alone. Brother Schreiber said it would make no difference, so he was taken to the house and conducted to a room in which there were two beds, neither of which had been arranged since last used. His host remarked: "My brother died here today, and his wife and children are staying with me. Just sleep in either bed. Goodnight." Brother Schreiber afterward remarked laconically: "If I had only known in which of the beds the man died!"

(Pages 63-64) In the year 1866 5 families moved from Ohio to Winston, MO, where they settled and established homes. They were true Evangelical families who longed for the church of their choice to worship in. This

privilege was granted them when the following year (1867) J. F. Schreiber came in contact with them and organized a class with 11 members as follows: Ephraim Kuhns and wife, Henry Coons and wife, Jonathan Burgert and wife, John Heldenbrand and wife, Mike Young and wife, and Fannie Stecker. Ephraim Kuhns was elected class-leader, and Mike Young exhorter. At first the services were held in a grove during the summer months, and later in the old Castor school house. In 1880 a church was built in town, which has been used ever since. Several ministers have come out from this society to bring the glad tidings of the gospel to their fellow men, namely S. A. Burgert of the Kansas Conference, who became the first missionary to Oklahoma, and I. H. Hauptfuehrer of the Illinois Conference. Also the former wife of F. C. Neitz, who accompanied her husband as missionary to Japan, and from there was called to her eternal home.

Schreiber, presiding elder, shall be stricken from the list of missionaries, with the understanding that for this year he shall receive out of the missionary treasury \$100 for rent, this \$100 shall apply to the new district house, and Brother Schreiber shall collect the amount he expends for rent up to the time he can occupy the house from the district."

"1871-Holton- During the past year the first church at Holton was built at the corner of Third Street and Pennsylvania Ave., with J. F. Schreiber and F. W. Voegelein as pastors. This building was one of the early structures in the Conference, built of wood, 40 x 30 feet in dimensions, and valued at \$3,200, including the lots, according to the statistics of Conference.

This church was used by the congregation as a place of worship 24 years, and was the scene of many glorious demonstrations of Divine powers in the salvation of souls and the quickening of God's children. Annual Conference sessions were held in the same, and the first annual convention of the Young People's Alliance was held here when the initial steps were taken to organize a Conference Branch of the Young People's Alliance. In 1894 the building was replaced by a larger and more commodious one."

"1895- Inasmuch as our worthy Brother J. F. Schreiber found it necessary during the year to withdraw from the active work because of failing health, and his physical condition not permitting him to remain in the ranks any longer, and since the dear brother has served without interruption for 40 years among us as a godly and useful servant for the Lord, experiencing great hardships and poverty in the early years of the work, yet laboring on faithfully in the saving of souls and building up the kingdom of Jesus Christ- therefore resolved, that we regret that Brother Schreiber is compelled to take this step, and that we wish him a happy and peaceful evening of life, and trusting he may be able to meet with us from year to year in our Conference sessions."

Memorial- At this time we are neccsitated to record the death of another pioneer and charter member who closed a long and exceedingly useful life in the Kansas Conference. J. F. Schreiber was born April 2nd, 1832, in Baden, Germany. In 1847, when he was a lad of 15 years, his parents came to America and located in Stephenson County, Ill., where he was led to conversion and united with the Evangelical Association. In 1855 he was licensed to preach by the Illinois Conference, held at Northfield, Cook Co., Ill., under the chairmanship of Bishop Joseph Long. When in 1858 the call was made for missionaries to Kansas and Nebraska, young Brother Schreiber volunteered to go. He was assigned by the Illinois Conference as missionary to Nebraska, whither he journeyed in company with Brother C. Berner, who was at the same time assigned missionary to Kansas.

Prior to the organization of the Kansas Conference in 1864 Brother Schreiber served principally in the State of

Iowa under the direction of the Iowa Conference, which was organized in 1860, but when in 1864 the Kansas Conference was organized at Dubuque, Iowa, and the assignment made for the newly formed Conference, J. F. Schreiber was stationed on Leavenworth and Lawrence Missions in Kansas. The following year at the first session he was elected presiding elder, thus becoming the first minister elected to this office by the Kansas Conference. He was one of the early leaders and wielded a strong influence in the formation of the organization, which continued throughout his long ministry of 37 years in the active work. During this time he served the church and Conference in various office. He served two terms as presiding elder, and as delegate to General Conference in 1867, 1887 and 1891, being also the first representative to General Conference. He was the first president of the Conference Missionary Society, which was formed at the first session in 1865. He was deeply interested in the progress and development of Christ's Kingdom. Wherever a trust was committed to him he performed his duty conscientiously and faithfully.

In 1860 he was married to Maria Fisher in Jasper County, Iowa, who proved a true helpmeet to him in his ministerial work. She, with three sons and four daughters, survive him. On September 16, 1896, his pilgrimage ceased, his weary spirit took its flight to higher realms, to be with the One who gave it, to whom he had dedicated his life and powers. His body was laid away in the cemetery at Leonardville, Riley County, Kan., to await the resurrection call.

Obituary (Leonardville (KS) Monitor, Sep. 17, 1896)- J. F. Schreiber, living southeast of town died yesterday afternoon from a complication of diseases. Funeral services will be held in the German church, Friday at 1 o'clock. The remains will be laid to rest in the German cemetery.

Obituary (Leonardville (KS) Monitor, Sep. 24, 1896)- It is with a saddened heart that we pen these lines concerning the death of our dear brother, J. F. Schreiber, who has gone to his eternal home, where all cares and toils are past and where death can never enter. Rev. J. F. Schreiber was born in Baden, Germany on the 2d of April, 1832, and died at his home one mile east and one mile south of Leonardville, on Sept. 16th, 96, at the age of 64 years.

Brother Schreiber was a devoted christian, he was converted at an early age and joined the Evangelical church; soon after his conversion he felt the call to the ministry in which capacity he served for forty years. His call to the ministry constituted his only pursuit and vocation. In those forty uninterrupted years of itinerant life he crowded many and varied activities. In the annual session of his conference he was one of the earnest, capable men of that body in any sphere of service. He was also honored by being elected twice as Presiding Elder, by this honorable body. As a preacher he was noted for the spiritualness of his sermons. His preaching contained an element of clear simple statements in the form of a sensible arrangement, and had the qualities of generous emotion and great earnestness. He came to Kansas in 1863 and was one of the pioneers of this, the Kansas Conference, which body, he later on had the honor of representing three times in general conference.

The sermon of his life ended, the Psalms of life sung, the closing prayer offered, there remains but the doxology of a triumphant death and then The benediction of him whose pierced hands welcomed His servants home as "they ford the river one by one." The cause of our brother's death was Diabetes and consumption which was also followed by several strokes of paralysis. He languished on the bed of affliction for some time, but bore his sufferings with great patience and resignation to the divine will that God might through his life and death be glorified. At 2 p.m. on Wednesday the second stroke of paralysis overtook him and from this time until five the time of his death, he gave scarcely any signs of life and in this condition he passed away.

The funeral took place on Friday Sept 18th in the Evangelical church of this place, Rev. Fricker, of Holton preached in the German language and Rev Tobias Presiding Elder of this district delivered a very appropriate and impressive discourse in the English language. Presiding Elder M. C. Platz of Holton, and J. J. Klipphardt of Holton, and the ministerial brethren Wurth, Nannings, Erffmeyer, Schindle and others assisted. About fifteen ministers and a throng of people were in attendance. The church was beautifully decorated in black and his many friends paid their last tribute to the deceased in bringing beautiful flowers in the form of crosses, wreaths etc. After services at the church the remains were taken to the Evangelical cemetery southeast of town where they were interred awaiting the morn of resurrection. The deceased leaves a beloved wife, seven children, several brothers and sisters and many friends to mourn his departure, Our loss is his eternal gain. May the sorrowing ones look beyond this vale of tears to a happy reunion in heaven.

Notes for MARIA FISHER:

Obituary (Leonardville (KS) Monitor, Oct. 21, 1915)- Mrs. Mary Schreiber, nee Fisher, widow of deceased Rev. J. F. Schreiber, was born Jan. 7th 1841 at Cambridge, Indiana, where she spent the years of her childhood. Early in life she was converted to God and became a member of the Ev. Association. In her 17th year she moved with her parents to Iowa. Being lively and hearty in her demeanor as a young christian, her influence for good was soon felt in the church of her choice. Mrs. Schreiber was married to the Rev. J. F. Schreiber, March 29th 1860 with he she faithfully shared the burdens and joys of an itinerant preachers life for 35 years. In 1863 she came to Kansas with her husband and inasmuch as he was one of the first pioneer preachers of this western territory, and his field immensely large, she was often left alone for weeks and months with her small children. Then too the means of living was so scarce that she frequently did not know where to get the next meal. Those were hard times. But she knew how to economize, took refuge in God and always found help, means and ways. In it all she maintained a cheerful disposition and unflinching confidence in God. Accordingly she labored faithfully in the vineyard of the Lord. "She hath done what she could." To her husband who died in 1896 was a faithfully helpmate, and to the 9 children, that were born to them a kindly loving mother. The last 20 years mother Schreiber lived in her home at Leonardville, Riley Co. Kansas. Her home was a modest one, yet always neatly arranged, where the most beautiful flowers seemed to vie with each in blooming at all seasons of the year. In the religious services and in the prosperity of the church she had a keen interest. Only when she could not attend was the absent. She was an active member of the Womens' Missionary Society and a teacher in the Sunday school at the time of her demise. Her home as well as her hand was always open to extend and support the cause of the Lord. It was a source of much joy to her that one of her grandsons, Ralph Schreiber stands in the active ranks of the preachers of the Kansas conference. During her illness she was kindly nursed by her children. She passed away in the full hope of eternal life in the morning of Oct. 13th 1915, in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Fred Stauss, Holton, Kansas, where she spent the last few weeks of her life aged 74 years 9 months and 5 days. She is survived by two sons, four daughters and a large circle of relatives and friends. Three children preceded her in death. Her remains were laid to rest beside those of her husband in the Evangelical cemetery at Leonardville. The following participated in the funeral services: Rev. J. J. Kliphardt, C. Linge, L. From "Kansas Conference Journal March, 1916"- Whereas, Mother Mary Schreiber, widow of Bro. J. F. Schreiber, pioneer preacher of our Conference, died last October, after living a long, useful life, evidenced by the fact that she bequeathed \$500 to the missionary cause shortly before her death, be it Resolved, That we express our sorrow and sympathy to her children, and pray that God may bless them all with a living hope of eternal life.

Obituary (Osborne County Farmer-Journal, July 23, 1953)- Phoebe Ellen Plumer was born near Council Bluffs, Iowa, Jan. 19, 1867, and died at a Salina hospital on July 7, 1953, having reached the age of 86 years and six months. As a girl of 12 years she came with her parents to western Kansas where they settled on claims near Pawnee Rock. Shortly after landing there they were victims of prairie fires in which they lost all newly constructed improvements.
