Obituary (Winston (MO) Sentinel, Aug. 8, 1912)- Jonathan Burgert was born in Schuylkill County, Pa., Oct. 16, 1820 and died near Winston, Mo., August 5, 1912, age 91 years, 9 months and 19 days. He moved from Penn. to Ohio at the age of ten years. In 1842 he was married to Miss Mary Koons, of Ohio. This union was blessed with six children, four sons and two daughters, all of whom save one, Mrs. Jas. A. Castor, of this place, with their mother preceded him in death.

In 1856 he was married to Miss Catherine Koons, a sister of his first wife. To this union were born six children, five sons and one daughter. Three of these also preceded him in death. Those who survive are Rev. Samuel A. Burgert, of Warrensburg, Henry A. and Miss Marietta C., of this place. These and his aged companion with the daughter by the previous marriage, twenty-one grandchildren, sixteen great grandchildren, many other relatives and friends are left to mourn his death. But they mourn not as those who have no hope. He was happily converted to God at the age of twenty-six and united with the Evangelical Association and remained a faithful and devoted member of the same till he was translated to the Church triumphant.

He moved from Ohio with his family in the spring of 1867 and located near Winston. He became one of the ten

charter members of the Evangelical church of this place, only four of which are now left. A good man has gone to his reward. He was not only ready but was waiting for the summons. He often expressed a desire to go to the home eternal. Among his last words were, "O! rest, sweet rest, home, sweet home." Funeral services were held at the Evangelical church Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock conducted by his pastor, Rev. W. C. Johnson. Interment was made in the Winston cemetery.

Notes for CATHERINE KOONS:

Obituary (Winston (MO) Sentinel, Nov. 18, 1926)- Catherine Koons was born in Niagara County, New York, on the eleventh day of April, 1834, and died in Winston, Missouri November 14, 1926, at the ripe old age of 92 years, 7 months, 3 days. She, with her parents, moved to Summit County, Ohio, when she was yet a young girl, where she resided until the spring of 1867 when she came to Daviess County, Missouri, where she resided until her death. She was married to Jonathan Burgert in the spring of 1856. To this union were born 5 sons and one daughter, her husband and 3 sons preceding her to the spirits world. Mother Burgert was converted and united with the Evangelical church at the age of 14 years she remained true to God and the church to the day of her departure. She was one of the ten charter members of the Evangelical church, which was organized in the spring of 1867 near the location of where Winston is now.

By her departure she leaves to mourn their loss- 4 children, Henry A. and Mary Celesta Burgert, of Winston, Mo., Mrs. James A. Castor Sr. of Excelsior Springs, Mo., Rev. Samuel A. Burgert of Lawrence, Kansas and Laura Harris of Julesburg, Colorado. Also 21 grandchildren, (two grandsons are ministers of the Gospel, two granddaughters are ministers wives and one is a trained nurse) there are 39 great grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren, one sister Mrs. Sarah Young of Cavileer, North Dakota and many other relatives and friends but we mourn not as those who have no hope, for our loss is her eternal gain, for she now rests sweetly at Jesus feet with the many loved ones gone on before, and her works do follow her. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the M. E. Church, conducted by Dr. Chas. H. Law, Rev. F. B. Sampson assisting. Interment in Winston Cemetery.

From "The Golden Year 1883-1933" - Samuel A., the third child, was born February 9, 1860 in Greensburg, Summit Co. Ohio. When he was 7 years old his parents moved to Davis Co. MO. They bought an 80 acre farm which was mostly timber land near the present site of Winston. Samuel grew into manhood on this farm. He was converted and joined the Ev. church at the age of 14. He worked one year on a brick yard where he later helped make brick for the Winston church. During the building of the church he served as a hod carrier. Samuel was janitor of this church for some time. Here he taught a class of boys in Sunday School for a number of years. During this time he faithfully served as class leader for two terms. It was in this church Samuel became acquainted with Mary Elizabeth Hauptfuehrer who later became his wife.

Samuel A. Burgert and Mary E. Hauptfuehrer were married at the home of the bride's parents by the Rev. S. H. Bower, May 22, 1883, at 7 o'clock A.M. After breakfast they, with Issac Hauptfuehrer the bride's brother and her aunt Emma Vogelgesang, went on their honeymoon trip of 15 miles in a spring wagon to have their photograph taken. They had a lunch at noon. That evening they returned to the bridegroom's parental home where a few relatives had been invited to spend the evening. A sumptuous meal was enjoyed by all. That evening before retiring they erected their family altar which has remained unbroken up to the present time. They decided then that she should take charge of worship in the evening and he in the morning. This plan they have followed all through the years.

Mr. and Mrs. Burgert moved on a farm near Winston, MO, where they lived for 4 years. Here Ralph Oscar and Hiram Oliver were born. In the spring of 1887 they went to Dundy County, Nebr. where they took up a homestead on which they proved up by paying out. While there they helped to build a sod church and to organize a Sunday School. It was while here that Alice Celesta came to the home. The family then moved to a preemption, which they bought, about 16 miles northeast of Burlington, CO. They lived here long enough to prove up. While out on the frontier they had many experiences which prepared them to meet problems they later had to face.

Having been called of God to the ministry Mr. Burgert, after evading the call for a long time, finally yielded. In the spring of 1889 the family came to McPherson, KS, where they lived with Rev. I. H. Hauptfuehrer while Mr. Burgert attended the Dunkard College, where he took a year of ministerial preparatory work. Samuel A. Burgert was licensed to preach by the Kansas Conference of the Evangelical Church which was held at Holton, KS, in March 1890. Rev. and Mrs. S. A. Burgert were assigned by this conference to the new mission field taken up that spring in the Oklahoma territory. They arrived in Oklahoma in May and proceeded at once to search out the Evangelical families scattered everywhere. They traveled by team and buggy over 4000 miles with no real roads to follow or bridges to cross streams. They had nine regular preaching points in a radius of 200 miles. Services were held in homes of sod, dugouts, school houses, under shade trees and a Rock Island depot. They built two churches, organized two classes and two Sunday Schools. For the years labor they received \$300.00 missionary money.

The next spring Rev. and Mrs. Burgert were appointed to Cambridge, KS, since the Oklahoma work needed a man who could preach in the German language. Here they received \$275.00 for a years labor. While here Cleta Alvena was born. In the spring of 1892 they were sent to Offerle mission in Edwards Co. Kansas. Here they served three years which was the time limit. The second and third years because of hot winds burning up the

farmer's crops, Rev. and Mrs. Burgert fed their ponies and cow straw. They used buffalo chips for fuel. It was here Chester Orpheus was born. Here they organized a W.M.S. and Y.P.A. Mrs. Burgert served as President of these organizations. She was also Assistant Superintendent of the Sunday School.

From Offerle they were transferred to North-West Mission in Philips Co. KS, now known as Woodruff served by the Nebr. conference. Here they had no crop the year previous. This was the hardest and longest move they ever made. They served this mission 2 1/2 years, when the Presiding Elder transferred them to Lucas and Wilson Mission as the former pastor had gone over to the Dowieites and resigned the work. He had quite a few followers who were not pleasant to deal with, but most of them were saved for the church. While living at Lucas, Eran Omer was born.

At the conference session of 1899 Rev and Mrs. Burgert were assigned to the Alden Mission, where there were 4 appointments; one of these was German which was disbanded the next fall. One appointment was 9 miles northwest of Alden and was served in the afternoon. While at Alden they had a wonderful revival with over 90 conversions. Rev. Vennum was the evangelist. In the spring of 1901 Rev. and Mrs. Burgert were sent to Lost Springs where they labored 2 years. While here the church was destroyed by a tornado. The church was again rebuilt. They had a glorious revival at this place with over 25 converts. Among them was the now sainted Rev. W. D. Coleman. Tampa was served with Lost Springs.

Osborne mission with 2 appointments, Killcreek and Rosevalley, 22 miles apart was served 2 years. Here they had good revivals in both places. Among the converts were the now Rev. R. R. Schreiber and Rev. E. F. Heffer. This is where Ester Amelia came to the home. In the spring of 1905 Rev. and Mrs. Burgert were sent to McPherson Mission. When they arrived here with their family of 6 children their household goods were at the station but there was no house to move into, so they had to buy a home of their own. Three congregations were served from McPherson at that time. Here the family was rounded out when Irma Almayra came.

The Burgerts were sent to Warrensburg, MO, in 1910 where they lived 5 years. They were then sent to Clair, MO, where they served 4 years. At these last 2 places they had to deal with "John Barleycorn." At Clair they built a parsonage near the church. Here Rev Burgert's health broke and he had to retire. They purchased a home in Lawrence, KS, where they moved. Here Rev. Burgert worked in his son's shoe shop until his health forced him to change occupation. They purchased a quiet country home at Stull, KS, where they now reside. Rev. Burgert teaches the men's Bible class and Mrs. Burgert is an assistant teacher in Sunday School and has an office in the W. M. S.

(Kansas Conference p. 162) "Lost Springs 1884- Originally Lost Springs belonged to Marion Mission, which embraced the appointments: Marion, Youngstown, Lincolnville, Tampa and Lost Springs. In the spring of 1899 Marion and Youngstown were taken from Marion Mission, and with the appointments Maple Grove and Banner City from Dickinson Mission, formed into Lost Springs Mission, which in 1904 was changed to a circuit. In the month of August, 1902, the church was destroyed by a cyclone, but was immediately rebuilt through the energetic labors of the pastor, S. A. Burgert."

"1890- S. A. Burgert and J. M. Fricker received license to preach." (Kansas Conference p. 204)

"1891 Oklahoma- At the former session of Conference the need for mission work in Oklahoma received recognition by locating a mission in the territory.

When in the summer of 1889 the Government signal was given declaring a large tract of land in the heart of Oklahoma open for settlement, large numbers of men and even women engaged in the "run" for a homestead. Dangerous as this undertaking was, yet thousands participated in the venture. Some were successful, others were not. Some lost their lives in the mad rush for a claim. No sooner had the successful one obtained his claim when he began to make the necessary improvements. Towns sprang up as by magic. Where only a few days before the Jack rabbit and coyote held forth, there were not stores of merchandise. Men came to do business and make money. Sod houses soon dotted the prairie where the homesteader had driven his stake to indicate his claim.

Almost invariably the people were very poor, with nothing of this world's goods except perchance an emigrant wagon, a team of horses, a few crude farm implements, and their families. That there were no luxuries goes without saying, and when the virgin soil refused to yield her returns for the labor performed because of the scarcity of moisture, the poverty of the people became intense indeed. Yet those early settlers, like the pioneers of Kansas, were undaunted in their purpose, and many of them holding on to their homesteads through adversity

and privations were rewarded in seeing the desert blossom and yield fruit."

"1891- Among the early settlers before and after the opening of the 'Cherokee Strip', which was a section of country extending across the northern part of the territory, 62 miles in width, between the original settlement in Oklahoma and the southern line of the State of Kansas, were also members of the Evangelical association from Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, and other states. In view of this fact, and because others were moving into the territory, the Conference located a mission there and appointed S. A. Burgert the first missionary to the new field. Brother Burgert was just licensed to preach, and hence this was his first appointment, which was pioneer work in the full sense of the word. The new mission was attached to Emporia District, with J. Wuerth as presiding elder."

From "Journal of the Kansas Conference 1934"- Whereas, Rev. S. A. Burgert was our pioneer Evangelical preacher in Oklahoma and contributed greatly to the establishment of our work in that state, therefore, be it resolved that we extend to Brother Burgert our deepest appreciation for his foresight and faithful work. May God's continued blessing rest upon him.

Obituary (Lawrence (KS) Daily Journal World, Aug. 24, 1937)- The Rev. Samuel A. Burgert, 77 years old, father of City Councilman R. O. Burgert, died last night at his home in Stull. The Rev. Mr. Burgert began his work in the Evangelical church in Oklahoma in 1890 as a missionary. He later held pastorates in several Kansas towns. Shortly after the World war his health forced him to retire and he came to Lawrence, where he resided for several years. About nine years ago he purchased a place in the Stull vicinity.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. E. B. Burgert of the home; three sons, R. O. Burgert, Lawrence; the Rev. E. O. Burgert, Topeka; and the Rev. C. O. Burgert, Drummond, Okla.; and four daughters, Mrs. Alice Nelson, Hiawatha, Kan.; Mrs. Clela Schreiber, Yates Center; Mrs. Esther Boehringer, Leona, Kan.; and Miss Emma Burgert, Lawrence. Twenty-five grandchildren and one great-grandchild also survive. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Additional obituary (Lawrence (KS) Daily Journal World, Aug. 25, 1937)- Funeral services for Rev. Samuel A. Burgert, who died Monday at his home in Stull will be held at the Stull church at 10 o'clock Friday morning. Burial will be in Oak Hill.

From "Journal of the Kansas Conference 1938"- Rev. S. A. Burgert, father of Mrs. Jacob Nelson, Mrs. R. R. Schreiber, Mrs. V. J. Boehringer, Rev. Chester O. Burgert, and Rev. Eran O. Burgert, was born in Greensburg, Ohio, February 9, 1860, and died suddenly at his home at Stull, Kansas, August 23, 1937. He was converted and joined the Evangelical Church of Winston, Missouri, when 14 years old. He was licensed to preach by the Kansas Conference in March, 1890. He served in the Conference for 29 years, serving the following fields: Oklahoma Mission, Cambridge, Offerle, Woodruff, Lucas, Alden, Lost Springs, Kill Creek, McPherson, Warrensburg, Missouri and Clair, Missouri. His deepest concern was the Cause of Christ and his Church.

From "The Golden Year 1883-1933" - Mary Elizabeth, the third child, was born in Canton, Ohio, January 23, 1867. Her father died when she was only 7 years old, her mother later married Daniel Triem. When Mary was 11 years old she came to Davis County, MO, with her parents where they lived on a farm near Winston. Mary was converted at the age of 8 and joined the Ev. church at the age of 11 years. She became a S.S. teacher at Winston. She was a regular attendant of the S.S., church and prayer meetings. Here is where she met Samuel A. Burgert, who was the class leader. After a courtship of some time, during which they had a Bible reading contest, they decided to join forces and were united in marriage.

Obituary (Lawrence (KS) Daily Journal World, June, 1946)- Mrs. Mary E. Burgert, aged 79 years, a former resident of Lawrence, died this morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. R. R. Schreiber, in Topeka. She was born January 23, 1868, in Canton, Ohio. She was the wife of the late S. A. Burgert, who retired from the Kansas conference of the Evangelical church in 1919.

Surviving relatives include three sons, R. O. Burgert, 1321 New Hampshire street; the Rev. C. O. Burgert, Hillsboro, and the Rev. E. O. Burgert, Wichita; four daughters, Miss Erma Burgert, 810 Tennessee street; Mrs. Schreiber, Topeka; Mrs. Jacob Nelson, Leonardville; and Mrs. B. J. Boehringer, Ponca City, Okla.; three

brothers, I. H. Hauptflehrer, Wichita; Charles and Albert Treim, Winston, MO; one sister, Mrs. H. E. Bower, Wichita; 27 grand children and 16 great grandchildren. Funeral services will be held Wednesday morning at 10:30 o'clock from the First Evangelical church with the Rev. Leland H. Young in charge. Burial will be in Oak Hill cemetery.

Obituary- Mary Elizabeth Hauptfuehrer was born in Canton, Ohio, January 23, 1867 and died in Topeka, Kansas, June 10, 1946, aged 79. When a girl of eleven years of age, she with her parents, moved to Davis County, Missouri, where she lived on a farm near Winston. Here she attended school and grew to womanhood.
